### Closed for eclipse

Fort Stewart schools will have a half-day of instruction Aug. 21. Dismissal was decided to ensure the safety of our students during the solar eclipse. Although exciting, safety of students relative to participation is important. Students will be released from school early to allow parents to determine the level of appropriate safety equipment. Buses will be prepared to pick up students when Fort Stewart schools are dismissed at 11:50 a.m. All students will be served lunch on this day, and afternoon Pre-K will be cancelled. Schools will resume on Aug. 22, at the regularly scheduled time.

The following county schools are affected:

- Liberty County schools are closed Aug. 21. The district says the day will be considered an "inclement weather day" and will not have to be made up.
- Long County Schools have canceled classes Aug. 21.
- Tattnall County Schools will delay dismissal of Glennville Elementary and Reidsville Elementary until 2:45 p.m. Glennville Middle School, will release at 3:15 p.m. and Reidsville Middle School, releases at 3:25 p.m. Collins Elementary /Middle School and Tattnall County High School will release at the normal time of 3:10 p.m.
- Effingham County schools are closed Aug. 21. The district says the day will be considered an "inclement weather day" and will not have to be made up.
- Savannah-Chatham County public schools are closed Aug. 21. All staff will be required to report to work as normal.

## 3rd ID assumes command

**BAGRAM AIRFIELD, AFGHANISTAN** - The 3rd Infantry Division added another milestone to its historic, 100-year-old legacy when Maj. Gen. Lee Quintas, Commander of the 3rd ID and Maj. Gen. John Thomson, Commander of the 1st Cavalry Division, conducted a transfer of authority ceremony, Aug. 16.

The ceremony, attended by several key U.S. and Afghan military and civilian leaders, signified the fulfillment of the 1st Cavalry Division's yearlong mission and the relinquishing of all duties and responsibilities to the Dog Face Soldiers of the 3rd ID, who will pick up and carry on the U.S. Forces - Afghanistan mission.

"This is an outstanding command team we are saying farewell to," said Gen. John W.

Nicholson, Commander of Resolute Support, to the gathered and overflowing ceremony crowd. "The number of people here today - it's about great respect and to say thanks to you for the great job that you all did. Thank you for your teamwork, partnership and your sacrifices - to the people of Afghanistan - but to all of us. I'm incredibly impressed with the job [Maj. Gen Thomson's] team has done here."

## Beware the eclipse

Our area will experience a historical phenom on Monday and eye-care safety is paramount. According to [NASA.gov](http://NASA.gov), the last total solar eclipse to grace the contiguous United States was Feb. 26 1979, when the path crossed the northwestern part of the country from Washington to Quebec.

This year a person would have to drive 140 miles north to Charleston to experience the full effect. Yet, the effects of the eclipse back then were as far reaching as Georgia. This year, the Phenom returns.

For about one minute and 38-seconds the sun will go totally dark during the day. So, area schools have closed or are releasing students early as an "inclement weather day" Aug. 21. In anticipation of the solar eclipse, which leaves many

optometrist worried about children viewing the eclipse without the proper eye protection, USA Medical Department Activity-Fort Stewart, Lt. Col. Jason Cates, Chief of the Optometry Clinic at Winn Army Community Hospital expressed his enthusiasm, yet precaution for viewing the event.

"Yes we are excited about the eclipse," Cates said. "It is a pretty rare opportunity to experience something like that and we are going to get about 90 percent [of it] in our area."

But, proper viewing of the eclipse is a cautionary tale. Direct exposure to the sun light can cause a condition called Solar Retinopathy. Cates said to properly view the eclipse; one should never look directly at the sun, but ensure they are wearing International Safety Standard 12312-2:2015 glasses.

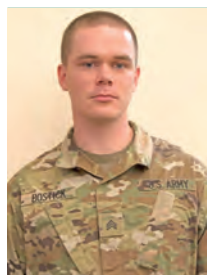

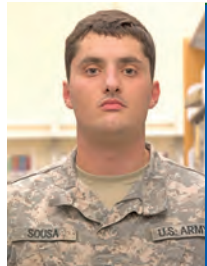

## Record crowd attend 7th Annual Winn Baby Expo

As the early morning Georgia temperature climbed into the 90s, eleven hundred moms, dads and grandparents with strollers in tow, stood in a long line, which snaked its way around to the end of Fort Stewart's Club Stewart parking lot. Many in line were eager to see what prizes lay in store for them inside the 7th Annual Winn Army Community Hospital Baby Expo Aug. 12.

More than 50 vendors and six sponsors participated in this year's event. Winn's Army Public Health Nursing staff along with the Fort Stewart Fire Department conducted car seat checks. Many other resources from Winn, such as Tricare, contraception education, a Daddy Panel and vital records were also on hand to teach first-time, and experienced parents the importance of readiness as they add a new member to their family.

U.S. Army Medical Department Activity – Fort Stewart event coordinator, 1st Lt. Athanasia Ashley, a registered nurse in the Maternal Child Health and Postpartum department, expressed the importance of heading up such a huge undertaking - organizing this growing event.

"I've seen on an average 70 to 80 babies that's born each month," Ashley said. "We come in and we see parents who don't know about the available resources that we have."

Ashley said she is grateful for all of the volunteers who put forth countless hours of their own time to set up and tear down the expo, but most importantly overjoyed for the family participation.

"First and foremost we say thank you ... thank you ... thank you ...," Ashley said. "Ultimately we are grateful that you are entrusting Winn Army Community Hospital to take a part in your family's life in whatever aspect that maybe. We hope that we provide you with a wealth of knowledge, resources that you may have not known about, or even if you know about it, we hope that we further that education in regards to what all that resource can provide for you. We're glad that you took time out of your day. We're glad that you brought your family, your friends, your loved ones and your children. We hope that this experience will be the first of many as we continue to do this baby expo every year."

For the first time in Baby Expo history, Winn partnered with Fort Stewart's Family, Morale, Welfare and Recreation commercial sponsorship team to give new parents a great experience.

Ashley said FMWR's Carly Michael and Michelle Cowart's help with lining up sponsorship and marketing was "phenomenal" this year, which enabled Winn to use more of the Club for areas like The Lactation Lounge, Teddy Bear Clinic, stroller parking and Baby Olympics.

"We were able to bring in some grand prizes that we weren't able to necessarily pass out last year," Ashley said. "So they [FMWR] enabled us to expand our giveaways even far and beyond what we can ever imagine. We are hoping, and definitely looking forward to working with them in the future baby expos."

There were many firsts for the Baby Expo this year. A Teddy Bear clinic, headed up by MEDDAC registered nurses, Lisa Tyler and Janice Palmer, was located in the Marne Room. This specially outfitted "hospital" offered children 12-years-old and younger the opportunity to experience a visit to the various clinics through the eyes of their stuffed animal. Bears were bandaged, given I.V. drips and went through the CT scanner.

A friendly competition was held at Winn between the various departments to see who could create the best baby basket to be given away at the expo. Family Member Sarah Brownfield, who is due to have their first child in December, said she and her husband came to see the various baskets and hopefully win something. Although, for the Brownfields the expo meant more than just getting give-a-ways, it meant connection.

"I feel like it brings people together," Brownfield said, "and you get to meet new friends, because being in the military life it's kind of hard to meet new people and so you bring people together like this and they have something in common, and you meet new people."

Winn commander, Col. Christopher Warner stressed the importance of readiness and strengthening Soldiers and their families.

"This event helps contribute to our families," Warner said. "It not only is a great community gathering and event. It's about connecting the resources, but it's also about empowering them with education, so that they can continue to grow and develop as parents and make sure that their children are growing and developing. So when our Soldiers deploy they know that their families are well taken care of and well resourced."

Overall the Baby Expo was touted a great accomplishment. Warner said the community support and involvement was key to the success of this growing event. He said he looks forward to seeing how the Baby Expo can be even better next year.

# Spartan Soldier beats the odds

Life wasn't ideal for Aaron Cowart before he made the biggest decision of his life. His home life was abusive, and he found himself frequently in trouble, often showing up late to class.

At the age of 12, Cowart said he decided to take matters into his own hands and make changes in his life. He met with the Georgia Division of Family and Children Services and told them the things that were going on at home.

DFCS investigated and confirmed that Cowart lived in an abusive home, so they sent him to a children's center in Savannah.

Cowart said he distinctly remembers the day they took him into custody and he became an orphan.

"We went to a building, and the counselors fed us snacks while we waited," he said. "At the time, it seemed like a bad day, but it turned out to be the most important day of my life."

Cowart was sent to Greenbriar Children's Center in Savannah.

After spending a year there, his counselor offered him an opportunity to move to the Treutlen House, an orphanage located in Rincon.

"When my counselor picked me up, I remember riding past a bus stop, going down a gravel road, and seeing the Treutlen House for the first time," he said.

Cowart finally arrived at the place he would call home for the next six years.

"I was 13 when I moved to Treutlen House and wasn't in the best state of mind," said Cowart. "I was rebellious and didn't want to follow the rules. But after a year or two of living there, I decided to get my act together."

Cowart said that every day after school he conducted study sessions with his orphan brothers and sisters and played video games. He felt complete.

"It was my dream to join the military," said Cowart. "I always thought the military was cool so when I turned 19, I joined the U.S. Army and became a Combat

Medic."

Cowart now serves with Headquarters and Headquarters Company of 3rd Battalion, 7th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Infantry Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division at Fort Stewart.

Cowart said that being in the military is very similar to the life he lived when he was at the Treutlen House.

"I have lots of brothers and sisters here too," he said. "We go through lots of hardships that brings us closer together."

Cowart said he still goes to the Treutlen house to visit the staff and to hang out with the children that live there.

"They're my family," said Cowart, "So I go as much as possible because I miss being there so much."

Cowart's platoon sergeant Staff Sgt. Dino Denetdeal said that Cowart is a growing Soldier and still has a lot to learn, but what he's done so far for his Army team and the Treutlen House exemplifies a true Soldier of character.

# Spirit Airlines gives Derry Township native, a World War II vet, an honor guard sendoff

Derry Township native "Mitch" Chockla is one of the Greatest Generation that pulled the United States and its allies through World War II, and his achievements on the battlefields of Europe are receiving added attention as he approaches a century of experience.

"It's overwhelming. I can't believe it's happening," Chockla said of recent honors, including having the street where he lives in South Miami, Fla., named Mitchel Chockla Court this past spring.

The accolades continued Tuesday as he and his daughter, Barbara Woodward, were sent off by an honor guard — including officers with the Broward Sheriff's Office — as they boarded a Spirit Airlines flight from Ft. Lauderdale to Arnold Palmer Regional Airport in Unity for a 10-day visit and family reunion in his hometown.

Chockla, who will celebrate his 97th birthday Thursday, served under General George S. Patton in the Army's 3rd Infantry Division, in roles including an advance scout and assistant squad leader. Chockla saw action in campaigns in North Africa, Sicily, Italy and France that earned him multiple military awards, including two Bronze Stars and six Battle Stars.

More than seven decades later, he still feels the effects of the severe wounds that also earned him a Purple Heart during an engagement with the enemy on Nov. 22, 1944, near the border between France and Germany.

"It's not the wounds as much as the memories," he said. "You never can brush the memories away."

"Day in and day out, we were fighting," he said of his unit's struggle to gain ground against German troops.

Shrapnel ripped through Chockla's right elbow and his left hand, but pieces that lodged in the skin below his right breast caused him the most immediate concern. "I could feel the blood running down," he recalled.

His previous recovery from a bout of malaria in Sicily was brief compared with the months of care and rehabilitation he underwent in hospitals in France, England, Scotland and stateside in Richmond, Va., before his discharge as a sergeant near the war's end.

Chockla was one of six brothers who all served in and survived the war.

In his civilian career, Chockla began working for the now-defunct Westinghouse plant in Derry, a job he returned to after the war. He soon got a job as a letter carrier with the Postal Service and, after delivering mail in the winter weather, welcomed a transfer to Florida in 1950. He retired in 1980 but has remained involved with his community and his generation's legacy, meeting with a dwindling group of fellow World War II veterans in Florida.

"There were 30 to 35 of us," he said. "Now we're down to about three or four."

The Afghan Minister of Defense, Tariq Shah Bahrami, echoed Nicholson's sentiments and gave his and his country's own gratitude to the outgoing leaders and Soldiers.

"On behalf the Ministry of Defense and for all Afghan people, thank you for all your service. The People of Afghanistan will never forget the mission of Resolute Support."

During their near 12 months serving under Operation Freedom's Sentinel the 1st Cav. Div. distinguished themselves as skilled and astute Soldiers. They developed and implemented new and consolidated force protection measures throughout Bagram Airfield, which ended previously outdated and erroneous measures.

Nicholson also stated that the 1st Cav. Div. contributed to the delivery of thousands of pounds of humanitarian aid such as medical supplies, clothing and non-perishable foods.

Picking up where the 1st Cav. Div. left off will not be difficult for the Rock of the Marne Soldiers. Over the last 100 years since its creation at Camp Green, North Carolina in November, 1917 the Division has made a name for itself and is known for having one of the most successful combat records of any U.S. Army division. The unit also has long line of historic leaders and Soldiers, such as Dwight D. Eisenhower and Audi Murphy, who had a strong adherence to standards. That sense of pride in standards and discipline continues on today.

For the next nine months, the 3rd ID will honor the past by being dedicated to the USFOR-A mission; supporting functions and operations at the Bagram Air Field and three Train, Advise and Assist Commands in the East, South-East and South. The support to BAF alone - the largest military base in Afghanistan - ranges from in and out processing Soldiers to and from Afghanistan and providing force protection for a joint

compound.

"The fight against terrorism is the most important in the world and for humanity," Nicholson said, in his welcome to the Dog Face Soldiers, who are returning to Afghanistan for the third time. "I have great confidence in that of the Marne Team."

Assisting the command's confidence was the successful mission hand-off.

"Because of you JT, your professionalism and dedication to the mission, this have been the best transition I've ever experienced," said Quintas to his fellow division commander. "Thanks to you and the troopers of the 1st Cavalry Division and the entire USFOR-A team, you have set the conditions for our success."

With their patch ceremonies completed and their 1st Cav. Div. Soldiers redeployed to Fort Hood, Texas, the current Dog Face Soldiers of the 3rd ID serving in Operation Freedom Sentinel will now take their turn and add to their century of history.

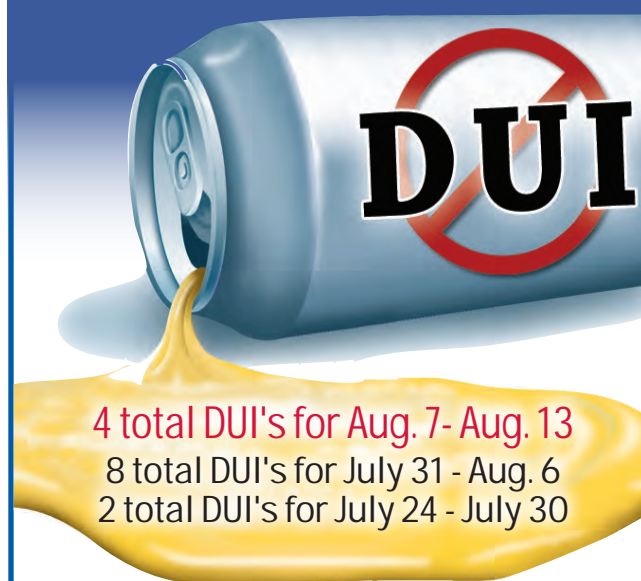

"So the important part in this area, we are not going to have a total eclipse, it's going to be a partial eclipse," Cates said. "So, really there is really not going to be a safe time to look at without the glasses."

Wearing multiple pairs of sunglasses is not sufficient protection from the harmful direct rays of the sun. Cates expressed the importance of meeting safety standards.

"The thing is with retina burns. There is no pain and you really wouldn't know anything was happening until maybe 4-6 hours later before there might be a problem," he said. "You can end up with permanent vision loss. Some people end up with a permanent spot missing in their vision ... but it will cause permanent damage to the back of the eye causing a blind spot."

Due to their curiosity, children are a number one concern for many optometrists. The fear is children may look around instead of through the glasses.

"I would monitor the kids," Cates said. "It's important to know that here at Fort Stewart, we will not be completely covered. It's going to be about 90 percent, so it is not safe. So [parents] need to make sure [children] keep the glasses on or keep them indoors if you are not sure."

To see the eclipse safely: Do not look directly at the sun; Cover your eyes with the solar eclipse viewers; turn/glance at the sun; look away and then remove your solar filter, but Do Not Remove The Solar Filter While Looking At The Sun!

NASA said after the August 2017 total solar eclipse, the next annular solar eclipse that can be seen in the continental United States will be on October 14, 2023 which will be visible from Northern California to Florida.

#### Beef, Okra, and Potato Kebabs

### Ingredients

- 8 fingerling potatoes, each cut in half lengthwise (Produce aisle)
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley (Produce aisle)
- 1 1/2 teaspoons prepared horseradish (Aisle 10)
- 1 1/2 tablespoons whole-grain Dijon mustard (Aisle 10)
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce (Aisle 10)
- 1 1/2 teaspoons sugar (Aisle 10)
- 2 teaspoons olive oil (Aisle 11)
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper (Aisle 10)
- 1/2 teaspoon salt, divided (Aisle 10)
- 1 cup (1-inch-square) cut red bell pepper (Produce aisle)
- 16 small okra pods (Produce aisle)
- 8 shallots, peeled and halved (Produce aisle)
- 1 pound boneless sirloin steak, trimmed and cut into 1-inch cubes (Meat aisle)
- 1 medium yellow squash, halved lengthwise and cut into 1/2-inch slices (about 2 cups) (Produce aisle)
- Cooking spray (Aisle 10)

Preparation: (30 minutes) Marinate time: (1 hour)

- Place potatoes in a saucepan; cover with water. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer 15 minutes or until tender; drain. Cool.
- Combine parsley and the next 6 ingredients (through pepper) in a large bowl, stirring well; stir in 1/4 teaspoon salt. Add potatoes, bell pepper, okra, shallots, beef, and squash; toss well to coat. Cover and chill for 1 hour.
- Prepare grill. Thread vegetables and beef alternately onto each of the 8 (10-inch) skewers. Sprinkle kebabs evenly with remaining 1/4 teaspoon salt. Place kebabs on grill rack coated with cooking spray; grill 10 minutes or until desired degree of doneness, turning occasionally.

8. All Applicants must have less than 10 years of active federal service time. If you have more time

than that; you will need to submit a waiver.

9. E-4 and above only to apply and must be active duty, reserves, or National Guard to apply. Applicant must be able to obtain a conditional release from branch.

10. No SAT's required.

11. Must have an overall minimum GPA of 3.0.

12. P2 profiles can submit a waiver and will be approved on a case by case basis. P3 profiles no waiver will be granted.

I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation, whether well fed or hungry, whether living in plenty or in want. I can do all this through him who gives me strength."*

Troopers on their way to Ranger School have recently stopped by the 6th Squadron, 8th Cavalry Regiment chaplain's office for prayer and advice. Ranger School garnishes a reputation of depriving its students of food, sleep, and leisure; it is time marked by a loss of freedom. However, the freedom one experiences upon leaving Ranger School often feels like trading one master for another. Rather than being forced to live under austere conditions, the newly graduated often are driven by their carnal desires into indiscriminate and uncontrolled eating, resting, and grumbling. Being controlled by their desires keeps a person from real freedom.

Real freedom is found in the ability to do something we want, but choosing not to act on it. This is true when we have the option to overeat or be lazy, but choose self-restraint and hard work. This freedom applies to all areas of our lives. For instance, we experience freedom when we could betray a friend, but choose to stay loyal. Such freedom comes from forsaking an enticing short term gain for an even greater one at a later time.
