

Wake Island Avengers visit namesake

WAKE ISLAND AIR FIELD,

WAKE ISLAND AIR FIELD, Pacific Ocean — June 12 began as most days do an Wake Island — calm and quiet, especially quiet. The daily 20-minute ocean squall made visibility impossible on one end of the 9,800-foot runway and was taking its time moving across the tiny atoll 2,010 miles west of Honolulu. It was 1623 hours.

It was 1623 hours.
Then, suddenly and without warning, a thundering scream disrupted the routine and four specks streaked between two thunderheads and disappeared into the squall. Several minutes, later, they peeled away beneath the storm and touched down—the Wake Island Avengers were home. It was 1623 hours.

the Wake Island Avengers were home.

They landed in four separate five-plane cells (groups of aircraft), each A.4 Skyhawk grey with slightly grey lettering that simply reads, VMA (Marine Attack Squadron)-211, Wake Island Avengers.

Although 211 is now home-based out of MCAS El Toro, Calif., history placed them on Wake Island four days before the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor in '41.

On Dec. 4, 1941, Marine Fighter

On Dec. 4, 1941, Marine Fighter Squadron-211 launched 12 Grumman F-4F Wildcats off the deck of the USS Enterprise bound for Wake. Because of the breakdown of relations between the U.S. and Japan, the squadron was flown in to support the 1st Marine Defense Battalion, commanded by Maj. James P.S.

Devereaux.
Beginning on Dec. 8 (Dec. 7,
Pearl Harbor time), the Japanese
unleashed a simultaneous
surprise attack on Wake's small
coral base. Squadron commander, Maj. Paul A. Putnam and the

handful of pilots and mechanics began what would be the last battle they would fight during World War II.

For 16 days the Japanese attempted to take the tough spit of land. Eventually, after repeated bombardments by bombers and constant strafings by Japanese Zeros, only three Wildcats remained. These three were composites of parts of other by Japanese Zeros, only three Wildcats remained. These three were composites of parts of other destroyed aircraft and just berely able to fly. Still, the island defenses had withstood an awesome Japanese task force for over two weeks; enough time to give Americans something to be proud of after their surprise attack on Pearl.

The cry "Remember Wake!" was heralded throughout the Pacific for the remainder of the war as a symbol of fidelity and the will to survive.

Even though Wake fell two days before Christmas that year, the valiant stand on Wake proved to all that America, had not been defeated.

Today, almost 43 years later, the Marines and pilots of VMA-211, especially the squadron commander, LtCol. J.B.
McAnally, are proud of their heritage. For McAnally, the tie to Wake Island is especially poignant. His father, former Cpl. W.J. McAnally, was one of the island's original defenders.

"We are extremely proud of our unit history," said McAnally, who couldn't make the Transpacific flight through Wake because of business on the mainland. "Of all the other squadrons in the Corps, I feel that ours is the most steeped in historical pride. When we fly to the Far East, we seldom go through Wake. But when we do, we feel that this is our real home.

bave been with '232." Fenton said. "We had an air strike on Kahoolawe where we had six A-6 Intruders and six F-4 Pbuntoms going against 16 aggressor aircraft from different services. Fighters feinted an attack on Kahoolawe, and the A-6s snuck around from the northeast.

"It was that type of thing that we were most interested in." he continued. "It gave us ideas un tactics, such as each other's bombing capabilities, fighter coverage, and what we each like to do as opposed to what the book says. By working together so closely, we were able to address a number of questions. With all of these fighters in an attack, how do we coordinate things? What are the best attack tactics?"

Embarking to Hawaii from El Toro enabled the squadron to refresh its collective memory on mount-out procedures, "We practiced our deploying capability by taking our aircraft, supplies, and all of our people at one time to a forward controlled site, 'Fenton remarked.

Once at that forward controlled site, the Knights didn't exactly live a life of leisure. Although there are transient barracks on Station, the squadron — officers and enlisted — lived in tents near the flight line. "We got all of our deploying genr out and saw what we could do in the field." Fenton said. "We wall stayed in tents, and everyone brought their 782 gear. The only thing that we didn't set up here was a field mess, because we didn't have that capability.

"You don't necessarily look forward to that type of thing,' he continued, "but once you're out there, everybody pitches in."





"Because my father was a Marine with the 1st Marine befense Battalion that defended Wake at the outset of WWII and now my being squadron commander of the same group of 12 Wildcats that flew to Wake in '41, I think there is an added responsibility on my part for the squadron," he continued. "I do have a somewhat personal relationship with the island and its history because of this."

After spending seven months at MCAS Iwakuni in the squadron rotation program. Avenger Marines were glad to be heading back to California but, were proud to have stopped at Wake.

"I never really knew why we were the Wake Island Avengers," said PFC Reese Blake, a plane captain for the A-4s. "I had read the stories and heard the officers describe the famous battles fought here and had been proud to be a part of the squadron just for that. But, having spent a few days here, I feel that this place is home 'for the aguadron." home for the squadron. Everywhere you turn on this island there are reminders of VMA-211, and the men who fought, died and were taken prisoner. It was sacred ground for our squadron."

Anxious to return to the states: the pilots didn't get to explore the destroyed coastal guns and

bunkers that litter the shore and island but, according to LtCol. Timothy G. Dineen, executive officer for 211 and former number two pilot for the Naw's Blue Angels, it was a very moving experience to come home. "I walked down the beach last evening and rummaged through some wreckage that washed ashore. I didn't know what it was," commented Dineen. "But it was World War II vintage and I felt an eevie sense of understandfelt an eerie sense of understand-ing because I am with the squadron now. Almost like there

are ghosts still here waiting to bend your ear with some stories of the fight.

"I'm pleased to have had the opportunity to visit this historic place. This entire island is a shrine or holy place in the eyes of all the Marines attached with the Avengers." he said.

The reality of the gallant fight endured by the men in '41 is still prevalent everywhere on the island. As if time has stood still on this isolated speck of coral in the middle of a vast blue ocean, rusting metal and war-scarred.

bunkers make up its terrain

bunkers make up its terrain.

The Avengers spent only two days on the barren atoll and as each Skyhawk screenmed back into the sky headed for MCAS. Kaneohe Bay, then home to El Toro, a personal piece of unit history and honor was taken back by each Avenger Marine.

It is 1310 hours. The last of the A-4's disappear into the clouds. Once again Wake Island is quiet. The daily squall can be seen heading onto one end of the runway; it will only last about 20 minutes.

Ghosts still wander on Wake Island

WAKE ISLAND AIR FIELD, WAKE ISLAND AIR FIELD, Pacific Ocean — Sparkling stars dance through an unobscured sky and a full moon illuminates a wreckage-strewn beach. The ghosts of a heroic past wander through countless pock-marked machine gun bunkers and rusting coastal defense guns. The sea, pounding relentlessly against a jagged reef, also has its share of apacters, moaning up

tombe.
This is Wake Island, "Where America's Day Begins."
Located some 2,010 miles west of Honolulu, Wake Island is one of the most isolated of the world's smallest inhabited islands. It is also the home of Wake Island Air Field Field.
Although this crab claw-

Although this crab clawshaped atoll is only nine miles
from tip to tip and its highest
point is a towering 12 feet
(depending on the tide), its
history is a tale of gallant
Marines, sailors and civilians
who fought the first battle of
World War II.
During the attack on Pearl
Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941, the
Japanese simultaneously
launched an attack on Wake
Island. A hand-full of Marines
from the 1st Marine Defense
Battalion, even fewer sailors and
several hundred civilians
withstood this onelaught for 16
days before Marine commander

Maj. James P.S. Devereux surrendered His last message to headquarters in Pearl Harbor was, "Enemy on island, issue in doubt"

doubt."

Devereux saw no other alternative after receiving word that the Marine reinforcements they had expected were ordered back to Pearl. The island defenders had repelled a large Japanese task force with just 12 Grumman F-4 Wildcats from Marine Fighter Squadron-211, guns with no extra parts or sighting equipment, no communi-

guns with no extra parts or sighting equipment, no communications and dwindling ammunition supplies.

When word reached the states that "Marines hold Wakel", it became the watchword that carried Americans across the Pacific in their flerce island-hopping campaign. To the Solomons, the Marshalls, the Gilberts, the Philippines and everywhere Marines fought, the cry "Remember Wake" built morale and encouraged men to face the enemy and defeat him. Today, Wake is an important "stand-by" air base, used for manuface He enemy and becaused for manuface He enemy and because of the conditions of the stand-by are base, used for manuface He enemy and defeat him.

Today, Wake is an important "stand-by" air base, used for many purposes. But, according to residents, being isolated is not so bad.

"Wake is small," said 1stLt.
James Weeks, executive officer of the seven-man force of Detachment 4, 16th Air Base Wing, home-based at Hickam Air Force Base in Hawaii. "But the people are what really make Wake Island an enjoyable tour."

Wake's population includes the Air Force's supervisory detachment (a one-year unaccompanied tour) and employees of IntelCom, a Dallas, Texas firm contracted by the Air Force to Maintain the 9,850-foot air strip. This work force is made up of 22 Americans and 149 Filipinos

(eight of whom have their wives on Wake).
Employees for IntelCom provide all the support services needed to maintain an operable contingency air base if the need arises. Their services include fire and safety, aircraft refueling, base operations, a dining facility billeting and all of the recreational activities on the island.


Although meager by standards seen elsewhere in the U.S., Wake offers plenty to do for the overnight traveler.

In addition to the water sports, including superb snorkeling, scuba diving, fishing and exploring, there is a library, bowling alley, several ball fields, tennis courts, and the Drifter's Reef, a club that looks like something out of Humphrey Bogart's "Casablanca."

It would seem that at this point, the people stationed on Wake don't have much to do. Although true some of the time because of

For thousands of servicemembers arriving in or departing from Hawaii each year, a Temporary Lodging Allowance can be a much-needed blessing.

But contrary to popular opinion, TLA isn't meant to pay all the bills. According to Fleet Marine Force, Pacific Order 7220.1J, TLA is "authorized for the purpose of partially reimbursing authorized servicemembers for the more than normal expense incurred as a direct result of the use of temporary lodgings."

When servicemembers arrive here they often can't believe they are really in the land of aloha. Oh, sure, they've read about Hawaii in travel brochures or, have seen game show contestants win vacations to Hawaii as prizes, but most never thought they'd be here in the South Pacific.

The Joint Reception Center here is often the single Market.

The Joint Reception Center here is often the single Marine's first contact with the Marine Corps in hawaii. It also gives them an idea of what they can expect in this new culture.

"A phone call or message for the state of the st

of what they can expect in this new culture.

"A phone call or message from the Camp Pendleton Movement Center is usually our first notice to expect new personnel," said SSgt. Tony Gonzalez, noncommissioned officer in charge.

The number of incoming personnel at any one time usually ranges from one to 60.

"We arrange transportation for all Air Station, 1st Radio Battalion and brigade personnel from the airport. They usually

Battalion and brigade personnel from the airport. They usually arrive at 11:20 p.m. Friday," said Gonzalez, "Personnel from JRC are at the airport to meet them. First, we make sure their names match the names we received from the Movement Center and they don't belong to Camp H. M. Smith or Marine Barracks."

After confirming the names and destinations of the personnel, they are taken to baggage claims and then to the buses.

Frequently asked questions on

the journey to the Air Station are

"Where is the duty station? ... How far is it to the hase? ... Is it really sunny here all the time? ... Where's the beach?"—and male Marines, of course, ask, "Where are the women?" according to Gonzalez.

Upon arriving at JRC, Marines and sailors are billeted, issued linen and a meal card and assigned a shift on the fire roster for the weekend. When not on fire watch, new personnel are free to explore their new base and surrounding civilian communi-

surrounding civilian communi-ties.

"We give them enough information to keep them out of trouble," said Gonzalez. "We give them a brief orientation about locations of places like the exchange, special services and heaches on the Air Station. We also tell them about the liberty bus and hot places in town." Hot places are not off-limits, but servicemembers have experienced some type of problems in those areas.

some type of problems in those areas.

"A lot of newcomers try to get a whole year of sun in one day. They come back burned and in pain, said Gonzalez. "We joke with them, tell them they are going to be here for a while and the sun will be here too."

After a weekend of fun and games comes business.

The job at the reception center is to get incoming personnel to their units as quickly as possible so their units can utilize them. They should not be at JRC more than three days, according to Gonzalez.

"The first working day they are at the center is used to process all travel vouchers and forward them to disbursing. It takes disbursing.

telow attend the Reading Test administered by the Joint Education Center. By 1 p.m. the third day, incoming personnel are ready to be paid up-to-date including travel claims, turn in their linen and meal cards and go to their permanently assigned units.

Incoming women usually spend only one night at JRC because of limited accommodations. They limited accommodations. They are assigned to their units the next

morning and relocated.

JRC processes more than 1,200 people annually. Some months are heavier than others. "November, December and January are usually our heaviest months. Last November, we processed more than 300 personnel," said Gonzalez.

One officer and five enlisted people man the stations at JRC.

people man the stations at JRC. The enlisted personnel, excluding the NCOIC, work 24 hours on and

24 hours off shifts and stand duty NCO.

In addition, JRC Marines are In addition, JRC Marines are trained to prepare emergency leave orders if necessary for brigade personnel after normal working hours. JRC personnel are the first to



Improved 155mm howitzer joins Corps arsenal

CAMP FOSTER, Japan - It is often said that time creates change and improvement, an increase in the quality of life with new ideas. Change and improve-ment is what the 12th Marine artillery regiment here is undergoing, with time. The 12th Marines have begun receiving the new M198 155mm howitzer. But is

Marines have begun receiving on new M198 155mm howitzer. But is this weapon really new?

The answer to that question is no. The M198 howitzer has actually been in the Corps' arsenal for some time. According to Maj. James Haney. 12th Marines logistics officer, the weapon has been in the system for approximately four years. After initial testing, the 1st and 2nd Marine Divisions were the first to receive the new weapon. But why the new gun when the Corps already had two howitzers in its arsenal — the M101 105mm and the M114 155mm howitzers?

"In the past, the old weapons couldn't compete with the enemy's devices," said Col. Francis X. Chambers Jr., 12th Marines commanding officer. "The enemy's weapons were more powerful and could shoot further. We needed a weapon that could out-shoot and out-fire the enemy's guns, and that is what we did."

At present, the M101 105mm howitzer is the weapon which provides direct support and the M114 155mm howitzer provides general support. But, because of the improved capabilities incorporated in the M198, it will eventually replace both weapons and assume both roles of support,

incorporated in the M198, it will eventually replace both weapons and assume both roles of support, according to Haney. The M198 will look a little different than the other howitzers in appearance, but it will operate in appearance, but it will operate using the same principle as past models. And, additional knowedge on behalf of Marine artillerymen will be required in order to operate it, which is why a Mobile Training Team from Fort Sill, Okla., recently visited the 2nd and 3rd Bn. of the 12th Marine Regiment here. During the visit, 12th Marine leathernecks were instructed on the maintenance and operation of the new howitzer. The Marines who attended the week-long class will train their fellow artillerymen on the proper use and maintenance of the new weapon.

According to CWO-4 Lee Beinger and the summer of the proper use and maintenance of the new weapon.

According to CWO-4 Lee Boise, an instructor with the weapons department at Fort Sill, replacing the M101 105mm and the M114 155mm howitzers with the M198 is now in transition.

The transition here has just begun because the weapon is new to Marine units onOkinawa. Since last March, 28 of the M198 howitzers have been delivered to island units.

The M198's are made at the Rock Island Arsenal in Illinois. This is also where the weapons underwent a preservation process in order to prepare them for shipment.

When the weapons are prepared when the weapons are prepared for shipment, a number of preservation steps must be taken, the first being removal of all film, dirt and residue which may be on

the weapon.
''The s "The surface must be completely free of any residue. Then, any bearing surfaces on the Inen, any bearing surfaces on the weapon are lubricated with a preservative oil and finally, the weapon is wraped in a material which will ensure preservation. These fibers now on the weapon will keep it free from moisture, rust, rain and will allow the guns to be moved and shipped without altering the weapon," explained Haney.

From the arsenal, the M198s were first delivered to U.S. Army artillery units, then to the 1st and 2nd Marine Divisions, and finally here. The new howitzer will be an adjustment for the Marines operating the weapon, but according to 1stl.t. Wayne Cowles, executive officer for Battery H, the change will not be as drastic as imagined. "There are approximately 14 Marines in my battery previously stationed at Camp Lejeune, N.C., who have had





previous experience with the M198. Those few are enough to ease the blow associated with change."

change."
Although those Marines have had the opportunity to work with the weapon elsewhere and will be able to teach their fellow Marines, the question was raised whether or not they fully understand the weapon's capabilities.

"The weapon's firing capabilities have better than 50 percent greater range than the M114 155mm howitzer. Its firing capabilities are 8,200 meters.

Thence howitzer is also capable of firing a howitzer is also capable of firing a number of new conventional types of munitions. Cooper head, which are laser guided rounds that go after tanks and other hard targets, fascam rounds that scatter mines, and dual-purpose munitions which attack personnel and equipment are some of the types of conventional munitions it can

conventional munitions it can fire." explained Chambers. "Previously, the enemy could hit us without ever coming into our range," he continued. "But

Chambers added, "It is true that the weapon is much larger than the other howitzers and that at 15,500 pounds, it weighs more than the M114, but, because of the greater range capabilities, it will not be required to be moved as often. We will be able to counter the enemy and provide a better posture than in the past. Although the weapon is capable of firing special munitions, its main purpose is for increased capability, utilizing a wide array of conventional munitions."

Change doesn't occur just for change sake, however. There is usually a reason. Flexibility and lethality are reason for a planned

usually a reason. Flexibility and lethality are reason for a planned reorganization of the structure of the artillery battery.

According to Chambers, at present, each battery has six guns. Within the next five years, each battery will have eight guns. Overall, the 12th regiment will contain five battalions, with the 1st Bn. home-based in Hawaii, the 2nd, 3rd and 4th Bns. stationed

here on Okinawa, and the 5th Bn. at Twentynine Palms, Calif.
MGen: Robert E. Haebel, Commanding General, III Marine Amphibious Force (MAF), fixed the first round from the M198 155mm howitzer here at Camp Hansen's Central Training Area, May 29. At that moment, it signified the heginning of a new era for the 12th Marine Regiment.



Judo champ goes to L.A.

When a contest of ancient Greek origin features on Oriental sport, practiced by an American with a Germanic name, who happens to be playing for the Virgin Islands, certain questions

Virgin Islands, certain questions arise.

And it is with those obvious questions in mind that the following answers are provided:

The contest is called "Olympics."

The sport is "judo."

And the American's name is Capt. Douglas A. Berliner, of the 1st Marine Brigade's G-3 staff. Berliner, 29, left Hawaii June 22 enraute to Houston, where he will

Berliner, 29, lett Hawan June 22 curoute to Houston, where he will frain as a member of the Virgin Islands' Olympic judo team.

Although some of the Virgin Islands are American possessions, they send their own athletes to international sporting events. "The United States has already selected its judy town for events. "The United States has already selected its judo team for the Olympics," Berliner said. "But the Virgin Islands team is having their cump right now, and they requested me by name." Berliner's name became familiar to them earlier this year when he naticipated in the

familiar to them earlier this year when he participated in the national judo competition. conducted April 27-28 at Orlando, Fla. "My brother, Gary. a resident of the Virgin Islands, is on the judo team right now," Berliner remarked. "At the nationals, he brought me to their attention. They talked with me and liked the way I competed. "I thought I did only fair," he continued, "not as well as I would have liked. But they liked what they saw and were certain that I

they saw and were certain that I could come around, so they asked if I would compete for them. I told them that they'd have to get approval from Headquarters Marine Corps."

That approval wasn't long in coming, possibly because HQMC was aware of Berliner's talent. Immediately prior to the nationals, the soft-spoken judoist grappled his way to victory in the All-Marine Judo Championships, conducted April 4 at El Toro, Calif

Berliner took first place in the 172-pound weight class and then 172-pound weight class and then went on to capture the Grand Champion crown and was awarded the Colonel Anthony S. Drexel Biddle Trophy. "I beat GySgt. C. Evans for the grand championship," Berlinger said. "He's placed either first or second in seven All-Marine tournaments. Since Pro Jones in the ments. Since I've been in the Marine Corps, I've always wanted to be in an All-Marine tournament, just to say that I did

it."
That wasn't the first time that the lethal leatherneck had "done it' in a tournament. As a student at Radford High School in 'Honolula, he was Hawaii State Judo Champion in 1970, 1971, and 1972. And in 1971, he also took third place in the National High School Judo Tournament.

Berliner competed in numerous other tournaments until temporarily quit competing in 1977. But even with a myriad of experiences under his black belt, one tournament remains special.

"The All-Marine Tournament was the most memorable," he said. "I had some doubts as to whether I would do well, because I hadn't competed since 1977."

Just as he had dreamed of battling as an "All-Marine," so too did Berliner fantasize of someday becoming an Olympian - a fantasy that began in 1964 when, with his Army father stationed in Japan, Berliner attended the Tokyo Olympiad. "I

remember sitting in the stands

remember esitting in the stands for the opening ceremony and imagining myself in those ceremonies," he related.

It was while in Japan that the Berliners first became interested in judo. "I was 8 years old and Gary was 9 when my dad got all of us kids involved in judo," the leatherneck recalled. "My brother and I are the only ones who kept it up."

With the Soviet Union and its Communist allies boycotting the Los Angeles Olympics, many have speculated that 1984's level

have speculated that 1984's level of competition would be greatly reduced, as it was in 1980 when the United States led a boycott of the Soviet games. But according to Berliner, the impact on judo events will not be great.

"The Russians are always competitive in any sport that they enter, but overall, the Japanese would be favored, followed by the French and the Italians," he remarked. "Of course, America also has some very good competitors."

Berliner is cautiously

completions."

Berliner is cautiously optimistic about his chances. "I think my chances are good," he said. "I have a chance to be very said. "I have a chance to be very competitive. But you can beat a guy in one tournament and lose to him badly in the next. It depends on who is "up" psychologically and who has the most adrenalin for the match. Of course, physical injury does play into it.
"I find out who I'm going up against and then take a look at him," Berliner continued. "I'll envision myself going out there, howing to him, and beginning the match. In order to get that extra adrenalin, I actually try to dislike him."

With that in mind, it is indeed unfortunate that no Soviets will be going up against Berliner. His adrenaline would probably


