## **Bush, Rumsfeld** support diplomatic policy toward Iran

WASHINGTON United States and its allies are pursing a diplomatic course

with Iran, and news reports suggesting that a U.S. attack on U.S. attack on Iran is in the works "get into fantasy land," Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld told P e n t a g o n reporters Tuesday. "Let me be ar," Rumsfeld clear," Rumsfeld said. "The depart-ment's policy is the president's policy."

And that poli-cy, as President George W. Bush described it Monday at Johns H o p k i n s University's Paul H. Nitze School of A d v a n c e d International Studies, is to use a multinational, diplomatic Rur approach to get Iran to abandon its nuclear

weapons ambitions. weapons ambitions.

"We do not want the Iranians to have a nuclear weapon, the capacity to make a nuclear weapon, or the knowledge as to how to make a nuclear weapon," Bush told the audience. "That's our stated goal. It's also the goal, fortunately, of other ... friends and

Whether it's an Eagle, Globe and Anchor, "Mom," the letters U. S. M. C. or a fire-breathing dragon complete with dagger-like fangs and razor sharp claws hold-ing a skull, Marines come home from leave and liberty with all kinds of the form of body modifi-

cation known as the tattoo Over the years and during war time, the art of tattooing has become increasingly popular with members of the Corps, even a rite of passage for some. However, as with many other vices that Marines pick up, they must maintain standards and common sense when dealing in ink that is considered permanent and sends significant of the considered permanent significant of the considered permanent significant sidered permanent and sends signals to people about your beliefs

and who you are.

"The old saying, 'Never mess with a guy who buys ink by the barrel,' not only applies to tattoo artists and publishers, but it also applies to the administrative system in the Marine Corps that could issue the paper work that will deny your re-enlistment, said Maj.

In other areas of the body, tattoos or brands that are prejudicial to good order, discipline and morale, or are of a nature to bring discredit upon the Marine Corps, are also upon the Marine Corps, are also prohibited.

# **CAC card access makes** logins, passwords obsolete

A Department of Defense mandated policy to improve computer network security will affect most of Camp Lejeune's population - Marines, sailors and civilians - starting Friday.

Everyone logging onto Navy Marine Corps Intranet computers will be required to use their common access card and six to

common access card and six to eight-digit personal identifica-tion number, eliminating the use of user name and password for

account access.

The change will not effect users of legacy network domains, according to Maj.

Allen Harper, information technology officer, II Marine Expeditionary Force.

"Once the cryptographic log in is implemented, individuals will not be able to use their old user name, and password to user name and password to access their computers," said Ashley Clontz, Public Key Ashley Clontz, Public Key Infrastructure local registration authority. "The entire Marine authority. "The entire Marine Corps will be implementing the

During the registration process, two scripts will be run. One will occur automatically, first time an individual reboots April 14. The second script must be run before May 31, according to Harner.

## Alcohol abuse can lead to risky decisions, death

Many Marines and other Americans celebrate special occasions with alcohol. But those celebrations can turn deadly when binge drinking is involved.

Binge drinking is the consumption of large quantities of alcohol in a short period of time; four or more drinks in a row for a woman, or five or more drinks in a row for a man, according to Caroline Graham. according to Caroline Graham, alcohol prevention specialist for Semper Fit Health Promotion.

Binge drinking may be part of the lifestyle of some young Marines, who think that heavy

drinking is what they are "sup-posed to do," according to Graham. When new enlisted personnel enter the military culture and barracks environment, they face many new challenges and opportunities, such as inde-pendence from parental control, the need to conform to military standards and the insecurity of a

standards and the insecurity of a new social setting.

About one-third of high school seniors and 42 percent of college students reported at least one occasion of binge drinking within a two week period, according to a nation-al survey. In the Marine Corps, more than 40 percent of junior enlisted personnel engage in binge drinking,

according to Graham.
Unfortunately, this behavior can result in risky decisions or

even death.

Recently a battalion lost a
21-year-old Marine because of
binge drinking. The Marine
passed out after heavy drinking,
and when his friends tried to
wake him up later, they discovered that he was not breathing.

"Sometimes when you are young, you think you're invin-cible," Graham said. "You don't think about the consequences."

According to the Centers for

Control Prevention, the four leading injury-related causes of death among youths under the age of 20 are motor vehicle crashes,

homicides, suicides and drowning. Alcohol is involved in a large percentage of those

Graham remembers talking to a Marine in the brig who said he had done something while he was drunk and he "wished he

was drunk and he "wished he would have died."

The Marine had played a "trust" game where he and his friends held another friend off of a third-story balcony. The friend slipped through his fingers, fell to the ground and died.

"When the alcohol wears."

"When the alcohol wears off, reality hits," Graham said. "It's not bad people, it's bad decisions

One thing is clear, she said:

"If you are not responsible when it comes to alcohol, the consequences can be very cost-

"Marines would not think of going into combat without a plan, because they or their fellow Marines might die. The same holds true for partying with alcohol: Without a plan,

someone might die."

Even those who choose not by the those who chose hot binge drink must be aware of what their friends and fellow partiers are doing. A party host can be held liable if they provide alcohol to someone, and that person leaves and kills himself or others. Marines who







## Tips for surviving on the roads



# Marine from Missouri unfazed by combat injuries in Iraq

HADITHA, Iraq — Lance Cpl. Matt Calvert accepts the wound he received March 25 from a rocket-propelled grenade attack in Iraq. It comes with the territory of

attack in Iraq. It comes with the territory of being a Marine in a combat zone. The infantryman from Blue Springs, Mo., said he was unfazed by the wound, caused when insurgents attacked his unit's patrol in western Al Anbar province. "I did not hear the insurgent fire the rocket-propelled grenade until the round exploded against the wall near me," said Calvert, 22. Calvert was injured when shrappel from

Calvert was injured when shrapnel from a rocket-propelled grenade caught him in the chest and neck when his platoon came under attack at the Euphrates River Valley city. Calvert was

Calvert was providing security at an intersection of two major roads in the heart of Haditha when his platoon, part of the Hawaii-based 3rd Battalion, 3rd Marine Regiment, was attacked. The small arms attack carps as the small arms attack came as the Marines were leaving the city to return to their forward

operating base, he said.

Reflecting on the incident several days later at the Marines' base, Calvert credits his body armor as saving his life. If it wasn't for the thick, armored plates in his vest, he's certain the shrapnel could have been lethal he said. lethal, he said.

"I was full of adrenaline, so I did not feel any pain at all," said Calvert, who also saw combat during a deployment to Afghanistan last year. "I remember feeling a sharp pain in my shoulder blade under my protective vest. I knew something had penetrated it."

As he speaks, he holds his M-16 A4 service rifle closely. His weapon never leaves his side, he said.
Calvert and the rest of the battalion's Marines arrived in Iraq about a month ago. In that time, they've focused their efforts

on disrupting insurgent activity in the "Triad" region of Hadithah, Haqliniyah, and Barwanah – three of the most popu-

lous towns in the area.

Though previous Marine units have spent more than a year combating the insurgency, there is still more work to insurgency, there is still more work to be done, as evidenced by the recent attack on Calvert's platoon as well as the frequent improvised explosive devices the Marines have encountered since arriving here.

But while IEDs and occasional insurgent attacks are nothing new to Coalition Forces operating in Al Anbar province, Calvert's perseverance in the face of danger seems to have inspired others in the unit – a testament that one man's actions can inspire others.

man's actions can inspire oth-

Cpl. Robert Janson, 22, witnessed the attack. He was on patrol with Calvert that day, and says he could not believe Calvert's reaction to the attack

"Calvert just brushed "Calvert just brushed this attack on his life off like it was nothing," said Janson, one of the unit's squad leaders. "All he cared about was getting back out on patrol four hours later to find those responsible for the attack."

After reinforcements ware called.

After reinforcements were called out to the scene of the attack, Calvert's wounds were treated and he was medically evacuated to the Marines' base. Though he's still recovering, his wounds have not deterred him from helping the Iraqi people and finding those responsible for the attack, he

"The only thing the insurgents accom-plished that day was heighten the Marines' awareness to an even higher level and make

awareness to an even higher level and make them more determined to hunt them down and bring them to justice," Calvert said. More importantly, such attacks will not hinder the progress of the Iraqi Army or the growth of Iraqi communities, said Calvert. The Marines "are suppressing the few insurgents that remain in the area," he

Even though he's injured, Calvert still keeps the sense of humor he is known for in his unit, keeping morale up with his witty banter, said Janson.

"We can still count on him to drop his one-liners that make us all laugh," said Janson. "He is a great Marine and can be counted on for anything. He brings morale to the squad with his level of motivation and his sense of humor."

Humor aside, Calvert takes his job, and the welfare of his fellow Marines, his "brothers," quite seriously.

"I am focused on becoming a corporal... and leading troops," said Calvert, whose brown eyes give away his seriousness on the subject, as does the slightly deeper tone in his voice when he speaks of the other Marines in his unit.

"Calvert is going to make a good leader of Marines," agreed Janson.

A promotion to corporal would make Calvert a noncommissioned officer — a small-unit leader.

But for this two-time combat veteran, leadership means more than adding anoth-

But for this two-time combat veteran, leadership means more than adding another stripe to the black, metal rank insignia on his collar. For Calvert, a promotion means added responsibility to protect his Marines and ensure their mission is complete before their externs.

Marines and ensure their mission is complete before they return to their base in Hawaii later this year.

"I am not going to hold onto the fact that I was hurt; and I, or another one of the Marines, can be hurt again," he said. "I am going to accomplish my mission here and return home to my family. That is also what I am going to make sure the other Marines are going to do."



Curtis said that even though he is familiar with the areas around Fallujah, he understands that some things likely changed since his last deployment.

"It's helpful to know the terrain and atmosphere, but a lot has changed," Curtis added.

The Dragoons, as the company is known, supported 1st Battalion, 1st Marine Regiment soon after arriving during a sweeping operation in the battalion's zone. The company used their speed and mobility to quickly establish blocking position as grunts from the battalion searched for insurgents.

The company's most recent mission was an extended security operation into the Northern Regimental Security Area, a rural area located north of RCT-5's area of operations.

"We are perfect to work in the NRSA because of our unique capabilities of because of our unique capabilities of speed and firepower," said Capt. Hunter "Ripley" Rawlings, the 34-year-old company commander from Boulder, Colo. "We are able to move quickly and get around the enemy's rear area, disrupting his command and control, supply and training areas. Basically, we can get into his comfort zone and poke him in the eye."

The company spent several days keeping the highways clear of roadside bombs, establishing observation posts and looking

establishing observation posts and looking for insurgents.

They performed a critical mission, Nastase said. "They allowed us to maintain a presence in areas we might otherwise be unable to address."

The change of scenery has been a welcome event for some the company's Marines.

## Engineers ge creative on the battlefield

GHARMAH, Iraq — A new tool could be the answer to locating caches in the sands of Iraq. Combat engineers created a new device to help them locate weapons

buried in the dirt.

It's a simple three-foot pole. It's just about the perfect tool for Marines – not very technical and tough to

"I read in a report that Iraqis were using a metal pole to locate caches buried in the dirt," said 2nd Lt. Joshua Guide, the 30-year-old combat engineer officer from San Clemente, Calif. "I went off their idea and had our Marines try our version of the probe out too."

With the word from the lieutenant, the engineers were hard at work coming up with a design of the tool. The Marines put their ingenuity I read in a report that



CAMP MERCURY, Iraq Darkhorse Marines recently learned new ways to deal with roadside bombs from one of the Queen of England's

British Army Sgt. Maj. Gary Price shared knowledge gained from the British Army's decades of countering improvised explosives with the Marines of Mobile Assault Platoon, Weapons Company, 3rd Battalion, 5th Marine Regiment

Company, 3rd Battalion, 5th Marine Regiment.

"We've been dealing with IEDs for over 30 years," he said. "The Counter Insurgency Academy's commanding officer requested that I come out and speak to the guys on the ground to give them the benefits of my experience."

Price is the insurgent advisor for Task Force Troy, which is the center for counter-IED operations in Iraq. They analyze trends in insurgent activity then create tactics, techniques and proce-

create tactics, techniques and procedures, or TTPs, for dealing with the

"We examine what's going on and put the best systems, TTPs and policies, as well as equipment suitable for the task in the area that it's applied," Price said. His 18 years of engineering with the British Army have taken him all over the

British Army have taken him all over the world, from Bosnia, to Egypt, Belize, Kenya and now Iraq. He said the bulk of his dealings with IEDs happened in the United Kingdom in Northern Ireland.

Price began the period of instruction by passing his British HK service rifle around a room of curious Marines.

Marines were also shown videos of insurgent attacks, and heard his view of the current IED situation in the Al Anhar the current IED situation in the Al Anbar

For two hours, he lectured on terror-ist organization, techniques for searching potential cache locations, disrupting IED production and placement and a variety of procedures for dealing with

the problems. He used his sense of British wit to keep the Marines' attention during the class.

"It was to the point, very informative, and had a lot of humor in it," said Gunnery Sgt. Brett Turek, the platoon commander for MAP. "It's a serious topic and he made it enjoyable to learn the material. He brings a whole new element to it."

I thought it was outstanding," said

"I thought it was outstanding," said Sgt. Philip Walker, an intelligence specialist assigned to Headquarters and Support Company. "As far as keeping Marines awake using his dry humor, it was good to go."

"They seem to take the advice," Price said. "They seem interested in what's there to be said, and to give as much assistance as possible."

Turek said MAP Platoon already uses many of the procedures, but that it's always good to get an update on what is occurring in other areas of the country. He said Marines are always searching for new ways to identify enemy threats.

for new ways to identify enemy threats.

"There were some new ideas out there, especially some of the new equipment that might be coming out and just some unique things to look for," said the 38-year-old from Hinsdale, Ill. "It's also good to get a refresher to remind us of

some things we need to do more often."

Price also shared lessons from his experience with military working dogs and how they can be better applied in the

and now they can be better applied in the area of operation. That piqued the curiosity of the Marines.

"It's one of the assets we have out there that I don't think we're utilizing to our full capacity," Turek said. "If we start using those dogs to start enhancing our abilities it's going to pay off in the

start using those dogs to start enhancing our abilities, it's going to pay off in the long run as far as finding more stuff."
"I've been out on a couple of patrols and what he was saying about the dogs was new," said 27-year-old Walker, from Muskogee, Okla. "He gave different TTPs for how to search potential caches that could be very useful."

The seven month long deployment, which began in September 2005, was marked by progress and change, including two free elections in Iraq.

"Operating with the Iraqi Army to provide a safe and secure election process was the hallmark of our deployment," said Lt. Col. Scott D. Aiken, the battalion's commander. "We gave the people of Al Anbar province another six months for their government to take hold and for their military to gain strength."

Marines from 2nd Battalion

Marines from 2nd Battalion spread their influence over the heart of Fallujah and villages surrounding nearby Saqlawiyah, just west of the city. Fallujah was a skeleton of the city it once was, much of it destroyed during

"We're helping them out," said Lance Cpl. Stephen A. Lawson, a 19-year-old from Moultrie, Ga. "We got Marines working with them. Every day they're getting better and better."

The battalion's training regi-men for Iraqi soldiers was ambi-tious. They conducted combat leaders courses, basic machine gun courses, combat lifesaver courses. They also assisted in acquiring necessary gear for

In the mix they located various weapons parts, mortar rounds and artillery rounds that could be used to make improvised explosive devices.

"I thought the operation worked out well," said Gunnery Sgt. Anthony J. Easton, the 30-year-old platoon sergeant from St. Cloud, Minn. "This is the first time I have worked with the Iraqis.



with his parents, leaving behind the still-Communist state before eventually settling down in Columbus, Ohio. Remnants of his eastern European accent still linger in his soft-spoken voice. He is an unashamed lover

He is an unashamed lover of philosophy and once taught Latin as a graduate student who viewed war with disdain until he took a philosophical approach to his thinking.

"I was a peacenik," he said. He decided he didn't understand war and in order to truly know it, he had to become part of it.

He made a phone call to the Navy recruiter. The recruiter learned of his schooling and referred him to an officer pro-gram, but the only choice they offered was in supply. He called back the Navy enlisted recruiter and said he wanted to

work with Marines.
"I just thought you have to put your foot where your mouth is," Eder said. "I had to mouth is, 'Eder said. "I had to experience war. Now when we talk about war, we can be more serious. We can now understand what peace is because we understand war."

Three years later, he's got two tours in Iraq under his belt

"The high point of this tour is we didn't lose anybody," Eder said. "We're one of the very few units who didn't lose anybody."

anybody."

But that doesn't mean things didn't get tense, even if he never showed it. Capt. Eric J. Penrod, Eder's commanding officer was with him when they were performing sweeps in Fallujah. A rocket-propelled grenade struck a humvee and small-arms fire followed. Penrod directed Eder to go Penrod directed Eder to go

"One lieutenant was hit by small-arms fire and another was affected by the blast," Penrod explained. "He was

very cool. As soon as he got over, he assessed them and turned to. He went right to

work.
"I kind of expected that from him," Penrod added.
"Watching him there just reinforced that impression I had and what I'd heard of him. It brought it to the forefront.'

He said while his parents Emil and Elizabeth Eder, living in Scottsdale, Ariz., never expected their adult son to drop everything to become a sailor who would be joined at the hip with Marines. Still, there's not much they could say, he explained. They're the ones who instilled his adven-turous spirit.

turous spirit.

"They were crazy enough to leave a Communist country with two young kids," he said.
"When I made that move, they could say nothing about it."

At 36, Eder's also grown into a sort of mentor for his Marines. He's the oldest man in his company and watches over his Marines like a doting father.

"Another high point is seeing the younger guys," he explained. "Something grew up in them. You can see something in their eyes. From now on, they're going to want something else."

His love for his Marines came through in the simple genuine words he had when he spoke of them. The group of rough, cussing Marines ready for a fight at the first chance welcomed the old man of the welcomed the old man of the unit who sported years of

unit who sported years of higher education. "These guys are just as intelligent and smart as any-one I know," Eder said. "When I first came to the battalion, I felt like the dumb one. It was a hard thing to convince them they were the smart ones in the fellowship.

Eder's combat promotion was the genesis of his command asking why Marines could be promoted for their combat performance, but not

their sailors. A little research by 1st Sgt. James L. Calbough, Company C's senior enlisted Marine proved they could. Matching that with Eder was even a second thought.

"He just does everything right," said Calbough, a 34-year-old from Louisville, Ky. "He knows what he's doing and not just the corpsman stuff. The Marines look up to him"

Calbough said Eder's intensity carries through in everything he does. His door is always unlocked, ready to offer medical service or just offer medical service or just plain old advice to young Marines. He once saw a Marine complaining of stom-ach pain. Calbough said most corpsmen might have sent him off with a remedy for upset stomach, but not Eder. He fol-lowed it through until it was properly diagnosed as appen-dicitis.

"He carries himself as a Marine," Calbough added. "He's part of the brotherhood. Some of these guys, without a doubt, would take a bullet for him. If I had to pick five Marines for a mission, I'd pick

him as one without a doubt."

Tours in Iraq weren't always sunny days, though. The man who once rode a bicycle across Europe and traveled across the United States has seen his share of tough times here too. He's States has seen his share of tough times here too. He's patched up Marines who were clinging to life. He's reassured them they'd be fine, even as he had their blood on his hands and he's haunted by the sight of Iraqi children living in poverty, squalor and fear of insurgents.

"The toughest part is going out there and see a little shack and seeing all these people come out with their animals," Eder said. "You want to give

Eder said. "You want to give them all your food and water. You know it's not going to do a whole helluva lot, but it

helps."
Still, his lifelong quest for

learning hasn't ended here. He sports tattoos on both forearms. They're quotes from Frederich Nietzsche. On his right arm, it reads, "Intuitions, Dissimulate." His left reads, "Ideas, Distort." They come from Nietchze's essay Truth and Falsity in their Ultramoral Sense. Ultramoral Sense.

"I read that essay about a hundred times last time I was out here," he said.

This tour, though, he sought

Instour, though, he sought knowledge from his wartime experience. He doesn't pity Iraqis. Instead, he's gained a profound respect for the Iraqi

"They're making do in a harsh environment that would

a harsh environment that would floor half the people in America," Eder explained. "They have an incredible survival instinct. Certainly there's a lot things we can learn about a country that gave us civilization. It's incredible being a tourist with a gun."

Eder's tour in Iraq is done. Within days of sitting for this interview, he'll be back at Camp Lejeune and knows he's probably looking at orders. He's still got three years left on his Navy enlistment. He hopes to stay with his Marines, but know that the great adventures in his life beckon. He just doesn't yet know what that might be.

"Specialization if for the arms."

No matter what happens, Eder said he'll forever be connected to the Marines who call him simply, "Doc."

"When I found out, it was a surprise to all of us," said Cpl. Scott A Hintz, a 23-year-old from Stevens Point, Wis., whose known Eder for almost a year. "He deserved it. He's





# Groundskeepers keep Paradise Point primed

## Golf courses ready for Marine Corps Celebrity Invitational tournament

Flora Hatfield has seen the sunrise more times in the last 16 years than many people will in a lifetime. She is usually far too busy to enjoy it for very long though, especially if she wants to get the tee boxes and greens mowed before the first duffers of the day are ready to tee off on one of Paradise Point's two 18-hole golf courses.

"Don't get me wrong, I love the golfers, but some of them can't hit," she laughs. "They've gotten me twice—once on the hand and once on the chin.

"I've tried to do it myself a couple of times though, ...it's hard."

Hatfield is just one of 18 groundskeepers at Paradise Point Golf Course tasked with chasing the neverending ideal of 36 perfectly manicured holes and foursome after foursome of happy golfers. For at least part of the Paradise Point crew, that means the mowers are revved up and roaring out of the maintenance shed by 4 a.m.

Grounds foreman Nick Durdle coordinates with his superintendent, Gary Appleton, to make certain that the rigorous scheduling necessary in keeping a golf course in top shape is upheld. Not only is there daily mowing that must be done, but there is also a lot of tending and nurturing of each and every blade of Bermuda grass to make sure it is healthy and performing well.

Water, fungicide, insecticide, fertilizer and herbicide must be applied with strict scheduling and exact amounts. Take the most overzealous lawn-owner in your neighborhood, multiply his effort by several factors of 100 and you will start to get the picture of what it takes to care for 12,591 combined yards

of beautiful green landscape.

In fact, some golf courses now require their superintendents to have a two- or four-year degree in horticulture. Most area grounds foremen share information on what works and what does not when it comes to getting the most out of their courses.

According to Durdle, Paradise Point's maintenance crew of 18 employees runs somewhere around 30 different pieces of grass-cutting equipment and requires

two dedicated mechanics to keep everything in working order. A dedicated staff and dependable equipment is critical to maintaining a golf course. If something is not right, there will be hundreds of inspectors driving around in electric carts and carrying golf bags who will let you know about it.

"If the greens aren't well cared for, you'll hear about it from the players," said Durdle, who also takes personal time to play the courses himself after work. "There's a microscope on you every day."

There is also a deep satisfaction for people like Durdle and Hatfield, who love working outdoors in beautiful sur-


"I enjoy it and I like playing golf," said Durdle. "I'm not the kind of man who can sit around and watch TV. I've always got to be doing something."

Things will not get any busier than they are at the present for the Paradise Point maintenance staff. The crew recently completed bringing the course into tip-top shape for the 35th annual Intercollegiate Golf Championship, held March 31 through April 2, and will work hard to keep the Scarlet and Gold courses in pristine condition for the upcoming Marine Corps Celebrity Invitational, May 18-21. Proceeds from that highly anticipated charity event will be distributed to Project Care, Disabled Sports USA and the USO of Jacksonville.

"We'll be able to keep it up," assured Hatfield. "It will just take a little extra effort. Big crowds are expected to come out and support the event, and all of those feet are sure to chew up the golf course. It will also take a lot of infrastructure to keep spectators and players comfortable and the maintenance staff is planning to coordinate with the tent and bleachers construction crews.

"We'll help them out wherever we can and advise them on where to pound stakes to avoid our sprinkler heads and water mains," said Durdle. "We'll be working throughout that weekend to have everything ready [before the first tee time]."

As the weather continues to warm and the landscape takes on a deeper shade of green, so too will the Scarlet and Gold courses at Paradise Point, with more than a little help from its highly trained and knowledgeable groundskeepers.

Dunphy was considered the top candidate

Dunphy was considered the top candidate almost immediately after Chaney stepped down. Each day brought another rumor that Dunphy would finally be offered the job. Dunphy, who has deep basketball ties to Philadelphia, won 10 Ivy League championships and led the Quakers to nine NCAA tournaments, including a first-round loss to Texas this season. Dunphy considered returning to La Salle two years ago after the program was rocked by a rape scandal before deciding to stay at Penn.

Penn is one of only two schools that won

## Coaches may lose jobs after recruitment probe

SEATTLE (AP) — Three Chief Sealth High School girls' basketball coaches may lose their jobs after a Seattle School District investigation found "substantial evidence of improver activity related to improper activity related to recruiting," the district says. The coaches have been

advised that their contracts may not be renewed, the district said Friday in a statement. Due process requires that the coach-

es be given an opportunity to respond, the statement added. All three coaches have pre-viously denied any wrongdo-

ing. Washington's Interscholastic Activities Association, which oversees prep sports in the state, forbids coaches from recruiting or attempting to recruit athletes. Coaches are barred from offering enticements such as playing time or help getting college

scholarships.

There is no proof that the players sought out the coaches' attention or were aware of

any violations, the district said, so none of the players is being ruled ineligible - and the state titles the team won this year and last year will stand.

Decisions about forfeiture of games or state titles will be reviewed by the Metro 3A League's governing council, which could overrule the district's recommendation, The Seattle Times reported Friday, If any penalties are appealed, a final decision would be made by the WIAA executive

In its own investigation, The Seattle Times had quoted parents and players as saying the willis and assistants Amos Walters and Laura Fuller -actively recruited players for







## LHS squeaks by Jones Sr.

Pat Sokoloski drew a walk to put runners at the corners with no outs. Tagliabue didn't have to wait through any more drama after that, when Juan Beltran sent him home with the winning run on an infield hit. The final score was 9-2

"I told Mike that if he got on base to steal," said Devilpup head coach Chad Fonville. "We don't normally do that because we don't have a lot of speed, but we had opportunities to run in

Lejeune jumped out to an early 7-1 lead on the Trojans after the

first two innings, but lost that advantage in a disastrous fourth in which Jones put up seven runs to go ahead by one.

In that inning, starting pitcher Stephan Perez gave up a hit, a walk and hit a batter to load the bases and then had to watch his

"I knew it was trouble when I saw where it was hit," said Fonville. "We've got a big outfield out there."

To his credit, Perez was able to shake off the inning and regain his control for the rest of the game. The Trojans did not score in the final three innings. Perez allowed three hits and four earned runs over seven innings. He walked two end create. four earned runs over seven innings. He walked two and struck

"He pitched a pretty good game," said Fonville of his starter.

The Devilpups were able to settle down and tie the game at eight in their half of the fourth, setting themselves up for the win in their last at-bat. The coach said he was especially proud that it was the bottom half of his batting line-up that came through in the chutch

"It was a good game with both teams fighting to the end," said Fonville. "They wanted it just as badly as we did, but our guys pulled it out in the end. I've got to give these guys a lot of credit—they never quit and they always give me their best. "It was our last game before Spring Break, so I was glad to get the win."

The victory breaks a three-game losing streak in the conference, "It was big," said Fonville, hoping that the win would give his team some momentum for the second half of the season.

The Devilpup bats were hot all afternoon, accounting for 13 hits

Offensive stars included Beltran, who went 3-for-4, with a run scored and the game-winning RBI, Perez, who helped out his own cause by going 3-4 with the bat, stealing three bases and scoring three times and shortstop Alex Seifert, who was 3-4 with two runs scored and two RBIs thanks to a double, a triple and a sacrifice

The Devilpups are now 5-8 overall on the season and 1-3 in the 1A Coastal Plains Conference. They play their next home game Monday against Central Davidson at 4 p.m. The next conference game is April 25 against Pamlico.



## Base enforces seatbelt use

A safety belt has been proven to be the difference in life saving devices in an automobile. But if you don't know the seatbelt laws, it can be expensive and deadly on and off base. Not only are you risking your chances of surviving an accident by not wearing your seatbelt, but you are also risking one in your wallet.

accident by not wearing your seatbelt, but you are also risking one in your wallet.

The Click it or Ticket program is a statewide program to save lives by increasing the number of people using their seatbelts, and the base Provost Marshal's Office is doing their part in keeping drivers buckled up.

"Safety belt use is the single most effective tool a person can employ to prevent deaths and serious injuries and reduce the costs associated with motor vehicle crashes," said Gunnery Sgt. Daniel P. Schismenos, traffic crash reconstructionist, Accident Investigation Division, Provost Marshal's Office, Marine Corps Base.

This safety measure originated in 1993 when Gov. Jim

Marshal's Office, Marine Corps Base.

This safety measure originated in 1993 when Gov. Jim Hunt launched this program to increase safety belt use and child safety by increasing enforcement of the state's safety belt laws, according to the Web site www.ncdot.org.

The program uses a two-pronged attack to increase the use of safety belts. The first is by making it known to everyone, through the media, that there is an increased risk of a ticket if a person doesn't buckle up. The second is by increasing the efforts to catch people who don't wear their seat belt by setting up checkpoints.

The base Provost Marshal's Office works closely with North Carolina State Troopers during these checkpoints.

"Working together gives us a little interagency cohesion," said Jason B. Casteen, a State Trooper. "Anytime we can get together and work as a cohesive unit is a good

Last year, the usage rate for seat belts on Camp Lejeune

was 99 percent, according to Schismenos.

The Click it or Ticket program has not only helped to ensure safety, but has also saved money, according to the

## Get monetary compensation for your chronic disability

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs office has been on base since August 1999 to serve Marines who are disabled by a chronic injury or disease incurred or aggravated while on active duty.

or aggravated while on active duty.
"To care for him who shall have borne the battle and for his widow and his orphan," said Abraham Lincoln during his second inaugural address. According to the organization's Web site, these words reflect the philosophy and principals that guide the VA in everything they do.

guide the VA in everything they do.
One of the many services offered by the VA is disability compensation, a monetary benefit, which is paid monthly to veterans who have become disabled due to their service or have rustained a chronic injury sustained a chronic injury while on active duty.

while on active duty.

"Out of all the VA offices in the United States, this is the only site where service members can file a claim and get a physical, all in the same building," said Cindy East, a supervisor for the VA aboard Camp Lejeune. "This generally

allows us to render a decision within 60 days of a Marine's discharge. Elsewhere, it could take anywhere from three to six months."

When filing a claim, Marines should remember to bring their entire service medical record with them to the appointment. In order to warrant any monetary compensation for the disability in question, the condition must also be documented in this file.

documented in this file.

"Before accepting or depring a claim, we take into account the diagnosis of our own doctors as well as the documentation found in the applicant's service medical record," said East. "If accepted, the amount given to each individual is determined by a code of federal regulations."

Though the amount of compensation varies with each individual's degree of disability, the largest cate-

disability, the largest category of veterans on the compensation scale is 10 percent disability (\$112 per month). As of the per month). As of the beginning of fiscal year 2006, more than 775,000 veterans received compen-sation at this rate.

"Our office is currently

# Off-duty recreation can be dangerous if not taken seriously

As Mother Nature blesses us with an early warm-weather reunion and the temperature continues to rise, accidents and safety violations do the same. Many people spend quality time with their families participating in recreational activities, but they are not always aware of the regulations and safety precautions involved.

Boating is growing as a pas-time and enjoyed by many serv-ice members and their families, according to Sgt. Joaquin

DeJesus of Newark, N.J., ground safety manager for Headquarters Company, Headquarters and Service Battalion, 2nd Marine Logistics Group. Unfortunately, the increased number of people boating increases the number of mishaps, which can kill or seriously inture.

ously injure.
"The majority of accidents would not have happened if the victims had taken time to learn proper small boat operating procedures," said DeJesus.
Boaters should always check the weather and local forecasts before and during a boating trip to ensure an unexpected storm

to ensure an unexpected storm

doesn't rain on their parade. They should also file a float plan with a friend or relative. A float with a friend or relative. A float plan is paperwork involving where the boat is being launched, the number of people aboard the boat, if they have any special medical problems, where the destination point will be and the estimated time of return.

Boaters should also know the area, and if they do not, they should ask locals about the area.

"A boater should never enter a body of water that is blind to

a body of water that is blind to him," said DeJesus. "Knowing one's surroundings is one of the most important factors of boat-ing safely."

onboard the boat is a non-swim-mer or is unsure of his swim-ming abilities, he should wear a life jacket throughout the entire life jacket throughout the entire-ty of his boating trip. Also, all children under the age of 12 must wear a life jacket at all times, despite their swimming ability, according to federal law. Speeding is also an accident waiting to happen when it comes

wating to happen when it comes to water sports.


"Although local conditions may warrant the imposition of definite limitations on speed of vessels, a general speed limit is that which is implied in safe vessel operation under existing cir-

cumstances. Speed which is excessive under the circum-stances, and which endangers persons or property, is one form of reckless operation, which is prohibited by North Carolina boating law," according to North Carolina Boating Regulations.

A growing trend on the water is bow riding. This is where someone sits on the front of the boat and lets his feet drag in the water for fun.

This is an unstable process, because the water could feel calm at that exact moment, but a larger ship may create a wake,

averaging approximately 250 claims per month," said East. "We want Marines to file their claims early because it allows us ample time to get the paperwork finished in a timely man-ner, and thus speeding up the entire application process."

Marines who are receiving either an honorable or a gen-

eral under honorable conditions discharge can call to make an appointment no more than 180 days before their end of current contract.

"If a Marine does have a chronic injury, but waits 10

years after being discharged to file a claim, he would have to link his current symptoms to the injury that occurred while he was on active duty," said East. "Though not impossible, it's hard to do after a long period of time. You may not think your injury is serious, but let's get it on the record just in case. Down the road, it might just come in handy."

The slogan, "Don't Drink and Drive" pertains to boating as well. Drivers can receive a 'Driving While Intoxicated citation for driving their boat under the influence of alcohol or

their boat under the influence of alcohol or drugs. The penalty for a DWI in a boat is much higher as it's a federal offense.

Boaters who stop and secure their vessels to

fish must also follow strict regulations. They must only fish in specified locations, and they

must pay close attention to the size and bag limitations. Failure to do so may result in a

state, local or Coast Guard citation.

Transporting one's boat could also heed safety problems, even before it hits the water.

# Iron Station, native returns from second deployment

For Navy corpsmen serving with Marine units, treating casualities in combat and saving lives is what their job is all about. Most of them jump at the chance to deploy with the Marines and serve their country.

Petty Officer 1st Class Ronnie L. Mashburn, who recently returned from his second tour in Iraq, is one of

from his second tour in Iraq, is one of those corpsmen.

The Iron Station, N.C., native was deployed with 2nd Marine Division in Ar Ramadi, Iraq from February 2005 to February 2006.

For the first part of his deployment, he was the battalion aid station's assistant petty officer in charge. He also had the opportunity to be a part of the quick reaction force, a team of Marines who respond to any incident that may arise.

respond to any incident that may arise.

"We were on a mounted patrol in Ramadi," said the 1991 East Lincoln High School graduate. "My vehicle commander and I got out of the humvee to set up an entry control point. I was in charge of telling people to stay back. After a few minutes, I heard a loud noise and I turned around and saw people running."

mashburn saw the Marines in a foot chase with insurgents armed with pistols and hand grenades. He heard on the radio that one Marine was killed and

wounded in the attack

Mashburn would later find out that his vehicle commander was one of the two wounded. "He was shot in the chin, but he

was still running after the insurgents," said the 32-year-old.

Mashburn's vehicle caught up to the Marines chasing the insurgents

after they caught them. "When I came up to my vehicle commander he was covered in blood, adrenaline was pumping," Mashburn explained. "I had to calm him down. I bandaged his wound and called in a medical evacuation. That was the first firstfath Lyos in."

first firefight I was in."

After Mashburn's time with the QRF, he packed his bags and headed to Fallujah with the Military Transition Team to train Iraqis in

basic field medicine.

"We taught them basic first aid,

basic sick call, and we trained their medics on how to use good judgment for triaging causalities," he said. His four months with the Iraqi Army training them, and he said the

Army training them, and ne said the entire time was a learning experience not just for the Iraqis, but for him.

"We had to adapt to their training level in order to reach them," he said.

"They don't always see things the way we do because of cultural differences."

According to Mashburn, he saw growth in the Iraqis while he was there, and that he feels the transition

team had a definite impact on them.

"At the beginning we had to hold them by the hand, but by the end of my time with them, they were more involved and had more experience,

Of the many experiences Mashburn had while deployed, he said nothing compares to being a corpsman with an infantry battalion

He was also deployed with 2nd Battalion, 8th Marine Regiment during Operation Iraqi Freedom in 2003.

"Being deployed with a grunt bat-talion is the epitome of being a corps-man," he said. "I don't do this job for the glory, I do it because I want to do it and being deployed with Marines is a big part of this job." Now that Mashburn is back in the

United States, he looks forward to the United States, he looks forward to the rest of his career as a corpsman where he will take over as the petty officer in charge of the Headquarters Battalion, 2nd Marine Division battalion aid station. Mashburn wants to be an instructor at the Combat Casuality Care Course, training medical officers on mass causality situations.

Mashburn has two tours in sup-port of Operation Iraqi Freedom-With all of his experiences in combat, he feels his time has helped him per-

onally and professionally.

"Iraq has given me experience to develop as a leader, a person and a corpsman," he said.







# Hot Apple Pie brings 'honest' country sound to Morehead

With all the mixing, editing and other tweaking that goes into most popular music these days, it's not unusual to go to a concert and hear a totally different sound than what you liked on the album.

But not when the band is Hot Apple Pie,

according to drummer Trey Landry.

"We're real musicians, playing real music," he said in a phone interview. "You can expect to hear songs like they sound on the album. When we play Hillbillies, it sounds like Hillbillies."

Hot Apple Pie's self-titled first album debuted at No. 6 on Billboard's country chart and features songs such as Hillbillies, Easy Does It and We're Making Up. The band will perform live at Midnight Rodeo in Morehead City Saturday night.

The band members come from diverse backgrounds. Lead singer Brady Seals was a member of Little Texas from 1991 to 1995, during which he wrote the band's hits My Love and What Might Have Been, as well as the Grammy-nominated Amy's Back in Austin and God Blessed Texas.

Seals also pursued a solo career before

Seals also pursued a solo career before deciding to put a band together. He asked Mark "Sparky" Matejka and Landry — who had played for Seals when he was a solo

had played for Seals when he was a solo artist — to join him.

Matejka, who plays the guitar and banjo and lends his vocal talents to Hot Apple Pie, has played for Charlie Daniels, The Kinleys and Sons of the Desert. Percussionist and accordion-player Landry has worked with Percy Sledge, Rodney Crowell and others.

The only thing missing was a bass player.

The only thing missing was a bass player. Keith Horne heard about the opportunity from a friend and called Seals.

Horne has toured with Tanya Tucker, Waylon Jennings, Peter Frampton, Ricky Van Shelton, Chaka Kahn, Trisha Yearwood, Sons of the Desert and

Lonestar. He plays the bass guitar, acoustic

guitar and steel guitar.

When Horne joined the other three band members, something clicked. They recorded four songs that day — all of which are fea-

"It's the band I've been waiting to play with my whole life, and I didn't even know it," Landry said.

Everyone brings a little something different to the band, according to Landry, which

"It's just about everything you can throw in and still be called country music," he said. "It's all honest. We all love all styles of music, and somehow they all find their way into Hot Apple Pie."

nto Hot Apple Pie."
For those wondering about the band's name, it has nothing to do with the movie American Pie, according to Landry.
Seals originally wanted to call the band The Apples, in a nod to the Beatles, whose record company is called Apple Corps. The idea morphed into Apple Pie, before Seals' wife suggested they add the word "hot" at the beginning.

wife suggested any the beginning.
"It sounded like a funny name at first,"
Landry said, but then the band decided it invoked all the right images.
"It's momma's cookin', it's home, it's American, it's patriotic, it's rock and roll,"

The band is already working on the second record, and they will likely start recording within the next month for a tentative summer 2007 release.

As for the concert, Landry said to imagine what would happen "if you take the record and you take the intensity knob and turn it up about 10 levels."

"It's a pretty rockin' show," he said. "We like to get the people dancing. We've really turned into a party band, without even trying

Applicants must answer an essay question and fill out an application form. The scholar-ship committee looks at each applicant's academic record, extracurricular activities and other relevant information.

The amount of money per recipient and the total number of recipients varies each year, depending on the amount of money the club has raised.

This year, "we were very fortunate," said Jennifer O'Neal, scholarship committee chairwoman. "We were able to give away \$17,000."

There are 17 recipients – 12 high school seniors and five dependent spouses. Last year, the club gave away \$13,000 to eight

recipients.
Scholarship money must be used for tuition, books or other course-related fees, according to O'Neal.

Money raised by the OWC's other activities go to the charitable distribution fund. The fund provides money for non-profit and other area organizations, including Girl Scout and Boy Scout troops, the Onslow County Women's Shelter, L.I.N.K.S., the Ronald McDonald House and the Navy-Marine Corps Relief Society.

#### Spring weather can mean bee swarms

Onslow County Beekeepers Association

Spring is here, and with spring comes budding trees, blooming flowers and honey bees. Each year, there is a significant increase in the number of bees in a hive, to anticipate the large amount of honey. This excessive number of honey bees means there may be swarms.

Honey bees may swarm from the hive as early as 8 a.m. on any day and as late as 5 p.m. in a mass of 40 to 100 feet in diameter.

The bees may fly through yards, traffic and people without regard to what is happening around them.

If you see a swarm, do not provoke the honey bees by spraying water, yelling

or throwing objects at the bees. Let the swarm settle and keep everyone at least 50 feet away.

In Onslow County, Hampstead and eastern Pender County, call the Bee Swarm Locator Coordinator, Jeff Morton, to have the bees removed from

Morton is an agent with the North Carolina Cooperative Extension Service and will direct the closest Volunteer member of the Onslow County Beekeepers Association to the location to gather the swarm.

Morton will need the swarm's location, a contact name, a phone number and the time the swarm was first

Morton can be reached at 455-5873. Do not attempt to move the bees your-

self. The Onslow County Beekeeepers Association members are trained volunteers who keep honey bees as a hobby and have the equipment, knowledge and experience to retrieve an active swarm of

More than 90 percent of swarms can More than 90 percent of swarms can be retrieved safely. The volunteers may not be able to show up immediately and, in some cases, the bees may not be able to be retrieved due to possible danger to the beekeeper. They do not remove swarms from inside buildings or walls.

or walls.

## Program eases deployment stress

Deployment is something that every Marine and sailor family lives with. It is never easy for the Marines, sailors, or family members when a deployment occurs.

However, knowing what to expect, learning to recognize the warning signs and knowing where to turn for help might make the multiple phases of deployment a little easier.

Active-duty service members or family members who experience deployment stress are not ill, do not have a disease, are not considered patients and do not necessarily need professional mental health treatment.

The II Marine Expeditionary Force and other support services aboard Camp Lejeune have partnered to provide a comprehensive, coordinated, proactive outreach effort for Marines, sailors and their families, making existing deployment support services on base more visible and easily accessable.

The Deployment Return and Reunion Program brings together a number of support services available through the naval hospital, chaplains, Marine Corps Community Services Community Counseling and Family Advocacy programs, and the Veterans Administration at Camp Lejeune, Marine Corps Air Station New River and Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point.

Managing deployment stress is a key health focus for the naval hospital and many programs are already established and readily available to assist Marines, sailors and families.

The DRRP focuses on making sure Marines, sailors and their families are aware of these services and take advantage of them to protect, maintain or restore their mental and physical health.

"We understand this and have tried to make it easy for

"We understand this and have tried to make it easy for folks to get the help they need and to recognize that we are all here to help them. Seeking assistance or more information related to deployment stress does not make them any less of a Marine or sailor or a supportive family member," said Capt. Richard Welton, commanding officer of Naval Hospital

All support services are coordinated with each other, and all service providers are aware of the other services available. Each service will make the appropriate suggestions and assist in a referral or transfer services, as needed, to any of the other available services.

Based on individual needs, service professionals can provide assistance in finding the right help at the right time, no matter what support service is contacted first.

"We depend on our Marines and sailors to complete their missions, and it is our duty to ensure they have the best care and information available so that they can be successful and lead healthy and prosperous lives with their family and friends. Waiting to seek treatment will not help you get better, as symptoms may get worse with time," Welton said.

It is important to be proactive and get ahead of possible difficult marital, family and job relations.

It is also important to recognize and address these issues up front, to restore stability, foster the idea that this is a normal reaction to an abnormal situation and facilitate the return to normal life back home as soon as possible.
