political activity policies in cording to Marine Adminis-the upcoming November trative Message 534/08. elections.


Federal employees and service members are prohibited from official involvement or the appearance of official involvement in partisan political activities, ac-

Service members are subject to more restrictive rules concerning political activities. They cannot participate officially in partisan political fund-raising activities or perform clerical or

political committee or candidate during a campaign.

Additionally, members cannot use their official authority to influence or interfere with an election, march or ride in partisan parades, speak

before a partisan political gathering in uniform or display a partisan political sign, poster, banner or similar device at their residence on a military installation to include privatized housing.

AL ANBAR PROV-INCE, Iraq — The lifeblood that helps rebuild the Iraqi infrastructure is commerce, and Iraq's roads and bridges are the veins through which the lifeblood flows.

This makes the Wahid Bridge, which connects the two towns of Jubbah and Jubbah Ria, extremely important. It is a direct connection between two Anbar

"The bridge is basically a shortcut to cross the Euphrates," said Sgt. John A. Esquivel, the utilities chief section head with support platoon, Company A, 3rd Combat Engineer Battalion, Regimental Combat Team 5. "The bridge

was originally installed back in May and has since developed some problems due to the heavy presence of algae in the river. The algae have caused the anchor and buoy cables to sink below water level and have produced a curve in the bridge."

Iraqi Army engineers assisted the Marines from Company A to dig four extra anchors along the river banks to give the floatingpanel bridge extra support. The anchors will later be tied to the bridge by another team of engineers.

Having IA engineers assist the Marines showed the Iraqis are making progress toward conducting operations such as this without the assistance of coalition forces.

"By the IA engineers being out there and using their equipment to help us

Coalition has entered 'Endgame' in Iraq

WASHINGTON

Amid an 80-percent drop in violence and with further withdrawals of U.S. forces in sight, the coalition in Iraq has reached the "endgame," Defense Secretary Robert M. Gates said Sept. 23.

"I believe we have now entered that endgame – and our decisions today and in the months ahead will be critical to regional stability and our national security interests for years to come," he told the Sen-ate Armed Service Committee during a hearing on

Iraq and Afghanistan.
Highlighting success in
Iraq are reductions in U.S. casualties and overall vio-lence, and the handover of Anbar province this month to Iraqi authority. Anbar, the 11th of 18 provinces now under Iraqi control, was once a hotbed of the Sunni insurgency and the scene of some of the war's most contentious fighting.

During testimony the secretary submitted to lawmakers, he cited other measures of progress, in-cluding "incremental but significant" progress by the Iraqi parliament and, with the exception of Iran, an increased willingness on the part of Iraq's neighboring countries to engage with Baghdad and help stabilize the country

But Sec. Gates tempered his analysis, saying serious challenges remain, including the failure of Iraq's parliament to pass an election law, which likely will delay a planned election until De-cember and could increase the possibility of politically motivated violence.

"Our military commanders do not yet believe our gains are necessarily enduring, and they believe that there are still many challenges and the potential for reversals in the future," he said.

The secretary characterized the situation in Iraq as fragile, but said current conditions mark vast improvements since early 2007, when Sec. Gates be-came Pentagon chief.



"When I entered office, the main concern was to halt and reverse the spiraling violence to prevent a strategic calamity for the United States and allow the Iraqis to make progress on the political, economic and security fronts," he said. "Although we all have criticisms of the Iraqi government, there can be no doubt that the situation is much different and for heter than it ent, and far better, than it was in

The secretary credited Army Gen. David H. Petraeus, the former commander in Iraq, who oversaw a 33,000-troop surge and the ensuing drop in violence there, with a "brilliant performance" during his nearly 20-month tenure. Petraeus last week relinquished command of Multinational Force-Iraq to Army Gen. Raymond T. Odierno and will take charge of U.S. Central Command during October.

Further, Sec. Gates called the relationship between Gen. Petraeus and U.S. Ambassador to Iraq Ryan C. Crocker a superb model

of military-civilian partnership.
"Beyond their own brilliant individual performances, the Petraeus-Crocker team ... (is) one that should be studied and emulated years to come," the secretary

way forward in Iraq from Gen. Petraeus and from Navy Adm. Mike Mullen, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Army Gen. David D. McKiernan, commander of NATO's International Security Assistance Force in Afghanistan, Army Lt. Gen. Martin E. Dempsey, acting CentCom com-

mander, and the service chiefs.
"Although each viewed the challenges from a different perspective, weighing different factors, all once again arrived at similar recommendations," Sec. Gates said.

After receiving recommenda-tions from the Defense Depart-ment, President Bush this month announced that some 8,000 U.S. troops will be withdrawn from Iraq by February without being replaced. This announcement comes after the drawdown of the five Army brigade combat teams, two Marine battalions and the Marine Expeditionary Unit that were sent to Iraq as part of the

Meanwhile, withdrawal 3,400 noncombat forces, including aviation personnel, explosive ordnance teams, combat and construction engineers, military police and logistics support teams, began this month, will continue through the fall and will be completed in January, Sec. Gates said. In addition, a Marine battalion stationed in Anbar will r in November, and another brigade combat team will r

Respiratory protection in the workplace

Camp Lejeune's Marine Corps Safety Division

An estimated 5 million workers are required to wear respirators in 1.3 million workplaces throughout the United States. Respirators protect workers against insufficient oxygen environments, harmful dusts, fogs, smokes, mists, gases, vapors and sprays. These hazards may cause canlung impairment, other diseases. or death. Compliance with the Occupational Safety and Health Administration Respiratory Protection Standard could prevent hundreds of deaths and thousands of illnesses annually. The most important defense against respiratory hazards is to control contamination at its source and prevent it from entering the air. This can be done by either substituting dangerous substance with less hazardous ones (particularly where chemicals are used) and by isolating or enclosing hazardous operations. The sad part is most respiratory diseases can be prevented by implementing the use of engineering controls and work practices designed to limit or reduce employee exposures. A respirator must be worn if these controls cannot be met. The following tips provide sound guidance for a healthy Respiratory Protection Management Program within your

Review your Industrial Hygiene survey for respiratory protection requirements if applicable for your work-center and NAVMC DIR 5100.8 chapter

Employees required to wear a tight-

fitting respirator shall have a medical control respiratory. evaluation and must have initial training and annually thereafter. Remember medical evaluation is based on age: Under 35 every five years, 35-45 every two years and over 45 every year.

Unit RPPM shall document and track for expiration and scheduling, without documentation you cannot track or prove the training occurred and results in an unauthorized respirator user

Re-train if personnel do not understand the training points, lack situation awareness of proper respirator usage or the PPE requirements change in the work place.

Ensure all respirators are National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health approved.

Your unit or organization is responsible for providing approved respirators and enforcing its use

program will be administered. ·A complete assessment and knowledge of respiratory hazards encountered in the workplace. Refer to

Prevention, training and education, as well as actual battlefield treatment, are saving lives.

In Iraq, medical treatment has moved closer to the fight and on a grander scale than in the past, staying available within one-hour rings around combat operations. Known as the "golden hour," this time of opportunity is the first 60 minutes after a severe trauma injury. If the wounded can receive swift medical attention during this time, they have the greatest chance of survival.

Marines and field corpsmen alike know and administer "buddy" first aid.

"I think (the survival rate) has a lot to do with the quickness in which medical attention is received," said Seaman Greg Norman, a corpsman with 3rd Battalion, 6th Marine Regiment. This immediate, onsite treatment is

the difference maker, said Norman.

Casualties sustained by first aid survive their wounds or injuries 90 percent of the time, said Roberts.

The enroute care is just as critical, Roberts said. Shock trauma platoons and forward resuscitative surgery systems, which are fast-acting emergency response teams that can administer medicine and surgery, are keeping more casualties alive and seeing them transported to the next level of care.

Designated helicopters

that also fly combat missions are evacuating casualties from danger zones. No Marine or naval helicopter fleet is dedicated solely to emergency evacuations, but Roberts insists that does not mean lifesaving is compromised.

"I do not know of a single case," said Roberts, about helicopters not being able to retrieve a wounded Marine or sailor.

Shock trauma platoons, in essence, are rolling emergency rooms consisting of 25 people, including emergency physicians, physician assistants, nurses, corpsmen and Marines. A forward resuscitative surgery system is a mobile unit that deploys as Marine combat service support and is staffed with two surgeons, a nurse, an anesthesiologist and four corpsmen. Casualties still alive in this care have a 97 percent chance of surviving, Roberts said.

From these small emergency rooms, casualties are transported to hospitals in Iraq cities such as Al Asad, Baghdad or Balad, and if necessary, to Landstuhl Regional Medical Center, Germany, for advanced surgeries and re-evaluation.

For example, at Marine Corps Air Station Yuma, Ariz., a relatively small base, an average of approximately 800 prohibited e-mails have been sent over the local network regarding political support recently, said Jack Neely, air station information technology director.

They may encourage others to vote, display one partisan bumper sticker on their vehicle and make financial contributions to partisan parties or candidates.

Rules service members and federal employees must adhere to regarding political activities can be found in Department of Defense Directive 1344.10.

"There are certain things a person of influence, whether he is a sergeant or a general, can't come out and do, like saying he supports this candidate and you should support him too," said David James, Marine Corps voting action officer.

The intent is that we don't want undue pressure on individuals from their seniors," said James. "You can support your candidate, you can do what you need to do, but you shouldn't have that feeling of someone forcing you to vote a certain way."

Federal employees can't wear campaign badges or buttons, display campaign materials or distribute campaign materials on government property or over government e-mail. However, federal employees, unlike service members, can actively participate in political activities off government property.

Those seeking more information about voting rights and limitations should contact their unit voting information officer or their local staff judge advocate.

and prevented upward of two-hundred possible vehicle-borne improvised explosive device attacks. With every find we make, Iraq becomes a safer place."

Through the help of local Iraqi citizens looking out for the safety and wellbeing of their community, the police received information on the location of the cache.

"The Iraqi police are one percent responsible for finding this cache," said Staff Sgt. Robert Fertal, platoon sergeant with second platoon, Company E. "Their hard work and sacrifice has created an environment where Iraqi nationals freely offer information. This information has led to several smaller caches and explosive remnants of war finds, as

well as the large one."

The ordnance the company normally finds is less in quantity than this one. Finds are commonly linked to preceding disposal attempts of enemy

munitions by coalition forces.
"We have never uncov-

ered this amount of ordnance in the same location," said Fertal. "Our typical finds are usually five to 10 rounds and almost always classified as ERW. On average, we find ERW about

twice a month. We also find

unexploded ordnance from previous controlled detonations, UXO is found more frequently."

With the quick response time of the IP and the help of citizens in the area, Iraqis are preventing insurgency operations in Iraq. Step by step, they are becoming self-reliant and completely capable of protecting their people and their freedoms.

"This find demonstrates the post (Provincial Iraqi Control) capabilities of an Iraqi police force in the lead, using its own intelligence to take the fight to the enemy by depriving him of a significant supply of ammunition," said Lt. Col. Steven J. Grass, the battalion commander of TF 2nd Bn., 2nd Marines. "It was a big win."







Deer season's fast approach demands leg work

It happens around this time every year — I get so excited about the upcoming that I jump spend a hot, sweaty day in the field. scouting for

potential tree stand locations and early rubs and scrapes

I'm actually proud of myself this time around. I managed to ignore the pre-hunt jitters all the way until the last weekend of September and, though the high temperature for the day was 85 degrees, I held off leaving the house until 3 p.m. under a cooling layer of cloud cover.

First things first. I am unbelievably fortunate to have a friend with more than 300 acres of prime hunting land less than an hour from my house. The landowner happens to be the guy who introduced me to hunting, some seven years ago. I remain his eager student when it comes to deciphering the mysterious ways of


the white-tailed deer.
We decided to start the afternoon sighting in our rifles and learned a valuable lesson in doing so. My gun, a Remington Model 7 in 7mm Short Action Ultra-Magnum, was shooting about an inch high at 100 yards — just right. My partner's gun, an older

model 30-06, came out shooting a whopping eight inches low and four inches right at the same distance. Mind you, this gun has always kept its zero from season to season in the past. My buddy didn't even bother sighting in last year and took two deer with it without issue. Now, all of a sudden, the gun was out of whack and we spent a fair amount of time walking it back

into alignment. The lesson for everyone is; always spend at least one session at the range before taking your firearm into the woods expecting it to hit where you're aiming. I would hate to think of a big old mossy horned buck popping up in front of my pal on opening day, only to have him shoot under and behind it because we hadn't put in the time zeroing in.

Our walk around the farm indicated the season, at least in our section of Jones County, has a little way to go in terms of bucks thinking about breeding. We scouted the edges of several big fields, some with harvested corn and some allowed to grow with native vegetation. We saw no evidence of any rutting activity. That is not unusual for such an early date, but I won't be surprised to start finding the first rubs and scrapes after the cooler weather takes hold late in the week.

We did find enough tracks to get the old heart pumping with anticipation. There were even a few sets of prints that I might go so far as to guess belonged to respectable deer that would go a long way toward filling my freezer



I still have to prepare a few stand sites before the opener, but at least I have sated my enthusiasm for the next couple

Fishermen, on the other hand, don't have to wait one minute to scratch their itch.

The fall fishing season is in full swing and anglers up and down the coast are cashing in with catches of speckled trout, Spanish mackerel, red drum,

bluefish and spots.
In the surf and along the ocean piers, black drum, pompano and other bottom dwellers have been providing much of the action. According much of the action. According to Richard Ehrenkaufer, a.k.a. Dr. Bogus, there have been flounder, but most of them are short of the state minimum.

The Spanish mackerel bite has been excellent of late, especially for big, 2- to 5-pounders.

In addition to the mackerel, bluefish are running strong, along with false albacore.

In the sounds and coastal rivers, red drum have carried the day, with fish found around the Haystacks area in the Newport River and the marshes behind Bogue Banks.

It's been a little too breezy of late to expect many offshore reports, but those who have made it out there are coming back with fish boxes of wahoo. Stay sharp out there. You

never know when the greatest outdoor moment of your life is going to happen.







Riley settling into new role with Heat, again

MIAMI - The Miami Heat gathered on their practice court, the squeaks of sneakers and the bouncing of basketballs echoing off the walls. It was like countless workouts before. This time, however, Pat Riley wasn't the coach

The new era of Heat basketball — with Erik Spoelstra the coach - opened with the start of training camp Saturday, and Riley insists he couldn't be happier

A Hall of Fame coach with 1,210 wins, even championship rings and an iconic legacy in the league, Riley decided five months ago that the time was right to turn the keys over to Spoelstra, who worked his way from the video room to the coach's chair in 13 years.

Riley is still around, but will lead from the front office, not the front lines

"My role is that I'm the president of basketball operations and my job is to try to build this team back to where we want to become a championship contender again," Riley said. "I want to do that as

quickly as I can. But I'll do it from behind my desk. I'm not going to be out there in front. I think it'll be a lot like it was the

st time. ... I know where my place is." Almost to a man, everyone in the Heat locker room, even those who never played for him, still call him "Coach Riley." The fact that he isn't coaching anymore

t change that.

His office is a short walk from the practice floor, he'll almost be a fixture at most games - whether he's visible or not — and still has a powerful voice in every Heat personnel decision. Plus, Spoelstra isn't shy about saying he's a product of the Heat culture, the one Riley installed when he arrived in South Florida in the

"All I've experienced in my two years prior to this is coach Riley running everything," third-year point guard Chris Quinn said. "But coach Spo was my summer league coach for two years, so I kind of have a little taste of it. It's exciting, kind of a new beginning, especially after last year. It's exciting to have another year and to get things going.

Riley met with Spoelstra constantly during the offseason, talking about how to revamp the roster while keeping salaries below the luxury tax threshold; the Heat did that with a mere \$415,000 to spare

But their chats were about players, not

On that point, Riley is clear: It's Spoelstra's call.

"I know he's an X-and-O coach. I know that part of the game, from that standpoint, he's very knowledgeable,"
Riley said. "He's going to be organized.
He's going to be disciplined. And I think
he'll bring it out on the court, every single

Riley will be watching closely, of course His role is still, in many ways, patriarchal within the Heat, having spent years grooming Spoelstra for this opportunity.
That doesn't mean that if Riley

disagrees with something Spoelstra does, he'll necessarily chime in with his opinion.

"I'm not going to be up and down with him on anything that I see, that I might not agree with," Riley said. "Everybody does it differently. I trust that he's going to do it in the nature that he feels comfortable in doing it in, so I'm go give him a free rein here

Riley retired once before, tappin former top assistant Stan Van Gur to be his replacement in a stunning move days before the start of the 2 04 season, Dwyane Wade's rookie

Van Gundy eventually stepped of as well, citing family reasons 21 ga into the 2005-06 season. Riley retu led the Heat to that season's NBA and stayed for the last two injuryplagued years

He insists that this time, his cos

days are done for good.
"One day I was driving to work then all of a sudden my mind went there, and I just said, 'Thank God I'm not in there doing film and doi playbooks and doing all these thin that would overwhelm your mind,' Riley said. "Even though I'm a litt overwhelmed with my desk duties that's behind me. And I love watch Erik work.







Construction moves at furious pace

The Tarawa Terrace housing community has been taken over by heavy machinery as Actus Lend Lease works to complete construction of houses by August 2011.

"Houses are coming down fast," said Michael Lane, director of public private venture liaison branch, family housing division. "And the way everything is moving along now, about 16 houses should go each month."

each month."

Lane said that Actus Lead Lease is currently demolishing old houses in the phase five sector of the project, while 156 new houses are almost complete in phase three. There are six phases total.

"Once phase three is completely built, there will be 374 new houses with 404 more houses to go," said Lane. "Ten percent of those houses will be for military members with exceptional family members."

As the new houses are built, Marines and their families, who haven't changed duty stations or left the Marine Corps, move from the old to the new, freeing up the old houses to be demolished and re-

built for more families.

"Once phase one was complete, we moved our first families into the new houses and began working on phase two," said Lane. "That's how the process works."

The houses constructed on Tarawa Terrace are two, three or four bedrooms, and although more then 300 houses have been built so far, the waiting list is still quite lengthy, said Lane.

Conference educates professionals on child abus

The Community Counseling Center hosted a conference on child maltreatment for multi-disciplinary professionals Sept. 29 and 30 at the Russell Marine and Family Services Center auditorium.

The conference was conducted by the Armed Forces Center for Child Protection, Naval Hospital Naval Medical Center Bethesda, Md. All civilian and military personnel who work with children were invited to attend the conference.

"The conference gave in-

"The conference gave information on recognizing, diagnosing and treating child abuse and neglect," said Wilbert S. Artis, a social worker associate with the counseling services center. "It was a wonderful training opportunity for our military and civilians in the community."

Topics covered during the conference included shaken baby syndrome, child pornography and adult outcomes after adverse childhood experiences.

Retired Navy captain and child abuse pediatrician director, Dr. Barbara R. Craig, said the conference was conducted partially in response to a study conducted by the North Carolina Child Fatality State Prevention Team. The study looked at all child abuse homicides in N.C. from 1985 to 2002. Eighty-five percent of the homicides in chil-

dren were younger than 12 years old and were due to child abuse by their own families.

During the 16-year period, 378 children were killed before the age of eleven. The state average for N.C. was 2.2 children killed per 100,000. In Onslow County alone, 4.3 children were killed per 100,000.

"Many referrals have been made in this area, and I felt it was important to come," said Craig. "The conference was free for attendees because it's so imperative to get the word out, inform and educate people about what's going on. By doing so, more people will be able to recognize, report and do a better job of treating child abuse."

The deployment comes at the culmination of a long series of training exercises to prepare the Marines.

"We've done the typical assault ranges here on Camp Lejeune," said Billings. "We went over to Mojave Viper in California and worked with the role-players to get a feel for what it's going to be like in that society and that kind of culture."

As always, safety came first and the Marines waited for the day's heavy fog to lift and the skies to clear before boarding the aircraft.

The aircraft took to the skies, heading toward their objective — the drop zone. Parachutes began to fly out six at a time in quick succession on each pass over the zone.

The Marines exited the rear of the airplane, leaping into the wind, locking themselves into a bentover position they had rehearsed many times. After the successful deployment of the canopy, the Marines gained control and maneuvered, mid-air, to avoid collisions with one another. Once safely descending to the ground, the most important objective was to land as a team, close to each other.

The practice jump simulated a basic airborne operation for combat support, which keeps the Marines familiar with such a skill. The purpose of the low-level static line jump is to move Marines into an area quickly at low altitude with the ability to go unnoticed.

"When it's too (dangerous) to drive in with cars, we have the ability to come in airborne under the radar," said Sgt. Alexander MacDonald, a team leader for the jump. "There are always dangers doing this, that's why we routinely practice it."

With approximately one minute to think during a 1,750 feet jump, falling at the rate of 18 feet per second, thoughts race through each Marine's mind before reaching the ground, said MacDonald.

Each Marine has to consider safety, standard procedures, reacting to the direction of the wind, landing in the designated landing area while avoiding the trees, and maintaining situational awareness at all times.

Once the Marines reached the ground, accounting for the safety of each Marine automatically became the priority.

"The strength of execution is rehearsals, and recon is known for its rehearsals," said Sgt. Maj. Stephen A. Thomas, the battalion sergeant major.

Staying prepared for any mission is what the reconnaissance Marines rely on for their success. The capability of parachuting provides the Marine Corps with the ability to place Marines in strategic places swiftly and silently.

has a secret apprentice? Well, duh, no — 'cause if you did know, he'd have to kill you. At least that's the story line in "Star Wars: The Force Unleashed," a new T-rated action game from LucasArts.

The action takes place while Vader and the emperor are consolidating their power after establishing the Galactic Empire at the end of what we Earthlings call "Episode III" of the "Star Wars' saga.

In the intro, you play as Vad-er, who's hunting a fugitive Jedi on the Wookies' home world. You get a taste of the action to come when you use the force to push those mangy fur balls off cliffs or fling them in to each other. It's

even stronger in the force — a son. Vader decides to tutor the youngster in the ways of the Dark Side and keep him secret, even from the emperor. The boy grows into Starkiller, your character in "The Force Unleashed."

Starkiller definitely rates high on the cool meter. He's young athletic and holds his lightsaber in an unorthodox behind-the back grip. His sidekicks are a hot starship pilot and a droid that's programmed to try to kill him - just to keep him on his

Your main job as Vader's aprentice involves hunting Jedi However, one of your early victims looks into your future and sees something more than the path of an assassin.

In fighting your battles, you'll

very handy but it's usually much more effective - and fun - to unleash the force. Examples:

The controls are efficient and easy to use - although you're likely to end up simply mashing buttons in battles that require more than a few combos

The graphics are quite good, with excellent character render ing and animations and some impressive environments. The levels are diverse and generally well constructed, offering plenty of opponents, secondary missions and a few puzzles. Some of the action gets a little repetitive, but not any more than in similar

The biggest problems are a few glitches that can trap you in corners, abrupt transitions between action and cut scenes and an occasionally wonky camera angle during boss battles. In the Wii version, which I

tested at the E3 Media and Busi-

ness Summit, the controls wer smooth, intuitive and very fun However, those still yearning to wield their Wii remote like lightsaber and have the action precisely duplicated onscreen will have to wait for another title. Control movements are still very stylized, with small swings and jabs translating in major onscreen action.







Kayak tours are a great way to kick back and enjoy scenery and wildlife found along local waterways of North Carolina and still get some exercise.

Kayak tours first started in May. The program is made possible by Semper Fit Recreation Division, Outdoor Recreation of Marine Corps Community Services. The division plans events for all military and family members. Participants must be at least 12 years of age or older. The lessons are free and no experience is necessary. Even if attendees are unable to swim, they can still participate in the

kayak tours. Space is limited to 11 spots, so authorized patrons must call to reserve a spot for kayak tours.

All gear needed for kayaking, including the kayak, paddle and life vest, is provided.

"The majority of people who sign up are beginners at kayaking," said Marybeth LeMaire the recreation outdoor specialist with the division. "The waters here are shallow, which makes it good for beginners.

Patrons who participate in kayak tours are shown hands-on how to manuever. They learn how to hold the paddle, use the foot rests for stability and balance while in the kayak. They also learn how to get back into the kayak if they capsize.

"The tours last around an hour to an hour and a half," said LeMaire. "We paddle out for about 30 minutes and then turn around and paddle back. Kayaking is a great way for people to relax, yet also get a workout. It

mainly works the core and upper back and it's a good change instead of running. It's a low impact sport.

There are several different types of kayaking, but the type the tours conduct is flatwater touring, which is meant for longer trips on smoother waters such as a lake, rather than a river or ocean.






