

Fire Safety Tip

With the Fall season almost here, now maybe the time to have your home's chimney and fireplace cleaned and inspected, if you have not done so. NFPA requires chimneys, fireplaces, and vents to be inspected at least once a year. Cleaning, maintenance, and repairs shall be done if necessary. Even if you don't use your chimney often, animals may build nests in the flue or there may be other types of deterioration that could make the chimney unsafe to use. A faulty fireplace, faulty chimney, nests, and/or excess creosote build-up can cause a structure fire, which can cause death, injury, or property damage. Protect your family, have your fireplace and chimney inspected today by a certified chimney sweep.

NSGL and tenants honor ombudsmen

Naval Station Great Lakes and its tenant commands honored ombudsmen during the 2017 Ombudsmen Appreciation Dinner Sept 8.

An ombudsman is a volunteer appointed by the commanding officer who acts as a link between command leadership and Navy families. They pass information up and down the chain of command, including official Department of the Navy and command information, command climate issues, and local quality of life improvement opportunities.

"Things happen, life happens, fires, floods, deaths, family emergencies and new Sailors who just don't know where to go," said Naval Station Great Lakes Commanding Officer Capt. James Hawkins. "We have ombudsmen for that very reason, and I want to say thank you to them because of all that they do."

Ombudsman also provide resource referrals when needed and handle family issues before they require extensive command attention.

The command ombudsman program differs by the commanding officer's perceived needs of his/her command. Each command ombudsman is appointed by and works directly with the commanding officer to determine the priorities of the program, the people involved in it, and the type and level of support it will receive.

"Two months ago we had some floods here on base, and we had our ombudsmen to be there to answer the call and take care of the families here," said Hawkins. "The Navy will always need our ombudsmen, whether it is a sea command or a shore command. We want to thank them for all the work they do to help our sailors and fami-

Sailors help Waukegan remember Sept. 11

Waukegan city leaders, active and veteran service members, and Naval Station Great Lakes (NSGL) command representatives came together for a 9/11 remembrance event at Haig Paravonian Park in Waukegan Sept. 11.

The Exchange Club of Waukegan hosted the event, which included several speeches from Waukegan city officials including Mayor Sam Cunningham and Exchange Club of Waukegan President Lety Castellanos. Also at the event, and keynote speaker, was NSGL Command Master Chief Samuel Robinson, who touched on the events during that tragic day, and how the country came together.

"Sixteen years ago, on a day very much like today, terrorists attacked the symbols of American strength," said Robinson. "Our commerce, our military might, and our democracy. We can never forget the planes flying into the World Trade Center or the smoke rising from the Pentagon. We can never forget the courage and compassion of men and women racing into burning buildings to save the innocent... or those heroes who died in a Pennsylvania field. The spirit of selflessness, the spirit of determination and courage is

Kamikaze survivors attend Navy recruit graduation

Three World War II kamikaze survivors attended Navy recruit graduation and toured Naval Station Great Lakes (NSGL) as part of a ship reunion visit

Genero Salana, Otto Husak, and Paul Gowen were all Sailors aboard the USS Zellars during the invasion of Okinawa, when Zellars came under attack and was struck by a Japanese kamikaze near the end of World War II. The three Sailors were part of a larger visit of two reunion groups, the USS Hermitage and Zellars, who were visiting Recruit Training Command and NSGL to remember where their Navy roots started.

"The graduation today was wonderful," said Gowen. "I can see that the Navy is alive and well, and I was very pleased to see that."

Salana, Husak, and Gowen were

only 17 when they enlisted in the Navy and were a part of the original crew of Zellars, making them among the last of the Zellars plank owners still alive today. All three vividly remember their short but life-changing time aboard Zellars, where they fought off Japanese kamikazes during a critical point in

"We were with a bombardment group filled with cruisers and battleships sending a pounding onto Okinawa," said Gowen. "We got there 10 days before the invasion, and from there on, things got pretty heavy. Towards the end of the war, the Japenese were getting desperate and sending down kamikazes everyday. On April 12, we were attacked by four kamikazes. I was a gunner's mate, and my gun mount got one of them, otherwise I would not be talking to you."

While both Husak and Gowen were

on gun mounts, Salana recalls being on

Army Reservists and the local community members participated in the second annual 9/11 Remembrance 5K run through the Phillip J. Sheridan Reserve Center and the surrounding Highwood, Illinois area Monday.

Victim from USS John S. McCain accident laid to rest

On Monday, Sept. 11, 2017, Petty Officer Second Class Logan Palmer,23, was laid to rest in Harristown, Illinois. Palmer died Aug. 21 while serving aboard the USS John S. McCain (DDG 56) when the ship collided with an oil tanker in the South China Sea.

Hundreds of people from the surrounding area who knew Palmer and the family attended the funeral at LIFE Foursquare Church in Decatur, Illinois.

Lead Pastor Mark Cooper, who knew Palmer, told mourners "Palmer gave his in 2011. life in service to his country. You have given a son, a brother, a grandson, a friend, to a grateful nation. That nation and its citizens owe you and Logan a debt of gratitude."

Palmer was born Feb. 16, 1994, in Decatur, son of Sidney L. and Theresa (Karcher) Palmer. He attended Northwest Christian School where he was baptized.

He later attended Harristown schools and was an honor roll student at Sangamon Valley High School, graduating in the class 2012.

He then attended Richland Community College, graduating with high honors in 2014. Logan enlisted in the Navy in April 2016, completed basic training and received further training in U.S. Navy Class C School in San Diego, finishing third in his class. His first assignment was to the USS John S McCain (DDG-56).

Palmer was a member of Boy Scouts of America, Troop 43, where he achieved the Rank of Eagle Scout along with his brother Kaleb

Bacha earns Military Excellence Award at RTC

SR Kurtis Bacha, Division 287, graduated as the top Sailor from Recruit Training Command earning the Military Excellence Award on Sept. 15.

Bacha, of Ringgold, Georgia, said he joined the Navy to serve a country that has given him the freedom to serve his God openly, without fear of persecution, and to protect the nations of the world against tyranny and oppression. He was assigned the rate of Electronics Technician.

The Navy Club of the United States Military Excellence Award is the top award presented to the No. 1 recruit of their graduating training group. The MEA is awarded to the recruit that best exemplifies the qualities of enthusiasm, devotion to duty, military bearing and teamwork.

awarded a flag letter of commendation.

"I will always remember the moment when the Recruit Division Commander to whom I looked up to the most, Senior Chief Warren Caverly, told me that I would be given the privilege of receiving this award," Bacha said. "Pride began to swell in me, knowing that I had been able to represent my division and my RDCs with that kind of esteem."

Faith plays a major role in Bacha's life. Sharing that faith and trusting in others helped him in making his decision to become a Sailor.

"Before I came to RTC, I was a church intern at Silverdale Baptist Church in Chattanooga, Tennessee," Bacha said. "It seems like every day I allowed doubt into my mind about why I made the decision to join. Someone from that body of Christ would send me some kind of encouragement, push-

cle of today's newest Sailors. Bacha is ing me to do my very best at all times. That's why I'm here right now. It's because of the people that poured their lives into my own, giving themselves up so that I would be successful."

The encouragement he received from his mother, Ginger Bacha, during an early phone call home inspired confidence in his boot camp leadership role.

"Being the (Recruit Leading Petty Officer) of my division forced me to be 'squared away' at all times for the sake of my shipmates," Bacha said. "After all, what right would I have to expect anything from my fellow sailors if I, myself, were not meeting the same standards of excellence I was pushing them toward? It was always a challenge to maintain both responsibilities of recruit and leader, but that's part of why I joined the Navy. I love a good challenge."

After graduation, Bacha will at-

tend the ET rating course at Training Support Center, Great Lakes. During his schooling, he will learn perform, manage, and supervise preventive and corrective maintenance on electronic equipment; and maintain, repair, calibrate, tune, and adjust electronic equipment utilizing test equipment and technical drawings for Command, Control, Computer, Communication, and Intelligence (C4I) systems, cryptographic systems, radar systems, and navigation systems.

Boot camp is approximately eight weeks and all enlistees into the U.S. Navy begin their careers at the command. Training includes physical fitness, seamanship, firearms, firefighting and shipboard damage control along with lessons in Navy heritage and core values, teamwork and discipline. About 30,000 to 40,000 recruits graduate annually from RTC and begin their Navy careers.

CERT deploys to Key West after Hurricane Irma

JACKSONVILLE, Florida (NNS) Naval Facilities Engineering Command (NAVFAC) Southeast dispatched part of a 17 person Contingency Engineering Response Team (CERT) Sept. 12, to Naval Air Station (NAS) Key West from NAS Jacksonville. The rest of the team flew down Wednesday, Sept. 13, on a separate flight.

The first team arrived on schedule. They weree on a direct military flight from NAS Jacksonville to NAS Key

"We are headed to Kev West today to assess damage that has occurred at NAS Key West," said Lt. Cmdr. Sean Gorman CERT officer in charge and the incoming Public Works Office for NAS Key West. "We will be working first to set up an emergency operations center for the team and immediately deploying teams to assess critical facilities."

The CERT will evaluate facilities on base that received damage from Hurricane Irma as it passed through the Key West Sept. 10.

There will be three Disaster Assessment Teams (DATs) on the CERT which consist of structural, electrical and mechanical engineers, architects, roofing specialists, community planners and construction contract specialists that deploy to begin Rapid Damage Assessments.

"It is during this initial phase that damage is rapidly assessed to support restoration of basic functions such as

debris removal and reopening roadways, expedient roof repairs and resumption of sanitation, water, electricity and communications services," said NAVFAC Southeast Disaster Preparedness Officer Lt. Cmdr. Rvan Thrun.

First time DAT member Evan Echlin. NAVFAC Southeast GIS analyst stated, "Deploying with this team is a great opportunity. It is important that we ensure the team has the right maps for an operation like this because quick damage assessment is important. Every

time we do this, we can learn from the experience and make improvements."

Some of the standard products produced by the GIS team include storm surge maps, flood maps and facilities index maps so the teams will be able to see where every building on the base and what type of facility it is so they can go facility to facility to determine if there is anything of concern after the

Ensign Derick Schmitz, PWD Jacksonville Construction Manager and Civil Engineer Corps officer stated, ing any storm.

"After deploying with my first CERT team two weeks ago to Corpus Christi. I am ready to help some of the new members on our team going to Key West. I learned a lot from Hurricane Harvey that will help us in Key West."

Sending engineers out to help after natural disasters is not new to NAV-FAC.

"We provide continuous training to employees who are willing to volunteer to be on our CERTs so they are ready to go at a moment's notice," said Thrun.

Typically, these teams deploy to assess hurricane or other storm damage to military installations such as was the case most recently, two weeks ago, the team deployed to Kingsville and Corpus Christi, Texas for Hurricane Harvey, in February 2017 to assist the United States Marine Corps Logistics Base Albany, Georgia, when tornadoes devastated the base and October 2016 when teams deployed to the United States Navy's Atlantic Undersea Test and Evaluation Center (AUTEC), located on Andros Island in the Bahamas after Hurricane Matthew impacted the facilities there.

'We were fortunate here in Jacksonville after Hurricane Irma that our employees were able to deploy to help with Key West even though many of our employees in northeast Florida and southeast Georgia are still without power," said Thrun. "Safety is always first and it is important that our employees are able to tend to their family and their property immediately follow-

Finding a better way to forecast hurricane strength

ARLINGTON, Va. (NNS) -- As Hurricane Irma approaches U.S. shores, researchers sponsored by the Office of Naval Research (ONR) are using airdropped autonomous sensors to compile real-time ocean observations to help forecasters predict the strength of future tropical storms.

This marks the first time a new, specialized version of the sensors-called ALAMO (Air-Launched Autonomous Micro Observer) sensors-is being used in hurricane-prediction research. While standard computerized prediction models rely on atmospheric data like air temperature, humidity, altitude, and wind speed and direction, the ALAMO sensors use sophisticated instruments to gauge water temperature, salinity and pressure beneath the sea surface.

"Hurricanes like this have a devas-

our thoughts and prayers are with the affected communities," said Chief of Naval Research Rear Adm. David J. Hahn. "Often, there is an intersection of military and civilian needs. If we can improve the lead time and accuracy of storm forecasts, it would give national and local leadership more time and detailed information for preparations, evacuation or shelter-in-place

Fully developed tropical cyclones-called hurricanes or typhoons, depending on their region-can grow as wide as several hundred miles and sustain winds greater than 150 miles per hour. With historically high winds, Hurricane Irma is one of the strongest storms ever recorded in the Atlantic Ocean.

> In addition to the potential catastrophic damage to coastal communities, hurricanes also pose a severe threat to U.S. Navy fleet operations. Accurate forecasting is critical for protecting ships at sea, evacuating vulnerable bases, and performing humanitarian assistance and disaster relief.

> Earlier this week, the ONR-sponsored research team-composed of U.S. Naval Academy midshipmen and scientists from Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution-dropped ten ALAMO sensors from an Air Force C-130 "Hurricane Hunter" aircraft into Caribbean waters, ahead of the storm. The sensors are continuing to make observations and will also be used to track ocean dy-

Short, metal tubes crammed with sensors and scientific instruments, each ALAMO sensor sank nearly 1,000 feet underwater and then rose again. They've been tracking ocean temperature, salinity and pressure, and transmitting this data via satellite, for use by the Naval Research Laboratory to update the Navy's coupled ocean-atmosphere forecasting models.

"The ALAMO sensors will enable us to get an accurate picture of conditions in the water column-before, during and after a hurricane," said Capt. Elizabeth Sanabia, an oceanography professor at the Naval Academy, who is overseeing the research. "For the Navy, this improved forecasting will increase operational readiness and mitigate risk. For the nation, it will result in better response planning and potentially save

Emergency communications ... be ready!

In the event of an emergency, Naval Station Great Lakes provides real-time alerts to the Navy community throughout the life cycle of the incident or crisis through: Giant Voice, a voice announcing system using exterior speakers; Computer Desktop Network System (CDNS), an administrative broadcast across Navy computer networks that overrides current applications, reaching all Navy users almost instantly; AtHoc – dissemination via text message and email; Great Lakes Hotline: 847-688-2459; Facebook, www.facebook.com/NavalStationGreat-Lakes; and Twitter, @navstaglakes.

We will be testing our mass communications on the first Tuesday of each month - 9:45 a.m. for all messages and 10 a.m. for Giant Voice siren.

That will be the only time we'll be testing. All other times that you hear the Giant Voice system siren or voice, please take cover immediately.

We ask that you then check your cellphone for the AtHoc message, which will give you the information that you need. AtHoc messages will generally be sent three different ways: via text message, and personal and work emails. Messages provide official updates on base delays and early departures, as well as other notifications that may affect the base. Anyone, including government contractors, can sign up to receive messages.

Registering for AtHoc is easy using your NMCI computer. Click on the Purple Globe to register.

- 1. NMCI users: Right-click on the Purple Globe icon (bottom right corner on desktop).
- 2. Select "Access Self Service."
- 3. Select the "My Info" tab and update your last name, first name and display name, and save.
- 4. Select the "Devices" tab and enter your work and personal contact information in the appropriate mandatory and optional device fields. Fill in as many fields as possible. Many times, text messages to personal cellphones and personal email addresses are the guickest to receive notifications. (Note: Your ability to receive alerts on home phones, cellphones, pagers, and email addresses depends upon information entered into the mandatory and optional device fields.)
- 5. SAVE.
- 6. Update your profile any time you have a change.

The base Twitter feed can be used by anyone with internet access, and will have the same information as AtHoc. Simply go to twitter.com/navstaglakes. If you have a Twitter account, click the "Follow" button. If not, bookmark the page and return to it in case of emergency. The base Facebook page will have the same information as Twitter, and can also be found by anyone with internet access at www. facebook.com/NavalStationGreatLakes. Click on the "Like" button if you have a Facebook account.

Public safety notes

Respect the police and firefighters aboard the installation by pulling over to the right-hand side of the road when you see flashing lights.

The Great Lakes Police Department aggressively enforces all traffic regulations on federal property.

If you receive a traffic ticket on any installation property with a mandatory court appearance, you must appear in traffic court on the date specified on the citation. Failure to appear will result in the revocation of your base driving privileges.

Additionally, military personnel could be subject to UCMJ action.

If you are a civilian or are nonbase affiliate and receive a federal magistrate citation, the magistrate's court will notify you of your court date.

If you have questions regarding traffic citations, call 847-688-5555, ext. 233. The courtroom is inside the Visitor Control Center in Bldg. 6130.

Remember to register your vehicle at the Visitor Control Center. The Visitor Control Center is located in Bldg. 6130 adjacent to the Naval Station Great Lakes Main Gate. Vehicle registration is conducted during normal working hours. Call 847-688-5648 or 2407 for more information.

Possession of weapons aboard Naval Station Great Lakes is prohibited under federal law. Violators will be apprehended and weapons confiscated. Call the base armory at 847-688-6795 for any questions.

The basewide speed limit is 25 mph unless otherwise posted. Notable Exceptions: 5 mph in all parking lots; and 15 mph in all housing areas.

Naval Station Great Lakes has a zero tolerance policy for speeding in housing areas. Security Force personnel use radar for traffic enforcement.

Motorcycles: Naval Station Great Lakes regulations require the use of an approved D.O.T. helmet, proper outerwear, long sleeves, pants and boots to operate a motorcycle on base.

A reflective vest is required to operate a motorcycle after dark. Personnel assigned to Naval Station Great Lakes are required to complete an approved motorcycle safety course every three years before registering a motorcycle on base.

Security personnel aggressively enforce DUI laws on base. Violators will be apprehended and their vehicle impounded.

The operation of radar detectors and jammers on base is prohibited. Violators will be ticketed and the device confiscated. Seat belts are mandatory for all vehicle occupants while on base.

Naval regulations mandate the use of seat belts for all military personnel off base as well.

The use of cellphones, including in-ear handsfree devices, while driving on base is prohibited. Violators will be ticketed.

Motorcycle safety

With the number of fiscal 2017 motorcycle-related fatalities already surpassing 2016's fatalities, the Commander, Navy Region Mid-Atlantic is reminding Sailors to take advantage of the free, mandatory motorcycle safety courses offered throughout the Mid-Atlantic Region.

"Our responsibility to our Sailors is 24-hours a day, seven days a week," Commander, Navy Region Mid-Atlantic Rear Adm. Jack Scorby said. "Courses like this are not just a safety issue - they're a readiness and personal responsibility issue. Sailors are reminded that these courses are mandatory and to take advantage of the tools offered by the Navy to remain safe and successful."

Since October 2016, 18 Sailors and 16 Marines have died in motorcycle-related wrecks, according to a Naval Safety Center report.

Last fiscal year, the Department of the Navy lost 12 Sailors and 13 Marines in motorcycle mishaps.

While not all of these wrecks may have been prevented, the Navy offers courses to teach service members to ride safely and potentially avoid devastating mishaps.

Naval Station Great Lakes has a unique training opportunity for motorcycle operators. Research shows rider education is the most critical aspect of motorcycle safety. Active duty military personnel, DoD civilian employees, Military Reservists/ National Guard, Dependents of active duty military personnel and Retired military are authorized to register and take the courses. There is no charge for

The Basic Rider Course is a 16-hour program that teaches basic motorcycle operational skills and advanced skills such as swerving, braking. cornering, and riding strategies. It includes class

roomandon-cycle instruction with quality, person-

alized coaching and several hours of practice riding. Instructors are certified by the MotorcycleSafety Foundation (MSF). The next class is Sept. 18-19 and 20-21.

The Basic Rider Course 2 is also known as Experienced Rider Course (ERC). Riders use their own bikes to hone their mental strategies to a razor-sharp edge and practice their handling cycle

The Military Sport Bike or Advanced Rider Course (ARC) includes a fast-paced classroom segment with several interactive activities to improve perception and hazard awareness. Range exercises enhance both basic skills and crash avoidance skills. Improving braking and cornering finesse is emphasized. The next class is Sept. 28.

A cast of polished actors is led by Michael Mahler as Jack Singer; Sean Allan Krill as Tommy Korrman and Samantha Pauly as Betsy. The cast is studded with performers gifted with strong singers and dancers.

"Honeymoon" has the trappings of a classical musical that successfully mixes with a contemporary spin. It tells the story of Betsy, a patient young woman who questions where her five-year relationship with Jack is headed – or whether it's permanently stalled because of Jack's commitment issues.

The two lovebirds fly to Las Vegas to check the city's wedding chapels. But Jack still has cold feet, and he can't help but remember his mother's entreaty that he never marry.

Enter Korman, a suave, wealthy gambler who takes an instant fancy to Betsy because she reminds him of his late wife. Korman lays the groundwork for an accelerated campaign to win Betsy's heart; his aggressive campaign includes a weekend trip for two to Hawaii with no strings attached.

Jack loses big time at a high-stakes poker game arranged by Korman; that leaves Jack without the means to buy airfare to Hawaii. The obstacle is overcome when a group of Elvis impersonators bound for Hawaii finds a spot for the desperate Jack.

"Honeymoon" features such likable songs as "Out of the Sun," "Cone to an Agreement," "A Little Luck" and "Anywhere But Here."

Without question, "Honeymoon in Vegas" comes with a lightweight storyline. In this case, the show's wacky humor proves the perfect tonic to escape (at least temporally) day-to-day problems.

Suicide prevention: Your actions could save a life

JACKSONVILLE, FLORIDA (NNS) Military life can be challenging. Reach out and be there for those at risk. Everyday connections can make a big difference to someone feeling alone, in crisis, or having thoughts of

People don't need special training to safely talk about suicide risk or show genuine concern for someone in crisis. There are many ways – calling, reconnecting, meeting for coffee, going for a walk together – to be there for service members and veterans.

"Preventing suicide is about being there for every Sailor, Marine, and family member, every day," said Cmdr. Rachel Baudek. Naval Hospital Jacksonville's director for mental health. "Recognizing risk factors early is essential. Equally important are simple acts or words of kindness. You never know when that one word or gesture will make a significant difference in a life."

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, suicide is

ages) in the U.S. Historically, suicide rates have been lower in the military than in the general population. However, with the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, military suicide rates have been increasing and surpassing the rates for society at large.

Building resilience and preventing suicide requires all members of the Navy and Marine Corps community to work together.

Know the warning signs, which include thoughts or comments about suicide, substance abuse, purposelessness, anxiety, feeling trapped or hopeless, withdrawal, anger, recklessness, and mood changes.

uational stressors, and other health PEER (7337), text 480-360-6188, or chat problems that are risk factors for suicide. Military members who seek behavioral health care are protected by law against discrimination.

Tips to help Sailors and Marines stay mission-ready include: find time for oneself (improve sleep habits, try voga or meditation, participate in enjoyable activities); break down obstacles (break challenges down into small steps and tackle one at a time); improve physical conditioning (regular physical training strengthens the muscles and the mind); avoid alcohol and substances (in order to manage stress, sleep, relationships, and responsibilities); and identify people to turn to when in need (identify a friend, family member, chaplain, or health care professional to speak with).

For free, confidential support 24/7, call the Military Crisis Line at 800-273-TALK (8255), text 838255, or chat online at VeteransCrisisLine.net. The Crisis Line is available to current and former service members, their families, and friends.

There's also a Be There Peer Support outreach center, staffed by veteronline 24/7 at BeTherePeerSupport.



The participating Naval Academy midshipmen were Casey Densmore, Kelli Wise and Rachel Boushon.

Once the immediate danger of Hurricane Irma has passed, the information accumulated by Sanabia's team will be used to improve the Navy's Coupled Ocean/Atmosphere Mesoscale Prediction System-Tropical Cyclone-COAMPS-TC, for short. CO-AMPS-TC, developed with ONR support, uses complex algorithms to predict hurricane intensity-by processing real-time and historical meteorological data, fed by information from satellites.

"Our goal is to improve ocean and atmosphere modeling and prediction for fleet operations," said Dr. Ronald Ferek, a program manager in ONR's Ocean Battlespace Sensing Department. "The real-time COAMPS-TC forecasts for Hurricane Irma help the Navy issue operational guidance for fleet safety, and improve understanding of the complex air-sea interaction processes that drive the intensity of tropical hurricanes."

ONR's sponsored hurricane research is part of the Task Force Ocean initiative, which seeks to strengthen the Navy's oceanographic capabilities in ocean sensing and modeling technology.

the enduring legacy of 9/11. It inspires our nation. It inspires our military to ensure such an attack never happens again. It inspires us to never forget those who perished... to defend our country and our ideals... and to send a resounding message to our enemies—that no one attacks the United States of America and gets away with it."

Robinson closed out the event with a pledge to the 9/11 victims and their families that America will always keep fighting for a brighter and safer future, and that those lost on that day did not die in vain.

"Make no mistake: we will continue to pursue and fight our enemies wherever they go, wherever they hide, wherever they try to find refuge," said Robinson. 

the bridge during the attack and witnessing one of the kamikazes strike the ship.

"Pardon my French, but I was watching the son of a b**** come," said Salana. "He came off about fifteen feet above the water, and he hit right under the second gun mount. I saw his face, I swear."

After being struck, the ship made her way to California for extensive repairs. During this time, the war ended, and Gowen and Salana moved on from the Navy shortly after, while Husak stayed on for a twenty-six year career. While each went their separate way, the bond they formed during their short time together lives on with phone calls, emails, faceto-face meetings each year, and memories that they will never forget.

'These crazy bunch of gringos taught me the best lessons of my life," said Salana. "They are beautiful people, all of them. We've known each other 74 years. I don't think I have a brother I care for as much as these guys."


