# 3/8 attends new Afghan Mojave Viper

MARINE CORPS AIR GROUND COMBAT CENTER TWENTYNINE PALMS, Calif. — Marines with 3rd Battalion, 8th Marine Regiment, completed the month-long predeployment training exercise known as Mojave Viper. The training is usually intended for units deploying to Iraq, but it has been modified to prepare the battalion for their upcoming tour in Afghanistan.

Once in country, the battalion will take over for 2nd Battalion, 7th Marine Regiment, who deployed in April and will perform combat operations in support of the Afghan military and security forces, said Lt. Col. David Odom, 3rd Battalion, 8th Marine Regiment's battalion commander.

The battalion arrived at the Combat Center the last week of August and immediately began the conventional combined arms, stability and support operations training, said Odom.

"This training is the capstone event, if you will, for infantry battalions that are getting ready to deploy to Iraq, or in our case, Afghanistan," he explained. "It is our opportunity to conduct combined-arms training on the desert floor with trainers, evaluators and the entire infrastructure to give us some final assessment and validation to the battalion prior to going on deployment."


Although this Mojave Viper is altered to prepare Marines for Afghanistan, the training has pretty much the same core elements tailored for units deploying to Iraq, with some minor tweaks, said Gunnery Sgt. Danny Watts, an instructor and evaluator with Tactical Training Exercise Control Group.

"In Afghanistan, you don't have as much of your patrolling operations inside dense cities as in Iraq, so we've been pushing them into more of the mountainous terrain we have out here, which is exactly what they'll see and have to traverse in Afghanistan," said Watts.

The Marine leadership in charge of Mojave Viper recently added Afghan role players to training scenarios serving as community members, street vendors, National Police and National Army, to interact with and challenge the Marines with the most realistic training available, said Watts.

Throughout Mojave Viper, dozens of instructors and evaluators, known as

# Officials urge military voters to send in absentee ballots

WASHINGTON – Service members overseas and other troops serving outside their home states need to fill out and forward their absentee ballots so their votes can be counted as part of the Nov. 4 federal and state elections, Defense Department officials said.

Scott Wiedmann, deputy director of DoD's Federal Voting Assistance Program, said during an interview with Pentagon Channel and American Forces Press Service reporters that some military voters may be waiting for ballots.

"Realizing that military members may be forward-deployed or at training for a period of time, upon returning they may find that their ballot has arrived," Wiedmann said. "We encourage individuals to vote that ballot from the state as soon as they get it."

Many states do allow ballot and registration requests well into this month, Wiedmann said.

Meanwhile, the Military Postal Service Agency and the U.S. Postal Service are working together to expedite the delivery of ballots to and from overseas

locales, Wiedmann said. Deadline dates for forwarding overseas ballots can be obtained from the MPSA Web site, hqdainet.army.mil/mpsa/vote.htm.

"The week immediately preceding the election, the U.S. Postal Service will express mail all of those ballots back to local officials to help ensure that they get back by the close of polls on Election Day." Wiedmann said.

Some 20 states allow for late counting of absentee ballots, Wiedmann said, as long as the ballots are signed, dated and postmarked by the day of election.

It's a myth, Wiedmann said, that absentee ballots for a general election contest only count during a close election. In fact, all properly submitted absentee ballots are counted in every general election.

"The localities want to ensure that all ballots that do arrive are counted and part of the final total of the election," Wiedmann said. "So, every ballot that's submitted does count."

Voters without state-supplied ballots can fill out the federal write-in absentee ballot, Wiedmann said, which has space

# Bush salutes mission, service members in Afghanistan

WASHINGTON — President George W. Bush cited the "incredible" progress that has been achieved in Afghanistan after he'd been briefed on the situation by U.S. Army Gen. David D. McKiernan, NATO's top commander there, Oct. 1

President Bush told reporters after meeting with the four-star general at the White House that Gen. McKiernan, commander of NATO's Inter-

House that Gen. McKiernan, commander of NATO's International Security Assistance Force in Afghanistan, is "going to make sure that we continue helping this young

democracy succeed."

Bush cited several examples of progress in Afghanistan, such as new and renovated schools, expanded education and health care, and the building of much-

needed roads.

"There's been progress when you consider the fact that millions of young girls go to school who didn't have a chance to go to school before in Afghanistan," President Bush said with Gen. McKiernan at his side. "That's in-

credible progress."

The president also acknowledged that challenges remain in Afghanistan. A rejuvenated insurgency is placing Afghan president Hamid Karzai's fledgling government under renewed attack in some eastern and southern portions of the country.

"Obviously, this is a situation where there's been progress and there are difficulties," President Bush said. Problems in



# Enjoy recreational activities, prevent off-duty injuries

Musculoskeletal injuries, especially those involving the legs, ankles and feet, are ng Marines' and sailors' most common non-battle related injuries. They account for a large majority of all sick-call visits and some medical discharges. The result of these injuries is a large number of lost workdays. The Naval Safety Center database, for example, shows the top six off-duty, lost workdays from recreational and sports injuries between FY2005 and FY2006 collectively accounted for 8,601 lost work days in Marine Corps

ranks alone. If you have suffered such an injury, it is recommended you visit the closest Sports Medicine and Reconditioning Team clinic. They'll minimize your downtime from off-duty recreational and sports injuries usually within 30 days of the first consultation, compared to 90 days before the SMART clinics were established. The benefits of the SMART clinic are a reduction in time for in-

jured Marines and sailors to get treatment for their musculoskeletal injuries, a reduction in lost man hours through a speedy return to duty, and prevention of future injuries through education. Keep in mind how debilitating injuries can be from sports activities and ensure you take all the precautions to enjoy the sport safely. Below are some tips to aid in heightening safety awareness so you can enjoy your favorite sport.

Participate in sports that

you're familiar with or have proper training in and stay within your abilities. If you only play once a week, don't expect to be able to play to the level of a professional athlete.

About 540,000 bicyclists visit emergency rooms with injuries every year, ensure you ride safely.

Stay hydrated, drink water throughout the day, not just during the activity, 6-8 ounces every 20 minutes.

Don't underestimate the use of Operational Risk Man-

agement in the off-duty capacity as well. In most cases, simply recognizing a hazard can help prevent a serious mishap from occurring.

Contact your nearest SMART clinic for sports injury prevention education for your command.



More than 200 Gortan citizens were seen by a local Iraqi doctor and doctors and corpsmen from 1st Bn., 2nd Marines, during the CME.

Gortan is a small community in the Habbaniyah district and the nearest hospital is in Ramadi, making it strenuous on the ill to make the trip for proper medical care, explained Petty Officer 3rd Class Andrew Harang, the company's senior corpsman.

"It's important we assist communities when we can, because it stimulates trust," he added. "At the same time it's crucial the police get the face to face with the citizens.'

The security for the engagement was provided by Iraqi Police, with Marines with 3rd platoon, Company C, providing over watch

"As police, it's our duty

to serve the community and protect them from terrorists," said an Iraqi police officer, who requested anonymity. "God willing, we allow for (engagements like this) to run smoothly so people can receive the help they need.'

Iraqi children gathered to collect toys and school supplies, which Iraqi Police handed out after children had been seen by the doc-

tor. Hundreds of pounds of food bags were also distributed among the families in attendance.

When it comes to the well being of the community, the Iraqi police and Marines share the same goal," said Harang. "A lot of the aid we provide is not (readily available), but with the police's help we accomplished a good service for



# Afghan Army's growth important to progress

WASHINGTON - Continuing to build the capacity and the strength of the Afghan National Army is strategically important to progress in Afghanistan and eliminating the insurgency's influence over the population, an official there said.

If the Afghan army can provide se-curity on its own, it would help to re-move the relationship between the insurgents and the populations they still influence, Marine Corps Col. Jeffrey Haynes, commander of Regional Corps Advisory Command Central, said in a teleconference with bloggers.

"As we continue to drive the wedge between the population and the insurgents, it will be harder and harder for (the insurgency) to operate," Haynes said. "That's one reason I continue to emphasize the Afghan National Army owning the problem and owning the battlespace and being seen by the people ... as being able to deliver se-

The Regional Corps Advisory Command Central, a multinational, jointservice command with about 750 members, trains and conducts combat operations with the Afghan National Army's 201st Corps, Haynes said. Their area of operation encompasses 11 provinces in and around Afghanistan's capital city of Kabul, he said.

The Afghans are leading combat operations in areas surrounding Kabul. 'We've got (Afghan soldiers) doing tremendous work out there," he said, "not having their hand held by the coalition in any means whatsoever.

A belief that insurgents have surrounded and are entangling the capital city are a myth, Haynes said. "(Though) they are having some hits every now and then around the capital," he said, those attacks are attempts by insurgents to create the false impression they have surrounded Kabul.

Haynes also said the insurgents are not strong fighters.

"You're not talking about really proficient fighters," he said. "You're just talking about guys who occasionally are tucked in with the civilian population and may get the drop on our folks."

In addition to security, Haynes said, the advisory command and the Afghan Army 201st Corps recently started a provincial reconstruction team to improve quality of life for local citizens. The reconstruction team already has met several times, he said, and is beginning to manage some development projects.

Understanding development and giving the people reason for hope is a key element in the counterinsurgency effort, Haynes said.

"Prosperity, employment, and of course security is the key to counterinsurgency," he said. "You know, it's a competition for the population.

# Combat engineer tears down barriers with Iraqi

FALLUJAH. CAMP Iraq-A Marine drives down a bumpy dirt path and comes to a stop beside several Iraqis. After a quick glance down at his English-to-Arabic dictionary, he smiled and said a new phrase in Arabic.

"I'm pretty much fluent in all languages," joked the Marine.

After a couple tries, some laughs, and help from the Iraqis with his pronunciation, Lance Cpl. Gregory Jeranek, has learned a new Arabic phrase to help him work with his Iraqi counterparts.

Previously he worked at the engineer shop as a carpenter and has helped complete countless projects including rebuilding Pumphouse Barney near Camp Falluiah with outstanding results, said Verduce.

"He is definitely a comedian and keeps not only the Marines' spirits high, but also the Iraqis'," said Ver-duce, who has worked with Jeranek for the past nine months of the deployment. 'He always creates a lighthearted environment."





The training is part of their month long Afghanistan-based Mojave Viper, which fulfills the battalion's predeployment requirements for their upcoming tour.

The Marines set up in forward operating bases, which they lived in and operated out of during the week long UWT, surrounding the range's mock Afghan village, Sara Kowt — complete with homes, market area and two mosques.

The training started with classes given by Mojave Viper instructors from Tactical Training Exercise Control Group, known as Coyotes. The classes refresh the Marines on basics of military operations, urban terrain, such as clearing rooms, hallways and stairs, urban movements and reactions to small-

"The purpose of all this training is a fine tuning," said 1st Lt. Adam Felde, the weapons platoon commander with the company. "It's our final phase of training, our last check in the box before we head to Afghanistan. Our Marines have seen this stuff before, and we have to just stick to the basic skills. Some of

these thing can become very complex, but we just have to make it as simple as possible, allowing the Marines to establish or just reaffirm the standard operating procedures we've been working on."

Once the classes were finished, the Marines moved onto the practical application portions of the training that rely heavily on realism, utilizing aspects such as firing weapons with blanks, simulated improvised explosive device explosions and actual Afghan role player interactions.

During the main portion of the training, platoons had to patrol a hostile area of the town with each squad receiving their own Afghan interpreter and Afghan National Army soldier to accompany them on their route. They talked and interacted with community members, elders and Afghan National Police and reacted to hostile fire by Taliban forces.

Cpl. Joseph Budrow, a squad leader with Weapons platoon said having actual Afghans play their roles during the training makes all the difference in the world in preparing the Marines for their tour.

"It's just outstanding," said Budrow, who has deployed to Iraq three times. "It makes our intent for this range exactly what our intent will be in country, which is to get information from the local populace and treat them with the respect and dignity that they deserve. And from there hopefully establish a relationship with them to where they feel trustworthy enough to give us information so we can do our jobs and get rid of the bad guys who are causing them harm."

The Marines also had to conduct

a first responder drill, in which each squad goes through a scenario of being the first ones on the scene of a mock explosion that causes several realistic and highly graphic casualties.

"The first responder class was really good, realistic training," Felde said. "We had Marines wounded, one with his legs completely blown off and a few civilian casualties as well. At that point, we focused on the squad taking tactical control – establishing security, talking to higher command, calling in the casualty evacuation and our senior corpsman took control of the situation. The Marines performed amazingly, despite the intense circumstances."

Capt. Sven Gosnell, the Company K commander, said that even though they most likely won't be using these skills as much as they would in the urban density of Iraq, they are still just as important to have.

"It's important we maintain these key skill sets even for Afghanistan," he said. "We may be fighting through a desert or mountainous environment and then have to go straight into a village and have to be able to provide security and civil affairs operations. It is very important to bring all this training together."

Gosnell said his Marines will have no problem utilizing all the skills they've honed and handling any objective thrown at them.

"They've performed excellently," he explained. "I have no doubt in their capabilities, from the individual Marines to the collective skills in the platoon and squad level. The Marines have been refining those skills, and they are phenomenal."



gunners, who generally do not spend much time on the weapon in this stage of Operation Iraqi Freedom.

"The main purpose of this range was to give our TOW gunners some training on the system — to let them engage deep targets with live TOW missiles with fire suppression," Barnes said. "It's an anti armor weapons system that was used largely at the beginning of OIF. We have strayed away from using them in combat, but we still bring them here for training."

Although the Marines fired at unmanned targets, the platoon still conducted this exercise with a heightened sense of awareness in a combat zone. Barnes said the platoon maintained security measures to ensure a safe training evolution.

"Out here, we take a lot more safety precautions," Barnes said. "It is very by the book. We set our heavy guns outside of the TOW with our medium machine guns. In training, we stop the fire suppression while the missile is fired so no bullets hit the missile and make it go haywire. We probably wouldn't do that in combat, but just like any other range, all of the safety precautions are taken here."

Barnes said with the daily operations his Marines perform, it is not often they

get to do combined-arms training in Iraq.

"Everyone is out here training to do what they learned in their MOS," Barnes said. "It's awesome for us to come out here and do what we initially trained to do."

Lance Cpl. Jeffery Evans, a TOW gunner with the platoon, was one of

the Marines who sharpened his skills with the weapon system. As a junior Marine, he said his last opportunity to train on the launcher was during training at the School of Infantry. He described his role as a TOW gunner in an infantry battalion.

"In case we ever go somewhere where the enemy is using armor, we practice using the TOW system so we can take out threats," Evans said. "The experience is unbelievable. As soon as you pull that trigger and hear it kick, it's like going 140 (miles per hour) on the interstate. Your adrenaline starts kicking because you know what's about to happen."

Evans said that without training, it can be difficult to keep a missile on target. While Marines fire machine guns down range and coordinate with each other, the TOW operators prepare the launcher with a high-explosive round and sight in on their target. All the movements must be done safely and precisely.

"Your first time can be pretty difficult," Evans said. "But, it just takes practice. As far as the safety precautions, we do it all the same as in SOI. But, we still have to load the missile quickly and execute everything on time."

Evans summed up the training day as a break away from the platoon's regular business, to come out and do what TOW gunners do best.

"Just being out here with your buddies, who are the same guys you go on patrol with every day—they normally don't get to see what the TOW gunners are trained to do," Evans said. "But, we got to shoot some missiles today, and it felt pretty good."



# MarCent transfers Marine duties in Africa

NAVAL SUPPORT ACTIVITY, Bahrain - Effective Oct. 1, Marine Corps Forces Central Command transferred operational control of Marine Corps forces in the Horn of Africa region to the recently established Marine Corps Forces Africa based in Stuttgart, Germany.

To support the inception of U.S. Africa Command, Headquarters, the Marine Corps directed that MarForAf be established. MarCent and MarForAf staff working groups have been planning the transfer of related Marine Corps forces, equipment and missions to MarForAf.

"MarCent was crucial in the smooth and seamless transition of command to MarForAf," said Maj. Blas Avila, action officer the transition. "We are now holding the reins and are committed to maintaining the high level of work and professional-ism upheld under MarCent."

Additionally, AfriCom became fully operational Oct. 1 as well. During the past year, AfriCom's staff has been in the process of integrating responsibilities and missions previously carried out by U.S. European Command, U.S. Central Command and U.S. Pacific Command. This new joint, interagency geographical combatant command encompasses the entire continent of Africa excluding Egypt.

MarCent maintains deployed established coordination elements throughout the CentCom area of responsibility. In the Horn of Africa, MarCent Command Element, Djibouti has uccessfully transitioned from MarCent headquarters' "eyes on the ground" over to MarForAf.

"Until now, the MarCent Command Element, Djibouti has facilitated support for Marine Corps forces operating in the Horn of Africa," said Col. Michael W. Pierce, MCE-DJ officer in charge. "We have been critical in coordinating the deployment and employment of MarCent forces in the region. Additionally, we represent the MarCent headquarters in component-level interaction with Combined Joint Task Force -Horn of Africa and Camp Lemonier. Although our parent command is now MarForAf, our mission remains the same.'

Camp Lemonier, home base to the new MarForAf Command Element as well as to CJTF-HOA, is also changing hands as Naval Forces Central Command transfers command and control to NavAf in Djibouti. Their formation was made official Oct. 1

The Marine provisional security companies are the camp's first line of defense. Their mission is to deter, detect, defend and mitigate terrorist activity to provide a stable operating posture for CJTF-HOA from Camp Lemonier. Additionally, they conduct contingency security missions to the U.S. embassy, Djibouti and the Port of

"Camp Lemonier is our home away from home," said Col. Pierce. "The PSC keeps it well guarded, both inside and out, so the CJTF-HOA can execute its mission successfully.

The Marine Corps also provides rotor airlift capability to the mission in the Horn of Africa. A detachment of CH-53E Sea Stallion helicopters supply the heavy airlift for CJTF-HOA missions in the region.

"The HMH detachment is our main method of transport in the Horn of Africa," said Gunnery Sgt. Miguel A, RiveraCruz, MCE-DJ staff noncommissioned officer in charge. "They provide us with a far reach capability that is crucial to the mission

In addition, MarCent has sourced and deployed a number of Marine individual augmentees, both officer and enlisted, who comprise a vital portion of the CJTF-HOA staff.

The CJTF-HOA comprises more than 1,500 people from all branches of the U.S. military, coalition forces and partner nations, with an AOR covering the airspace, land areas and coastal waters of Comoros. Diibouti, Eritrea, Ethiopia, Kenya, Madagascar, Mauritius, Seychelles, Somalia, Sudan and Yemen. Since its creat the command has trained the host nations militaries deployed French Foreign gion forces, built schools, ics and hospitals, dug wells assisted in a multitude of curren manitarian missions.



ghan government to provide good governance and to improve its connectivity with the Afghan people by providing community aid projects and infrastructure improvements.

"I want to thank your family as well as all the other families who are standing by those who wear the uniform as this nation continues to defend our own security and defend young democracies," President Bush said.

During their five-year reign in Afghanistan, the Taliban routinely cut off the heads of people who didn't agree with their radical Islamic philosophy. The Taliban also cooperated with Osama bin Laden's al-Qaida terrorist group and allowed it to establish training camps in Afghanistan. The Taliban were kicked out of power in Afghanistan during Operation Enduring Freedom that was launched soon after the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks.

Gen. McKiernan and the rough-32,000 U.S. troops currently serving in Afghanistan are making sacrifices today, President Bush said, "so that future generations of Americans don't have to worry about harm coming from a place like Afghanistan and future generations of Afghans can grow up in a hopeful society.'

Coyotes, teach classes, give demonstrations and follow the Marines during scenarios to serve as a kind of referee and give their expert opinions on the Marines' performances, Watt explained.

"Our job is to watch the scenarios and make sure they're played out correctly and as realistically as possible," he said. "The Coyotes make any changes that need to be done on the spot to help the Marines any way we can.'

Since arriving at Camp Wilson, the main operating base for Marines at Mojave Viper, the battalion has been pushed from day one, starting from fire-team all the way to battalion level training, said Odom.

"It has been the progressive crawl, walk and run approach, but once we got everyone settled in, we immediately went out to the ranges where we were able to do basic combined arms integration at the fire team, squad and platoon levels," he said. "We eventually progressed into the deliberate assault course, where the battalion's headquarters commanded and controlled a mechanized task force, utilizing combined-arms from aviation, artillery and then the striking power of the battalion for that decisive affect.

The unique quality amount of training in the Afghanistan-centered Mojave Viper is exactly what an infantry battalion preparing to deploy needs, Odom explained. "Simply put, I think the train-

ing is right where it needs to be for a unit about to head out to Afghanistan," he said.

With all he has observed so far, Odom said he is confident about how his Marines will perform once in theater.

"They're doing magnificent, every day I see them. They're learning, they're focused, they're ready and they're taking care of each other," he said. "There is no doubt in my mind they're absolutely ready to accomplish their mission of assisting and helping the Afghan populace.

3rd Battalion,8th Marine Regiment's next step after completing Mojave Viper is to return home to North Carolina and finalize administrative and logistical details prior to their deployment in the coming weeks.





Since the very beginning, the place has held wood ducks - those most beautiful of birds that, unlike many other waterfowl species, breed across the South and there-fore can be found here year-round.

The numbers of birds has fluctuated, sometimes as few as 10. sometimes as many as ... well, I really don't want to say, but the presence of wood ducks has been constant. I have also seen, on occasion, Canada geese, green-winged toal and hooded mergansers.

I have told only two of my clos est hunting buddies about it, and I cannot express to you how excited the three of us were to give the wamp a whirl on the recent early season opening day.

In North Carolina, the waterfowl hunting season is actu-

We waded down to the head of the swamp and threw out half-a-dozen wood duck decoys and a handful of green-wing teal blocks.

As we stood around talking, the skies started to brighten and legal shooting time approached. With 10 minutes to go, we took our positions on the edge of the swamp and waited for the ducks to fly. And fly they did.

The first group of three passed erhead, and we shot one out of the flight. As the dog hit the water to re trieve our prize, startled wood ducks rose up from all over the swamp. How many? I'd rather not guess.

The action was steady throughout the first 20 minutes, and we quickly secured seven woodies in short order, just two shy of our three-man limit. While my companions worked with the dog to lo cate a downed bird (she found it), I sat tight and "guarded" the decoys. I was rewarded for my laziness with a late-flying drake that came by just inside my comfort zone.

With eight birds in the bag, we collected our gear and considered ourselves very lucky men indeed. Until next time

Gilardi arrives in Annapolis after spending the last eight years in Columbus, Ohio, as a member of the Ohio State lacrosse program, four as a player and the last four as a coach.

"Anthony is a tremendous young coach who issudes enthusiasm," said Meade, who is in his 15th season guiding the Midshipmen. "He brings with him a wealth of experience at this level and is well respected among the coach-ing community. Without a doubt, I think his personality lends itself to him being a tremendous communicator who will interact well with our players. In particular, I believe he'll be an asset to our attackmen."

I am excited for the opportunity to work at the United States Naval Academy," said Gilar-di, who will work with the Navy offense alongside second-wear assistant coach Stan Ross. "This is a great opportuni ly for me to continue to grow and learn both professionally and personally from Coach Moade and Coach Ross."

One of the most talked about teams in collegiate la rough the last few years has been Ohio State and its ability to emerge as one of the contenders among the traditional powers. A year later, the Buckeyes earned their second-consecutive NCAA Tournament berth by way of deciming their first outright GWLL title with a 5-0 record. Anchored by his co-captain Gilardi, who was one of the top joint producers (41) and nexist (24) men in the country in 2004. Breachi's Buckeyes turned in a 12-4 record, the most wins by the program since 1968, fromically, one of their 12 wins was against a Nevy team who would go on to win a school owned 15 games and earn a date with Syracuse in the 2004 NCAA Men's Lacrosse Champsonship.

idards, who was named Ohio State's offensive MVP in 2004, stands 13th on the school's all-time scoring list wi \$35 points on 75 goals and 58 assuts. Meanwhile, his 58 ets are the ninth most by a Buckeye

While he was rited multiple times for his play on the field, Gilardi also was rampaized for his success in the classeroom. A three-time scholar-athlete selection, he received Academic All-Rig Ten honors in 2003 and 2004. Alls earned a bacholor of science degree in history in 2004 Postgraduate Scholar-Athlete Scholarship.

Though his collegiate playing days came to an end Gilardi signed a free-agent contract to play with the Long Island Lizards of Major League Lacrosse in 2004. He played with the organization for two seasons

Upon graduation, Gilardi began his coaching career by working with both the Ohio State and Denison lacross

programs. As the co-offensive coordinator at Denison during the 2004-05 campaign, he helped develop two All-North Coast Athletic Conference attackmen and led the Big Red to the Division III NCAA Tournament. Additionally, he was responsible for creating game plans and breaking down film, while developing and implementing speed and agility

programs.
That same year, Gilardi signed on as a volunteer assistant coach at his alma mater where he worked with the attack on a one-on-one basis. His knowledge of both the program and the game gave him an edge over his peers as Breschi hired Gilardi as a full-time ass tant coach in 2006. In his new role, Gilardi





# Phelps honored with parade, salute

Michael Phelps was formally welcomed home Saturday with a two-pronged celebration that began with a parade and ended with a fireworks show

at historic Fort McHenry.
Phelps was the focal point
of the "Parade of Gold", which served as a homecoming for Maryland's Olympic heroes, most notably the swimmer who won a record-setting eight gold medals at the Beijing Games this summer.

An estimated 5,000 people lined the streets of Towson for the parade, according to Baltimore County police
The festivities t

then moved to Fort McHenry, birthplace of "The Star-Spangled Banner." Wearing a dress shirt, sports jacket and jeans, Phelps walked onto the makeshift stage to cheers from thousands of people, many of whom arrived several hours before the event.

"There's no better place to be than right here in Baltimore!" he told the crowd.

The "Star-Spangled Salute" started with a recap of Phelps' performance in China and featured a speech by Gov. Martin O'Malley and Baltimore Mayor Sheila Dixon. It also included a visit from Phelps' mother, Debbie, who received a big bug from bar soon. ceived a big hug from her son.

The ceremony concluded with fireworks above Baltimore's harbor.

At the parade, Phelps wore sunglasses, jeans, a T-shirt and a brightly colored jacket. He waved to admiring fans from within an open-air military vehicle on a gorgeous autumn afternoon. Those in at-

tendance waited months to pay homage to the Baltimore native, whose haul in China raised to 14 his career gold medals.


Lining the 1 and a half mile route, many onlookers held red, white, and blue signs. Participants in the parade passed under large American flag strung between the ladders of two fire trucks.

Caroline Dill, 13, was in position with four friends more than three hours before the parade began.

"He's an amazing person because he won eight gold medals and beat Mark Spitz's record," Dill said of Phelps. "Plus, he's from here.

The parade also honored swimmer Katie Hoff, who won three medals at the Beijing Games, and Special Olympians and Paralympians.

The city staged a parade for Phelps after the 2004 Games. After his amaz-ing performance in Beijing, the city arranged a two-part affair, at a cost estimated to be \$300,000, in anticipation of far bigger crowds this time around.







The Naples, Fla., native wanted to serve his country, and he did so with honor, serving with 2nd Battalion, 8th Marine Regiment, in Iraq. Joseph was struck by a roadside bomb, Nov. 11, 2006, causing severe nerve damage to his legs. He thought his Marine Corps career, one of the things defining his life, was over.

"When I would go home, my sons would run around saying, 'Come on daddy, play with us,' and I would think, 'How can I keep up with them?'" said Joseph,

a wounded warrior with Wounded Warrior Battal-ion East. "It brought tears to my eyes. I cried every

Joseph was placed on several prescription drugs to alleviate his pain. However, he said the only time they worked was when he

was lying in bed.
"My bedroom was a dingy, dark prison. I couldn't do anything by myself. I couldn't even take a bath without help," said Jo-seph, beginning to choke up. "I was a prisoner of a war taking place in my

Joseph broke out of his prison July 8, when he became the first Marine aboard Camp Lejeune to receive a revolutionary spinal cord stimulator procedure. The cell phone-sized implant, which is at-tached to nerve endings in the spine, tricks the brain into believing there is no



An X-ray of Joseph's spine shows where the nerve stimulator implant is attached to his body. The implant's magnetic battery can be charged wirelessly and can hold a two-week charge. Courtesy Photo

The stimulator sends an electric current through the spine, confusing the nerves and stopping them from sending impulses to the brain that lets it know the body is in pain, Cmdr. Jerry Foltz, the pain management specialist at the Naval Hospital, explained.

The procedure has a 75 percent success rate, low risk of complications and is reversible if necessary.

Joseph was terrified of the operation at first; he dreaded the thought of another surgery after

# Right on target: New weapons system success for 1/8 Marines

Marines with Weapons Company, 1st Battalion, 8th Marine Regiment, 2nd Marine Division, fired a new weapons system at G-3 range, Sept. 26.

The M-41 Saber, a tube-launched, optically tracked, wired command linked missile, or TOW, recently replaced the M-220 E4

"The Saber system is a huge im-ovement from the old system," said Sgt. Dan Colt, a TOW gunner

for the company.

According to Colt, the M-41 provides long range, heavy antitank capabilities, better optics, and has an improved target acquisition system and target tracker. He said the Saber has a 90 percent chance of hitting the target, as compared to 63 percent with the previous

We hit nine out of nine targets today with the Saber system," said Colt. "I've been a TOW gunner for about six years, and this is the first time I have seen us hit nine out of

Pfc. Travis Welker, an assaultman with the company, fired the M-41 for the first time.

"Hitting nine of nine targets was incredible," said Welker. "It's like throwing a touchdown in football or getting a clutch shot in basketball. You want to make your shots count."

Colt said hitting 100 percent target accuracy indicated the vast improvement in the new Saber system. He praised the improved optical ability on the M-41, saying it was currently the most powerful

### **VOTING AND** NON-CITIZENS

Non-citizens, even if they are legal permanent residents, cannot vote in any national, state or local election that requires the voter to be a U.S. Citizen.

Nearly all jurisdictions require U.S. citizenship for voting.

Illegal voting by a non-citizen can derail a citizenship application, prevent entry into the United States, and even make a non-citizen deportable.

Non-Citizens may contact the Board of Elections or the Camp Lejeune Legal Assistance Office for information concerning voting eligibility.

"Joseph has come a long way," said Foltz. "The first step taken to ease Joseph's pain was medication, which in some cases is all we need to do. We also try to relieve the pain with nerve blocks. Nerve blocks, when the proposed in the proposed in the part of the blocks numb the nerves much like an epidural, but nothing was working for (Joseph). So, I approached him with the option of a surgery to implant the stimulator.

After a seven-day trial period to ensure the device would have the desired affect on Joseph, Foltz gave the go-ahead

foltz gave the go-anead to proceed.

"The results of the stimulator were instantaneous," said Foltz.

"The implant was the obvious choice for (Joseph) to have a shot at a normal life again." normal life again.

Joseph compared the stimulator to a light switch. When he flipped the switch, he said the pain disappeared.

The pain stays away for hours, even after the device is turned off. It has a wireless charger so he can conveniently charge the system once every two weeks.

Third party ticketing on or off base

Active-duty officers and staff noncommissioned officers who observe unsafe driving by suspected Marines or sailors may report such behavior using the following guidelines:

1. Do not commit unsafe or unlawful acts get license plate or For your safety, do not attempt to confront suspect drivers.

2. Record the suspect vehicle license plate, state, vehicle description, driver description, alleged traffic offense, time and location.

3. Use the following Web site to submit your complaint: www. lejeune.usmc.mil/mcb/3rdparty.pdf. Complaintants may also submit intractions in person at Bldg 43. The point of contact for all traffic complaints is the PMO Operations Division at 451-5702 or 451-4316. For PMO Dispatch, please call 451-3004/3005.

4. For on-base complaints submitted by active-duty officers and SNCOs, PMO will write a DD I 408 citation and notify the suspected Marine of their traffic court date.

The complainant will be required to be present at traffic court to describe the offense. For off-base complaints, PMO will obtain the suspect's information from law enforcement data bases PMO will then contact the suspect Marine's command and notify them of the alleged offense.

# me review: 'Rock Band 2' twice as nice

The rock wars are starting to

roll. Harmonix, MTV Games and Electronic Arts have released "Rock Band 2" for the Xbox 360 — a full month before Activision's "Guitar Hero: World Tour" goes on sale.

It's a move that might help the "Rock Band" franchise gain some ground on the immensely popular "Guitar Hero." How-ever, this is a battle that will be decided by the quality of the instrument-shaped controllers and the depth of the song lists. In both areas, the T-rated "Rock Band" looks good.

Harmonix has improved its controllers quite a bit. The new guitar's fret buttons and strum bar are a lot less stiff, which

makes them feel more responsive. The biggest improvement to the drums is they're now wireless, which means you'll have less to trip over when you're rocking out. The drum kit is also sturdier and more sensitive. In fact, the pads can sense the intensity of the impact, which makes the experience feel

more realistic.

"Rock Band" veterans will immediately notice these changes make the guitar and drums much more forgiving. Each of us was easily able to play at higher difficulty levels than we had with the original version of the game. This should answer complaints that the game was more difficult than "Guitar Hero."

At this point, you can't buy the game and controllers in a package together. You'll have to buy them separately — for a total of \$230 — or rely on controllers from the original "Rock

If none of that sounds appealing, you'll have to wait about a month. The Special Edition version of the game, including a guitar, drums and microphone, is due Oct. 19 for Xbox 360 and most other plat-forms. It will cost \$190. If you really want that rock star vibe, and have a few extra bucks, you can spend \$300 for an ION drum set and \$70 for a Fender Precision Bass Guitar Control-

Harmonix said the game "is compatible with most music game controllers." However, the

game controllers." However, the opposite isn't necessarily true. The "RB2" guitar didn't work on "Guitar Hero III."

The 84-track song list is quite diverse. Titles range from oldies, such as The Who's "Pinball Wizard," to Panic at the Disco's "Nine in the Afternoon" from earlier this year. It also includes the first tracks pro vided by ACDC and Bob Dylan

for use in a video game. Harmonix officials have boasted they'll have more than 500 songs available for "Rock Band 2" by the end of the year. In addition to the game's stanBand" or download material from the constantly growing library on Xbox Live and the

PlayStation Network. Everyone should be able to find plenty of songs they like,

although they might have to pay a few extra bucks.

"Miracle at St Anna" is a dark World War II drama with a mystery surrounding a long-lost artifact.



# Bob Hamer turned Marine Corps discipline into stellar FBI career

Bob Hamer, a former Marine and father of a Marine, took the discipline and honor instilled in him as a Marine and fashioned a courageous career as an undercover Federal Bureau of Investigations agent out of it.

Hamer's son, 1st Lt. Joe Hamer, has a home aboard Camp Lejeune with his wife and son and serves as logistics officer with 3rd Battalion, 8th Marine Regiment which recently trained for combat at Mojave Viper.

for combat at Mojave Viper.

After enlisting in the Corps in 1970, the elder Hamer went on to attend law school and become a Judge Advocate General officer at Marine Corps Base Camp Pendleton from 1975 through 1979.

From that experience he

From that experience he learned many things. One was that he was looking for more excitement than the life of a trial lawyer. Yet he also came to understand the intricacies of federal rules of evidence.

"My experience in the courtroom put me at a level where I
knew what it took to get.a federal conviction," said Hamer. As
a foreshadowing of his latter career, such knowledge was gold.

"One thing the Marine Corps

"One thing the Marine Corps taught me was to be decisive," said Hamer. "It frustrated me at the FBI that nobody could make a decision. The Marine Corps taught me that a good plan executed is better than an excellent plan discussed."

When preparing to leave the Corps, Hamer applied at both the FBI and the Central Intelligence Agency. Though he called the CIA recruitment experience an exciting process, he ended up at the FBI.

"I thought they were looking for someone who could parachute behind enemy lines and be picked up three months later after they have assassinated some third world leader," said Hamer.

Thus, he may have skewed a few of his answers to questions on the FBI's personality test and ended up scoring an unprecedented zero, meaning he had the personality of someone who could be quite comfortable being marooned for years on a desert island.

Upon joining the FBI, Hamer reported to San Diego where he worked on the bureau's criminal squad.

"It was a tremendous experience," he remembered. "It was kind of the cops and robbers experience

Within six months he was assigned investigate an interstate stolen property ring which gave Hamer his his first opportunity to work undercover. In today's FBI, that opportunity would take much longer to obtain as rookmost

ies must now wait a minimum of three years to apply to work undercover.

Hamer's FBI career spanned 26 years. Though most agents only stay in the undercover world for a brief period, Hamer lingered for his whole career bringing down members of organized crime, street gangs, terrorist cells and child predators.

"There's no greater high than becoming one of them without really becoming one of them," said-Hamer of his skill in infiltrating crime circles.

His preparation included studying up on the crime, drugs, learning the buzz words of the criminal insiders, creating a cover story and maybe sporting fake prison tattoos.

When Hamer went undercover inside the North American Man/Boy Love Association, a group

which advocates the legalization of sexual relations between adult males and underage boys, he used a cast-off Salvation Army cane toform his undercover persona.

"What struck me was how normal a lot of these men looked. Obviously, you had your central casting-type folks. But, most of them were high-functioning individuals with productive jobs in society," Hamer recalled.


After his tirement dur-ing March 2004, Hamer wrote a recently released book about his FBI work called "The Last Undercover: The true story of an FBI agent's dangerous dance with evil." Though the book discusses other assignments during his undercover work, Hamer wrote it mainly to expose NAMBLA and make parents aware of pedophilia.

As a result of the sting, the organization is essentially on its last leg, said Hamer, adding that doesn't mean pedophilia is dead.

As such, Hamer uses a simple acronym, ACT, to help parents keep their children safe. It stands for affirm, communicate and trust.

Hamer said parents must affirm their children and help them build a strong self-esteem. They must keep lines of communication open so their children will talk with them about issues troubling them. Finally, parents must trust a child's instincts. If their child does not want to be around a certain adult, then don't force them to, said Hamer. The child may sense something the parent cannot see.

He also suggests that parents attend their children's sports


practices, ballet lessons and other activities as much as possible to be in the know about their children's lives and with whom they associate.

Hamer is pleased he was able to do some good for society through his FBI career.

"I found (being undercover) thrilling and exciting. My favorite course in college was deviant be-

havior, and during my career, I m or portrayed everyone I had studi about in college," he said.




