Senior operational planner addresses HNSC on Corps' equipment and readiness

HEADQUARTERS, U.S. MARINE CORPS, Washington D.C. — "We are ready today, but tomorrow's readiness is a concern," said LtGen. Arthur C. Blades, the Corps' senior operational planner. "A significant amount of our current Marine Corps equipment was obtained in the 1980s. The average life expectancy of a major end item of ground equipment, for example, is approximately 15 years.

"Today, the average age of most of our equipment is 12 years. Failure to modernize will only increase the cost of repairs which are becoming more labor-intensive and expensive. Eventually, this will have a negative impact on readiness," he said.

In his testimony to the House National Security Committee on March 16, LtGen. Blades, deputy chief of staff, Plans, Policies and Operations, focused his attention on summarizing the impact of contingency operations on force readiness while identifying readiness shortfalls.

"Marines exist to meet the nation's needs," the general said. "We have in the past, are doing so now, and are committed to doing so in the future. Maintaining the active duty end strength at 174,000 is the minimum necessary to sustain an effective warfighting capability and to maintain daily peacetime operational commitments."

That said, the general continued by saying that the Corps' forces are stretched.

"Contingency operations are normally subsidized by diverting funds from operational and maintenance accounts until reprogramming action is taken or supple-

mental funding is provided.

"Last year," he said, "unanticipated, unbudgeted contingency operations, coupled with delays in received supplemental funding, resulted in a decrease in aviation training readiness."

The general used the example of aviation training dollars being sapped last September to fund active operations. The Corps experienced a 5,000 flight-hour funding shortfall due to contingency operations during the fourth quarter fiscal 1994. This required a standown of five squadrons and reduced flight operations for six others.

"Training readiness was degraded," he said, adding that these units are expected to return to their previous levels by the third quarter of this fiscal year.

In FY95, funding for the supplemental request is essential to maintaining overall readiness. A key aspect of maintaining readiness is the ability to measure and, to the extent possible, forecast readiness, he said.

The general said on average, one-third of Marine infantry battalions and squadrons are deployed, while another third trains for deployment. Between 1992 and 1995, forward presence units on scheduled deployments participated in 41 contingency operations. This is 73 percent of all U.S. contingencies in which Marines participated during this time. During 1995, Marines on scheduled deployments participated in 10 contingency operations.

By adjusting deployment cycles, resourcing the deploying units and modifying training schedules, unscheduled commitments can interrupt the planned deploy-

Workshop to help families with special needs

The Exceptional Family Member Program. What is it? Who does it help and how? These are just a few of the questions that will be answered during the EFMP special needs workshop being held April 11 at the Bachelor Officer Quarters conference room from 8:30 through 11:30 a.m.

EFMP is a program designed to assist Marine Corps personnel who have family members with special needs. The program is mandated by Marine Corps Order P1754.4 which establishes Marine Corps policy, procedure and assignment responsibility related to EFMP. The EFMP was established in 1987 to conform with Public Laws 94-142 and 95-561.

An exceptional family member has one or more handicapping conditions or needs requiring special medical, educational, or medically-related services. Special needs include those characterized as physical, intellectual, emotional, or psychological.

The workshop is being held to promote the EFMP and to encourage enrollment of those Marines who have special needs family members. The objective of the pro-

gram is to ensure that Marine Corps families are assigned to locations where services exist to support their special needs.

In order for this program to work effectively it needs the full support of the commands. The commands need to help identify and encourage the exceptional families.

"The focus of this workshop is to educate the commands," explained Brian Goodson, EFMP coordinator, MCB Hawaii. "The commands need to understand the challenges these families face and learn what tools they can use to help."

There will be several guest speakers at the workshop, to include Belinda Sims, EFMP Manager, Headquarters Marine Corps; Dr. Tom Gallagher, department head EFMP, Tripler Army Medical Center; Dr. David Weiss, Department of Psychology, Tripler AMC; and Claire Shinasato, special education, Hawaii Department of Education.

Each of the speakers will be providing valuable information that will be the tools the commands can use to help their military families who may qualify for the program.

F/A-18s return to K-Bay for training

The sound of freedom has just increased in the skies overhead with the arrival of Marine Aircraft Group-41.

The MAG recently deployed to MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay to provide close air support for 3d Marines during their training at Pohakuloa Training Area on the Big Island.

During CAS training the MAG's squadron of F/A-18 Hornets, VMFA-112, will utilize their attack capabilities to provide close air support for 3d Marines ground troops.

"Artillery sections of 1st Battalion, 12th Marines will mark the target and will allow the F/A-18s to locate and destroy the objective," said Col. John Goodman, commander, MAG-41.

Stationed in Dallas, MAG-41 took two months to prepare for this multi-operational deployment.

"This deployment would give us the chance to further establish our credibility with active duty units and to show that we can provide op-tempo relief for extended periods of time," said Col. Henry Weiland, deputy commander, MAG-41.

MAG-41 will not only provide close air support for 3d Marines, but will also take part in other training missions such as live missile fire exercises at Pacific Missile Range Facility, Barking Sands, Kauai and Dissimilar Aircraft Training with the Hawaii Air National

Guard.

"Dissimilar Aircraft Training is important in the aviation community because it provides pilots the opportunity to engage aircraft and pilots from other commands that they are not normally familiar with. Since they don't normally train with each other, the engagement creates a more realistic combat environment," explained Goodman who took command of the MAG in July 1993.

Though the MAG has deployed to Kaneohe Bay before, most of the 218 personnel have never had the chance to train in Hawaii.

"The training facilities here are great. They allow us to easily carry out our mission plans," said Goodman. Moving so many personnel and equipment thousands of miles might seem like a difficult task, but as a reserve command they are often called upon to assist many units and are up to any logistical challenge.

To help defer the cost of the deployment they used assets already available to them, making this deployment one of the most cost efficient of its size. "With all the various types of training we are receiving here, we are getting more bang for the buck," said Weiland.

The F/A-18 is a considered to be a versatile aircraft capable of carrying out any mission given to them. And like the aircraft they fly, maintain, and support, the reserve and active duty personnel of MAG-41 are here to prove that they are just as capable.

Every clime and place

High level training takes place in Okinawa

The III Marine Expeditionary Force recently completed a maiden 18-month voyage here through the Marine Air Ground Task Force Staff Training Program in only one week by using a hypothetical exercise code named Habu Strike.

Teams from III MEF and MSTP battled through a computer-generated war game to meet the principle staff officer training objectives initiated by MGen. Carlton W. Fulford Jr., commanding general, III MEF.

Habu Strike also included some training objectives mandated by Marine Corps order, said Col. Jerry Humble, director of the MSTP Center at Quantico, Va.

"The whole MSTP process is designed to train a high-level staff to function in a combat environment," said Col. John Brennan, chief of staff, III MEF. "Tactics are not the only area in which we train. We also explore the

process and procedures to do battle," he continued. During Phase III, the CPX members of the MSTP staff perform in a number of capacities, such as role players for the joint task force.

Prior to the CPX, MSTP examined the operations orders III MEF drafted for Habu Strike and compared them with JTF operations orders to look for incongruities in doctrine. Rear area security is one process MSTP USMC High Level Training on Okinawa evaluates. "Tuesday we experienced rear area security attack," said Maj. John Pomfret, the MSTP logistics and strategic mobility officer. "We were standing by, monitoring MEF's response. What was their coordination? Did they follow their standard operating procedures, or did they make things up as they went along?"

"War fighting is the (Marine Corps) focus," said Col. Robert Cohen, commanding officer, 4th Marine Regiment, 3d Marine Division. "Always has been, and it has to continue to stay number one. To learn war fighting at the

senior level in a joint environment is no easy task," he added.

III MEF and all major subordinate commands operated out of command posts established in CPX-designated buildings, and from general purpose tents erected throughout the camp.

"The MEF is the war fighter, but the 3d Marine Division and the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing are doing the fighting, while the 3d Force Service Support Group provides the support," Brennan said. "Clear, concise orders based on current, accurate information must go down to those units, so they can perform the job we expect. We, on the other hand, have to get good information back up to the staff so the general can see the situation and determine the best way to prosecute the current battle and plan for future battles."

According to Cohen, the training value extends from the MEF command element all the way down to the regiments and groups. "The training exercises our staff to provide that bottom-up feed, but also forces us tacti-

cally to look at how we're going to fight our units," Cohen said. "The training value is tremendous at all levels."

Employing 7th Communications Battalion's deployable assets on Camp Courtney and Hansen provided the Courtney-based command elements direct phone and computer contact with their regimental and group commanders who operated at the Tactical Warfare Simulation Evaluation Analysis System building, Camp Hansen. TWSEAS's building also housed a command element for the enemy force and AN/UYSK-43, a military mainframe computer which is the brain of simulated wars.

AN/UYSK-43 receives operational decisions made by opposing forces and determines the outcome, such as casualties and equipment lost. According to Cohen, you can only duplicate so much in a paper war, but working from a map inside a tent makes the simulation transparent to staff officers. "While you don't see the troops, the gut feeling that the troops are out there

still exists, and you're still planning for troop movements and resupplies. The reality of this is as close as you're going to get for any staff," Cohen said.

CPXs such as this are also a cost effective way for training staff officers on a MEF-size scale. "I think (MSTP) is very important to the Marine Corps because somewhere in this MEF are the future leaders of the Marine Corps," Brennan said. "The captains and majors are going on to become the colonels and generals someday. They're going to learn this and retain it."

According to Brennan, the modern battlefield is very lethal and minimum exposure for Marines is the Marine Corps' primary goal. "The visibility of MSTP's effectiveness to the individual Marine down on the front line will be through efficient staff officers making the right decisions and recommendations to generals ... and the ceasing of hostilities as rapidly as possible on favorable terms to the United States with less casualties and less damage," Brennan said. 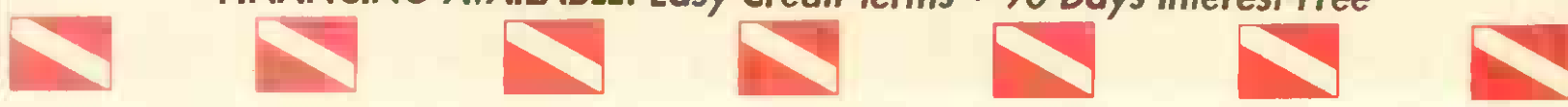

Marines to help Joint Task Force Full Accounting mission

Once again American troops are making their way through the jungles of Southeast Asia but this time their purpose is not to do battle. Rather it is to locate and return the remains of fallen service members.

This is being accomplished by Joint Task Force-Full Accounting, established in January 1992 and headquartered at MCB Hawaii, Camp H.M. Smith. To complete their goal, the JTF has employed more than 180 investigators, analysts, linguists and other specialists, along with participants from every branch of service.

Though the JTF has already completed a number of missions, no two are alike. Each mission is conducted in various areas utilizing different military assets.

Scheduled to support the next mission is Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron 463 and small attachments from 3d Marines and Combat Service Support Group 3. More than 40 officer and enlisted Marines and sailors from such occupational specialties as pilots, aircrewmembers, and maintenance personnel will

accompany three CH-53 helicopters to Bung Lung, Cambodia.

"We'll fly out of Kaneohe Bay, aboard two C-5s and travel to U'Taphao, Thailand where the helos will be off loaded and assembled," said Maj. John Rudzis, operations officer, HMH-463.

Their stay will not be long. Shortly after arriving the squadron will fly the CH-53's 180 miles northeast of Phnom Penh, to their base of operations at Bung Lung.

Each day the squadron will provide transportation for the JTF investigators so that they may reach remote sites located in mountainous jungle terrain.

"Each site is within an hour's flight time of Bung Lung so there will be no need to stay in any area overnight," explained Rudzis.

Because each investigation is costly, the JTF requires overwhelming evidence before initiating an operation.

Once on site, investigators will look for any human remains so that they can match them with medical and dental records of known POWs and MIAs.

Though Cambodia is known as one of the world's political hot spots, service members

will be working in a low threat area and will not carry any type of sidearms.

To prepare for this unusual mission, pilots and crew will practice making landings in tighter more restricted areas and squadron personnel will receive a variety of inoculations to combat any of the local diseases.

Marines deployed are usually housed in barracks, however, the personnel of HMH-463 will stay in hotels and guest houses while living off the local economy.

Upon completion of the mission, HMH-463 will journey back to U'Taphao where they will stay for approximately four weeks and take part in the joint national training exercise, Cobra Gold 95.

Said Rudzis of the upcoming deployment, "The Marines are looking forward to participating in both the JTF operation and Cobra Gold. This is an excellent opportunity for a practical application of our skills and to take part in a joint national training evolution."

Since there are more than 2,000 missing service members still unaccounted for in Southeast Asia, the JTF is doing what it can to bring home our fallen heroes.

Recruiting programs can help advance career and rank for Marines

Marine Corps recruiting is a tough battle, and with every intent of victory the Corps is pulling out every weapon possible.

One such weapon, armed with a cadre of benefits, has the capability to not only help clear a path to the fulfillment to the Corps' vital mission, but also, through a long list of incentives — ranging from on-the-spot promotions to leave-free days home — to generously reward Marines who volunteer for the battle.

That weapon, the Command Recruiting Program, is one of many afforded recruiters on the front lines, but the only one with such obvious benefits for volunteers.

Command Recruiting is subdivided into five programs: boot leave, for Marines home on leave after recruit training; annual leave, for Devil Dogs who supply assistance to a recruiter while home on leave or liberty; Permissive Recruiter Assistance Program (PRASP), for Marines who have not yet made their first permanent change of station; Permissive TAD Recruiter Program (PTAD), open to any active duty enlisted Marines; and Active Duty for Special Work Program (Reserve Recruiter Aide), which allows reservists up to 179 days on temporary active duty to assist the recruiting effort.

The first two programs operate under normal leave circumstances. Boot leave referrals can mean a promotion to private first class or lance corporal. While on annual leave lance corporals and corporals can earn points toward their promotion composite score; sergeants and above are thanked with positive

comments in the coveted section "C" of their fitness reports, as well as possible meritorious masts for all.

PRASP allows junior Marines up to 14 days permissive TAD to recruit in their hometown. There are two maxims in boosting sells, according to GySgt. Kendall White, contact team member at 8th Marine Corps District (a recruiting area spanning portions of 11 states throughout the mid-southwest, headquartered in New Orleans), "Get face-to-face with as many people as possible and spread positive word-of-mouth from satisfied customers. This program capitalizes on both."

In regards to the first rule he explained, "Command Recruiting Marines are an extension of the recruiter, simply increasing the sheer number of Marines on the streets. In grunt terms, your attacking with a wider front." Or as Confederate cavalry general Nathan Bedford Forrest said, the first step to winning the battle is to, "Get there first with the most."

Recruiting station commanding officers have the authority to promote PRASP Marines up to the rank of private first class for referrals.

"PRASP is great because, for a recruiter there's nothing better than to take a young Marine with cash in his pocket, driving a new car and chockfull of ooh-rah Marine stories, out into the public to talk to guys with whom he graduated," White said. "Especially guys driving beat-up old clunkers they hope will start in the morning so they can get to work stacking cans in the local grocery store on time. all the while thinking, 'My life stinks.' They may not enlist right away, but a definite seed has been planted."

Such was the case with PFC Jeremy Marks, who got two contracts while he was a PRASP recruiter out of RSS College Station, Texas, after he graduated Marine Combat Training. BGen. Clifford Stanley, Director of Manpower Plans and Policy and Assistant Deputy Chief of Staff, Manpower and Reserve Affairs Division, HQMC, who was visiting RS Houston, pinned on Marks' meritorious first chevron March 3.

"I got to go back to my high school, Caldwell High, and talk to a couple of classes about boot camp and stuff," said Marks. "They were all really stunned at how much I've changed. I was kind of a problem child when I was in high school. Now, I've come back and they can see the discipline the Marine Corps gave me. Instead of wearing baggy drawers and sporting a messed up haircut, my appearance is squared away — tucked in shirt, always with a belt, nice haircut and a clean shave."

"They see how drastic and positive the change was and they want a part of it. They want what the Corps has given me."

Marks cites an example of going to a high school football game in uniform, "People just swarmed around me, wanting to know about the Corps. It was great."

Since home, Marks has been shadowing Sgt. Richard Harris, a College Station recruiter. "It's (PRASP) an outstanding program. He's a great proof source," he said. "Because of PFC Marks' roots in the community, kids are more comfortable talking to me. I wish I could have someone come back from every one of my high schools."

The PTAD program is open to all enlisted Marines after their first permanent change of station. Participants get to go

home for 30 days permissive TAD. Lance corporals and corporals earn 20 points per referral (up to 100 points) toward their composite score for promotion.

Cpl. Greg Carter, a supply warehouseman at MCAS Cherry Point, recently discovered these impressive benefits when he went home to Chattanooga, Tenn., to recruit for a month.

During his short tenure there he pulled in four recruits, boosting his composite score from an 1821 to 1901 in a field infamous for stratospheric promotion scores. "Because I'm pretty much maxed out on everything else (other factors in his composite score for promotion), it would have taken me a year to earn that many points by just time-in-grade and time-in-service points," he said.

"While enjoying an extended visit with his family and friends, he also appreciated the opportunity to test the "B" billet waters before he has to plunge into them in order to remain competitive for promotions in the staff-noncommissioned officer ranks. (All enlisted Marines are encouraged to spend at least one tour in a "B" billet, either as a drill instructor, embassy guard or recruiter.)

"I had always heard how hard recruiting was and that it would either make or break your career," he said. "But I liked it. It was great getting a chance to tell kids, who may not see a whole lot of opportunity in their future, that the Marine Corps is a perfect medium to do something positive with their lives."

"I wouldn't mind being a recruiter someday. The secret is just believing in what your selling, which isn't hard with the Marine Corps."

The last program, Active Duty for Special Work Program or Reserve Recruiter Aid, allows reservists to work up to 179 days on active duty earning all the same grade-determined incentives as the previous mentioned programs.

Although the Command Recruiting Program is targeted to bring in 15 percent of the Corps' annual personnel requirements, GySgt. Ron Gross, also an 8th MCD contact team member, believes it could be worth even more. "With all the benefits involved for recruiting as a whole and individual participants, if used properly, this program could boom. Kind of like Kool Aid, 'just add water,' — just add more involvement to the Command Recruiting Program and bam — contracts."

"The only way the Command Recruiting Program will be successful is if everyone at every echelon believes in it. It's like Tinkerbell, you have to believe in the magic for it to work," said GySgt. White.

Belief in the program certainly paid off for RS New Orleans last month (February), when Command Recruiting accounted for nearly one out of every five contracts pulled in. "The Command Recruiting Program is vital to the success of meeting the Marine Corps' needs," said MGySgt. Maurice Valerie, recruiter instructor for RS New Orleans.

If you are interested in becoming part of the battle and taking advantage of the career-enhancing incentives, then contact the Recruiter Instructor at the Recruiting Station where you were recruited, after attaining your command's approval.

Marine recruiting is a tough battle, and the Corps knows you're its best weapon.

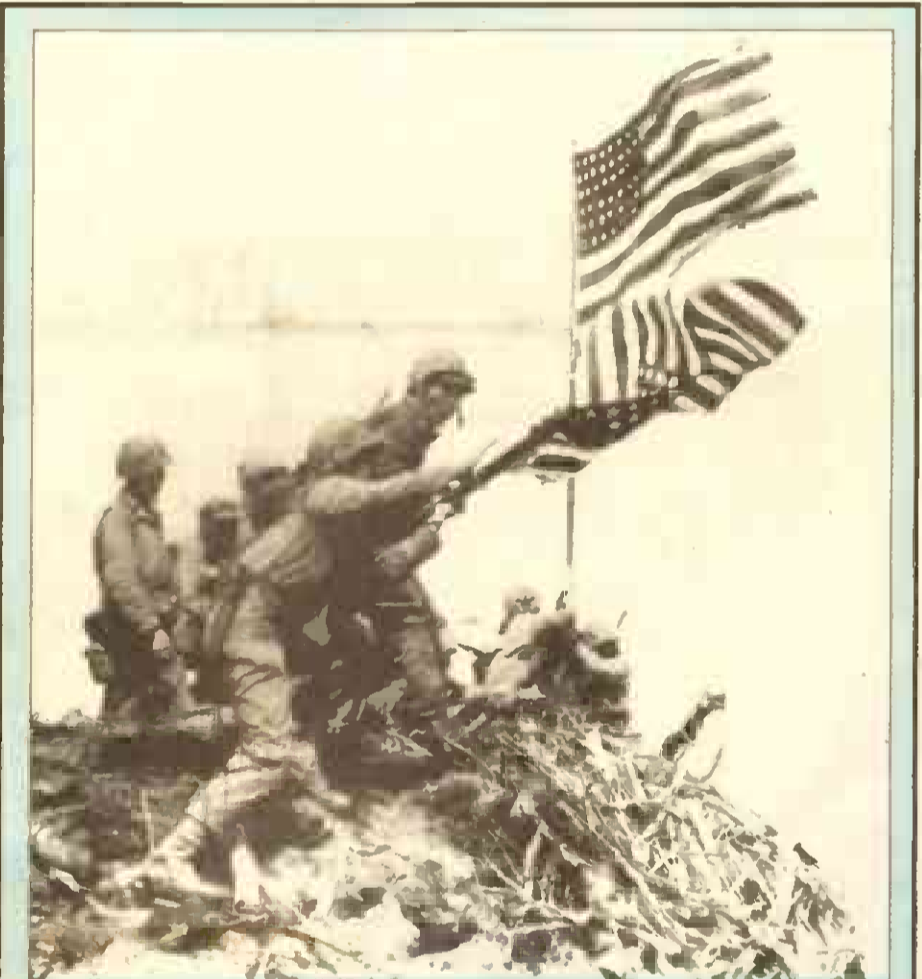

Forgotten first raising was the motivator for Iwo vets

The first flag raising on Iwo Jima is all but forgotten and almost completely overshadowed by the second flag raising which was captured on film and immortalized by Associated Press photographer Joe Rosenthal.

The 28th Marine Regiment, 5th Marine Division, had the objective of taking Mount Suribachi. After three days of fighting, they isolated it and early on the fourth day had sent a patrol up the mountain.

After the patrol returned and reported no resistance, LtCol. Chandler Johnson, battalion commander, 2nd Battalion, 28th Marines, sent 3d Platoon from Company E up the mountain with a small flag and instructions to raise it at the top.

"The patrol met no resistance going up," said Charles Lindberg, the sole surviving member of the first flag raising on Iwo Jima. "At the top, the Marines found a water pipe about 14-feet long and raised the flag."

"It was then everything came alive. The troops down below started to cheer, the ships out in the ocean started their whistles going. It was

a proud moment."

"I have never seen a flag so big as that first flag that was raised on Iwo Jima," said Sgt. Richard Fiske, Iwo Jima veteran. "It was a like a shot in the arm telling everyone that this here island is ours and we're taking it."

Four hours after the first flag raising, Johnson sent a larger replacement flag up the mountain. Along with the new flag was Rosenthal, who, upset that he had missed the first flag raising, went along just to get a picture of something. He ended up taking World War II's most memorable photograph.

"The Rosenthal photograph is like a great work of art in that we don't go to the photo expecting to identify somebody or expecting to see some particular truth. There's a quality of general; faces are averted and hidden by helmets. The sense is these aren't some young men, they are all young men," explained Karal Ann Marling, a historian who was interviewed about Iwo Jima.

Be it the first flag raising or the second flag raising on Iwo Jima, they both have combined to become a symbol of American resolve; they have become an American icon symbolizing honor, courage, and commitment.



A heavy price — American fighting men suffered more than 26,000 casualties including more than 6,800 service members killed. Of the more than 20,000 Japanese soldiers, only 1,083 survived this costly battle on the small Japanese island.

Ship to be named after last Marine killed

"First Lieutenant Martin, alone and armed only with a pistol, boldly charged the hostile position and killed all of its occupants."

"Realizing that his few remaining comrades could not repulse another organized attack, he called to his men to follow and then charged into the midst of the strong enemy force, firing his weapon and scattering them until he fell mortally wounded by a grenade."

"By his outstanding valor, indomitable fighting spirit and tenacious determination in the face of overwhelming odds... He gallantly gave his life for his country," so reads his Medal of Honor citation.

That was the final day of the 36-day fury known as Iwo Jima.

1stLt. Harry Linn Martin, then 34, was the last Marine to die before the Hell of Iwo was officially declared over. He died of wounds 10 days later.

On the black sand shores of that despicable island, March 14, Secretary of the Navy John H. Dalton, announced his decision to name the newest maritime prepositioned ship in honor of Martin. The Bucyrus, Ohio,

Marine was among 5,931 Marines who perished in a battle where the only tactic was frontal assault.

The Martin will be the fourteenth ship in the history of the maritime-prepositioned force. The MPF is comprised of three squadrons afloat and standing ready in the Pacific and Indian Oceans and the Mediterranean. The MPF is an integral part of the nation's strategic sealift capability and its ability to provide swift logistical support to forward-deployed Marines. The ships are capable of off-loading pierside or offshore with special lighterage. Additionally, the ships have ramps for rolling stocks and are especially valuable for quickly off-loading tracked and wheeled vehicles. Each ship in the MPF also has helicopter landing platforms.

The procurement authorization for the Martin was approved by Congress last year. Congress appropriated \$110 million to acquire and convert it as part of the MPF. MPF ships are privately-owned vessels chartered to the Navy and operated by civilians employed under contract by the Military Sealift Command. Sailors are also embarked aboard these MPF ships.

Each of the four-to-five ships in each squadron carries enough supplies and equipment to sustain a Marine Air/Ground Task Force of approximately 17,000 Marines and sailors for 30 days.

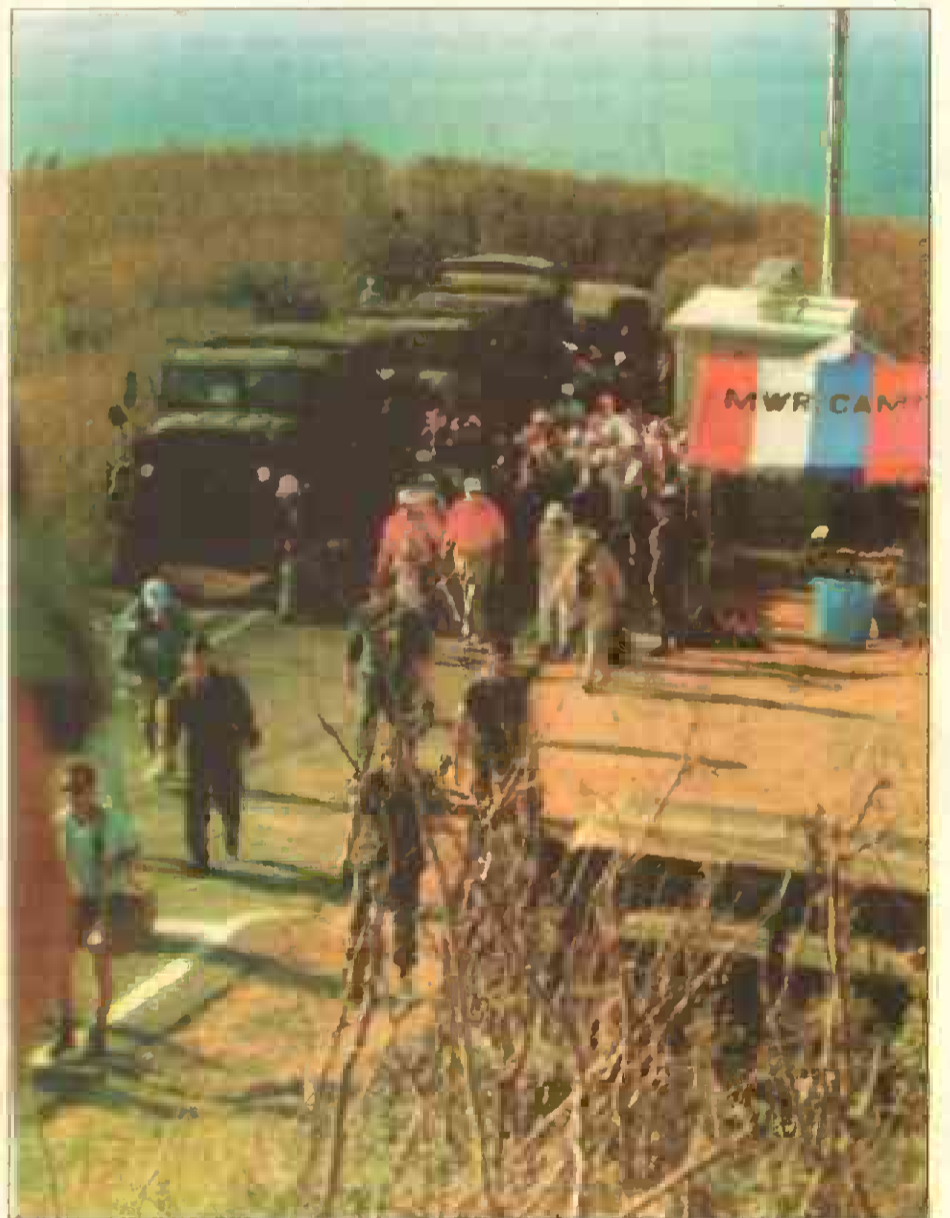

Vets return to the Iwo Jima for 50th anniversary

IWO JIMA—Nearly 1,000 World War II veterans of one of the bloodiest Pacific battles returned recently to this small Japanese island they fought on half a century ago.

American and Japanese Iwo Jima veterans, with their families, covered this eight-square-mile island as they clambered through sulfur caves, attended ceremonies and stood once more atop Mount Suribachi.

The day's events began as soon as planes bearing their precious "cargo" touched down. Hundreds of active duty Marines and sailors greeted these "living legends" before the veterans loaded up on five-ton trucks for a four around the island's many monuments and sites. One of the stops along the route included the headquarters cave of Lt. Gen. Tadamichi Kuribayashi, the commander of all Japanese forces on the island. Other sites included the cave used by

Japanese soldiers as a hospital and the island's most dominant feature, Mount Suribachi.

Any tensions left between the Japanese and U.S. vets melted away as they clasped hands and posed for pictures with one another at the various monuments atop the volcano. Clad in old uniforms, unit patches and wearing medals on their chests, the U.S. veterans contrasted starkly with the solemn dark suits worn by the Japanese veterans.

The pinnacle of the day's whirlwind events took place at the Reunion of Honor Memorial, dedicated 10 years ago as a symbol of the friendship built by both countries.

In attendance were U.S. Ambassador to Japan Walter Mondale, Secretary of the Navy John Dalton and Commandant of the Marine Corps Gen. Carl E. Mundy Jr. Secretary Dalton in his address to the crowd said, "By remembering war, we will safeguard the peace. The men who fought here, now our grand-

fathers and great-grandfathers, are heroes to us all."

Mundy then spoke of the sacrifices and fighting spirit of both sides.

"All of those who fought here have become a part of something that will live forever. We have come here today to honor you," he said.

Representatives from both countries placed wreaths at the monument and a 21-gun salute and the playing of Taps brought tears to many warriors' eyes as they remembered fallen comrades who attended only in spirit. After the ceremony, many veterans armed with baggies, bottles and glass vials stormed the invasion beaches to collect a bit of the black, coarse sand that proved only their first obstacle so long ago.

One of the U.S. veterans, retired Sgt. Maj. Richard Kerr of Albuquerque, N.M., came bedecked in his original dress blues. He made a big hit with everyone, particularly with the active duty Marines who took pictures and requested autographs.

Kerr served as a rifleman with Easy Company, 13th Battalion, 5th Marine Division. Standing atop Mount Suribachi, the 70-year-old Kerr reflected on how glad he was to be here.

"We were about to invade Iwo Jima and I didn't plan on coming back. I just wanted to go out in a blaze of glory. Now standing here, I feel wonderful. The island has changed since the first time I was here, but it's still Iwo," he said.

For Patricia Armstrong of Davis, Calif., coming to Iwo Jima was a healing process. Her father, Cmdr. Robert Armstrong, executive officer of USS Pensacola was killed along with 16 other men Feb. 17, 1945, two days before D-Day.

"It's been very difficult for me coming here. He was buried at sea near here, so this brings to closure that part of my life," she said.

For the Marines assisting in this commemorative event, being on Iwo Jima was a once-in-a-lifetime experi-

ence.

For 25-year-old Sgt. Wendell Hadnot, a native of Beaumont, Texas, and a KC-130 flight mechanic with VMGR-152, strolling the beaches of Iwo Jima was overwhelming.

"Looking around here, it's amazing what our forces managed to do. It makes me so proud to be a Marine and to be here," Hadnot said.

Ken Runkle of Lafayette, Ind., a rifleman with 2d Battalion, 26th Marines, 5th Marine Division, planted a small U.S. flag on the beach as he collected some of the shifting sand in the shadow of Mount Suribachi. He summed up best what most everyone was feeling, be they American or Japanese, former servicemember or active duty.

"What a thrill and honor it is to be back here. I had tears in my eyes when I got off the plane and saw all those folks waiting to greet me. I feel damn good that I'm back on Iwo Jima," he said.

Fifty years ago, they returned from a hell called Iwo Jima to a little corner of paradise called Waimea. This week, Marines who survived the hellish Battle of Iwo Jima repeated the trip from former battle field to former training site as part of 50th anniversary commemorations of the battle.

Nearly 50 Iwo Jima veterans and guests from the 5th Marine Division joined hundreds of Waimea residents last week in a special day-long reunion in this Big Island town, located about 100 miles southeast of Honolulu. Most had just arrived after participating in 50th anniversary commemorations of the battle on the island of Iwo Jima. In the process they renewed old friendships and helped the people of Waimea recapture an important portion of local history that was in danger of being lost.

The veterans, most of whom had served on Iwo Jima with the 5th Marine Division, returned to a site which had been both a rigorous training area and a "home away from home". The people of Waimea and MarForPac Marines greeted them with a traditional Hawaiian lei greeting, band music, a tour of their former training base at "Camp Tarawa", and a luncheon in their

honor.

The visit to Camp Tarawa capped a series of commemorations in which the veterans returned to the Island of Iwo Jima, visited Guam, and held a memorial service at the National Military Cemetery of the Pacific (Punchbowl).

The last stop for many veterans was a visit to their old training area in Waimea's Camp Tarawa. The day-long visit brought the veterans and Waimea residents together for the first time in a half-century. It also brought Waimeans and active duty Marines too young to remember the war in contact with a living embodiment of a history rapidly being shrouded by the passage of time.

In December, 1943, Marines of the 2nd Marine Division established as their training grounds a site they dubbed Camp Tarawa, after the terrible battle they had just fought. The Marines arrived in the sleepy little Big Island town of Waimea to rest, recuperate and retrain in the art of amphibious warfare. What they found was not only a magnificent training area on the open range owned by the famous Parker Ranch, but the warmth and hospitality of the local population.

The 2nd Marine Division was soon to depart Waimea, destined for the shores of Saipan, Tinian and Okinawa. The 2nd was

soon followed to Waimea by the 5th Marine Division. Although few 5th MarDiv Marines were aware of it, they were preparing for one of the most hellish ordeals in Marine history: the battle of Iwo Jima.

Following the 36-day ordeal, the Marines returned to the peaceful village to rest, refit and renew old friendships with the Waimeans who had taken "their" Marines into their homes and hearts.

"We spent many a pleasant hour here," said Iwo veteran Frank Wright. "One of the fondest memories I have is coming into town and getting a steak dinner for a dollar," he said. "I think they (the local citizens) had an appreciation of service people. They had seen us close up. We liked them and they liked us. It's been a love affair that's gone on ever since, apparently," Wright said.

Waimeans agreed. Pat Shioji was a young girl when the Marines arrived. "I remember I was about five years old and the military men used to come by and give us chocolates. We used to wait for that chocolate candy to come, because we used to love it," she laughed. "My mom used to wash their clothes and iron them by hand," she added. Many Waimeans supplemented their meager incomes by providing useful services.

"We used to come to the camp and sell sandwiches and hot dogs," said Natsuko Ryusaki who was 15 when the Marines established the camp. "Lots of newspaper boys made lots of money selling newspapers (to the Marines)," she added fondly.

Memories abounded on the camp tour, which began at the present-day Waimea-Kohala Airport, once an open field bordering a terrain feature known as "Red Hill" by the Marines or "Hohoholoku" by Waimeans. Red Hill was where the 5th Division's 28th Marines trained to take Mount Suribachi.

"A couple of days out of (on the way to) Iwo Jima, (the officers) had a map made and they showed us what Suribachi was like," explained Stanley Walker, who had trained on Red Hill with the 28th Marines. "We knew that was our priority. We were going to have to take Mount Suribachi," he explained.

Cpl. Michael Roney from Marine Forces Pacific, headquartered here, served as the Red Hill "guide", clad in original World War II Marine garb, including herringbone utili-

ties with leggings, steel helmet and cartridge belt. Marines in similar garb guided the veterans at the other Camp Tarawa sites.

The last tour site was Parker School, home of the original Camp Tarawa USO. Older Waimeans and local students had spent many hours researching the camp and had acquired many World War II photos and artifacts. The Waimeans had even hung a large "USO" banner from the school's front porch to give an authentic flavor.

Following the tour, the veterans and locals repaired to Kahilu Hall, the local community center for a luncheon honoring both. Entertainment was provided by the Marine Forces Pacific Band, which played a wide

repertoire of 1940's-era big band music.

Col. Mike Cooper, MarForPac's Headquarters and Service Battalion commanding officer, provided the keynote address.

"The world will little note nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here," he said, paraphrasing Lincoln's Gettysburg Address in honor of all those who served on Iwo Jima. He then led the 250-strong assemblage in a toast to the Marines on Iwo Jima who made the ultimate sacrifice for their nation. Cooper went on to praise both the veterans and Waimeans for their incalculable contributions to the American war effort.

Several hundred Marines, sailors and civilians gathered for a short, simple, but moving ceremony at the Base Theater March 23. Special guest speaker Sgt. Richard Fiske, an Iwo Jima veteran, shared his experiences of battle on that small Japanese island.

The ceremony began with Col. M.H. Boyce, deputy commander of MCB Hawaii

making comments and the introduction of Fiske.

"These veterans came face to face with the doors of hell. Many of them paid the true price of freedom," Boyce said. "But whatever the price, it was worth it."

The battle of Iwo Jima was the bloodiest battle in Marine Corps history, with 5,931 Marines killed and 17,272 wounded. In comparison the Japanese also sustained heavy losses with more than 19,000 soldiers killed in the 36-day battle.

Among those who survived is Honolulu resident Richard Fiske who was aboard the USS West Virginia when it was bombed on Dec. 7, 1941, and was among those who landed on the small volcanic island located between Japan and the Marianas Islands in February, 1945.

"I didn't think I would leave that island," Fiske told the audience. "On the first day all appeared to be well until around 10 a.m., and then the hellacious battle began. The Marines battled for the next 24 to 36 hours, being stuck on the beach and out in the open."

"It was unbelievable the amount of bravery that these young Marines displayed. Never once did anyone turn their back in the heat of battle," he continued. "There was something special about these Marines, they were so young but, did their jobs to make it safe for others."

Though 50 years have passed since Fiske and his fellow Marines of the 5th Marine Division took the island, it appeared the memories of battle remained vivid in the 73 year-old's mind.

"We knew that we were facing the Japanese who refused to be taken as prisoners," Fiske said. "We only took 236 total prisoners."

Facing such a fierce enemy was not only a physical battle but also an emotional one.

"We tried not to get close [with members of his unit] but, we were a part of the family, and when one dies, a part of your family dies," he said, holding back the tears.

On Feb. 23, 1945, Fiske was at the base of

Mount Suribachi. As the first flag was raised on the 550 ft. volcanic cone, Fiske remembered what that did for the morale of the Marines.

"It was like a shot in the arm. This is ours and we are gonna take it. Though we had not captured the entire island, it made a difference," said Fiske. "I have never seen a flag so big in my life as when they raised the first one."

As do many veterans of Iwo Jima, Fiske considers himself lucky to have survived the fierce battle for the small Pacific island.

"The only souvenir I have from Iwo Jima is a 1919 nickel which saved my life," Fiske explained after the ceremony.

A bullet hit Fiske in the thigh and would have surely been a serious wound had it not been for a nickel in his pocket which stopped the bullet and left Fiske with only a bruise. Fiske carries the nickel with him as his only souvenir of Iwo Jima. He also advised the Marines in the audience not to try stopping a bullet with a nickel as they may not like the results.

Fiske also eluded to the fact though he survived, he also lost a lot of "buddies" in the battle.

"Hill 362 was known as the "Meat Grinder" because of the Marine casualties sustained there," he said. "The Japanese would have fought to the death if the emperor said so."

Fiske thanked the Marines for attending the ceremony and invited them to look at the photos and articles he had accumulated

over the years at the conclusion of the ceremony.

After Fiske concluded his comments, Base Chaplain Cmdr. David O. Travers, MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, concluded with a prayer. Fiske was then presented with a plaque of an aerial view of MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay.

Immediately after the ceremony Marines flocked around the photos and articles which the veteran had brought. A group of more than 30 Marines asked questions and listened intently to the stories Fiske shared about his World War II experiences from Pearl Harbor to Iwo Jima.

"This was the first time I have ever heard someone actually speak about what they had to go through," said Sgt. John Harlow, Headquarters 3d Marines, Division Schools. "I have a lot more respect for them for it."

"When he was up there talking you could actually visualize what he was talking about a lot better. You can read books or see films, but it's not the same as someone who has actually walked the grounds and can tell fine details from actually being there," he continued. "I would like for more people to come and share their personal accounts of what they saw as a form of PME for Marines."

Though Fiske has faced many dangerous encounters during his lifetime the 73 year-old believes he has 50 more good years left in him, and with that his heart will always be with the Marines and the Marine Corps.

After hearing a first hand account of the Marine Corps' costliest battle do you look at Iwo Jima differently?

Front and center

Career planner is a counselor, friend and confidant

A big gleaming smile, a firm handshake and a "How are you doing Marine?" If you happen to run into GySgt. Andre L. Jeffries this is the greeting you will receive.

Jeffries is a Marine of many hats. He is the Ready Reserve Liaison Chief for MCB Hawaii, he is also a career planner, counselor, friend and confidant.

"The main thing I want Marines to

know is that I care," Jeffries said. "It doesn't matter what the case may be, I will listen. I don't believe in appointments so they can just stop on by."

Jeffries was born in Cleveland, Ohio July 28, 1960. He enjoyed the usual activities of young men and was awarded a football scholarship to a college in rural Ohio.

Everything seemed just fine and then a quirk of fate changed Jeffries life.

"I was having second thoughts about

football and was feeling pretty down about possibly dropping out of college," Jeffries explained. "I was home for the Christmas holidays and received a Christmas card from a Marine recruiter. I called him ... and well, the rest is history."

That history has spanned 16 years, of which only four were spent on regular active duty.

Jeffries joined the Marine Corps just after Christmas and left for Parris Island, S.C. in January 1979.

He was trained as a radio operator at the Communication School, Camp Geiger, N.C. and then was stationed with the 2nd Force Service Support Group, Camp Lejeune.

After his tour there, Jeffries chose to leave active duty service and went home to Cleveland. However, it was not the end of his Marine Corps career. Jeffries joined 3rd Battalion, 25th Marines to serve as a reservist.

"I went through a lot to become a Marine," he said. "I wasn't going to turn my back on all that I had accomplished. Just because you are no longer serving on active duty doesn't mean your Marine Corps career is over. There are so many opportunities out there, you just have to want them."

Jeffries served as a reservist until October 1983. At that time he was selected for active reserve duty. He

served Inspector and Instructor duty in Cleveland, and then with I&I Detachment A, Marine Air Group 41, Andrews Air Force Base, Washington, D.C.

After I&I duty, Jeffries continued his active reserve service as a recruiter. He started recruiting duty in Washington D.C., in 1988 and served there until 1991. He then went to Alameda, Calif. as a recruiter from 1991 to 1994.

Jeffries arrived aboard Marine Corps Base Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay in September 1994. He is now serving as the Ready Reserve Liaison Chief.

"I am responsible for informing active Marines on reserve affairs," Jeffries explained. "They need to know that the reserve units are no longer the 'B' team. The reserve units have proven that they are more than capable of serving alongside their active counterparts."

Jeffries talked about how much he enjoys the job he has now. "After two tours of recruiting duty this job is a blessing," he said. "I believe that I am now at the forefront of the prior service recruiting mission. In essence I like being able to show Marines that 'Hey, there's something out there for you, and you are foolish if you pass it up.'"

In the reserve force Marines can continue to have contact with the Corps so they are up to date on what is going

on. Marines who continue in the reserve force are eligible for many benefits such as promotions, pay, and retirement.

"Two retirements are better than one," Jeffries said. "There is no reason that getting out of active duty service means throwing away retirement funds. But, if you take the uniform off for good that is what happens. In the reserves you get a new lease on Marine Corps life. It's there, take advantage of it."

Jeffries took every advantage and says that he wouldn't change one thing about the last 16 years.

"I met my wife, Lisa, while on active reserve duty in Washington D.C.," he said. "I have two wonderful sons, Andre Jr., 3 years-old, and David who is 8 months."

"The Marine Corps has been good to me. I want to make sure that other Marines understand about the opportunities available to them. They can come see me now, or they can see me later. But I will see them before they go."

Jeffries takes his job quite seriously and is always ready to help, and to listen.

"It's their career," he said. "They do have some control. If they have questions about reserve duty, or if they want to talk about what is going on in their current position in the Marine Corps, I'm here. Come see me."



Family housing residents frequently ask why the housing department places families in quarters that are designated for service members in higher pay grades.

To put it simply, the housing department has an obligation to keep quarters full.

"Any time a home is vacant while there's a waiting list, the government is paying basic allowance for quarters and variable housing allowance to a family that wants to be in quarters and could be in quarters. That

money adds up quickly," said Becky Ray, MCB Hawaii family housing director.

It has always been a housing department goal to keep 98 percent of family housing units occupied at all time, and until recently, vacated quarters were easily filled by families on appropriate waiting lists. But because of units reorganizing and the relocation of several fixed-wing squadrons MCB Hawaii Kaneohe Bay housing waiting lists have substantially shrunk.

In March 1993 there were 766 fam-

ilies waiting to move into quarters at MCB Hawaii Kaneohe Bay. Now, only about 60 families are waiting for on-base housing.

"When housing lists get that low, there will sometimes be a lot of families on one list and no families on another," said Melissa Cutter, assistant family housing director. "Because the cost of living is so high in Hawaii, we try to get families into housing as soon as we can. We don't want to let quarters sit vacant if there are families who could be living in them."

Family housing waiting lists are

established according to rank and number of bedrooms. When a family reaches the top of the waiting list, the family is offered the first available home in an appropriate housing area, based on bedroom requirement.

For example, a three-bedroom home becomes available in a housing area designated for sponsors with the rank of corporal or sergeant. The housing counselor first checks the waiting list for eligible families in those ranks. If there are no service members in the rank of corporal or sergeant waiting for housing, the counselor then checks the housing list for sponsors in the rank of pri-

vate to lance corporal, and offers the quarters to the first family on that list needing a three-bedroom home.

There are some limitations, however.

"We'd never place the family of an enlisted sponsor in housing designated for officers," said Amanda Cevallos, housing counselor. "And we wouldn't place a private in housing specifically designated for a sergeant major. But the important thing is that by having some flexibility, we are able to get a lot of families in base housing who might really be struggling to make it in local housing."

ment cycle without degrading readiness, he said.

"During 1994, there were 17 unscheduled deployments in response to contingency operations. These units deployed at the same readiness levels as those in the scheduled deployments cycle. In 1995, there have already been four unscheduled contingency deployments," he said.

This past year, the Corps was involved in rescuing Americans citizens from Rwanda, maintaining watch off Somalia, conducting migrant rescue and security operations in the Caribbean and ashore in Jamaica, Panama, Cuba and Haiti,

responding in the Northern Persian Gulf, projecting forces into amphibious withdrawal of U.N. forces from Somalia.

Adjusting to the changing international climate, with regard to preserving readiness, is a constant challenge when balancing the ability to provide ready forces today and recapitalizing and modernizing forces for tomorrow, he said. Since Marines and their resources have been used more intensively than forecasted, they must have greater resources devoted to their training and maintenance.

"Whether scheduled or unscheduled operations, America expects her Marines to be ready to respond immediately," LtGen. Blades said. "The price for this constant high state of readiness is that our first funding priority must be to maintain current operational readiness. Events like

Somalia, the Persian Gulf, Rwanda and Korea have underscored the wisdom of this priority.

"At the same time, the Corps must prepare for the future," he said.

The general stressed that the Corps is a force of economy, and highlighted FY96 funding requests. The funds requested by the President to maintain the Corps in FY96 is under 6 percent of the total defense funding request. In return, the Corps will provide 11 percent of the U.S. active force manpower, 20 percent of the active divisions, and 14 percent of tactical aviation.

"But more than any statistical portrayal, it will provide an unmatched national asset — Marines. Our most effective weapons system and greatest asset is that individual Marine," he said.

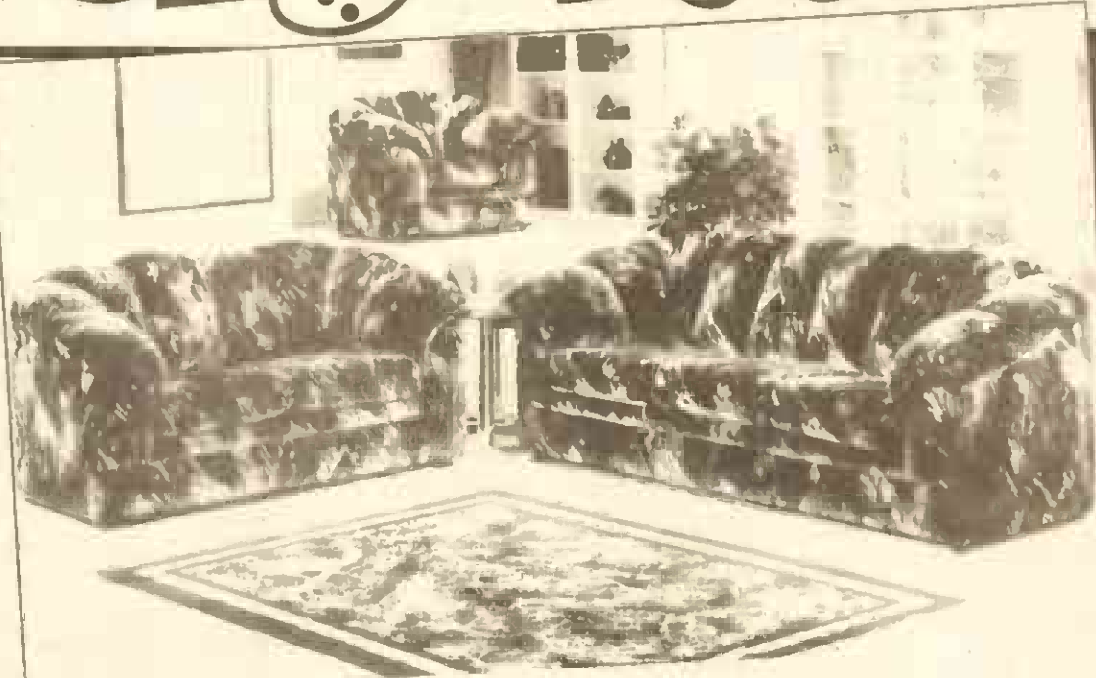

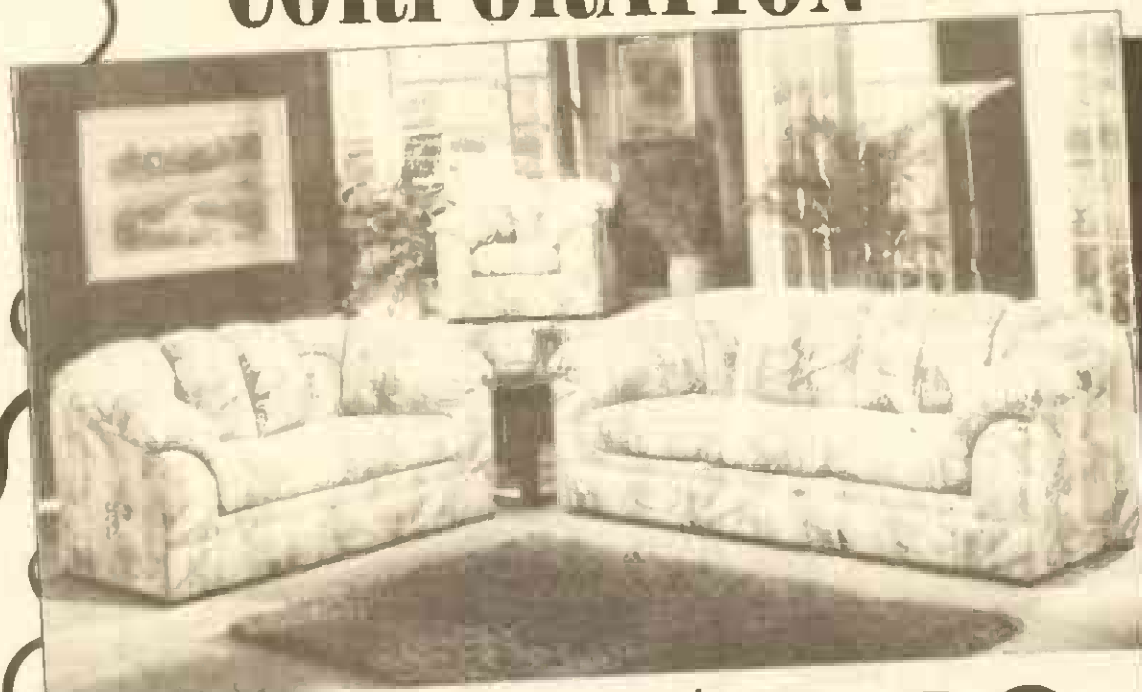

Two ways to explore the ocean depths

Snorkeling offers adventure in Hawaii's waters

When most people think of Hawaii, they picture beautiful sunsets, white sands and clear waters. What many may seldom think about is what is in those clear waters where the untouched beauty of Hawaii lies.

This beauty can be easily accessed by snorkeling or diving. By diving, the mysteries far beyond the surface of the ocean can be unveiled; however, it is more timely and costly than snorkeling. Diving requires hours of training and the purchase or rental of costly equipment. Snorkeling requires much less. A mask, snorkel and fins are all that's needed for a colorful day underwater.

With equipment in hand, Hawaii's beaches provide snorkelers the most beautiful sites to see.

One of the most frequented sites on Oahu is the remains of an ancient volcanic crater, Hanauma Bay, located off Kalaniana'ole Highway. Open to the sea at one side, it is a perfect spot for beginning snorkelers and experienced divers alike. An inner shallow reef offers a great opportunity for both swimming and snorkeling while an outer reef offers deeper, clearer waters for diving.

Hanauma Bay allows snorkelers to see Hawaii's most panoramic views. In the inner reef where beginning snorkelers are recommended to stay

by Doug Wallin, author of the book "The Hawaiian Islands, Diving and Snorkeling Guide," the water is almost always calm. The maximum depth of the inner reef is about 10 feet depending on the tide. The visibility runs from good to poor, depending on the daily water movement conditions and the amount of people kicking and stirring the sand.

Although there is little coral in Hanauma Bay, snorkelers can see the volcanic rock topography. What snorkelers may enjoy the most at

Hanauma Bay is the abundance of fish. Hanauma Bay is a protected marine park, so the fish are tame and will eat right out of your hand. Some of the fish you may expect to see are lemon butterfly fish, convicts, tangs and parrotfish. Occasionally in the deeper outer reef, you may even see a sea turtle. Remember, however, sea turtles are federally protected. Federal law prohibits swimmers from touching, holding or harassing them.

Other beautiful sights on Oahu are

Kahe Point, located on Farrington Highway 90, and Waimea Bay, located on the North Shore.

If you don't want to travel far, Hale Koa beach on MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, offers a beautiful underwater sight.

To make this a more enjoyable experience, the snorkeler should pay close attention when purchasing or renting equipment.

The mask should fit properly. To test it for the proper fit, you should place the mask on your face and pull the strap over your head. This can be easily done with one hand by sucking in just a little with the nose to create a vacuum that will hold the mask in place while you place the strap over your head.

Other items needed for snorkeling are a set of fins and a snorkel. Fins help the diver develop the thrust necessary to propel him through the water.

The snorkel should be adjusted by sliding back and forth on the strap, and up and down in the keeper, until it fits in the mouth naturally without having to be held there with tight jaws.

Classes and equipment purchasing or rental are available at the base Scuba Locker, building 107. For more information on snorkeling sites, classes, or equipment contact the Scuba Locker at 254-5709. You'll be on your way to a snorkeling escapade.

Snuba offers freedom of scuba and ease of snorkeling

On an aquatic voyage with snuba, you can experience the chilling exhilaration of swimming among dozens of colorful tropical fish, without the disruptive hinderance of having to surface merely to fulfill the body's basic need for oxygen.

Snuba is an innovative combination of the freedom of scuba diving with the ease of snorkeling. A person can venture as deep as 20 feet below the surface without the encumbrance of expensive and time consuming training, or the heavy awkward gear required for scuba diving.

Although there are other locations to experience Snuba, Hanauma Bay is an exceptional location to enjoy the separate world that exists beneath the water's surface. At the

bottom of the hill, and beneath the shade of a palm tree, one of the instructors gives a brief class and distributes the necessary equipment. Then the group heads to the shoreline where the Snuba rafts are lined in preparation for the aquatic journey. With one guide to every six divers, there is plenty of attention for all of the snuba-er's needs. The guides encourage the novice snuba divers to spend a few minutes in shallow water, so they can become familiar with the equipment.

Preparing to submerge with two snuba rafts and four snuba-ers trailing, snuba instructor Erick Luttrell commented, "We like to give them a few minutes to become accustomed to breathing through a regulator, that way the divers are more comfortable when we set off."

The snuba system is comprised of a 78-inch by 28-inch inflatable raft, a

compressed air tank and a 20-foot air line that connects the snuba-er. In addition, the potential explorer is equipped with a mask, fins, weight belt, and a lightweight harness that holds the regulator. The length of the air line limits the depth that the diver can explore, inherently safeguarding the snuba-er from a condition known as the bends.

Also known as decompression sickness, the bends is a painful and possibly lethal affliction that is created when a diver descends or ascends too rapidly, causing an accumulation of nitrogen in the blood. This can lead to muscle weakness, pains in the limbs, paralysis, or possibly death. With the proper equipment, a few brief minutes of instruction and the ready assistance of one of the snuba guides, the diver is ready to enjoy this memorable experience without the possibility of injury.

Once prepared for their dive, the

snuba-ers are led to their rafts that have been lined along the shore. The adventure continues with a tour through the living coral that comprises much of the ocean floor. Like an underwater city, the different breeds of fish bustle to and fro, often feeding, and occasionally seeking refuge within the coral's cavernous shape. An early morning tour can enable the diver to view an impressive inhabitant of the bay, the sea turtle.

"The turtles will swim right along with the group sometimes," explained Patt Harding, snuba instructor. "It's a very unique experience."

The Snuba adventure can be procured for the fee of \$50.00. If transportation is desired, pick up can be requested for anywhere in the Waikiki area for an additional \$10.00. For reservations or further information, Snuba of Oahu can be contacted at (808) 922-7762.



From the first Olympic Games to the present time, wrestling has evolved quite substantially, but today's freestyle wrestling is still a very fun and competitive sport that is open for all ages.

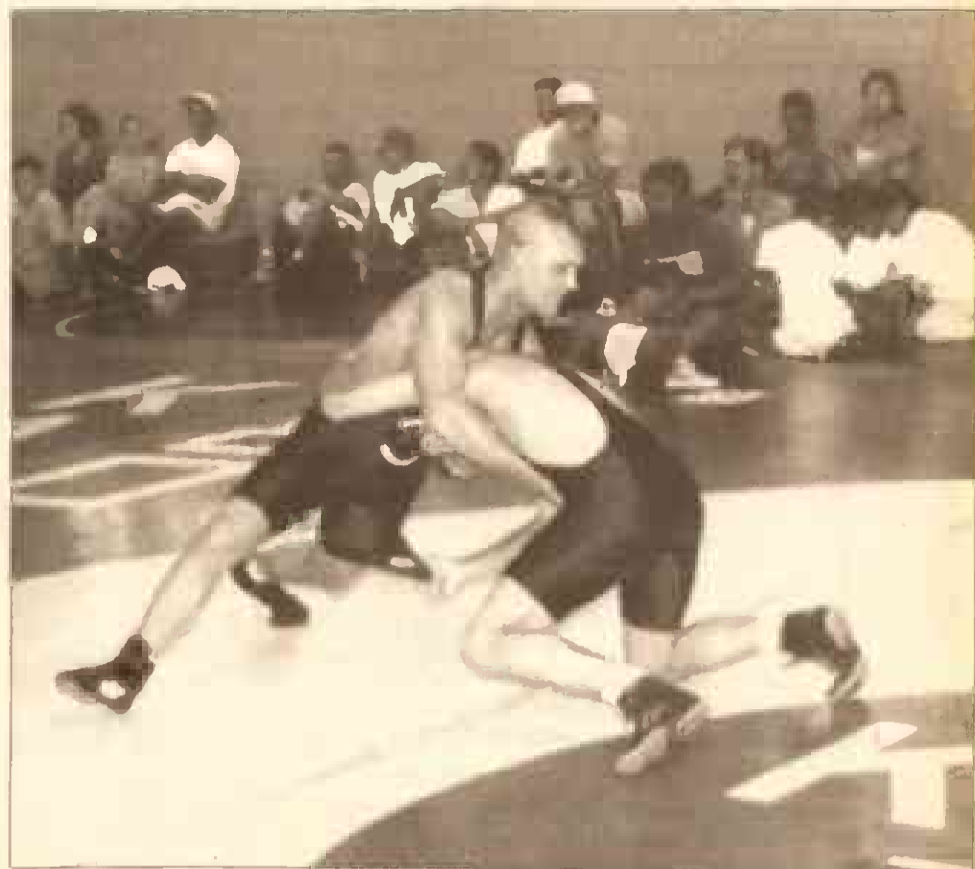

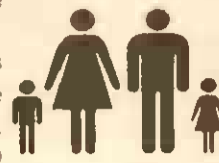

was then that they learned how to relate to others and how to get their love and approval. It was then that they absorbed their parents' patterns of behavior and formed their values. These lessons became the foundation of their adult lives. If your foundation was faulty the present structure of your life may be weak. You may be prone to recreating the patterns from your past and reliving the wounds you experienced as a child.

The Family Service Center can help you rebuild your faulty foundation through its

"Healing the Inner Child" group. This group offers a formula for returning to your childhood and repairing the wounds that left you weak and vulnerable. Participants are lead through a process of healing those wounded feelings by learning to personify and getting to know these feelings as the children within. The group can show you appropriate ways to deal with your feelings toward your parents and children. It will teach you the tools you need to confront and grieve your past so you can change how you relate to your present.

It can help you cope more effectively, teach you to have feelings without acting them out, enable you to release others from being responsible for your feelings, and teach you the skills you need to act from choice. The group won't teach you how to feel good; it will teach you to feel.
