Bankoh agrees to auto-removal reform

A Joint Military Committee and Bank of Hawaii announced Monday that they had reached an agreement on vehicle-removal policy, an issue that was debated during the recent legislative session.

Military officials sought a change in Hawaii law which stipulates that lenders must approve out-of-state shipment of vehicles with liens. They saw the law as an unnecessary hardship on servicemembers. The Hawaii Bankers Association ques-

tioned the need for a change, explaining that recouping collateral that has left the state was highly difficult and expensive, and that changing the law would impact loan availability.

The new agreement provides that servicemembers can ship vehicles if they are current on payments, have valid military orders to depart the state, and provide a forwarding address. However, the credit requirements for vehicle loans will be tightened, as will repossession

policy. Additionally, servicemembers may remove a vehicle from the state if their unit is alerted that it will move to a location outside the continental United States where dependent travel is not authorized.

To expedite the resolution of any problem regarding the shipment of a vehicle out of state, the Bank of Hawaii has also established internal procedures by which the servicemember can discuss the difficulties with one of three

specific vice presidents. The names and telephone numbers of the vice presidents can be obtained by calling the legal assistance officer at respective bases.

"During the legislative session when the bill was moving so quickly, we were highly concerned that military officials did not fully understand the impact a different credit policy would have on servicemembers. We are now assured that both sides are fully informed and comfortable with the new agreement,"

said H. Howard Stephenson, president, Bank of Hawaii.

"The proposal will encourage servicemembers to continue to contribute to Hawaii's economy as wise consumers and responsible citizens, and will clearly indicate to members of the Armed Forces that Bank of Hawaii is a community leader that fully supports them," noted Adm. Ronald J. Hays, commander in chief, U.S. Pacific Command, in a letter to the Bank of Hawaii.

Military personnel and

financial institutions were encouraged by the legislature to work out an agreement. Although the agreement has so far only been signed by Bank of Hawaii, it is expected that other financial organizations in the state will follow suit soon.

In his letter, Hays applauded the bank's initiative and said he was "impressed by the candid and thoroughly professional manner in which Bank of Hawaii has addressed the issue."

Corps restructured to bolster readiness

HQMC, WASHINGTON, D.C.—Marine Corps Commandant Gen. A.M. Gray has approved recommendations for several changes in force structure and manning within the Marine Air-Ground Task Forces (MAGTFs). The changes are designed to enhance the combat-readiness of the Corps while complying with the end-strength reduction of 3,000 Marines that was directed by the Department of Defense.

The Corps' goal is to produce a warfighting machine that is balanced and that represents the Corps in the best way possible. Selected units—infantry, reconnaissance, communications, and intelligence—will be manned near full strength. A fourth rifle company will be restored to eight of the Corps' active infantry battalions.

While the number of infantry battalions will be reduced from 27 to 24, all active

HQMC, WASHINGTON, D.C. — Secretary of Defense Frank C. Carlucci announced June 22 that the president has nominated, and the Senate confirmed, LtGen. Joseph J. OKINAWA, Japan — A CH-53D Sea Stallion crashed Friday when it attempted to cross the island of Shikoku, Japan, killing all seven Marines on board. The helicopter was assigned to HMH-462, 1st MAW, MCAS Futenma, Okinawa, Japan.

The Marines, home based at MCAS Tustin, Calif., were assigned to MCAS Futenma as part of the Unit Deployment Program. The Marines killed in the crash were Cpl. Jason W. Chase; Sgts. Jay A. Watkins, Donald R. McKay, and Eric C. Mau; SSgt. Steven R. Yoder; 1stLt. Patrick C. Fleming; and Capt. Michael E. Bermel.

MCRDAC sharpens Corps' cutting edge

BGen. G.L. Cates, commanding general, 1st MEB will be leaving the Brigade in August to take over as the deputy commanding general, Marine Corps Research, Development, and Acquisition Command (MCRDAC) in Quantico, Va.

This new command —

whose shortened name is pronounced "ma-kra-dik" — is something of a mystery to Hawaii Marines. What's MCRDAC, and how can it help the infantryman, aviators, and logisticians of the MEB?

Well, here is an example of what MCRDAC does.

Assault amphibian vehicle

Marine gets 60 years for rape

A Marine was sentenced to 60 years in prison June 23 following his conviction at a General Court Martial here for the rape of a dependent wife in Kailua last month.

LCpl. Barry D. Stadmir, 21 of the 1st MEB, pled guilty to the four charges and all specifications, according to the trial prosecutor, Capt. Gerard W. Fischer. LCpl. Stadmir was also reduced to private, given a dishonorable discharge, and ordered to forfeit all pay and allowances.

The rape occurred at a Kailua residence May 11. The victim, who was seven months pregnant at the time, was assaulted after the assailant tricked her into

allowing him to use her telephone.

Capt. Fischer said the case was unusual for both the speed with which it was brought to trial, and the fact that the military was able to assume jurisdiction over an incident that occurred in the civilian domain.

Investigators identified and apprehended LCpl. Stadmir May 16.

"The investigation was probably the best example of multi-department cooperation that I have ever seen," said Capt. Fischer, a veteran of several hundred trials. "The Honolulu Police Department and our NIS and CID actively investigated the case at the same time, and worked as a team. They conducted outstanding crime scene and

investigative work to track down the assailant.

"The reason for the speedy disposition of the case was that the investigation was completed so rapidly—within five days after the attack," said Capt. Fischer.

Following LCpl. Stadmir's apprehension, the Marine Corps requested jurisdiction over the crime from the Prosecuting Attorney for the City and County of Honolulu, Charles Marsland.

"We asked for jurisdiction based on the Supreme Court ruling in the Solorio case of June 1987," stated Capt. Fischer. This ruling allows the military to exercise jurisdiction over military members based solely on their military status, regardless of where the crime takes place.

Prior to this ruling, an offense committed off base had to be strictly service related to be tried by military authorities.

"Mr. Marsland recognizes our strong interest in discipline for our Marines, and our ability to enforce that discipline," add Capt. Fischer. "He has indicated his willingness to work with us in future cases."

Stadmir is currently confined at the Naval Station, Pearl Harbor Brig, pending review of his sentence by the Commanding General, 1st MEB, BGen. G.L. Cates. Such review normally takes several months of study, said Capt. Fischer. If Stadmir's sentence is approved, he will probably be transferred to Fort Leavenworth, Kan.

AFIS — There's something about the Fourth of July. We listen to "The Star Spangled Banner" while watching a fireworks display, enjoy a picnic, and generally celebrate our good fortune at being Americans.

Safety doesn't usually make the list, but it's no less important. First of all, consider fireworks safety.

Military safety officials hope you'll watch the display put on by the professional fireworks people in the community rather than try to do it yourself.

Individuals on the Air Station are not allowed to use any fireworks.

That's because even seemingly innocent fireworks such as sparklers can cause injury. One 8-year-old, for example, received second and third

degree burns on her leg when a sparkler ignited her dress.

According to the Consumer Product Safety Commission, an estimated 9,000 people were treated in hospital emergency rooms last year for injuries from fireworks. About half the victims were under 15 years old. Perhaps due to stricter fireworks laws, stepped-up enforcement and greater public awareness, the number of injuries is going down — in 1985, 10,300 people were injured — but any is too many.

If you're going to use fireworks, safety experts say to follow these guidelines:

- Do not allow younger children to play with fireworks. The sparkler, considered by many to be the ideal "safe" firework for the young, burns at very high temperatures and can easily ignite clothing. Children can't

appreciate the danger involved.

- Allow older children to play with fireworks only under close adult supervision. Don't allow any horseplay around fireworks.

- Read and follow all warning instructions printed on the fireworks label before use.

- Light fireworks outdoors in a clear area away from houses and flammable materials.

- Keep a bucket of water nearby for emergencies.

- Don't try to relight malfunctioning fireworks. Soak them in water and throw them away.

- Be sure other people and pets are out of range before lighting fireworks.

- Never light fireworks in a container, especially one of glass or metal.

- Store fireworks in a dry, cool place. Check instructions

for special storage directions. Fireworks aren't the only Fourth of July hazard. Drunk driving is even more dangerous due to the increase of traffic during a holiday weekend.

Most military and civilian police step up their vigilance to spot drunk drivers over the holiday, but they may not get them all. Therefore, all drivers should drive more defensively to avoid accidents.

If you're a motorcyclist, don't let holiday high spirits tempt you to ride too fast. Trying to negotiate curves while speeding is one of the most common causes of motorcycle accidents.

Although it may seem a little grim to think about accidents during a holiday, taking a few simple precautions to avoid an accident is better than spoiling a holiday by having one.

Initial exams for school held here

All children, preschool through grade 12, entering the Hawaii Public School System for the first time are required to have a physical examination according to regulations set by the Department of Education and Health, State of Hawaii. The physical must be completed within 90 days of the child entering school before the child will be disenrolled.

Some private schools and most athletic programs, require an annual physical examination. Hawaii Public Schools also recommend a physical for students entering kindergarten, fourth, seventh, and tenth grades.

The Branch Medical Clinic conducts school and athletic physicals, scheduled through the Immunizations Clinic, on a monthly basis, except December.

Gurkhas train with 3/3

Under a relentless and blistering Hawaii sun, the first phase of Exercise Union Pacific '88 got underway June 21 when a company of Gurkhas and a platoon of U.S. Marines took to the field for four days of intense live-fire and maneuver training.

The men from Weapons Platoon, Co. I, 3/3 were the first Marines to host this year's visit of Co. A, 10th Princess Mary's Own Gurkha Rifles, who will train with the Marines until the end of July. Union Pacific is an annual deployment of a company-size unit from the Gurkha Rifles, British Forces, Hong Kong, sponsored by the U.S. Army Western Command.

According to 2ndLt. William E. Foy, 3/3's Weapons Platoon commander, this year's training evolution for the Gurkha Rifles is intended to integrate the Gurkhas into the different battalions of 3rd Marines and to focus on the shared benefits of co-training at the small unit level.

The two units linked-up at a U.S. Army firing range at Makua Valley on the northwest shore of Oahu, where they immediately went to work coordinating their signals, tactics and scheme of maneuver.

According to Sgt. Karl W. Nugent, M-60 machine gun section leader, "the Marine's mission was to provide the Gurkhas with supporting arms while they refined their offensive assault tactics."

The India Co. "grunts" accomplished this assignment in typical Marine fashion. On June 23, the first day of actual live-fire, the Marine machine-gun teams moved towards an enemy force simulated by pop-up targets in a series of bunkers about 1,000 meters to their front. Maneuvering through neck-high underbrush at a dead run, the machine-gun teams had their guns "in action" sending their first rounds of suppressive fire down range in a matter of seconds. Meanwhile, the Gurkhas performed a very impressive platoon envelopment to the left flank of their enemy. The Marines continued to lay down a base of fire on their target until the Gurkhas moved into position

and overran their objective. After two separate attacks, the day's training was abruptly halted by a large brush fire, which was started by tracer rounds in the target area. A Marine helicopter, two U.S. Army helicopters and a Honolulu Fire Department chopper spent the remainder of the afternoon smothering the fire with their large external water buckets.

While training was halted, the 48th Gurkha Infantry Brigade Commander, BGen. V. Beauchamp, a British army officer, commented on

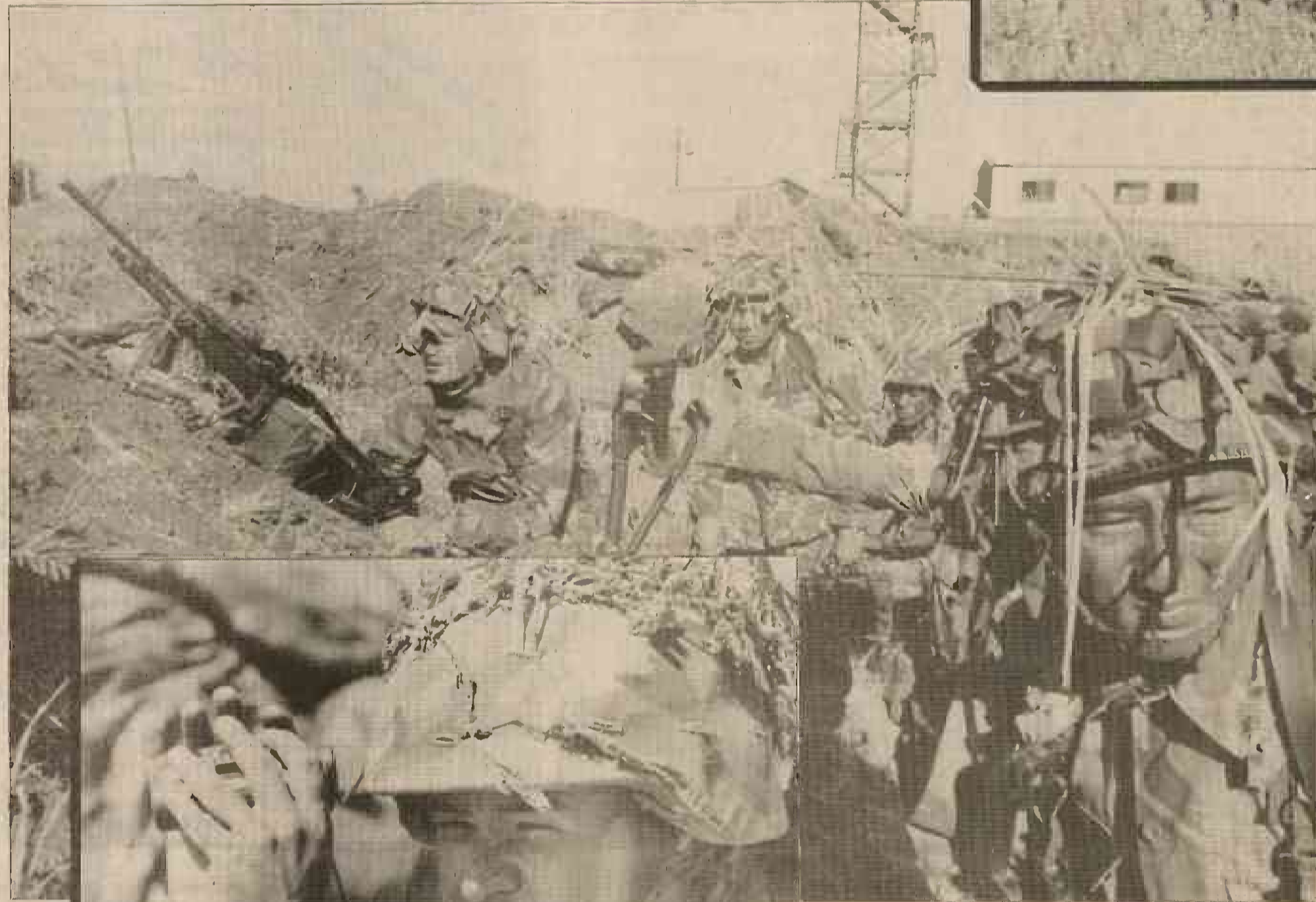
what he had seen during the day's training.

"This is the first time I've ever served with U.S. Marines and I must say they seem to live up to the highly placed reputation they so justly hold. They are very professional infantrymen. It's also good to see the integration of these two forces work so smoothly, and to have such a highly proficient special weapons platoon here training with us."

According to BGen. Beauchamp, this was the first year that there have been two such deployments

of Gurkhas to Hawaii. The U.S. Army 25th Infantry Division finished their See GURKHAS/A-7

Gurkhas: 160 years of loyalty to Britain

During the second half of the 18th century, Prithi Narayan Shah, king of the small principality of Gorkha, in what is now the Kingdom of Nepal, began wars of expansion using an army comprised of hillmen. By the beginning of the 19th century, he had conquered all of his neighbors and was making incursions south into India.

The Indian territory he and his troops were attacking was, at the time, the property of the British East India Company. By 1814, the incursions were so deep into British territory that the Governor-General was forced to declare war.

The Gurkhas were finally defeated, but only after two long, bloody years. The British were so impressed with the fighting skills and tenacity of the Gurkhas that they immediately recruited four battalions into their service.

Various units have been formed, disbanded, and reformed as the needs of the times demanded. But Gurkhas have served continuously with the British since the early 19th century; first for the East India Company Army; then the Bengal Pres-

idency Army; later the Indian Army; and now in both the British Army and the new Indian Army.

The modern-day Gurkhas are usually recruited from family clans high in the Himalaya Mountains, which run through most of Nepal. The land is extremely rugged and sparsely populated, and the people who live there are hardy and self-reliant; the same people act as Sherpa guides for expeditions into the Himalayas. By western standards, the people are materially poor, living in a way that hasn't changed for centuries.

Members of the British Army recruit in Nepal once a year, from one of four major clans; the Magars and Gurguns in the west, and the Limbus and Rais in the east. Former servicemen bring a predetermined number of potential recruits to central points where former Gurkha officers make the first selections.

Those chosen, about twice the number actually required, are then sent on to recruiting depots where the final selections are made. It is estimated that approximately 300 young men apply for every

available slot; those who finally make it are sent to recruit training in Hong Kong.

Once they've completed their training, the Gurkhas are assigned to one of four infantry battalions, or one of three support units, which make up the Brigade of Gurkhas now serving with the British Army.

These seven units were the

only ones retained by the British Army when independent rule was granted to India in 1947. All the other Gurkha units were disbanded or became part of the Indian Army.

The Gurkhas serve as the British Army's light infantry, and have fought in almost every corner of what was once the British Empire, in both major conflicts and small

expeditions.

Starting in 1817 with the Sikh Wars in India, the Gurkhas have stormed into battle waving their deadly Kukri knives in such far-flung places as Burma, Afghanistan, Somaliland, Malta, Cyprus, Malaya, South Africa and China.

During World War I, Gurkhas fought in almost all theaters of the war: in France, Mesopotamia, Persia, Egypt and the Suez Canal, and Gallipoli, Salonika and Palestine.

During World War II, 40 Gurkha battalions saw combat in the North African des-

ert, Italy, Greece, and throughout the Far East in places like Burma, and Singapore.

Since the war, Gurkhas have served in the Middle East, Dutch East Indies, Vietnam, Laos, Cambodia and Borneo, as well as patrolling the New Territories borders near Hong Kong. Their latest active service took place in 1982 when they fought the Falklands War.

Starting as bitter enemies, the Gurkhas have since given the crowned heads of Great Britain more than 160 years of faithful and loyal service.

BSSG-1 trains at PTA

POHAKULOA TRAINING AREA, Hawaii—The near barren area between Mauna Kea and Mauna Loa, on the island of Hawaii, has become the temporary home for Combat Service Support Detachment (CSSD)-37.

The detachment is a miniature version of BSSG-1, which was activated 18 years ago today as the Provisional Support Battalion.

The Marines of CSSD-37 have been at PTA since the arrival of their advanced party June 3. Their job is a complicated one, involving full support for elements 3rd Marine Regiment, supplemental support for MAG-24 and combat training for the Marines temporarily detached from BSSG-1.

CSSD's first mission upon arrival was to begin off-loading the barges of equipment too large and too time-consuming to airlift to PTA, and establish a base camp. With the exception of the administrative section, the establishment of a base camp was delayed due to scheduling problems with the Army.

Once CSSD was able to move into their original training site, the 200-plus Marines immediately went to work setting up camp, while maintaining full support for 3rd Marines.

"We wanted to be as concealed as possible and not present a presence to anyone, and yet still carry out our combat service support mission," said Capt. Chris Ellis, executive officer CSSD-37. "In order to train our Marines properly we need to teach them tactical cover and concealment, along with their MOS training."

Training Area One, on the eastern edge of PTA, was

found to be the best suited area for cover and concealment. With the area's foliage, hilly terrain and extensive road network, Area One was the ideal place for a rear area unit. Being able to naturally camouflage themselves and have control of the roads leading in and out of the camp, CSSD is able to provide the much-needed services and support to the artillery and infantry units while providing their own rear area security.

Although following tactical doctrine is an important factor for the Marines of CSSD, their training must be

1st MEB Marines battle fire

POHAKULOA TRAINING AREA, HAWAII—Marines from CSSD-37, elements of 3rd Marine Regiment, and HMM-265 have been battling a fire on the western end of the training area since Friday.

The fire began in the impact area and is believed to have traveled through a lava tube into Training Area Seven where it started burning foliage, according to Maj.

Patrick Donohue, Regimental S-3 officer.

All training operations were halted early Friday morning, and all available personnel from 1st MEB training on the Big Island were called out to fight the fire along side state and Army firefighters. Marines from HMM-265 fought the blaze from the air by dropping 500 gallons of water onto the estimated 22-foot high flames. By late that afternoon the

fire was brought under control, although it proceeded to burn. "The fire is being kept under control, but efforts to extinguish the fire are being hampered by high winds and volcanic rock which burns when exposed to heat," said Maj. Donohue.

Approximately 50 Marines are still fighting the fire along with helicopters dropping water to put out the hot spots that are keeping the fire going.

Legally Speaking

Paternity suits explained

The issue of paternity is a problem that may confront many Marines and their dependents. It is a two-sided problem that affects male and female Marines in different ways.

What is a paternity suit?

A paternity suit is a court action to prove that a man is the father of an illegitimate child and to enforce support obligations for that child.

Although a father who is sued for paternity may not be very happy about it, there are certain benefits. For the parent there is a more equitable or fairer sharing of the responsibilities of raising their child. The action also promotes a sense of responsibility for one's actions.

Society benefits because of the savings to taxpayers. The natural father provides for the raising of the child as opposed to the rearing provided by the state welfare system. A successful action will raise the quality of life for unmarried women.

Most importantly, the illegitimate children benefit because they will then enjoy a basic right to economic support, a lessening of the "illegitimate" stigma and the possibility of a relationship with both parents.

Initiating a paternity action

Every paternity action begins with an allegation by the mother that someone is the natural father. In fact, most states require mothers receiving public assistance to

cooperate with the state agencies in establishing paternity. An action can be brought by the state on behalf of the illegitimate child or by the mother herself. Once an action is commenced, by the state or mother, it is very unlikely that the case will actually be fought out in the courtroom. It has been estimated that, in states with effective paternity establishment procedures, only about two percent of the cases actually get decided in court.

Usually after an allegation has been made and proceedings begin, the parties will "settle." Most often the alleged father is willing to admit paternity. After that an agreement is drawn up and filed with the court. The court will issue a judgement of paternity plus an order for support against the father.

In most states that order will include back child support to the date the child was born. Another common situation occurs when the alleged father simply does not show up in court after being served with civil process. In such cases a default judgement is entered against him. Again paternity is considered to be established and a child support order is issued.

What happens if a man is accused but he does not believe he is the father? He is given an opportunity, both in and out of court, to present evidence that he was unavailable during the period of conception, e.g., during the time the child was conceived, he was in the middle of a six-month float to the Persian Gulf.

The alleged father can also under very limited circumstances provide evidence that the child was conceived by another identifiable person. The most common method of disproving or establishing paternity is by the use of blood testing.

Blood testing

Blood testing is extremely complex. The major use of blood testing is not to prove who the father is, but rather to exclude the wrongly accused father.

The principles of blood testing are based on genetics. The child inherits half his genes from his mother and half from his father. Simply put, if the child has gene "markers" that do not come from his mother or the alleged father, then they

must have come from some other person.

The tests work by stating that an individual is definitely not the father or if he cannot be excluded, by stating a percent that he "might" be the father, i.e. 98.5 percent probability that the alleged father is the real father. Usually an alleged father will agree to paternity after taking the tests if there is a high percentage indicating he is the natural father.

This article is a general overview of a very complex area of law, and not intended to provide specific answers to individual problems. If you need to commence a paternity action or defend against one, you should first speak to a lawyer at the Joint Legal Services Center.

On the Blotter

•A corporal was apprehended for DWI after a traffic accident occurred on Irwin Street. The corporal drove his car across a yard and struck a parked car. He then left the scene of the accident. The owner of the parked car reported the accident to the Military Police Department. Shortly afterward, the corporal reported to the MPs that he had witnessed an accident. The car that he was driving matched the description of the hit and run vehicle, and the Marine had the odor of alcohol on his breath. He chose to have his breath tested, which resulted in a .17 percent blood alcohol content.

•A private first class was apprehended for being drunk in public, underaged drinking, possession of two ID cards, provoking speeches and gestures, and disrespect to an NCO. The Marine was found asleep at a bus stop near the exchange. When awakened, the private first class was unsure of his surroundings, and had the odor

of alcohol on his breath. When asked for ID he gave an ID card that belonged to another Marine. He was uncooperative and used provoking speech toward the MPs.

•A lance corporal was apprehended for DWI at the main gate. A test of his breath revealed a .16 percent blood alcohol content.

Assaults

•A private first class was the victim of an assault near Anderson Field. Two unknown individuals struck the Marine in the face, pushed him to the ground, and kicked him. The duty NCO at a nearby barracks yelled at the individuals and they ran away.

•A lance corporal was the victim of a robbery near Fort DeRussy. Three unidentified males assaulted the Marine and stole his wallet. He was treated at the Branch Medical Clinic.

Other events on the blotter

•A captain reported that someone had placed his lawn sprinkler on his front porch and turned the water on, causing damage to the living

room and dining room floors of his quarters. In addition to this, several plants had been overturned on the front porch.

•Four civilian boaters were observed to be within the 500-yard zone off of North Beach. The four were fishing and diving from their boats. They were detained and later released on their own recognizance.

•Two Marines, a lance corporal and a private first class, were arrested in Honolulu after they tried to enter a nightclub using false identification. Both were taken to the Military Police Department at Fort DeRussy where they were later released to their unit.

•In addition to these events, there were 11 larcenies, 12 traffic accidents, two domestic disturbances, two drug-related apprehensions, one prowler complaint, and five other alcohol incidents.

battalions will be enhanced through the addition of 41 enlisted Marines including platoon guides and ammunition men.

Plans call for the addition of the fourth rifle company to the eight battalions assigned to the Marine Expeditionary Unit/Special Operations Capable (MEU/SOC) rotation base. This action is expected to be completed during FY89.

Plans also call for the conversion of current light armored vehicle battalions to light armored infantry battalions. Three LAV battalions will each receive 168 scout infantrymen during FY89, and will be redesignated LAV battalions. Four LAV assault gun (AG) platoons will be added to each LAV battalion beginning in FY93.

The formation of three surveillance, reconnaissance, and intelligence (SRI) groups, one in each Marine Expeditionary Force, is expected to be fully structured by FY92. These groups will concentrate and coordinate the Corps' tactical information-gathering resources.

The proposed changes to the combat service support element involve five categories: structure and manning reductions in each active FSSG; battalion consolidations and reductions; transfer to and activation of selected FSSG units in the

selected Marine Corps Reserve (SMCR); transfer to and cadre of selected FSSG units in the SMCR; and transfer of selected capabilities to the ground combat element.

The SMCR will be directly affected by changes in the active structure. Those changes include affiliating certain reserve units to active units, to provide common

training and operational performance goals, as well as standing up some additional capabilities in the reserves, likely to be needed in the

event of a major conflict. Finally, as the new systems are fielded, reserve units will be equipped with the M1 tank and LAV AG system.

A concept-of-execution message will be sent to the field. Additional messages will follow as details are worked out.

month of training with the Gurkhas in May.

"One of the main reasons we train with the U.S. Marines and Army is our limitations in training areas," explained the general. "It is difficult to accomplish this type of maneuvering and live-fire training in a location like Hong Kong."

As night fell, the Gurkhas and Marines disappeared back into the camouflage of the mosquito-infested underbrush to rest up for the next day's assault. With only ponchos to protect them from the rain, the men attempted to get a good night's rest in spite of the elements, as grunts so routinely do.

The next morning brought a well-orchestrated display of firepower and allied teamwork as the company of Gurkhas and the Marines moved farther into the valley. After receiving simulated fire from another series of bunkers manned by pop-up targets the Marines and Gurkhas quickly silenced the enemy fire with deadly accurate firepower. Before the

pop-up targets had a chance to come to a fully raised position, they were slammed back down by the combined marksmanship of the two units.

Again, the order to move out was heard. The Gurkhas and some elements of the Marine platoon regrouped and began sweeping on line farther into enemy territory. Within minutes the allied forces came under simulated hostile fire. With everything they had, they unleashed a blanket of steel that included 60mm mortars, LAWs, machinegun and small arms fire toward the enemy position.


SSgt. Richard W. Beckett, platoon sergeant, was impressed with the qualities of the allied unit. "The Gurkhas are not very big, but they are some tough little fellas. They have a lot of endurance and are extremely well-disciplined troops."

This week the Gurkhas are on the Big Island training with elements of 2/3 at the Pohakaloa Training Area and will return here to train with 3/3 again before returning to their home base in Hong Kong.

BSSG/from A-4 incorporated and sometimes take a back seat to their main mission—service support.

The small detachment of Marines is responsible for nearly every aspect of life for the infantry, artillery, and command units during combat and field training. Each section within the detachment plays a major interwoven role in the outcome of a mission.

Comprised of several sections, CSSD runs itself like a smaller version of BSSG-1. One of the largest sections is supply. "We provide basic direct support for the ground units," said Sgt. Estaban Martinez, of Supply. Not only are the basic necessities of life, like 60,000 MREs and enough water to keep a regimental size unit from going thirsty, maintained and issued to the ground units, but also the basic necessities for the equipment used by the Marines can be found in supply.

The supply section is responsible for keeping repair parts on hand for all vehicles used to transport troops and supplies, artillery guns and ammo. Hundreds of parts are on hand to keep weapons, ranging from M60

machine guns to M198 howitzers, in top operating order. Bulk items are also on the inventories for the Motor Transport and Maintenance sections.

Another of the larger sections, with an even larger mission, is the Maintenance section. "Simply put—if it shoots, moves, or communicates, we can fix it," said GySgt. Charles Martin, maintenance detachment commander.

The maintenance section is primarily responsible for third and fourth echelon maintenance, which is basically anything beyond the capabilities of the repairmen at the unit level. In the first 12 days of the exercise, the maintenance section completed 71 of 105 work orders and is awaiting parts for the other 34 orders.

Maintenance deals with the intricate work of repairing communications equipment to changing transmissions in AAVs. At present, they are working on what is believed to be the first LVS engine transplant in the field. Also, contact teams are sent out on a daily basis to do repairs at the requesting unit's location.

Supporting the Maintenance section by trans-

porting contact teams is Motor Transport. Not to mention the more than 13,000 gallons of fuel; 35,000 gallons of water; 1,200 troops; and thousands of pounds of supplies and ammo that are transported weekly, "Motor Ts" 52 vehicles are constantly on the move.

Providing fuel for the HMMWVs, 5-tons, LVSs, and wreckers is Bulk Fuel, dispensing 1,200-1,600 gallons of fuel from their 10,000 plus gallons of fuel reserve, from their tactically built fuel farm.

Run by six Marines, Bulk Fuel's main priority is safety. In the event of a fire the Twin Agent Unit (TAU) responds rapidly by shutting down all operations. A three-man team then don fire protective gear, and through the use of hand and arm signals the Marine in charge directs the other two Marines, manning the hose, to the source of the fire in an all out effort to extinguish the flames.

One of the most diversified sections of CSSD and the 1st MEB is Landing Support Company (LSC). Playing a role in all aspects of life in the field, LSC supplies personnel in areas such as

carpentry, heavy equipment, plumbing, engineering, and electrical work, to establish camps, landing zones and roads.

LSC also runs the Helicopter Support Team (HST). Responsible for clearing and establishing an area as a landing zone and helping to guide pilots in and out of the zone, HST Marines also train members of 3rd Marines about their job. This type of cross training is beneficial when an HST is not available and the infantry is expecting supplies or needing to medicate personnel and there is no landing zone available.

Keeping all the Marines healthy is a detachment from A Medical Company. Running a 16-bed ward that is expandable to 60 beds, the sailors of "A Med." run a sick call, and support the Regimental and Battalion aid stations of the infantry and artillery units with lab, X-ray and life support systems.

"Even though we work in an unsuitable environment, we do the best job possible for the Marines we're serving with," said Petty Officer First Class Michael Tyree, a hospital corpsman with A Co. "One of our primary concerns is preventive medicine."

Inspections are run daily on the water supplies, chow halls, living areas, garbage and head areas to ensure the insect, vermin and bacteria are not being induced.

Tying all these units together are the communications personnel. Without effective communications an operation or even a war can be lost. "By running comm. back and forth through the camps, linking telephone lines, establishing and monitoring convoy lines, and running switchboards we help keep the operations running smoothly," said LCpl. Scott Saeger, switch-

board operator.

Another aspect of CSSD's training is that of the warrior. "It's time for the Marines, who haven't been to the field for some time to get reorientated," said Maj. Jon Grogan, commanding officer of CSSD-37. "It's also time for those Marines who have never been to the field to get acclimated to what field duty is all about."

The training is well received by the troops of CSSD; in fact, many of them wish the training can be expanded and continued in garrison.

Constitution ratification a centerpiece for festivities

WASHINGTON—On June 21, 1788, New Hampshire became the ninth state to ratify the Constitution, making it our new form of government. It was not until July 2, 1788 however, that the President of Congress received this news and announced that the Constitution was now the official law of the land.

To celebrate Independence Day and the ratification of the Constitution, a Grand Parade was held in Philadelphia July 4, 1788.

The 1988 national focus for the commemoration of the Bicentennial of the Constitution highlights statehood celebrations as well as the ratification process. Accordingly, a re-creation of the

July 4, 1788 Grand Federal Procession will be staged on Independence Day in Washington, D.C.

Therefore, the ratification of the Constitution is an appropriate centerpiece for local Independence Day parades and activities. Other national plans for Constitution Week, Sept. 17-23, include a repeat of "Bells Across America" and locally-sponsored educational programs.

or equipment can get involved in its improvement.

"Our ultimate goal is to give the Marines in the field reliable, cost-effective, state-of-the-art weapons and equipment... quickly," said MGen. Robert J. Winglass.

As current deputy commanding general of the command, he is in a position to back those words with action.

MCRDAC is designed to streamline the intricate process of research, development, and acquisition of Marine Corps equipment and weapons into a simpler, faster and more cost-effective venture.

Its organizers keep one truism in mind — the best way to find out what Marines in the field need is to get input from Marines in the field. MGen. Winglass stresses that a means to get information on equipment performance has existed for some time, and continues to be used.

"It's called the Quality Deficiency Reporting System," said the Massachusetts native. Failures or deficiencies are reported by users via the chain of command to the Marine Corps Logistics Base, Albany, Ga. The problems are resolved through modification, maintenance or operational procedure revision."

The problems could involve anything from boots to tank turrets, from weapons systems to field computers. Most of these deficiencies are overcome by Fleet Marine Force units themselves or at the Marine Corps logistics bases.

"MCRDAC, on the other hand, looks for replacement equipment and/or new items which will enhance our ability to fight and win," said the general.

"We'll have very close ties and interaction with the Warfighting Center here," he stressed. "That's natural, because the Warfighting Center examines the stated needs of the Fleet Marine Forces and serves as the Marine Air-Ground Task Force proponent for those systems determined to be essential.

"Put plainly, the Warfighting Center, once satisfied that an FMF deficiency can best be overcome by fielding a new item of equipment, will pass such a requirement to MCRDAC for satisfaction."

MGen. Winglass said the Warfighting Center will be the primary route through which MCRDAC will find out what the needs are in the field.

"However," he added, "our people will, in conducting their business, uncover capabilities that are not well known in the Marine Corps. We will pass such information along to the Warfighting Center for their assessment.

"In fact, we recently provided information on a training system that has potential application to the communications schools here... a device we discovered during our interaction with other services. We don't know if it's something that interests them, but if it is, they'll come back to us and we'll see what we can do about satisfying their requirement."

When the problem ends up at MCRDAC, it falls into the hands of experts in a variety of fields who aggressively pursue the best way to make it right.

The 1,146-member command roster shows representation in nearly every combat, combat support, and combat service support occupational specialty in the Marine Corps, as well as necessary administrative support people.

Nearly 400 of them are based at Quantico. The rest are spread strategically across the country where their varying assignments include budget and contracting specialists in Rosslyn, Va., light armored vehicle developmental test experts at Twentynine Palms, Calif., computer software configuration controllers at Marine Corps Tactical Systems Support Activity at Camp Pendleton, Calif., and a missile liaison officer at Huntsville, Ala.

When a project is brought to the attention of the MCRDAC staff, it is immersed into a well-oiled system that might appear staggering to an outsider; but, the system revolves around program managers, who deal with problems of particular weapons or equipment.

The former procurement system had an acquisition coordinating group made up of functionally-diverse representatives from around Headquarters Marine Corps — people from training, manpower or fiscal — each work-

ing their portion of the project.

"That's all changing now," said the general. "All those responsibilities are being centralized and embedded within the offices of Program/Project Managers here, so authority, accountability, and responsibility are centralized and individuals so designated are provided the personnel and fiscal resources to accomplish the task."

The general pointed out many of the program managers, who are experts in their particular fields, also hold the additional military occupational specialty of 9958, acquisition management officer.

This makes them highly qualified, not only to speak on technical aspects of the project they're working on, but also on the acquisition process.

The general continued, "While there is currently a need to increase the number of Marines with the rather new military occupational specialty, more and more Marine officers and civil service personnel are being qualified through attendance at the Defense Systems Management Course at Fort Belvoir."

Centralizing formerly diverse functions is one reason that success is envisioned for the new command; inte-

grating assets of various departments to focus on specific problems is another.

MCRDAC is built around what was the Development Center here until last Nov. 18, when it was merged into the new structure. Segments of Headquarters Marine Corps were also integrated (specifically, staffs of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Research, Development, and Studies, and the Installations and Logistics Department).

The result of these efforts will quickly identify needs, develop combat systems and speed up delivery to the field.

Ironkid Triathlon

Marine's son places second

When James Eusse Jr. says his goal is "to run the Iron Man," there's little doubt that some day this 10-year-old athlete will succeed in that grueling event. In fact, he has already moved closer toward his goal by finishing second in the Iron Kid Triathlon, held June 12 at the Naval Air Station, Barbers Point.

Last year James Jr. watched the competition on TV and told his parents he wanted to try the triathlon.

"We almost missed the registration date for this year's race, and James had only

about a two months of training before the event," explained 1st Lt. James Eusse, former embarkation officer, 1st MEB, and now the combat cargo officer on the USS Belleau Wood, San Diego, Calif.

The Iron Kid Triathlon consists of a 100 meter swim, 3.1 mile bicycle ride and a .6 mile run. Using only standard equipment, Eusse finished second out of 20 competitors in his age group, and an incredible fourth place finish overall with a time of 20:48.

Eusse's training schedule is demanding for a 10-year-old, but his family is very supportive of his ambition to be a

triathlete. James' schedule consists of a three mile run, 400 to 800 meter swim, and 5 to 8 miles on the bicycle five days a week. His mother makes sure he doesn't forget to train, and drives him to the pool, and his father runs and rides with the fifth-grade student after work.

"I never push my son into anything he doesn't want to do. However, when he starts something like the Iron Kid Triathlon, I make sure that he finishes it," said Eusse.

James Jr. also has another goal, and he doesn't bat an eyelash when he tells what that goal is.

"My dad was one of the best runners in the Marine Corps and I want to be just like him!"

Eusse ran for the Marine Corps Track Team during the 76-77 season and represented the U.S. in the 1977 European Olympics in Finland, winning a gold medal in the 5,000 meter and a silver medal in the 10,000 meter runs.

Now that the Eusse's have moved to the West Coast, the fifth grader has set his training schedule to prepare for the Iron Kid Nationals in Phoenix, Arizona. "And he'll have better equipment this time!" stated Eusse.

Diet, exercise keeps blood pressure down

AFIS — High blood pressure — hypertension — can mean trouble. It's linked to heart attacks, strokes, kidney disease, and other conditions.

DoD's Health Promotion Education and Training Subcommittee is emphasizing high blood pressure education this year. While the percentage of adults with the disease is steadily decreasing — due in part to greater pub-

lic awareness — elevated blood pressure is still a public health problem for America and a readiness problem for the military.

About 25 percent of adult Americans have high blood pressure. Black Americans have a slightly higher rate than whites — about 30 percent. One out of two Americans has high blood pressure by the age of 60. Factors that increase the risk of hypertension include being male, obese or diabetic, smoking,

and taking birth control pills.

A normal blood pressure reading for an adult is 120 over 80 millimeters of mercury. The first number is the systolic pressure — the reading when the heart is working hardest, pumping blood out of the heart. The second reading, or diastolic pressure, is taken when the heart relaxes.

According to Dr. Motilal Pamnani of the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences, a blood pressure reading that stays at a level of 140 over 90 normally indicates a person has hypertension. Once the level reaches 150 over 95, the person has a definite hypertension problem and should be treated.

However, blood pressure must be reduced gradually, said Pamnani, an associate professor of physiology. "If you bring down a person's blood pressure too quickly, you risk reducing the supply of blood to vital organs," he explained.

In cases of mild hypertension, Pamnani prefers treating patients with changes in diet and lifestyle rather than giving them drugs. "Once

you start taking drugs for hypertension," said the doctor, "the treatment must be continued for life. It's dangerous for a patient to stop taking his medicine because he thinks he is better and doesn't like the side effects."

Although today's drugs are more sophisticated and have fewer side effects than earlier medicines, they are not without risk, Pamnani said. Therefore, the treatment of choice is to lose weight, get more exercise, stop smoking, and eat less salt and more potassium.

The lifestyle changes recommended for people who already have high blood pressure may also keep healthy from getting it. A diet that is high in sodium and low in potassium contributes to high blood pressure for people who are sensitive to salt. Although not everyone is sensitive to salt, most people take in far more salt than they need, said Pamnani. "Cutting down can't hurt — and will probably help," he added.

If you want to cut down on salt, Pamnani suggested doing so gradually — start by cutting down on processed foods, which often are

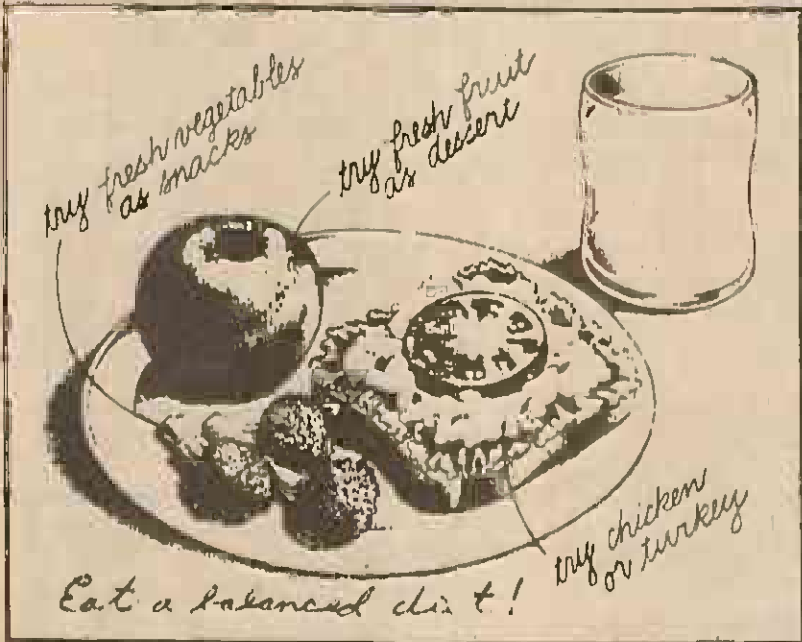
high in salt. Read labels — sodium is hidden in many foods that don't taste salty.

Pamnani said potassium is also important. You can get more potassium by eating citrus fruits, bananas, and beans.

Finally, being active is important in keeping blood pressure under control. "Being an active person doesn't have to mean becoming

an athlete," said a DoD health-care official.

"The word we want to get out to both military and civilian people is don't be a couch potato," she said. "You can do simple things like taking stairs instead of elevators, sometimes walking to see colleagues instead of calling and parking a little farther away from your destination. In general, try to do everything with more vigor."
