## Marines keep Iraq's waterways safe

**HADITHA, Iraq** — In Iraq, a country where temperatures often soar above 110 degrees and terrain is mostly fine grains of sand, Cpl. Derek Metallo never thought he'd find himself patrolling Al Anbar province in a boat when he arrived three months ago.

Metallo, a 27-year-old Marine reservist from Jacksonville, Fla., is part of a team of Marines who patrol the Euphrates River by boat, providing security to the Haditha Dam — one of the country's largest sources of electrical power and home to the Hawaii-based 3rd Battalion, 3rd Marine Regiment's headquarters.

The dam provides electricity to thousands of Iraqis throughout the Al Anbar province, as well as portions of Baghdad.

While most U.S. and Iraqi military forces operate in the country's cities and towns, Metallo and the dozens of Marines who make up the dam's security unit spend their days patrolling the waterways on both sides of the dam.

"We patrol around the

dam all day to make sure insurgents are not trying to breach the area around the dam," said Metallo, a gunner assigned to the dam security unit.

On one patrol Metallo said an infantry company was receiving indirect fire from mortar rounds and the Marines located the insurgents. The insurgents fled the area when the Marines arrived.

The Marines use Small Unit Riverine Craft, military boats used by the Armed Forces to secure rivers and other small bodies of water, to patrol the Euphrates River and the manmade Lake Qadisiyah, which sits on the northern side of the dam.

The Security Unit's Marines are mostly reservists who put their civilian lives on hold to support the Marines who operate out of the dam.

Cpl. Alexander Lucea was an airline pilot and lived in Hollywood, Fla., before he volunteered to join the Corps' active-duty ranks and serve as a gunner with the water-bound unit.

"Just like the active-duty Marines, we all miss being at home," said Lucea, 27. "The initial adjustment was the

hardest part of coming to Iraq, but I enjoy being here with my fellow Marines."

As the Marines patrol the banks of water around the dam, they also keep their eyes open for any suspicious activity on the banks of the water. Recently, the Marines found a small cache of weapons hidden along the Euphrates River, said Metallo.

"Some patrols are more interesting than others," said Lucea. "We have responded to firefights involving the Marines from three/three and saw insurgents shooting mortars right off the bank of the river. You never know what is out there."

The Marines are not only trying to keep the waterways clear and safe from insurgent activity, but also protect the hundreds of fisherman and farmers who work along the river's banks.

"We have established a good relationship with the farmers and the fisherman," said Lucea. "They know we are not the enemy and we are just here to help them."

When the Marines arrived here earlier this year, locals were sometimes abrasive and

## Chiarelli passes Haditha climate report to Casey

**WASHINGTON** — The coalition corps commander in Iraq has completed his review of the circumstances surrounding the deaths of 24 Iraqis around Haditha on Nov. 19, 2005, and has passed his findings and recommendations to the coalition commander in the country.

Officials said Army Maj. Gen. Eldon Bargewell reported on the circumstances surrounding the deaths and the subsequent actions of Marine leaders, focusing on "training and command climate," to Multinational Corps Iraq Commander Army Lt. Gen. Peter W. Chiarelli. Chiarelli completed his findings and recommendations and passed them and the report to Army Gen. George W. Casey Jr., commander of Multinational Forces Iraq.

The report is separate from a criminal investigation the Navy Criminal

## Bush urges North Korean leader to give up weapons

**WASHINGTON** — North Korean leader Kim Jong Il has the power to set his country on a more productive course by giving up its nuclear and ballistic missile ambitions, President Bush said today during a news conference at Chicago's Museum of Science and Industry.

"There's a choice for him to make," Bush said. "He can verifiably get rid of his weapons programs and stop testing rockets, and there's a way forward to help his people. The choice is his to make."

North Korea, officially known as the Democratic People's Republic of Korea, is an isolated, repressive regime of 23 million people that has experienced wide-scale starvation under its current

## Marines thwart insurgents' attempt to destroy new Iraqi school for girls

**KARABILAH, Iraq** — Thanks to the work of Marines and Iraqi Security Forces, 800 elementary-aged girls will now have a school to attend this fall.

Marines from 1st Battalion, 7th Marine Regiment unveiled a brand-new grade school in this city of about 30,000 on the Iraq-Syria border in western Al Anbar Province July 7.

About one week before its opening, insurgents planted an improvised explosive device inside the school which would have leveled a good portion of the building, destroying nearly three months of work by Marines and locals, said Gunnery Sgt. Joseph S. Mallicoat, team leader for the civil affairs team.

"The bomb had the potential of taking down both wings of the building and the school would have been unable to open by September," said Capt. Rick Bernier, commanding officer of C Company — the Marines responsible for providing security alongside Iraqis in this city.

The Marines discovered the bomb and immediately secured the building leaving Iraqi Security Forces to provide 24-hour security to prevent further attacks.

Local tribal leaders and sheikhs attended the school's grand opening and expressed thanks to the Marines of 3rd Civil Affairs Group who spearheaded the reconstruction proj-

# Legal advice for hurricane preparedness

Now is the time to prepare for the next hurricane before the storm surge is flooding our shores, the rain is pounding down and falling trees are crashing through rooftops, you should review rules and regulations concerning hurricanes.

Knowing your rights and liabilities can help lessen the financial effect of these sea monsters.

**Renters' Insurance** can lessen the loss due to storms, as well as losses due to fire, theft and other disasters. Carefully consider whether you need such coverage. If you already have a renter's policy, review it carefully to determine whether it is sufficient or whether more/different coverage is appropriate. Coverage amounts begin at about \$20,000 and such policies are fairly inexpensive. Base residents who have signed a lease and are living in Public Private Venture housing run by Atlantic Marine Corps Communities already have renter's insurance provided for them as indicated at paragraph 30 of the lease. But, as with any insurance policy, you should review it carefully and you may wish to discuss it with your AMCC representative. It contains significant deductibles and special limits concerning either the type of property lost or the cause of the loss. Loss created by water damage due to flood and losses resulting from electrical power outage may not be covered.

**Claims Against the Government.** Relying solely on the Federal government to compensate you for your hurricane damage losses is risky because:

- The Military and Civilian Personnel Claim Act (31 USC 3701, 3702, 3721), implemented in the Navy and Marine Corps through JAG Instruction 5890.1 authorizes, but does not require, the United States to provide compensation for losses "incident to service," including losses in Base quarters. (Different statutes and regulations not the subject of this article cover losses caused by the negligence of government agents or employees).

- The United States will not pay claims when negligence of the claimant or his/her guests caused the loss. In most renters' policies, such matters are irrelevant. (Of course, no one will pay the claim if you intentionally destroy property)

- The United States will not compensate for losses where the possession of the items is not considered reasonable under the circum-

stances or where the claimant failed to take reasonable precautions to protect the property. Such matters are generally immaterial in renters' policies.

- The United States will pay depreciated value according to a strict depreciation schedule, not replacement value. Thus, you may get only \$100 for the television you purchased for \$500 four years ago. You may be able to purchase a renters' policy that pays replacement value.

- The United States may take several weeks, even months, to process a claim. After some previous hurricane strikes to eastern North Carolina, a claims representative traveled from Washington to Camp Lejeune to expedite claims adjudication. However, there is no requirement to send such a representative. Private insurance proceeds are generally paid much more quickly than government claims.

**Proving Loss.** In any event, you should take a good inventory of your property, consider preparing a videotape, and keep receipts of the more expensive items to substantiate your claim, whether against the government or your insurer. Historically, the most common hurricane related claim against the government has been for food spoilage resulting from power outage. In its desire to provide quick compensation for such claims, Federal claims officers have previously relaxed rules relating to the proof of food spoilage. However, there is no guarantee that proof requirements will continue to be relaxed, especially given the potential for fraud. Be prepared to provide some proof of food spoilage and the amount thereof. Of course, making a fraudulent claim is a criminal offense, whether committed by service members or others.

**Repairing Rented Premises.** Landlords, not tenants, are responsible for repairing storm damage and clearing debris resulting from natural disasters [NC Gen Stat 42-43(6)]. If your rented premises is damaged, or if trees or other debris has blown into your yard, notify the landlord or the landlord's agent immediately by phone and follow up in writing. If the damage significantly lessened the value of the property, for example, if air conditioning or plumbing were damaged and not quickly repaired, you may ask the landlord to reduce or eliminate rent until the repairs are made. The modified rent should be equal to the rental value of the premises that are damaged. If the landlord agrees, get it in

writing. If the landlord does not agree, you can sue him or her in small claims court for an order lessening or eliminating the rent until the repairs are made. If you have already paid the full rent, you may sue the difference in the value of the damaged property and the value of the property without damages. A court order reduction in rent might be the wake up call to inform your landlord to make the necessary repairs.

**Lease Termination.** North Carolina Law (NC Gen Stat 42-12) provides that if the residential rental premises is damaged so badly that it will cost more than a year's rent to fix it, a tenant may terminate the lease without penalty. However, the tenant must pay rent up to the time of the damage and notify the landlord of intent to terminate in writing and within 10 days of the damage. The lease carefully. This provision of the law only applies if the lease does not contain an agreement concerning destruction of the premises.

**Consumer Fraud.** When winds die down, home renovation artists will descend on Jacksonville like vultures. Here are some danger signs to look for:

- The door-to-door seller home repair services fail to comply with state (NC Gen. Stat. 25A-39) and Federal law (CFR 429) requiring a written notice of a three-day right to cancel the contract.

- The company headquarters is out of state and/or is impossible to contact. Or maybe it is just a post office box and physical address.

- The contract fails to completely and accurately describe the work to be done and/or price to be paid. Be especially wary of contracts in which price is based on an estimate that is to be completed in the future.

- The seller tells you not to worry about the exorbitant price, because the insurance company will pay for everything.

**Emergency Funds.** If the President declares a national disaster, individuals may be eligible for loans or grants administered by the Federal Emergency Management Agency. FEMA provides grants to help repair damaged homes, loans to compensate for personal or business property loss, and grants for people unable to afford the loans. However, FEMA money can be delayed and may only compensate for only a small portion of the loss.

Be smart. Be safe. Be prepared. ■

# Semper Safe

## Learning small boat operating procedures prevents unfortunate mishaps, deaths

Boating is growing as a pastime and enjoyed by many. The increase in the number of people boating is an increase in the number of mishaps. Many Marines, sailors and their family members are killed or seriously injured in boating mishaps every year. The majority of accidents would not have happened if the victims had taken time to learn proper small boat operating procedures.

If small boat enthusiasts observe the following rules, they will be mental miles ahead in personal fun and safety. Know your boat - what it can and can't do.

- Don't overload - check the boat manufacturer's capacity plate.
- Keep a good lookout and situational awareness of other boats and objects.
- Operate at safe and legal speeds - watch your wake.
- Know and respect the weather - heed weather warnings.
- Take sufficient fuel - in prop-

er containers - know your cruising radius.

- Keep your boat shipshape - check safety equipment.
- Take necessary equipment fire extinguishers, personal flotation devices.
- Learn boating laws and obey them. They may vary from state to state.
- Never operate a boat while intoxicated.
- All boaters are encouraged to take part in formal small boat training programs offered by the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary. You may contact the Coast Guard Auxiliary for classes, boat inspections and other safety guidance.

**Drinking afloat more dangerous than driving?**

Research has shown that as little as four hours' exposure to sun, wind, glare, vibration and other motion on the water produces "boater's hypnosis," a kind of fatigue that slows reaction time almost as much as if a person were drunk. Alcohol can affect your judgment, motor skills, peripheral vision, depth perception, night vision and balance. A "tipsy" person on an unstable, moving platform like a boat runs the risk of slipping on deck, stumbling down a gangway, or falling overboard. In the event of a fall overboard, alcohol may increase risk of cardiac arrest and will certainly reduce your body's ability to stay warm in cold water. It is a well-established fact that with the very first drink, brain functions are depressed. That's why boaters should think before they drink.

As Marines and sailors, we live by our ethos. So think before you jeopardize the safety of yourself, your fellow Marines, sailors, civilian employees or family members, and remember SEMPER SAFE. ■

# Marines train to support front line

When an amphibious assault vehicle breaks down or its tracks are damaged, Marines on the front lines don't always fix it on the spot. The vehicle must be taken to a forward operating base, fixed, and sent back out to the front within a few hours time.

Marines from Headquarters and Service Company, 2nd Amphibious Assault Battalion, endured a six-day training exercise at Landing Zone over, June 21, to better prepare them for their upcoming deployment. During the exercise, the Marines set up a FOB, or a secure base, providing perimeter security, conducting counter-insurgent patrols and performed vehicle maintenance.

"Basically, our mission out there is to ensure our comrades on the front line have the support needed to enhance their training for future deployments," said Gunnery Sgt. Mathew K. Brower, an amphibious assault crewman and platoon commander. The Marines were put into different situations that might happen while in Iraq. If a vehicle in a convoy breaks down, the mechanic in the convoy can't fix it, it is towed back base. The Marines work as fast as possible, through the night if necessary, to get the vehicle in working condition. "They work as fast as they can to get the vehicles working correctly and to get them back

in the fight," said Master Sgt. Rodney "BAMA" Curry, the operation chief for Headquarters and Service Company. "They don't just sit back here at the base; they also go out on patrols and convoys."

The perimeter security of the base also falls on the shoulders of the Marines - the patrols and convoys ensure the base remains a safe place to work. The area around the base was set up so the Marines might come across simulated improvised-explosive devices. If they find an IED, they train on how to react and report its location back to base.

"IEDs are big in Iraq right now," said Brower, a Wayland, Mich., native. "It's good for [the Marines] to learn how to deal with them if they ever encounter one."

The Marines also provide security around the FOB. The entire base is surrounded by Amphibious Assault Vehicles watching for any enemy movement. They set up a vehicle check point and an entry control point to make sure no unidentified personnel enter the base.

"We teach them how to be able to do anything just in case they get put into these situations," Brower said. "We try to make it as realistic as Iraq as possible out here."

"We want them to be as prepared as they can be for deployment," Curry explained. "We could deploy on a moment's notice, so we do training like this as much as possible to stay sharp." ■

Marines are taught early on in training the best leaders will show the way and lead from the front. Lance Cpl. John G. McElwee served as a squad automatic weapon platoon leader for part of his first deployment. Before trying the SAW, he was a rifleman. "I enjoyed using the M-249 SAW," he said. "It's interesting to carry such a powerful weapon."

McElwee was selected to be a squad leader after returning from deployment in Iraq. This time he was to take over the position and push his Marines to work hard and train hard like his predecessors did for him.

Being in charge of the fireteams means I'm in charge of three M249 gunners and their combined firepower," he said. "It's more responsibility, but I'm ready for it." McElwee trained with his Marines from 2nd Battalion, 2nd Marine Regiment and Marines from 3rd Battalion, 10th Marine Regiment as part of a week long exercise in an urban environment. Pfc. Dustin Butler, an assaultman with 2nd Battalion, 2nd Marine Regiment was in the same

squad as McElwee during the training exercise here. McElwee led a fireteam of Marines during the exercise.

"McElwee took charge of the situation," said Butler.

"He led his Marines from the front. He had confidence with every room they cleared and didn't slow down for anything." He said it wasn't enough to just push his Marines forward.

"I have experience with these types of operations," he said. "I know what it takes to get the job done and I do it." Military service always held an interest for McElwee, whose father and sister both served as officers in the U.S. Navy. It was Operation Enduring Freedom, Operation Iraqi Freedom and the Global War on Terrorism that pushed him to join.

"I'm glad I joined the Corps," McElwee said. "I'm glad I chose the infantry."

"It's something I felt I had to do," he said. "Infantry seemed like it was the heart of the Corps, and that's where I wanted to be."

With half of his time in the Corps already spent McElwee, is debating what to do when he gets out. For the time being he plans to go to college. After serving his country as a Marine he is considering serving his community as a teacher.

"I've always been interested in higher education," he said. "I think I might go become a history teacher." ■

# Scout Snipers break in new rifles for 26th MEU

FORT A.P. HILL, Va. — Scout Snipers from the 26th Marine Expeditionary Unit's Battalion Landing Team, 2nd Bn., 2nd Marine Regiment, fired their new rifles for the first time on a range Sunday.

The BLT Marines will use the new MK-11 semi-automatic sniper rifle simultaneously alongside the bolt-action M-40A3, a descendent of the Vietnam-era M-40.

The rifle resembles an M-16 on first glance, and Sgt. Gerald V. Gavin, Scout Sniper platoon commander, said the resemblance can benefit operations on today's urban battlefields.

Gavin said the distinct look of the M-40A3 makes identifying a sniper in an infantry patrol easier. The MK-11 allows the sniper to better blend in with the infantry, making them less vulnerable.

Gavin said the semi-automatic action on the new rifle, as well as the addition of a suppressor system that reduces muzzle flash and report, make it a valuable addition to the inventory.

The MK-11 comes fitted with the Scout Sniper Day Scope, which the Marine Corps also is attaching to its existing inventory of M-40A3s.

Gavin said the new scope

improves the sniper's ability to engage targets, offering enhanced sighting ability and ease of use. "It's a great piece of glass," he said.

Lance Cpl. James K. Dagenhart agreed with Gavin's opinion of the MK-11, and said he prefers the MK-11.

"I like it because it's semi-auto, and I love the scope... the new scope is money," Dagenhart said.

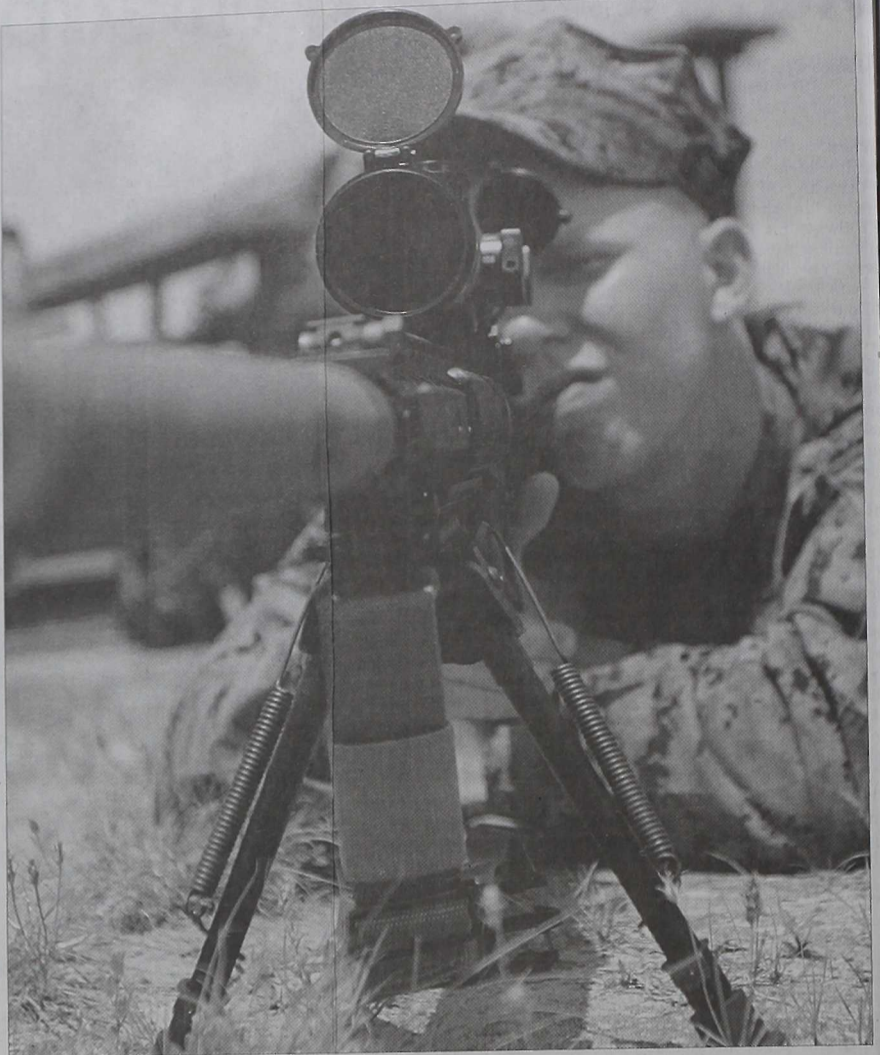
The MK-11 weighs 18.29 pounds fully loaded with its two-pound suppressor attached, while the M-40A3 weighs in at 18.5 fully loaded.

Both rifles fire the same 7.62 mm round, and the MK-11 is accurate up to 800 yards.

Gavin said he thinks the MK-11 is a great weapon, although he is still partial to his experience with the M-40A3.

The BLT and Scout Snipers will continue to train with the MEU's Aviation and Logistics Combat Elements here until the end of the month. The training at Fort A.P. Hill is the MEU's first step in a six-month pre-deployment training process designed to merge the disparate elements of the MEU into a cohesive, rapid reaction force. The 26th MEU will continue to prepare for an early 2007 deployment in support of the Global War on Terrorism.

# MALS-36 ratchets up speed, efficiency

**MARINE CORPS AIR STATION FUTENMA, OKINAWA, Japan** — Marine Aviation Logistics Squadron 36 implemented a new process aimed at increasing the speed and efficiency of all logistics within the squadron.

The system, Enterprise AIRSpeed, integrates modern solutions for business practices used by major corporations such as Boeing, General Electric and Microsoft, and applies them to a military environment.

The solutions are founded on the business theory that the sum of something's parts are of greater value than its whole, and continuous improvement should be demanded from every part of an organization.

The new system will reduce the amount of time and effort necessary to complete logistics projects, said Staff Sgt. Billy Carter, a fixed-wing aircraft power plant mechanic with MALS-36.

One example is how the squadron repairs an engine.

Prior to the implementation of AIRSpeed, the Marines from the power plant section focused on repairing only the discrepancy noted by the ground crew who pulled the engine from the aircraft.

The problem created by this process of troubleshooting a single component is that it could lead to several costly repairs and engine checks before maintainers identified the exact defect, Carter said.

With the new process in place, they disassemble the entire engine and service or replace each part before rebuilding and returning the engine to the supply system. Though the overhaul may appear more time consuming and costly, it is more effective because Marines are able to fix the problem with the engine and repair other discrepancies that may not be immediately visible, he said.

The squadron began using the AIRSpeed system June 5, after officers and staff non-commissioned officers came back to MALS-36 from stateside classes on the system. The leaders passed on the knowl-

edge to their non-commissioned officers in charge, who went back to their respective sections to get the junior enlisted Marines involved, according to Capt. John Digiovanni, the avionics officer of MALS-36.

"It's those Marines who are the backbone of the shops," Digiovanni said. "They're the ones who use the current systems and equipment, so they'll be able to make the most difference in improving the way the squadron works as a whole."

The system will enhance mission success by standardizing practices throughout the squadron and eliminating unnecessary steps. This will also allow units with the squadron to transfer equipment quickly and efficiently, said Maj. Jack G. Abate, MALS-36 aircraft maintenance officer.

"It's a disciplined methodology whose purpose is to keep us all on the same page," he said. ■

leader. Earlier this week, in defiance of international wishes, the communist country test-fired seven ballistic missiles.

Bush reiterated that diplomacy is the best way to deal with recent North Korean provocations and explained that patience is important.

"It takes a while for a problem to fester and grow, and then it takes a while to solve them diplomatically. It's just the nature of diplomacy," he said. "I wish we could solve them overnight, but I'm realistic."

The international community must come together to put pressure on North Korea to reform its ways, Bush said, and urged China, Japan, Russia and South Korea, all participants in the Six-Party Talks, to seek a United Nations Security Council resolution condemning North Korea for its missile launches.

"It's best for all of us to go to the U.N. Security Council and say loud and clear what we're in the process of doing," Bush said. "What matters most of all is for Kim Jong Il to see the world speak with one voice." ■

charged diesel engines.

"These boats can stop on a dime even when they are going full speed," said Metallo, who is a physics teacher at Inglewood High School in Jacksonville, Fla.

Now, Metallo and Lucea said they are looking forward to returning to their civilian lives in a few short months, but they will miss the Marines they met in their unit.

"I have always wanted to be a school teacher and a Marine, now I get to do both," said Metallo. "Plus I got to ride cool boats while I was in Iraq." ■

# Those who strip the right to be called service members

For two months, this 23-year-old guy was allegedly having one sex with a woman he had never seen before. The woman and the guy she was raped even though she was not. From her description, the guy thought that the rapist was someone who worked in the same company. So he reportedly kidnapped the other man, slit his throat, poured gas all over the body, lit it on fire and tried the remains.

Why did I think the crime was so much worse when I read the 23-year-old accused murderer was a petty officer and the victim was a Marine who returned from

Iraq? That the telephone sex woman was the kind of woman who would wander around Oceana Naval Station collecting telephone numbers so she could randomly call military guys?

The addition of those uniforms suddenly made these events too disturbing for me. Because in my heart military people ought to be above all that. They should be smart enough to know that no one should call you 50 times a day. They should suspect that someone who is allegedly blonde, wealthy and willing to send topless pictures of herself is not on the up and up. Most of all they should understand in the core of their every cell that life is sacred and that you lay down your life for another guy in uni-

form, not scheme to take his.

I don't usually react to crimes like this in quite the same way. I try to be a realist. I accept that there is a criminal element acting in my world with malicious intent. But I have trouble accepting criminal behavior from servicemen. I don't know why.

It isn't like the uniform is a leash or a collar. It doesn't prevent people from being vulnerable to the same jealousies, mental illnesses, addictions, bad upbringings and raging evils that slay the rest of the population. Service members are not gods and heroes because of a couple of ribbons and a stripe down the side of their pants. Still, I expect more from them.

Maybe holding military folks to

this higher standard is totally unfair. My husband thinks it is demeaning when a criminal is identified as a military person, especially in a headline.

"Once they commit the crime they have stripped themselves of the right to be called a sailor," he said when I showed him this story. "Once you act against honor, courage, commitment you are no longer part of the uniform."

"Do you really believe that?" I asked him. "Do you really think that you can set aside the uniform just because they murder somebody?"

"Yeah, I do," he said.

Well, I don't. For him, the uniform is something that you have to

earn and keep on earning. For me, it's different. For me the uniform is something that your country bestows on you. It's an honor. It's a responsibility. You don that uniform and everything you do reflects back on it. You aren't allowed to shed it just because you don't believe in it anymore or because you never believed in it.

And I think that's what adds one more thick layer of tragedy on any crime that a military member commits. The fact that once upon a time that person aspired to be a man or woman in uniform. They wanted to be a finer person.

They wanted to be held to a higher standard. And they failed. In the worst way possible, they failed us all. ■

and obtained the necessary manpower to complete the building.

Civil Affairs teams oversee funding for a variety of reconstruction projects in the region which bolster Iraqis' quality of life while improving the economy, said Lt. Col. Larry L. White, the civil military operations center director for the Al Qa'im region.

The team spent nearly two years finding a contractor to complete the project and locals had lost hope of seeing their school constructed since it was destroyed in 2003 during heavy fighting between Marines and insurgents, according to Mallicoat, 33, from Vancouver, Wash.

"I want to thank the Coalition Forces on behalf of all of the people of Karabilah for finishing the school very fast and for supporting the construction of a fine place," said Mohammed Ahmed Selah, mayor of Karabilah, where the school is located.

The mayor and the Marines agree that the school's neighborhood is relatively safe although there is still the threat of IED's - the insurgents preferred method of attack, according to Bernier, a Fallbrook, Calif. native.

"The bomb was a last ditch effort by insurgents to destroy the progress we've made in this area," said Bernier.

Since arriving here four months ago, the Marines have seen a decrease in enemy activity after conducting daily security patrols in 110 degree-plus temperatures alongside Iraqi soldiers. The Marines have also introduced the city to their new police force and have begun conducting security operations alongside policemen.

The Marines say local

Iraqi Security Forces have made significant progress in the past few months by providing security for their people and conducting several independent operations to hunt down insurgents. Just three months ago, Iraqi soldiers partnered with the Marines here were learning the basics of security maneuvers and weapons handling.

Today, the Marines conduct security foot patrols with the Iraqi Army and Iraqi Police on a daily basis. Now, the Marines say they are seeing less insurgent activity since they arrived four months ago, thanks to the combined efforts and increase of presence of Iraqi Security Forces.

"We are capturing more of the bad guys with a higher level of expertise in IED-making and that leaves a lot of insurgents with minimal experience in making the bombs," said Bernier. "One guy blew himself up last week trying to plant an IED."

Tribal sheikhs expressed pride in the region's new police forces during a visit by Al Anbar Provinces' governor to Husaybah last week. The governor, Maamoon Sami Rasheed al-Awani, echoed their sentiments.

"The security in this region has changed for the better," said Awani in Arabic during the July 3 meeting. "Without the work the Iraqi Army and Iraqi police are doing here, we would not be able to move forward with construction projects."

The city of Karabilah opened their first police station last month after a

three-year hiatus of policemen.

The Marines feel the area will remain safe from insurgents as more Iraqis are coming forward to join local police forces.

Of the 400 Iraqi males who showed up during a police recruiting drive last week in Al Qa'im, more than 100 were accepted for police boot camp - the largest turnout yet in the area.

The Marines' priority in this region is helping local police become more involved with their communities, thus bolstering locals' confidence in their own police force, said Bernier.

The sooner the Iraqi people can count on their police to address crime in their city, the sooner Coalition Forces can begin going home, according to officials with the Police Transition Team here, a group of servicemembers responsible for mentoring and advising the Iraqi Police to become an independent organization.

"The policemen here do their job much the same way police officers back in the states do their job," said Arthur L. Dehlinger, a retired American police officer with the Police Transition Team. "The people here are going to trust their own police force over the Americans naturally."

The transition team's goal is to have fully functioning police departments throughout the country in order for Iraqi Security Forces to take over security operations such as in places like the Diyala Province, Iraq. Iraqi Security Forces there have already begun working independently. ■

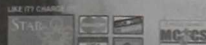

# How pure is the water we drink?

## How drinking water sources are protected at Camp Lejeune

This is the third of a three part series on drinking water at Camp Lejeune and New River. The first article in the series addressed our current sampling and testing efforts to ensure that the water you drink is safe. Last week we addressed where our water comes from and the process we use to treat the water. This final article will provide some information on actions being taken aboard the base to preclude contamination from our drinking water sources.

The following information is intended to help explain the actions that Camp Lejeune has undertaken to ensure you are consuming safe drinking water by protecting the quality of the underground freshwater aquifer - the source of drinking water produced at Camp Lejeune.

Each day, Camp Lejeune produces an average of 7 million gallons of drinking water. This water is pumped from the Castle Hayne Aquifer through 77 deep water wells to one of our five water treatment plants. The Camp Lejeune Wellhead Protection Plan is one tool that base planners use to ensure this drinking water supply is safe and clean. The purpose of a wellhead protection plan is to identify specific procedures and plans to protect both individual wells and the drinking water aquifer. Protection measures assure that Camp Lejeune can provide an adequate and safe supply of drinking water at all times.

Actions which protect drinking water from contamination include restricting land uses near wellfields, frequent sampling of wells for highly mobile contaminants, locating wellfields in undeveloped areas and constructing wells in a manner that minimizes the potential for contamination from surface sources. The wellhead protection plan also identifies "protection zones" surrounding each well and identifies areas where water resources are plentiful. The Camp Lejeune Wellhead Protection Plan balances the need to protect groundwater supplies with the unique mission responsibilities of an active federal military installation.

We take protection of occupants and residents of the base very seriously and make sure contaminants do not enter the drinking water supply. When a contaminated site is first identified, part of the initial evaluation is to determine the risk this site poses to human health and the environment. This risk assessment includes the identification of drinking water production wells within 1,500 feet of the site or hydraulically downgradient from the site. These wells are closely monitored and they are closed immediately if monitoring of the contamination plume shows a potential for the well to become contaminated.

Once the extent of the contamination at a site is identified, actions are taken to clean it up. The State Department of Environment and Natural Resources and the Federal Environmental Protection Agency set the standards to which the sites must be remediated. They also must approve the technologies that are being used to perform the cleanup. To clean up sites with petroleum, oil and lubricants, we take advantage of the shallow location of the contamination and its desire to volatilize or change from a liquid to a vapor. The primary technology for cleaning up these contaminants is to use an Air Sparging/Soil Vapor Extraction System. This system operates by pushing air through the groundwater. The contamination clings to the air bubbles as they rise to the top of the groundwater table. When the bubbles reach the soil, the system creates a vacuum and pulls the air out of the ground and through a treatment system. To date, we have completed cleaning up 149 POL contaminated sites and are nearing cleanup completion at 16 others. That leaves 17 sites that have ongoing active remediation systems running, and 27 final sites that are being assessed for proper corrective action. These clean-up and assessment actions address all known Underground Storage Tank locations aboard the base where releases may have occurred.

The cleanup of chlorinated solvent contaminated sites (like dry cleaning solvents and metal degreasers) is significantly more difficult because these contaminants sink when they reach groundwater and because they tend to be adsorbed by the soil. Until recently, chlorinated solvent remediation technologies have proven to be very unsuccessful across the nation.

Even with recent technological advancements, the varying processes are efficient only under certain site conditions. The key to success lies in matching up different technology to the conditions present at the site. To date, Camp Lejeune has had great success with a technology that uses thermal heating to boil the contaminants out of the groundwater and capture the vapors for treatment above ground.

Of course, the best way to ensure that drinking water is safe and clean is to prevent pollutants from ever entering the aquifer in the first place. Because even small amounts of pollutants can contaminate millions of gallons of drinking water, prevention is always the best policy. Therefore, the base implements many precautionary measures to minimize the risk of contaminating this valuable resource. Two of these actions are described below.

Our Underground Storage Tank program provides several examples and includes facilities across the base that use these petroleum storage devices: facilities such as service stations, steam plants, vehicle maintenance shops, and the MCAS New River aviation fueling system. In the past, corrosion of steel tanks led to soil and groundwater contamination at sites scattered across the installation. During the past decade more than 500 regulated Underground Storage Tanks and more than 2,500 non-regulated Underground Storage Tanks have been removed from aboard the base.

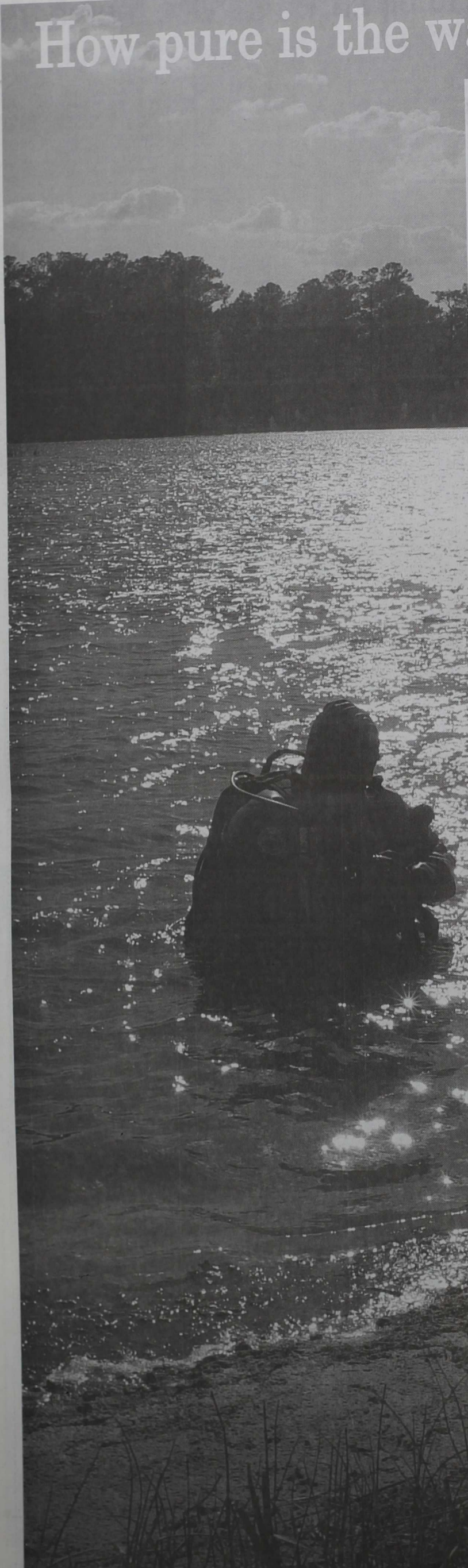
Today, in comparison to those numbers, we have minimized the use of Underground Storage Tank systems and have only 72. All but one of these tanks is constructed of corrosion-resistant materials such as fiberglass-reinforced plastic or high-density polyethylene - including nine of 10 tanks that are not required to meet this requirement. Another risk-reduction initiative undertaken is the installation of a computer-based Underground Storage Tank monitoring system that immediately alerts site personnel to a POL release - decreasing the potential for groundwater contamination. We have also removed all known home-heating oil Underground Storage Tanks as a further means of reducing our liability.

With military range sustainability efforts becoming increasingly important to DoD, Camp Lejeune has investigated new technologies to eliminate lead from accumulating at high-volume firing areas such as pistol ranges, and risk becoming a source for eventual groundwater contamination.

Over the last few years, the base has undertaken the installation of bullet traps at six small-arms ranges located on Main side, MCAS New River and in the Greater Sandy Run Area. The bullet traps catch lead and copper projectiles so that they do not enter the environment: the lead and copper are then recycled. The bullet traps also employ vacuum systems that capture lead dust generated from the firing activities. Two more systems are currently under construction at pistol ranges located at Stone Bay.

Protecting our groundwater from contamination is vital, and it is something each of us can help with by properly storing, handling, using, and disposing of all chemicals, fuels and oil products. ## What should I eat to stay healthy and fit?

I get this question a lot and I always answer with an assertive, "Food!" It may sound sarcastic, but in this day of pills, shakes, smoothies, powders and bars, the public needs to be reminded that good ol' food has brought mankind a long way. Sometimes, I do elaborate on my answer and suggest specific foods and that's what I'll do in this article. I'll suggest some ideal foods in lieu of more traditional choices and give some examples of how food marketers may try to be a bit deceiving.

### Multi-grain bread is whole wheat

Unfortunately, just because the name of a brand of bread contains 7-Grain or Multi-grain, it doesn't mean that the entire grain is being used in the bread. Food companies do this because health care professionals are pushing for Americans to eat more whole grains, but it is cheaper and easier for food companies to process refined grains, plus there is less shelf waste when wheat is in its refined form.

Why do we want whole grains? Whole grains have been shown to protect against cancers, heart disease, diabetes and may also be linked to obesity prevention and weight maintenance. The funny thing is,

scientists don't fully know why. There are a plethora of nutrients such as fiber, vitamin E, B-vitamins, chromium and selenium, but there are dozens more that we are not even certain about. It may be as simple as, people who choose whole grains make other healthy choices, such as exercising more or eating more vegetables.

The bottom line is to reap the known benefits of eating whole grains by making sure the first ingredient on your bread, pasta, granola bars and cereals reads whole wheat flour, bulgur, rolled oats, etc. and look for "100 percent whole grain" on the packaging. This is the only way to be sure that you're getting the good stuff. I have heard complaints about whole grain products being too expensive and sometimes they are. If it is too expensive, I recommend stocking up on whole grain products when they're on sale. You can store excess bread in the freezer to ensure it doesn't become moldy. As more consumers demand the "real" healthy products, the price will come down.

### Made with 100 percent real fruit

Does this still work on people as they eat their jelly-filled donut or sugar laden smoothie?

The truth is, jelly, smoothies and juices can be made with 100 percent real fruit and the rest of it is sugar, flour, ice-cream, butter, or artificial flavoring. Containing 100 percent real fruit means that they did toss some real fruit into the vat of fat, but it does not justify calling the food healthy!

Don't be fooled. If you are really looking for a product made with 100 percent whole fruit only, look at the ingredients and be sure that only fruit is listed. Also, look at the calories and confirm that a serving

## NBA Basketball

**ORLANDO** — The Orlando Magic are holding guard J.J. Redick out of summer league play because of a back injury.

Redick, a former Duke standout, repeatedly has said he's not bothered by the herniated disc in his back, an injury announced just before the Magic took him No. 11 overall in the NBA draft. He received a cortisone shot about a month ago and said he won't need surgery.

"I feel I could be out there, but we had to decide if it was worth the risk and not take the chance," he said.

General manager Otis Smith said Friday the club was holding him out as a precaution because Redick hasn't played full-speed in four weeks.

Redick also said he isn't certain whether he will train with Team USA, which opened pre-2008 Olympic workouts Wednesday in Las Vegas.

He was one of 23 players chosen for the squad, including Magic teammate Dwight Howard.

Redick was The Associated Press National Player of the Year last season and finished as the Atlantic Coast Conference's career leading scorer.

## NHL Hockey

**RALEIGH** — The Carolina Hurricanes have signed forward Patrick Dwyer to a two-year contract in a move to improve the team's depth, the team said Friday.

Dwyer, 23, will make \$450,000 next season and \$475,000 in 2007-08 at the NHL level and receives a \$25,000 signing bonus. He will make \$50,000 a year while playing at the American Hockey League level.

Last year, the 5-foot-11, 170-pound prospect had 16 goals and 29 assists in his first full professional season with Chicago of the AHL.

Before that, he totaled 45 goals and 56 assists in 142 career games with Western Michigan of the Central Collegiate Hockey Association.

## World Cup

**BERLIN** — France captain Zinedine Zidane, sent off for headbutting Marco Materazzi late in Sunday's World Cup final loss to Italy, won the Golden Ball award for the tournament's best player.

The results were released Monday morning in Berlin by FIFA.

Zidane polled 2,012 points in the vote by journalists covering the tournament, beating Italians Fabio Cannavaro (1,977 points) and Andrea Pirlo (715 points) in the ballot.

Zidane, 34, a former international player of the year and 1998 World Cup champion, announced last month that he was retiring from soccer after

the end of the tournament.

He wasn't particularly outstanding in France's opening draws with Switzerland and South Korea and missed the last group match against Togo due to suspension.

But Zidane produced some vintage performances in the wins over Spain, Brazil and Portugal in the knockout phase.

Voting for the 2006 Golden Ball closed at midnight Sunday. In previous tournaments, the ballot has closed at halftime in the final and the winner announced soon after the match.

Italy captain Cannavaro could be considered unlucky in the voting.

He led an Italian defense that conceded only two goals in the tournament: an own-goal against the United States and Zidane's penalty.

The final was his 100th cap for Italy.

Germany goalkeeper Oliver Kahn won the Golden Ball in 2002.

Other previous winners were Brazilians Ronaldo (1998) and Romario ('94) and Italy's Salvatore Schillaci ('90).

Germany striker Miroslav Klose was the Golden Shoe winner for the tournament's leading scorer. He won with five goals.

Ronaldo won the award in 2002 with eight goals.

is around 60-80 calories, 15-20 grams of carbohydrate and little or no fat or protein. As far as which is healthier, products made from real fruit or whole fruit? It's a no-brainer. Whole fruit has all the nutrients of fruit plus the fiber and water content which can help individuals on a weight loss diets feel full. If a product contains only 100 percent fruit juice, is it healthy? Yes, it's much healthier than soda or a sports drink, but not as healthy as whole fruit. Shoot for whole fruit first, then 100 percent fruit juice! Avoid fruit drinks and soda and save the sports

drinks for physical training lasting more than 60-90 minutes.

**Skim or 1 percent milk**

I know that some of you are cringing right now, but I've come a long way too. In the past, 1 percent milk would not have been an option — I would have suggested skim milk only. The truth is, we drink a lot of milk and that's great, but we need to reduce the saturated fat we are consuming to less than 20 grams each day.

Some health professionals suggest less than 15 grams each day to help prevent heart disease. One cup of whole milk has eight grams per cup and 2% milk has five grams per cup. So, three, 8-ounce cups of whole milk totals 24 grams of saturated fat for the day, without eating anything else with

saturated fat! Should you stop drinking milk all together? Absolutely not! In fact, drink more! You should be drinking three or four 8-ounce cups each day. Milk is packed with vitamins and minerals, the most important being calcium, but it's also a great provider of whey and casein protein and a disaccharide called lactose, which makes a great post exercise beverage. Don't let lactose intolerance stop you from reaping the benefits of milk, either. Drink Lactaid or better yet, just buy some lactase enzyme supplements at your local pharmacy and you'll never have a problem again with digesting milk or any other dairy products.

"Why wouldn't you want to take advantage of an opportunity to work out and stay fit for free right here on base?" Warner said.

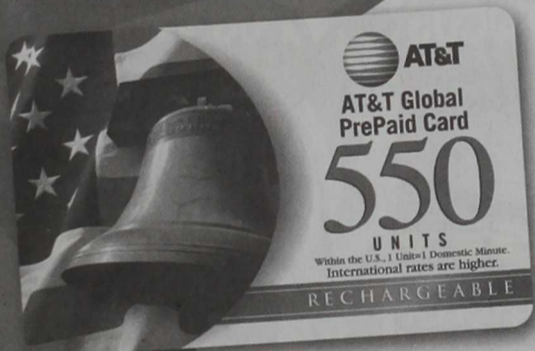

Human attitudes towards sharks changed forever when Peter Benchley wrote *JAWS*, but savvy saltwater anglers understand these impressive fish are worthy of far more respect as terrific, tackle-busting gamefish than many ignorant folks are willing to give them.

For those misinformed masses that stay out of the water out of fear of a shark attack, a quick Internet search revealed the number of people killed by sharks averages around 15 worldwide every year. The average annual number of people killed by falling coconuts: 150.

Marina spent Friday afternoon anchored in Browns Inlet to do a little shark fishing and had great action in just a few hours. Howell and a friend landed two sharks weighing approximately 100 pounds and 60 pounds respectively and had eight run-offs to boot. Needless to say, they plan on returning soon to take advantage of the great action the local shark population is more than willing to provide.

If you decide to give shark fishing a try, bring heavy tackle, respect your adversary and release them to fight another day. If you do decide to keep a shark, remember that North Carolina fishing regulations allow one shark per boat per day and that these must measure 54 inches from nose to tail fork.

Fishermen looking for a little less adventure will find the red drum fishing along the beach and in the New and White Oak rivers to be excellent and the usual summertime cast of characters to be present in varying degrees of abundance.

Spanish mackerel, small bluefish and a host of bottomfish will all do their part to make your next fish fry possible.

To the east, Richard Ehrenkauffer, a.k.a. Dr. Bogus, has seen an increase in activity over the past week. Over the weekend, the king mackerel blitzed the anglers at the end of the Bogue Inlet Fishing Pier. On Sunday afternoon alone there were six kings hooked, of which three were landed. A tarpon was also hooked during the hot bite, but the fish was lost before it could be brought up.

Along the beaches there has been a return of the pompano and the flounder are edging ever closer to Bogue Inlet. Bogus recommends fishing the rising tide along the recently-dredged inlet channel.

As has been the case for the better part of the past three weeks, red drum are still going strong and providing lots of action in the surf and up in the quiet backwaters of Bogue Sound and the White Oak River.

Sight-casting to these bronze-backed beauties is becoming part of a normal day of soundside fishing. It seems there are few places where anglers won't run into at least a few drum feeding in the shallows, where a quiet presentation is everything.

Bogus also reported there are lots of big blue crabs in the Bogue Sound for those in search of the main ingredient for fresh crab cakes.

# Ted Williams embodied the American man

If you look at the statistics of arguably the most storied player of all time, you see years that are empty. Holes in the middle of one of the greatest careers baseball fans ever v.

Ted Williams hit .406 in 1941, becoming the last player ever reach the plateau — then he entered his first duty as a Marine Corps pilot in World War I.

"A man has to have goals — for a day, for a lifetime — and that was mine, to have people say, 'There goes Ted Williams, the greatest hitter who ever lived,'" Williams wrote in his book, *My Turn At Bat*.

Williams played for the Boston Red Sox and is remembered by many simply by his nickname — "Teddy the game."

The man was an enigma in the way that no matter what task he decided to delve into, he wasn't satisfied if he was the best at it. Williams wasn't just good at what he did, he was great at everything. Teddy was as good as can be at anything he did.

During operational training in Jacksonville, Fla., he set a world record in 1942.

Later in life as a fly fisherman during retirement, he was inducted into the International Game Fish Association Hall of

Fame in 2000. Not too bad for a two-time MVP, the last .400 hitter the game has seen and a man that served two tours in two wars.

Williams played in the Red Sox from 1939-1942, before his two-year tour in WWII, came back and played from 1946-1952 and then left the diamond again to serve in the Korean War from 1952-1953 before returning to Boston to finish out the last seven years of his career.

Williams retired in 1960 with a career batting average of .344 and 521 home runs. The infamous No. 9's hitting stroke was so feared that opponents frequently employed the then-radical, defensive "Williams Shift" against him, leaving only one fielder on the third base half of the field. Rather than bunting the ball into the open space, the proud Williams batted as though he were going against the typical defense.

But, as amazing and groundbreaking as he was as a player, Williams was an even better American. He didn't let baseball stop him from doing what he thought was his duty as a part of this great nation.

Of course the Red Sox didn't want him to leave their team, as they were constantly competing with the Yankees for supremacy, but Teddy did what he thought was right.

While in Korea, Williams flew 39 missions despite the fact that he was in and out of the infirmary during his

time there. Various sicknesses and ailments kept him from being in the air flying as much as he would've liked during the tour.

"I was no hero. There were maybe 75 pilots in our two squadrons and 99 percent of them did a better job than I did," the humbled Williams said in 1953.

Even more remarkable was his commitment to fight after sharing very controversial feelings about his displeasure with the war in the first place.

In his mind, the benchmark of his life was when he was elected into the Baseball Hall of Fame June 20, 1966 after receiving 282 of a possible 302 votes.

His acceptance speech was one that personified the man who was larger than life almost as well as any of his accomplishments. He used it not to talk about himself, but to praise Negro League stars who then weren't allowed to enter the hall along with the game itself.

"I hope that some day the names of Satchel Paige and Josh Gibson in some way could be added as a symbol of the great Negro players that are not here only because they were not given the chance," Williams said.

"So in closing, I am grateful and know how lucky I was to have been born in America and to have had the chance to play the game I love, the greatest game of them all, baseball." ■

## Camp Lejeune's historical sites protected

For hundreds of years, Native Americans and European settlers have called the North Carolina coast home. They raised their children, farmed the land and left traces of their lives in the soil where Marines are now making their mark on history.

The Cultural Resources Program, which is part of the Environmental Management Division, Marine Corps Base, is dedicated to protecting the base's more than 1,000 archeological sites, many of which date to early Native American and colonial life, while promoting the training of Marines here, according to Rick Richardson, the base archeologist with the Environmental Conservation Branch, EMD.

Of the 1,000 sites, some of which dated to 8,000 BC, only a few are federally protected, according to Richardson. One such site is the Col. Ward archeological site.

"This site represents the entire gamut of historic and prehistoric artifacts on base," Richardson said.

The site, where the prominent Englishman, and his family started a plantation, is where they believe Ward's residence and slave quarters were located.

The land not only contains artifacts from this period of time but artifacts from Native Americans such as pottery, stone arrow heads, spear points and stone tools. Along with this site, there are 11 other protected areas on base with several others being reviewed.

The program goes through sev-

eral steps to find sites and determine what degree of protection should be placed on them and how much of the site should be excavated to protect the artifacts, according to Richardson.

An initial survey is done by systematically shoveling small amounts of dirt and sifting the dirt through a screen.

The next step is to collect data on the site and send it data to the National Register of Historic Places. If they deem the site eligible to be put on the register they must be protected.

The last step of the process is only conducted if a building or training crucial to the base will destroy the artifacts at a site. In this case, a full excavation of all the artifacts at a site will take place.

The base archeologist contracts companies to perform the excavation while he supervises. The artifacts are then sent to North Carolina Archeological Office in Raleigh.

Archeological sites, which are not excavated, are left where they are. Archeological sites are unmarked to help protect them from people who might take steal from the sites and to preserve their historic significance. Taking artifacts from a site is illegal, said Richardson.

Even though there are many archeological sites, it does not mean that units cannot train near an archeological site, according to Richardson.

"We work with the units and try and show them what they can or can't do in an area," said Richardson. "Our goal is not only to reduce the impact to sites but to also reduce the impacts on training." ■

## Rip current threat warrants caution

When people go to the beach, they often take precautionary measures to ensure they will have a good time. Most apply sun block to prevent burning, bring cool beverages to combat thirst and wear clothing that is suited for the elements of a beach environment.

One thing that many beach goers overlook however, is the eminent risk of drowning, which is the third leading cause of unintentional deaths in the United States. Especially dangerous are rip currents, which claim more than 100 lives a year and are responsible for more than 80 percent of rescues by U.S. Lifesaving Association affiliated lifeguards at ocean beaches, according to USLA's Web site [www.usla.org](http://www.usla.org).

"Rip currents are strong, swift-moving channels of water rushing from the shore out to sea," said Sgt. Michael Story, noncommissioned officer in charge of the Marine Corps Community Service's beach detachment. "They are most typically formed at low spots or breaks in sandbars, and also near structures such as jetties and piers."

Rip currents can be found on many surf beaches every day and can vary in widths from a few feet, to hundreds of yards, according to Story.

The seaward pull of rip currents also varies. In some instances the rip current ends just beyond the line of breaking waves, but in other situations rip currents continue to push hundreds of yards offshore, according to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Web site at [www.ripcurrents.noaa.gov](http://www.ripcurrents.noaa.gov).

Although the speeds of most rip currents are relatively slow, under certain wave, tide, and beach profile conditions the speeds can quickly increase to become dangerous to anyone entering the surf.

"If you are caught in a rip current, you need to remain calm, conserve energy and think clearly," said Story. "You should never attempt to fight against the current, instead swim parallel to the beach to exit the flow and then continue in towards the shore at an angle away from the current."

Should a person find themselves unable to swim out of a rip current, they should float or tread water until free or draw attention to themselves by waving and yelling for help according to the USLA.

The best way to avoid becoming the next victim of a rip current is to not go swimming, surfing, or participate in any water activity when winds are strong or when a storm is approaching, according to the NOAA.

The program begins with a computerized physical fitness assessment, which evaluates body composition, blood pressure, aerobic capacity, flexibility, muscular strength and muscle endurance followed by a printout detailing the results.

Following the assessment, a trainer will tailor a fitness program to meet the specific goals of the trainee.

"I try to generate a well balanced workout with cardio, strength training abdominal work and flexibility," said Cheryl Henley, personal trainer and group exercise instructor for Semper Fit.

Trainers then guide the trainee step-by-step through any one of a number of programs for example weight loss, sports specific, performance enhancement and strength gaining to ensure the exercises are performed correctly and efficiently.

After six to eight weeks, trainers perform a physical fitness retest that consists

of the same physical fitness assessment that was conducted upon beginning the training this helps trainers continuing to tailor the program to their needs, said Tanya Hewitt, the personal training and workshops coordinator for Semper Fit.

"I go home sore but full of energy and motivation every day after training with Cheryl, and it gets us ready to go with the Marines," said Navy Seaman Andray A. Clark, a student at Field Medical Service School at Camp Johnson and training to become a Marine Corpsman.

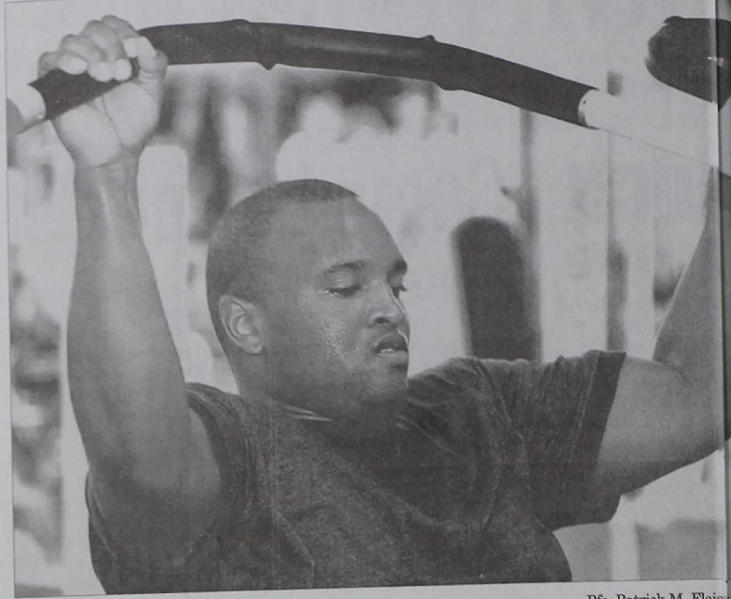
A health history questionnaire to determine physical ability is required to begin a training program, added Hewitt.

We monitor trainee's range of motion, manage the amount of weight they work out with and make adjustments throughout the workout to ensure their safety, said Henley.

Family members 17 and older can take advantage of this program but have to pay a per-session rate of \$10 or purchase a value package consisting of eight lessons for \$70.

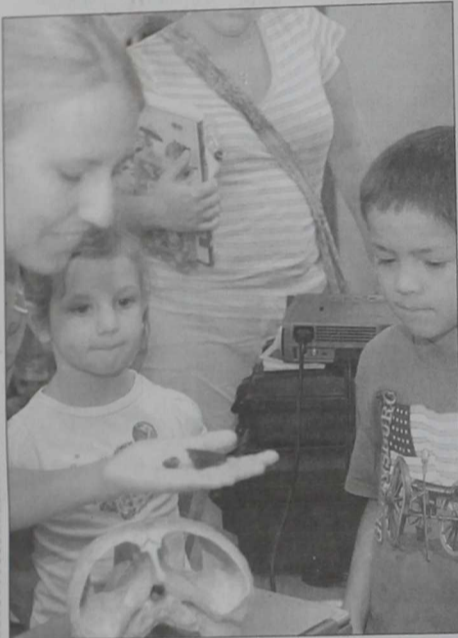

## Fraud, Waste, Abuse Hotline offers safe outlet for filing reports

With all the costly supplies and advanced technology in the Marine Corps, abusing the power to utilize them can become a problem. Fortunately, there is a way to help regulate them.

The Fraud, Waste and Abuse Hotline is available for reporting such crimes to the proper authorities without going through the chain of command, said Gunnery Sgt. Clayton J. Carson, Fraud, Waste and Abuse manager, 2nd Marine Logistics Group.

Fraud, waste and abuse can be compared to similar improprieties such as theft or misuse of government property and conflicts of interest, which are serious matters that increase costs to the government and reduce resources available to support the operating forces, according to Secretary of the Navy Instruction 5430.92B. Examples may include making long distance phone calls at work, taking a government vehicle to the exchange or using government property for personal use.

The hotline gives Marines an avenue to address improprieties outside of their chain of command and without fear of reprisal if they choose to remain anonymous, said Carson. For those who may think their allegations will be ignored, do not be so quick to doubt the system. "Every allegation is investigated," said Carson. "Depending on the accuracy of the allegation, it may be up to the unit's commander to decide whether to investigate or not."

If a reported allegation is too implausible to waste resources, such as something the unit does not even supply being stolen, the commander will stop the investigation before it starts, said Carson. Overall, the hotline provides an outlet for MLG personnel to utilize when reporting an act of fraud, waste or abuse in their respective command. The caller may remain anonymous and their allegation will be taken seriously. "It's a good system if it's not abused," Carson concluded.

# Literary Latte

Lejeune High School graduates start poetry night at local coffee house

Coffee houses have long been venues for artists and writers to congregate and showcase their work, but these cultural centers are usually found only in big cities or college towns. Now, Jacksonville has a literary community to call its own thanks to Darren Angle and William Roberts, Lejeune High School graduates back from their first year at college and hoping to inspire creativity in their hometown.

"Just because Jacksonville isn't a big city doesn't mean there are people here who aren't fellow lovers of art," said Roberts, an English and philosophy major at St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn. "There are community orchestras, bands and theatre productions — why not a community poetry club?"

Angle and Roberts are hosting a poetry reading every Sunday from 9 - 10 p.m. at Beans Coffee House at 314 Western Blvd. in Jacksonville. "We chose Sunday night because the reading is adult-oriented and children are least likely to be there," explained Roberts, who works at Beans. The poetry reading, an open-mike style gathering that features a guest poet in addition to welcoming impromptu readers, has already attracted a sizeable crowd of art appreciators after just three weeks.

The creators hope to get as many members of the military community involved as possible. "This is a military town and so this is the audience we're trying to capture," said Angle, an English major at Macalester College in St. Paul, Minn.

Both students' drive to write was inspired by their English teacher at Lejeune High School, Beth Knappenberger. "My poetry was so contrived and overly emotional until she took me aside and pointed me in the right direction," said Angle, who is currently in the process of writing a book of poetry. "She really shaped my literary career."

"She had us dissect and analyze poetry daily and no other teacher did that," said Roberts.

Angle's and Roberts' eventual goal is to create a Web site featuring an online literary magazine and a guide for creating a literary community in a small town. "The Web site will serve as a manual to teach people how to start something like this in their own town," said Angle.

In the meantime, the friends hope to spread the word about the poetry night as much as possible before the end of summer. "We'd like to contact teachers and ask them if they'd like to give their students credit for reading work at the literary community," said Angle. When the two head back to college, Ellen Smith, the owner of Beans, will host the community's events.

Angle will return to Macalester in the fall and Roberts will be taking classes at an experimental college at Macalester in which students and teachers collaborate in non-traditional classes. "It'll be very Jack Kerouac-esque," said Roberts. ■

## THE BREAK-UP (PG-13)

The Break-Up is an anti-romantic comedy about a couple who can't live with each other and can't live without each other. It is a story about a man and woman who fall out of love.

A Chicago couple meets at a Cubs game, falls in love, moves in and then, after two years together, they decide to part ways. However, once they split, neither ex is willing to budge from the condo they bought in happier times.

Jennifer Aniston (*Rumor Has It*, *Desire*, *The Good Girl*) stars as Brooke Myers, who works at an art gallery.

Vince Vaughn (*The Wedding Crashers*, *Be Cool*, *Mr. & Mrs. Smith*) stars as Gary (Gibowski) who hosts bus tours of Chicago.

Pushed to the breaking-up point after their latest "why can't you do this one little thing for me" argument, Brooke calls it quits with Gary.

When neither ex is willing to move out, the only solution is to continue living as hostile roommates until somebody caves.

What follows is a series of remedies, war tactics, overtures, and underminings suggested by the former couple's friends, confidantes and the occasional total stranger.

Costarring is John Favreau (*Wimbledon*, *David*) as Johnny O, Gary's best friend; Joey Lauren Adams (*The Big Empty*, *Dr. Dolittle*) as Addie, Brooke's best friend; Jason Bateman (*Dodgeball: A True Underdog Story*) as Riggman, the real estate agent; Vincent D'Onofrio (*The Imposter*) as Dennis; Judy Davis (*Coast to Coast*) as Marilyn Dean, Brooke's eccentric boss; and Ann Margaret (*Taxi*).

Director Peyton Reed (*Bring It On*, *Down With Love*) does not quite pull the film together to convince the audience of the total break up.

This Break-Up has little substance, is funny at times, but runs out of steam towards the end.

## THE OMEN GO

The Omen is the remake of the 1976 horror classic about a couple who adopt a Satanic child after their biological child is stillborn.

Liev Schreiber (*The Skeleton Key*, *The Manchurian Candidate*, *The Sum of All Fears*) stars as Robert Thorn, an American diplomat who endures his wife's difficult delivery in which their newborn child dies.

Knowing his wife Katherine, played by Julia Stiles (*The Bourne Supremacy*), would be devastated by the news, he takes

an infant who was born at the same time and whose mother died giving birth and passes it on as their own with the help of the hospital priest. However, his wife must never know their secret.

Seamus Davey-Fitzpatrick is the new Damien, the son of Satan.

When the adopted child turns five, unsettling events begin to occur. People around Damien start to die and his nanny hangs herself.

Mia Farrow (*Rosemary's Baby*) plays Mrs. Baylock, Damien's new nanny, who seems to have a preordained devotion to the child.

The Thorns begin to think their young son is no ordinary child and that he may be Satan's incarnate.

Now, Robert Thorn must make the ultimate sacrifice to prevent the unspeakable terror that awaits the world.

Also starring are Michael Gambon (*Harry Potter* series) as Carl Bugenhagen and Pete Postlethwaite (*The Constant Gardener*) as Father Brennan.

John Moore (*The Flight of the Phoenix*, *Behind Enemy Lines*) directed this remake. This is the same story as the 30-year-old horror classic, only now played in our time. And of course, the date 6-6-6, the so-called devil's mark, was perfect for the film's intended release.

The Omen is more graphic and gory than the original but cannot touch the very scary classic of 1976.

Director Bryan Singer (*X-Men*, *X-Men 2*, *Apt Pupil*, *The Usual Suspects*), who helped write and also produce this enormous film, gives us a back-to-basics "Man of Steel" and a solid, classic theme by John Williams.

Superman Returns must not only endure the comparisons to the unforgettable Christopher Reeve films, but meet new standards for comic-book adaptations brought on by *Spiderman 2* and *Batman Begins*.

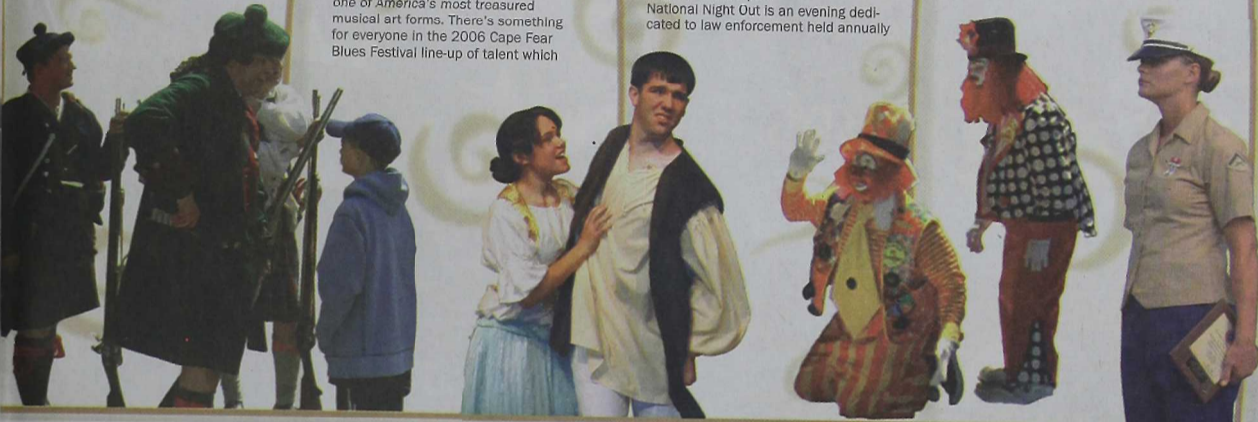

For six un-paid months Jeffery spent his time developing the Successful Soldiers Web site, [www.successfulsoldiers.com](http://www.successfulsoldiers.com), to help service members succeed in the civilian world after leav-

ing the military and to use their time in active-duty wisely.

"Transition officers do a great job, but we at Successful Soldiers believe that career guidance should be introduced well before leaving the military," according to the Web site.

Open to veterans or active-duty military, the site highlights jobs at more than 800 companies. It includes a resumé builder that asks job hunters questions about their past experiences and formats usable resúmes for them. Candidates can use the forum or chat functions to talk with potential employers, other service members or even friends and family. Employers can alert candidates to courses they can take while they're in active-duty to prepare them for an open position.

The site has been up for three months and has had 600,000 hits so far, but Jeffery wants more.

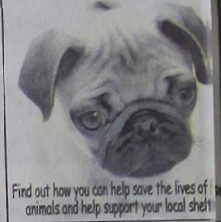
"My biggest challenge is to make the site known to military members," he said. "Once they find out about it, I think they'll see it as a great resource," he added.

There is no charge for using the site and Jeffery hopes to generate funds through advertising so that he can offer such advantages as free online tutoring services. "If users are having trouble in algebra, they could go to the site and I could provide help for them," he said.

Jeffery plans to provide laptop computers to troops that commit to continuing their education. "I'm going to preach education to them all the time, because I know that's what's going to get them a job when they leave the military," said Jeffery.

Upon completing the site Jeffery filed for non-profit status in the state of Missouri. ■
