CDC will be open for b-day ball child care

Child care during all Hawaii Marine Corps birthday balls is available with certified base child care providers.

A special birthday ball list of family child care providers is available at the Early Childhood Education office or over the phone. Providers determine their own fees, which range from \$2 to \$3 per hour.

The Child Development Center will be open Nov. 10. Reservations for the center must be made in person and require a \$10 deposit per family, which will be credited to the hourly child care fees.

The CDC is located next to the Exchange and is open from 6:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday for reservations. Deposits are not refundable after Wednesday. The center will be open Nov. 10 from 6:15 p.m. to 1 a.m. and charge \$2.80 per hour for the first child and \$2.60 per hour for each additional child in the same family.

Units with birthday balls on dates other than Nov. 10 can make special arrangements to use the CDC if they have 20 or more children who need child care. Call the Supplemental 15 to comply with a new Programs and Services coordinator at DoD directive. 257-7430 at least one week prior to your

Meal prices increase at chow hall

Prices for meals went up at Anderson Hall here Oct.

The increase was not only intended for Hawaii, but according to the DoD-wide directive was due to rising food prices and dining hall

services costs, said MSgt. Steward. David Steward, mess hall manager.

"We have to change with the times," he said. "With rising inflation and higher costs, we have to raise prices sometimes."

The 14 percent increase brought the per-day DoD allowance for chow up from seven to eight dollars, said

BAC focuses on Tricare issues

The advantages of Tricare headlined Tuesday's Base Action Committee meeting, held at the Pacific Hideaway

Representatives from Branch Medical Clinic here, Naval Medical Clinic Pearl Harbor and Queens Health Care Center were on hand to field any questions about Tricare programs and services.

"Our whole effort is to show the definite plus Tricare provides over the old ways of health care," said Gertie Francoise, director of marketing and education at the Tricare Pacific Support Office.

Tricare Prime offers advantages such as priority for appointments over those not enrolled in Prime and higher quality of health care, said Francoise.

Other advantages of Tricare are the conservation of resources and improved time management for health care providers.

"Tricare is still new and many people don't understand it," she said. "It's much like a new appliance. It has many buttons and devices, but unless you know how to use it, it doesn't work for you. That's why were trying to educate everyone about the program and trying to get every family enrolled."

Other topics of discussion included an update on the progress of base construction from Col. Bill Peoples, deputy base commander.

"The volume of construction hasn't peaked yet," he said. "The construction here will increase, it will be very inconvenient at times and we must be very careful when traveling on base."

Construction on base consists of 237 new housing units at Kansas Tower, 54 replacement housing units on Cochran Street and improvements to the base gym, said Peoples.

Issues concerning the new quarters cleaning initiative were also discussed, and due to the number of questions and comments about the program, BAC is scheduling a date for a forum covering the ins and outs of the new initiative, said Peoples.

The chief instructor of Squad Leaders School will be honored as Oahu's Marine Volunteer of the Year during a ceremony at Aloha Stadium Saturday.

Staff Sgt. Martin Trujillo will receive his award for countless hours of devoted volunteer work at Armed Forces Appreciation Night during the University of Hawaii vs. Air Force football game.

"It came as a shock when I was told I'd be getting the award," Trujillo said. "I put a lot of time and effort into volunteer work, but it's not recognition I was looking for."

Trujillo's volunteer efforts in 1996, included work for Meals on Wheels, Toys for Tots, American Red Cross, and other jobs for those in need of service.

"The spare time is there, and someone always needs help," said the 30-year old Northglenn, Colorado native. "People really appreciate you when you give up your time to help them out, and you never know what you might find out there."

Benefits of volunteering include new friends, a higher sense of community awareness and a sense of accomplishment, Trujillo said. Not only does Trujillo volunteer, but he finds other Marines to go with him.

"It gets them out of the barracks and into the community, meeting local people, instead of spending their time and money on stupid things," said Trujillo. "A lot of the guys find they like it, because they make new friends, get homecooked meals and occasionally find a girlfriend."

Trujillo's hard work and dedication have lifted the Marine Corps' image here and strengthed the local public's opinion of Marines.

"We really appreciate all the work he does," said Liz Delima, American Heart Association. 'He and the other Marines are very dependable and they work hard - I've told just about everyone I know how great they are."

"The comments I've gotten back are our Marines have a strong sense of community and people really love to have them come out," said Chuck Little, community relations officer. "They know Trujillo and the other Marines are hard workers and will stay until the job is



Training means cohesion

SINGAPORE — Setting foot for the first time onto foreign soil since leaving San Diego, Calif. Aug. 28, Marines of the 13th Marine Expeditionary Unit (Special Operations Capable) were ready to tackle the hot and environment humid Singapore's training areas.

More than 180 Marines of Weapons Company, Assault Amphibious Vehicle Platoon and A Battery, Battalion Landing Team 1/1, 13th MEU(SOC), took advantage of the first opportunity to train since being in Hawaii in September, boarding buses in the fog-laden morning of Oct. 2 for a 45-minute ride to the Safti Military Operations in Urban Terrain facility here.

"Much of the training in Singapore was not inherent to our heavy weapons units," said Maj. Chris I. Woodbridge, commanding officer, Weapons Co. "Therefore, the best alternative to leaving them on ship was to take them out to the MOUT facility to hone their urban skills."

With the exception of AAV Platoon and A Battery, this was the first time for Weapons Co. to gather in its entirety since the pre-deployment workups.

"Every element of Weapons Co. is always attached to other companies," said SSgt. Troy Harges, section leader, TOW Platoon. "So, this training gave us a chance to consolidate and teach the company, as a whole, the fundamentals of MOUT."

With four stations set up, platoons were sent on a round-robin routine. The Marines, rotating from station to station, would get their fill this day with MOUT fundamentals, urban patrolling, room clearing and riot control/non-lethal training.

For many of the Marines, this

was a new experience.

"We have only five Marines in my platoon from the last float," said Cpl. Gregory J. Hoover, section leader, Dragon Platoon. "Whenever my new Marines get some hands-on training like this, they not only learn a lot, but really enjoy what they are doing."

When the classes and practical application came to an end, Marines broke for chow. What came next was motivational stress release in the form of "force-on-force" training. The exercise incorporated Humanitarian Assistance Operation scenario where the HAO force would be faced with a hostile urban environment.

While A Battery and AAV Platoon prepared to render assistance to refugees within the town, Combined Anti-Armor Team, Dragons and 81mm mortar platoons teamed up as the refugees. Playing the part of an angry mob begging for food and water, the Weapons Co. Marines rushed the HAO force, but to no avail. With lessons learned, the

teams switched and continued the scenario.

Past experience sometimes dictates the way Marines look at training.

"As in Somalia, an artillery battery may not likely see themselves in a MOUT environment," said 1stLt. John Cowart, platoon commander, A Battery. "The very first Marine killed in Somalia was an artilleryman during urban patrolling."

While some of the Marines thought of the value of the training, others could not escape the unrepentant heat and humidity of Singapore.

It had been a long time since these Marines trained in this kind of humidity. In California, the Marines were exposed to a mostly arid environment, according to Harges.

"The Singapore training not only helped acclimatize us somewhat for this region of the world, but also gave us a little of what to look forward to when we float toward the Persian Gulf," said Harges.





Impact Area

An appeal to professionalism

t seems to me our commandant and the sergeant major of the Marine Corps have to spend an inordinate amount of time and energy trying to persuade us to adhere to and/or enforce orders and regulations.

All-Marine bulletin 127/97 announced a revision to the Marine Corps Uniform Regulations, specifying, "When wearing civilian headgear it will be removed when indoors..." Yet we still have Marine leaders, commissioned and enlisted alike, who not only decline to enforce the regulation, but decline to adhere to it as well.

Marine Corps Order P1400.32, Marine Corps Promotion Manual Volume 2, Enlisted Promotions specified "Photographs of all Marines (USMC and USMCR) who are eligible for promotion consideration (sergeant through first sergeant) must be taken and submitted during each year of eligibility to the CMC... within six months of the convening date of the respective promotion board.' Yet we are constantly reminded each year there are hundreds of Marines who fail to submit pic-

Marine Corps Order P1553.4, Professional Military Education, specifies, "Sergeants will attend the resident Sergeants Course within 24 months after promotion to sergeant." "Staff sergeants will attend a resident Career Course." "Gunnery Sergeants will attend a resident SNCO

Advanced Course within 24 months after promotion to gunnery sergeant." Yet resident courses at SNCO academies remain at approximately 70 percent class attendance rate.

I can't even begin to count the times I have felt compelled to remind us of: Marine Corps policies regarding the wear of utility uniforms off base;

attendance of and wearing of uniforms by all Marines attending birthday balls; web belts being the only appropriate uniform belt when wearing utilities; civilian backpacks not being authorized for wear with uniforms; and more.

Why does it take the senior officer and the senior enlisted Marine of our Corps to remind us of our obligations?

Why do senior Marines seem to spend boundless energy researching orders with the agenda of finding "verbal loopholes" which justify their non-compliance regarding adherence and/or enforcement of the same?

Marine leaders are duty bound to implement and enforce those policies established by higher authority. No entitlement exists to question the validity or relevance of such policies unless they are suspected to be morally or ethically inappropriate.

Marine promotions are based on special trust and confidence in our fidelities and abilities. As fidelity is defined as faithfulness

to duties, obligations and observances, let's demonstrate that the special trust and confidence remains well-founded.

I would like to offer a quote attributed to Plato, which I learned from a retired Marine who is still devoted to positively influencing his fellow Marines: "To provide security there must

They cannot allow the usual or petty distractions of society to compromise decisiveness or dedication. Their standards of bravery and conduct must be unquestionable. Last, they should be recruited at the height of their vigor and then maintained through gratitude and appreciation.

Just a sergeant and below

fter spending three years on independent duty, I was elated to rejoin the fleet here where I would no longer be stuck at the bottom of the totem pole as a sergeant.

For most sergeants on independent duty, when something needed to be done which sergeants would normally supervise or delegate, they had to do it themselves. After three years of getting orders and turning around to see there was no one there but me, I was ready to get back to the place where a sergeant is a sergeant, or that's at least what I believed.

However, for the year I've been here, I've noticed somewhere during the three years while I was away from the fleet, the rank of sergeant underwent a metamorphosis into a brand new rank sergeant and below. This was a great shock.

One of the first places I noticed this was at the range. For some reason it has been determined

that staff NCOs and officers are responsible enough to carry their weapons in privately owned vehicles while sergeants and below are relegated to the bus. This makes no sense. Although I under-

stand the difference in rank, I don't see how anyone can rationalize that a second lieutenant with two years in the Corps is somehow more responsible than a sergeant with eight. If we can't trust a sergeant to check out his weapon, put it in his POV and go to the range, then what can we trust him to do? Although it may not seem like a big deal. when sergeants are continually told, directly or indirectly, they are sergeants and below, that's exactly what they'll

become, just like the

old saying.

Also at the range, sergeants and below have to march in a formation from place to place. As a Marine, I don't have any problem with it. However, when the staff NCOs and officers just go from point to point in no formation, I have to wonder what's going on? Are they no longer Marines? Or, have they put in their. time, so they don't have to do those irritating little things like marching - that the sergeants and below have to do?

Another area that disturbs me is at my unit's weekly formation run. While the sergeants and below form up for PT like Marines are supposed to, everyone else just stands around behind the formation. Somehow it seems as you put on rank you can stop doing Marine things.

Although I don't expect things to change because of my opinion, I do vow that as I move on in rank, I'll do my best to help the rank of sergeant recover to the point where it was before the sergeant and below syndrome took hold.







POHAKULOA TRAINING AREA, Hawaii - Marines from 1st Battalion, 3d Marine Regiment and A Battery, 1st Battalion, 12th Marine Regiment finished preparation at Pohakuloa Training Area for an upcoming deployment and returned here last week.

Main bodies of the units along with Marines and Sailors from Combat Service Support Group and B Battery and Headquarters Battery, 1/12, began arriving to Pohakuloa Training Area Sept. 22 with Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron 366. It was 1/3's and B Battery's last chance to tweak live-fire and maneuver skills before heading to Okinawa, Japan, in January.

Big guns of B Battery began battery training Sept. 24 while companies of 1/3 started individual training schedules Sept.

The battery underwent a Combat Marine Corps Readiness Evaluation Oct. 9-11 before all of the units conducted a field exercise Oct. 15-17. Bay Oct. 24-27.

Third Battalion, 3d Marine Regiment as an aggressor force.

'Power and control' wheel demonstrates methods of abuse

The Family Advocacy Program has a big tool in its bag when it come to dealing with domestic abusers the "power and control wheel."

Developed by the Domestic Violence Intervention Program in Duluth, Minn., the

Marine Corps has adapted the wheel for use in its own ranks.

"Violence is just one arrow in an abuser's quiver he can use against his spouse," said Glen Corlin, social worker, FAP. "The power and control wheel shows other things he or she

The "wheel" is a circle segmented like a pie chart, with different sections detailing specific methods of power and control, said Corlin.

"Using intimidation, isolation, emotional and economic abuse are several ways an abusive spouse uses

to control the other," said Corlin.

Social workers are faced with the difficult task of breaking the "control" mindset of abusive spouses, instead instilling in them a non-violent attitude toward their marriage.

"We try to teach them a relationship should be based on equality with shared responsibilities," Corlin added. "It's incredibly hard because of society's concept of someone always being in control. It's tough, but we

The counter for the power and control wheel, the "equality wheel," was also developed by DVIP. With elements like negotiation and fairness, respect and non-threatening behaviors, the wheel gives alternatives to the power and control wheel and allows couples to live equal and fair marriages.

"Every element of the equality wheel correlates with an element of the power and control wheel," Corlin said. "We try to get the abusers to use the equality wheel in their relationships instead of power and con-

1/3 Mortars Platoon put to test

POHAKULOA TRAINING AREA, Hawaii -Marines were scrambling with precision as 81mm Mortars Platoon, Weapons Company, 1st Battalion, 3d Marine Regiment, underwent a standard procedures test here, Oct. 15.

The SPT was part of 1/3's Marine Corps Combat Readiness Evaluation in preparation for a sevenmonth deployment to Okinawa, Japan, according to Cpl. Matthew J. Huggins, forward observer.

"The gun line was graded on how fast they mounted their mortars," said Huggins. "They can usually get it done in about 90 seconds.

"They were graded on how fast they come up for fire direction," he continued. "They also had to carry out target location and smoke and illumination missions."

"This training was very important for us," said PFC Daniel T. Taylor, forward observer. "It was very realistic and having the time element in play is a challenge."

The SPT not only showed the Marines what readiness level they have reached, it also pointed out weaknesses they could work on before and during deployment, according to Huggins.

With the Food For Families program, the Armed Services YMCA here is providing food goods for needy families at a reduced price. Eligibility requirements are families who are on the Women, Infants and Children program, food stamps and in special situations of financial hardship.

"The program assists families by supplementing food until they can get back on their feet," said Deedee A. Ryan, FFF voluntary coordinator, ASYMCA. "We currently have five groups of eight families, for a total of 40 families on the program. This allows these families to receive supplemental food every fifth week.

"Each fifth week two designated shoppers will go to the Hawaii Food Bank and buy food at discount," added Ryan. "All the food is brought to the ASYMCA office in Building 216 and divided among the families. The savings to these families is substantial." Food items, except meat, can be purchased at the food bank for 19 cents a pound and some items are

"An emergency situation would be like one individual who had four children, deployed to the Pohakuloa Training Area and the family's van breaks down while he is away," said Ryan. "We pulled out the stores of food in our pantry and helped this family until our next shopping trip. Members in the program sometimes even open their own cupboards to help when someone is more needy.

"The Marine Corps is like a big family and this is what it's all about - taking care of our own," added Ryan. "The program is so awesome, there is some inquiry about getting it started on other Marine Corps bases, but nothing firm has been established."





Family Advocacy answers questions

Frequently, people call the Family Advocacy Program and the Case Review Committee with questions such as these:

What is the FAP?

The FAP is the DoD's response to the growing number of allegations of domestic violence (spouse or child abuse and neglect). The Marine Corps has its own FAP adminis-

tered through the Family Service Center.

How does the FAP work?

When allegations of domestic violence are received (from blotters, medical personnel, teachers, etc.) several things will occur. Usually, MPs, Criminal Investigative Division or Naval

Criminal

Investigative Service will begin a legal investigation to determine if a crime has occurred, as domestic violence is considered to be an assault, which is a

When the legal investigation is done, the FAP will then assess the situation with that family, and determine a treatment to help them deal with domestic problems without violence. After the assessment is completed the allegation is brought to the CRC for determination as to whether or not the incident was abusive, and what treatment would be appropriate. The recommendations are then given to the command.

What is the CRC?

The CRC determines the status of allegations of domestic violence and makes recommendations to commands based

upon these determinations. Allegations can be either substantiated (which means the evidence supports the allegation that abuse occurred) or unsubstantiated (the evidence does not support the allegation of abuse).

The CRC consists of seven voting members. These members are representatives of agencies here which deal with domestic violence; Provost Marshal's Office, CID, NCIS, staff judge

> advocate, base Inspector, substance abuse control counselor, Branch Medical and the FAP manager. A representative from the service member's command will also be present, as will the case manager, victim advocate and other people as needed to present all sides of the

Not necessarily. The CRC will pass on its status and treatment recommendations to the command. The command will determine if it agrees with those recommendations or not. The command may also order the servicemember to attend treatment.



"Imagine you are approaching a traffic light," said Sgt. Robert White, base safety office. "As you get near the light it turns yellow. You ask yourself, 'Should I stop or keep going?' This is risk management. If you feel the risk outweighs the benefit of running the light, you will stop. Operational risk management is based on whether the benefit outweighs the risk."

If lives and equipment such as tactical vehicles and weapons are lost through taking risks, it decreases a unit's combat readiness, said White. The classes teach leaders to effectively handle these situa-

"Some leaders already effectively handle situations and some don't," said Smith.

"We want to pass the word to every Marine in "Some are simply better at it than others. The goal of the course is to bring all leaders to a higher level of risk management skills."

ONA, Hawaii — They didn't tackle the rough waters or grueling hills at the Ironman
Triathlon World Championship here Saturday, but MCB Hawaii Marines still sweated to make life easier for those who did.

By volunteering their services to put together changing racks, medical tents, road blocks and anything else the Ironman staff needed, four Marines from Combat Service Support Detachment 78, which was to Pohakuloa Training Area, and one from 3d Marine Regiment, inadvertently helped some the world's best athletes, according to the Marines.

"The athletes don't need to worry about little things like where their gear is," said John M. Juarez, regimental ammunition chief, Headquarters Company, 3d Marine Regiment. "With us setting up all this equipment so all their gear is organized before hand, all they have to worry about is the race. Little things like that mean a lot."

"We're athletes too," said William H. Nash, utilities maintenance chief, Landing Support Company, CSSD-78. "We understand what it's like to host an athletic event and what goes into supporting it. And, it's good public relations for the Marine Corps."

The Marines put in approximately 36 hours between Friday and Sunday, including a schedule working 5 a.m. to midnight Saturday.

"It makes me feel good to volunteer my labor to support these kind of things," said Fernando J.D. Russell, bulk fuel specialist, CSSD-78. "We like to help out civilians like this because that's who we work for anyway."

Hawaii Marines are constantly volunteering their services on Oahu as well. The Marines here said the Ironman support is just an extension of the helping hand they provide at home.



ONA, Hawaii —
Several Marines
and Sailors joined
more than 1,500 of
the world's fittest
triathletes to take

on one of the world's toughest annual challenges here — the Ironman Triathlon World Championship.

Covering more than 140 miles in Marine style, from sea to land, the Marine Corps and Navy teams battled scorching heat and strong head winds for more than 10 hours. Despite considerable fatigue, the devil dogs and Sailors put forth their shining colors for the whole world to see.

"It's like a journey through life," said Douglas W. Marocco, a 33-year-old Iwakuni, Japan, Marine who came in sixth in the military division at 10 hours and 26 min-

utes. "Everyone starts out fresh like babies. Then, as you get into the race you grow older as the day goes on."

But despite reaching a point where they nearly needed canes to walk, the military triathletes finished well. The first member of the Navy and Marine teams to finish was David Savatgy, from Martinez, Calif., who came in at 10:15. He

finished fourth in military overall.

Tony Guerra, a lieutenant from
Kaneohe, Hawaii, finished eleventh
in the military division with a time
of 11:03. Donald C. White, of San
Diego, Calif., followed at 11:32.

"I ran this one for the same reason I run all of them - my family," said White, after running his sixth Kona Ironman. "It was the anniversary of the day I met my wife. I wanted it to be a good time."

Other Navy competitors were Steven M. Foster from Ewa Beach, Hawaii, and Maria K. Galbraith, from Virginia Beach, Va. Other Marines included Ronald D. Giger, out of Panama City, Fla., Douglas W. Gardner, from Lubbock, Tex., and Karl E. Williams, of Gilbert, Arizona.

For many of the finishers, the title "Ironman" will be hung on their belts for the rest of their lives. But for Ironmen like Marocco, now it's time to start the work-up process all over again. Typical, he'll swim 15,000 meters a week, bike 300 to 400 miles per week and run approximately 70 miles.

"I have to say for the record, I'm never coming back," Marocco said with a large, gleaming smile. "We work really hard for this and when we finally finish, all we get is a bag of... stuff."

But that's exactly what he said following last year's race. It may be what many of the military competitors are thinking after exhausting their physical abilities. However, determined, unstoppable triathletes like Marocco will return to the island for another experience.



Marines continue PT regimen at PTA

OHAKULOA TRAINING AREA, Hawaii - At more than 7,000 feet above sea level, physical training here gets a little tough for Marines who are used to exercising down at sea level on Oahu.

But because of these heights, leathernecks who make sure they continue a good physical training regimen between busy training schedules will definitely prosper when their next physical fitness tests roll around at MCB Hawaii, according to Marines here.

"This is good training because of the altitude," said LCpl. Gustavo C. Ibarra, bulk fuel specialist, Landing Support Company, Combat Service Support Group 3. "It's a little more difficult run, but if you are persistent and keep a good PT program, you will have a much better run time when you return to base."

"There are a lot of good hills to run on out here," said LCpl. Jeffrey C. Jaeckle, infantryman, B Company, 1st Battalion, 3d Marine Regiment. "I make sure I run about six miles at

least once a day."

The base camp here has a 1.1mile trail with three "Fit Trail" stations. The stations are designed to support various upper and lower body muscle workouts to go with a good run around the camp. They include chin up and dip bars, a sit up bench, a push up station and several other training aids complete with instructions on how to conduct the exercises.

Another thing Marines need to watch is their food intake, said

"Basically, I try to stay away from Meals Ready to Eat as much as possible," he said. "They have a lot of fat. Each one has 3,000 calories. If I do get an MRE, I don't eat the whole meal at one time."

"If you're in the field eating MREs and not working it off later, you can gain a lot of weight," said Jaeckle. "And a lot of Marines are buying pogey bait at the exchange here."

"No one out here is training so hard that they can't get a good PT session at least once a week," said Sgt. Matthew R. Bement, hygiene equipment operator, LSC. "If you run when training permits and watch what you eat, you'll leave here much stronger and healthier than when you arrived."

The training at PTA is focused on sharpening combat skills for Marines before they deploy to Okinawa, Japan in January. But according to many Marines in training here, it's also a great place to boost PFT scores and physical combat readiness.



Free class offers key to hunting in paradise

Hunter Safety course given in Kaneohe; may soon be offered at MCB Hawaii

ANEOHE, Oahu — A free Hunter Education Course, a requirement to get a hunting license here, is offered by the Hawaii Department of Land and Natural Resources at the Kaneohe Community Center.

The course teaches future hunters everything from safety rules and bow hunting to conservation laws and field dressing an animal, said Charles A. Phelps, course instructor.

"The course makes our hunters more aware of safety rules and wildlife conservation," said Phelps. "The course is a requirement to get a hunting license. We want to make sure our hunters are on the right track."

The 12-and-a-half hour course covers a wide variety of topics, said Phelps. It's not only designed for hunting in Hawaii. The knowledge acquired from the course can be applied anywhere.

"The course can make you more well-rounded as a hunter," said Phelps. "It's also a plus because in many states a class like this isn't free. It could cost over \$100 and the classes aren't even as comprehensive as this one."

Marine SNCOs bring leadership to Annapolis

NNAPOLIS, Md. - Senior enlisted Marines and Sailors from all over the world participated in midshipmen programs here this Summer at the U.S. Naval Academy - Naval Academy Summer Programs, Naval Tactical Training and Plebe Summer.

"Team members learn to finish together," said Bair. "They learn to work together, talk together and communicate."

"The best improvement at the academy since I graduated," said Navy Cmdr. Ron Brinkley, officer in charge, Plebe Summer, "has been the presence of the senior enlisted. Their perspective definitely serves as an
