Pass in Review

Field grade officers

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Last month, in a move to improve the availability of field grade officers in the Fleet Marine Force, the Commandant of the Marine Corps directed a five

Force, the Commandant of the Marine Corps directed a five percent reduction in staffing of fieldgrade billets at HQMC, and other non-FMF commands. As a result, an additional 29 majors and lieutenant colonels slated for reassignment this summer will be assigned to FMF commands. The temporary reduction in staffing at HQMC and other non-FMF commands, will not off or the reassignment. affect structured table of organization requirements.

According to manpower officials here, the additional staffing in the FMF directed by the commandant, was requested by the FMF commanding generals. A recent report from the commanding general, Fleet Marine Force, Atlantic, emphasized the requirement to more effectively support the manning of Marine Amphibious Units, Marine Amphibious Brigades the Fleet Aprilation of Directory and Amphibious Brigades, the Fleet Assistance Program and Some of these field grade officers could be assigned to

permanent billets in Marine Amphibious units and MABs at the discretion of the FMF commanding generals, according to officials here.

Billets considered for permanent staffing in Marine Amphibious Units are: commanding officer, executive officer, S-1, S-2, S-3, S-4, embarkation officer and

communications officer. The permanent staffing of these key billets will enhance the stability of the Marine Amphibious Unit staffs.

July sergeant promotions

The following are requirements set by Headquarters Marine Corps for the July 1981 sergeant promotions. To be eligible, a Marine's date of rank must be July 17, 1980 or earlier. The Armed Forces active duty base date must be June 30, 1979 or earlier, making time in-service to rescent 24 months

sergeant 24 months. The cutoff date for computing time-in-grade and time-in-service is June 30, 1981. The cutoff for proficiency and conduct marks was April 30. Composite scores must be reported on unit diaries in sufficient time to be entered and posted no later than June 1, 1981.

Secretary of the Navy

Secretary of the Navy John Lehman in congressional testimony recently reemphasized his basic philosophy; that national security demands maritime superiority and nothing less. He called for a sustained national commitment and a dedicated effort to restore sea power.

The secretary assured the committee that the Navy would "... never stop its efforts to improve the quality of life and career satisfaction of Navy and Marine men and women." He said that the increased pay and compensation legislation passed during the last year was not enough to restore competitiveness with industry nor seven years of accumulated last buying nower.

passed during the last year was not enough to restore competitiveness with industry nor seven years of accumulated lost buying power. Urging a pay raise for servicemembers, Secretary Lehman said, "Despite the beneficial selective reenlistment and speciality bonuses, it is hard to see how our youth will be attracted to military careers, particularly in these services, when neither the personal sacrifices and demand nor the assured pay are comparable to those of civilian employment."





After all, they knew she would only be here temporarily. But they did hire her. Let me rephrase that — they practically adopted both of us. So much for militarycivilian theories.

There will always be problems and conflicts between Hawaii's residents and the military people who are here for such short tours. Unfortunately no one has figured out how to totally eliminate prejudice.

BUT OVERALL I believe things are constantly getting better. The reason is simple. People in both communities care.


