### Battle Colors receive new streamers

MARINE BARRACKS WASH-INGTON, Washington D.C. —
Three new campaign streamers were added to the official battle colors of the Marine Corps during Marine Barracks Washington's Friday evening parade, July 15.

The Commandant of the Marine Corps, Gen. Michael W. Hagee, affixed the Afghanistan Campaign

streamer, Iraq Campaign streamer and Global War on Terrorism service streamer during a special ceremony in which their corresponding medals were formally established to recognize Marines in service after 2001.

The executive order signed at the White House by President George W. Bush states, "These medals shall be awarded to members of the Uniformed services of the United States who serve or have served in Afghanistan or contiguous air space, as defined by such regulations, on or after October 24th, 2001; who serve

or have served in Iraq or contiguous waters or air space, as defined by such regulations, on or after March 19th 2003 or who serve or have served in military operations to combat terrorism, as defined by such regulations, on or after September 11th, 2001, and all of which before a terminal date to be prescribed by the secretary of defense."

The last streamer to be added to the Battle Colors was the Kosovo Campaign Streamer, awarded for service in various Kosovo operations beginning in 1999.

Technology and convenience. Two separate words with two separate meanings. And yet, both have become synonymous with one another. Consider the cell phone. Without the cord, people are able to stay connected wherever they go. In keeping with the times, the Marine Corps has gradually been phasing out the old and implementing the new.

With the introduction of the Defense Travel System, Temporary Additional Duty orders will now be processed online.

The vision of DTS is to reengineer defense travel to a seamless, paperless, auto-

defense travel to a seamless, paperless, automated system that meets the needs of individual travelers, force commanders and process owners. The new system will support defense mission requirements, provide superior customer service to the traveler and to the command and reduce costs to the government.

Dealing with all the paperwork made the old system cumbersome, according to Pamela A. Gaines, the lead defense travel administrator at the base disbursing office.

"Rather than having to physically go out and get the signatures, each member of a Marine's chain of command is notified electronically. This enables them to give their stamp of approval from the comfort of their own workstation," said Gaines.

From the moment a request is initially filed, it can be processed in as little as 24 to 48 hours later. In order to make this and the mission of DTS a reality, Headquarters Marine Corps invested \$3.2 million into the project.

### IIF Platoon wraps up **Operation Scimitar**

MUWAYLIHAH, Iraq — After eight days of seeking out insurgents in Iraq's Al Anbar province, Operation Scimitar came to a close for the Marines and Iraqi soldiers of Iraqi Interdiction Force Platoon, Echo Company, 3rd Reconnaissance Battalion, 2d Marine Division.

In the third and final phase of the operation, IIF Platoon, was tasked with securing a small village approximately 18 miles southeast of Fallujah, called Muwaylihah.

Around 5 a.m. on July 12, the Marines and Iraqi soldiers of IIF platoon rolled into town and began cordon and search opera-

### Privatization of family housing makes progress

A private company, Atlantic Marine Corps Communities, is scheduled to take control of 63 percent of Camp Lejeune's family housing inventory Oct. 1 in the first phase of the base's move to privatize on-base housing through a Public-Private Venture partnership.

"Under a PPV arrangement, the ownership and management of on-base housing units will be turned over to a private company to improve living conditions and serve tenants better," said Jerry Swain, director of Family Housing Division, Installation and Environmental

Department, Marine Corps Base.

For many years, due to limited resources, an aging housing inventory and a backlog of maintenance and repairs, Family Housing around the Marine Corps has experienced difficulty in providing consistently high quality housing for service members and their families, according to Mike Lane, director of personnel for Family Housing Division.

"Many of the houses here were built back in the '40s and '50s," said Lane. "After 50 or 60 years of use, a lot of them need to be replaced and the rest need significant repairs."

### New law changes officer augmentation rules

Headquarters Marine Corps released Marine Administrative Message 316/05 July 15, listing several changes to the laws that govern the initial assignments of Marine Corps officers and

how they are augmented into active duty.

The Ronald W. Reagan National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2005 states that new officers, regardless of method or source of commissioning, will be added to the active duty list. This law is

retroactive to May.

Currently, all officers are given a reserve commission when they are commissioned. When their reserve commissioned. sion ends, officers can apply to be augmented a regular commission. Another provi-sion of the law is that all

reserve officers who currently meet the statuary require-ments for transition to active duty will be made active by May 2006. The Marine May 2006. The Marine Administrative Message states that the switch to active duty is automatic and cannot be declined, while all officer's

rights and obligations under their original contract will remain unchanged and that their oath of office will remain in effect and will not need to

be re-administered.





The main purpose behind Hallstrom's pook is to inform the American public

about what Operation Iraqi Freedom was like on the ground. He hopes that by doing this he can portray the bigger picture of why U.S. Forces are in Iraq.
"I want people who agree with us being here to have more fuel for the fire; people who don't, to understand what it was like here, and everyone to understand that not all Iraqis are bad people, and they want and need our help," Hallstrom said.

After being in Iraqi for more than five months, Hallstrom explains that he has seen progress in his battalion's area of operation, and he wants to convey that in his writing.

"I don't think people at home see the progress we're making on television. They don't always hear the stories of the people who were there the whole time witnessing the progress and being a part of it." he said.

Hallstrom decided to be a part of history and the Marine Corps. He wanted adventure and in two years, he has had "the adventure of a lifetime," serving with the Joint Task Force in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, and a deployment to Irao.

### 26th MEU Marines maintain edge with MCMAP

Operations Capable) continue
operations ashore throughout
the Central Command theater,
those who maintain the MEU's
"force in readiness" status
aboard ship are active daily in
training to keep mentally and
physically fit.

One example of this is the Marine Corps Martial Arts Program, as there are currently 36 Marines from Battalion Landing Team, 2d Bn., 8th Marines Regiment engaged in this intense program as they prepare for their gray belt test. The gray belt is the second of five belts a Marine can achieve in the MCMAP program.

The Marine Corps Martial Arts Program began in 2000. The program is designed around the three pillars of mental, physical and character development.

Aboard USS Kearsarge, Lead Instructor Staff Sgt. William D. Sudbrock, with Weapons Company, BLT 2/8, does his best to teach his class while they train aggressively in a small train aggressively in a small opening on the hangar deck of

the ship.
The limited space aboard ship is a major challenge, according to Sudbrock. Since the program includes extensive throws and grappling techniques, much of the student's time is spent on the ground.

At Camp Lejeune, large

At Camp Lejeune, large grassy or sandy areas are used for training. The cement-type non-skid surfaces found throughout the ship; however, make it necessary to confine the training to three large wrestling mats.

Sudbrock said due to the limited space, he breaks the group into smaller ones and uses a lot of round-robin rotations. This gives everyone the opportunity to practice their skills on the mats under the direct supervision of Sudbrock and other sion of Sudbrock and other

sion of Sudbrock and other instructors.

From a time perspective, he said it is easier to accomplish the required training aboard ship because of the captive audience and extra time available for training.

"There is more time in the evening hours than in the rear, since the Marines don't secure at the end of the day. We also don't have a lot weapons shoots when we are on ship."

don't have a lot weapons shoots when we are on ship," Sudbrock said.

In the rear, he may get in one or two classes a week, but on ship, the Marines train every day except Sunday, he said. His favorite part of the training is when the flight schedule allows the Marines the time to train on the flight deck. "You get a nice ocean breeze and have the Harriers as a backdrop," he said.

The Marines usually train for two hours a day and have been at it for the last three weeks. Their next step in the program is the gray belt test scheduled in the coming days.

### Corpsman makes history with meritorious promotion

CAMP HURRICANE POINT, AR RAMADI, Iraq — Paul W. Champion, 25, of Iron Mountain, Mich., made history July 15, when he was meritoriously promoted to the rank of petty officer 2nd class during a ceremony.

"I wasn't expecting it," said Champion, a hospitalman and the senior line corpsman for Company A, 1st Battalion, 5th Marine Regiment, humbly on his day of advancement. "I'm just doing my job the same as any other corpsman. I'm certainly happy I was recog-I'm certainly happy I was recognized, but I don't feel like I earned it any more than the other corpsmen out here."

Modesty aside, Champion's promotion was a Navy first.

Under the Navy's newly mandated Combat Meritorious
Advancement Program, Champion was one of only two sailors selected to pin on the rank meritoriously while serving in combat.

The program was created to advance sailors in enlisted pay grades of E1 through E5 in recognition of uncommon valor and extraordinary deeds demonstrated while engaged in, or in support of combat

dinary deeds demonstrated while engaged in, or in support of combat operations, according to Navy Administration message 077/05.

Just like his name, "he's a Champion," said Maj. Phillip J. Treglia, the operations officer for 1st Battalion, 5th Marine Regiment, shortly after pinning Champion's new rank insignia on the collar of his camouflaged blouse. "His actions proved that last year [in Fallujah]."

Champion was awarded a Navy Commendation medal with combat V device for his actions in Fallujah April 7, 2004 with 1st Battalion, 5th Marines.

"HM3 Champion exposed himself to the full volume of enemy rifle, machine gun and rocket propelled grenade fire as he gained access to a courtyard to treat a wounded Marine on the rooftop of a building," wrote 1st Battalion, 5th Marines' commander, Lt. Col. Eric Smith, in his letter nominating Champion for the program.

While exposed to heavy fire from

Champion has been a corpsman for three and a half years and has served with 1st Battalion, 5th Marines for two years.

the enemy, Champion climbed to the roof using a ladder, grabbed the wounded Marine and proceeded to carry him off the rooftop to safety, according to Smith's letter.

"HM3 Champion's strong back and incredible inner strength showed

as he moved the Marine from the as he moved the Marine from the rooftop," read Smith's letter. "In order to protect the Marine during the decent from enemy fire, HM3 Champion used himself as a human shield for the egress down the ladder. In training, without enemy fire,

and with protective gear, very few individuals could have carried another Marine down that exposed, narrow ladder."

The Marine returned to full duty days later and continued combat operations because of Champion's efforts, added Smith.

In addition to his heroic actions that day, Champion is also credited with being directly responsible for the casualty evacuation of 12 urgent, 10 priority, 15 routine and eight Iraqi civilians with gunshot wounds and blast injuries as a senior corpsman with

injuries as a senior corpsman with Company A last year during Operation Valiant Resolve.

An enemy mortar round injured Champion and five Marines, and according to Smith's letter, Champion rendered aid to the wounded Marines before seeking attention for his shrapnel wounds.

shrapnel wounds.

He also qualified as an Enlisted Fleet Marine Force Warfare Specialist last year in Fallujah.

"Champion is on

"Champion is on his second deployment to Iraq with 1st Battalion, 5th Marines in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom and continues to display an outstanding level of performance," wrote Smith.

He has built a cohesive unit of corpsman, who're responsible for the treatment of 14 wounded Marines, according to Smith. Champion was also selected as the Infantry Battalion's "Sailor of the Quarter."

Quarter."
Chief Petty Officer Rodney J.
Lewis, the senior medical department representative for the Battalion
Aid Station, 1st Battalion, 5th
Marines, believes Champion's promotion is well deserved.

### **'Flying Tigers' crew chiefs** train to engage enemy

MARINE CORPS AIR STATION FUTENMA, OKINAWA, Japan — The training scenario: A squad-sized element of enemy troops, armed with anti-air-craft missiles inhabit an island off the coast of Okinawa. Helicopter pilots must attempt to keep their "Phrogs" concealed during the flight to the hostile island, engage targets of opportunity and insert troops to take out the enemy. The crew chiefs will engage multiple targets on the island using M-2 .50 caliber machine guns.

The "Flying Tigers" of Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron 262 (Reinforced) attached to the 31st Marine Expeditionary Unit, stormed the island during a training exercise that took place June 28. Pilots and crew chiefs worked hand-in-hand during the training. The training counted as aircraft division leader training, aimed at developing pilots leadership in the air and aerial gunnery, intended to improve the crew chiefs marksmanship.

All flight operations require a strong sense of teamwork. When it comes to overall readiness of a helicopter squadron, the pilots control where the helicopter flies, and the crew chiefs work long hours, making sure the heli-

opters are ready for the mis-

sion.
"In Iraq, I saw firsthand

"In Iraq, I saw firsthand how important crew chiefs are to overall mission success," said Ist Lt. Alex T. Kushnir, flight equipment officer, HMM-262 (Reinforced). "A crew chief is a jack of all trades. They are the guys who get the helos ready for us."

Before a helicopter can fly, crew chiefs inspect the helicopter, prepare the cabin in accordance with mission requirements, fuel it, and acquire all needed equipment, said Cpl. Leif D. Skredsvig, a CH-46E crew chief with HMM-262 (Reinforced).

"We're responsible for the mechanics of the aircraft, as well as operating all crewserved weapons," Skredsvig said. "We make sure the weapons are in working order and set up, so they fire when we pull the trigger."

During the scenario, 12-14 enemy troops threatened the helicopters with anti-aircraft missiles. The objective was to

helicopters with anti-aircraft missiles. The objective was to fly to Idesuna Island undetected, conduct troop insertions and eliminate or capture any enemy personnel and equip-

ment.
"The training helps us build combat readiness and flight leadership," said Kushnir. "Flying is a perishable skill, and we need to train constantly to be proficient. Since we are with the MEU, we are focused on readiness because we can leave at a moment's notice."

Crew chiefs need to train on a daily basis, so that they can operate fluently when they are on a mission, said Lance Cpl Brandon P. Pratt, a CH-46E crew chief with HMM-262 (Reinforced). They must be able to handle everything inside the helicopter and be conscious of other wingmen.

other wingmen.
"Our job is to train constantly
until we go to combat," Pratt

said.

Crew chiefs have a great sense of dedication and responsibility to their fellow Marines. They put in long hours of hard work to ensure every aspect of the aircraft is prepared to complete any mission, Skredsvig said.

"Some days we pull 13 or more hours a day, bit it's worth it," Skredsvig said "I love this job. I can't see myself doing anything else in the Marine Corps."

### **Program aims to reduce** military divorce rates

WASHINGTON —
Recognizing the stresses military life and multiple deployments put on families, the services are stepping up their efforts to help their members strengthen their family relationships and avoid the divorce courts.

A full range of outreach programs - from support groups for spouses of deployed troops to weekend retreats for military couples - aim to help military families endure the hardships that military life often imposes.

families endure the nardships that military life often imposes. Specific service-by-service statistics about divorce rates within the military weren't available, but the rates for the Army give a snapshot of what are believed to be a militarywide trend

officials reported Army officials reported 10,477 divorces among the active-duty force in fiscal 2004, a number that's climbed steadily

anumber that's climbed steadily over the past five years. In fiscal 2003, the Army reported fewer than 7,500 divorces; in 2002, just over 7,000, and in 2001, approximately 5,600.

During the past two years, the divorce rate has been higher among Army officers than their enlisted counterparts, reversing the previous trend, officials said. In fiscal 2003, the Army reported almost 1,900 divorces among its 56,000 married officers. The following year, that number jumped to more than 3,300 - an increase of almost 1,500.

These statistics reflect a general trend in American society,

These statistics reflect a general trend in American society, Army Chaplain Col. Glen Bloomstrom, director of ministry initiatives for the Army's Office of the Chief of Chaplains, pointed out. Forty-five to 50 percent of first marriages end in divorce nationwide, he said, and the failure rate is even higher for second marriages: a whopping 60 to 70 percent. 60 to 70 percent.

Divorce rates run even

higher in specific occupations, particularly those that expose people to traumatic events and danger, as well as heavy responsibilities and public scrutiny, Army officials noted. Police officers, for example, face divorce rates averaging between 66 and 75 percent, they said.

Despite the nationwide trends, Bloomstrom was quick

to point out that the numbers represent far more than just statistics. "These are people we're talking about," he said. "When a marriage ends, it's the end of a dream."

The toll goes beyond the human side, and affects military operations as well, he said. Service members in happy marriages tend to be more focused on their jobs and less likely to become disciplinary problems, Bloomstrom said. They're also more likely to remain in the military.

To help reverse the statistics, the services have introduced new programs and pumped up existing ones, offered through their family support, chaplain and mental-health counseling networks.

For example, the Army's

For example, the Army's offerings include: the new Deployment Cycle Support Program, which includes

their absence and return may affect their family relation-ships and how they can cope with the inevitable changes; a with the inevitable changes; a family support group system that provides both practical and emotional support for spouses of deployed soldiers; The Building Strong and Ready Families Program, a two-day program that helps couples develop better communication skills, reinforced by a weekend retreat; The Strong Bonds marriage education program that focuses Strong Bonds marriage edu-cation program that focuses specifically on issues that affect Reserve and National Guard couples; and The Pick a Partner program that helps single soldiers make wise decisions when they choose

The Army is not alone in offering programs to help its families survive the rigors of deployments and strengthen their relationships in the

The Marine Corps' Prevention and Relationship Enhancement Program is a two-day workshop that teaches couples how to manage conflict, solve problems, communicate effectively and preserve and enhance their commitment and friendship, Marine officials said.

Participants begin the program by taking a marriage survey, developed by a retired Navy chaplain, to help them evaluate their relationship and identify prob-

neip them evaluate their rela-tionship and identify prob-lems before they become serious. The four top prob-lems generally involve com-munication, children and par-enting, money and sexual inti-macy, according to a Navy chaplain involved in the pro-gram.

The Marine Corps program focused on what the chaplain

The Pre-Deployment Brief is a discussion that includes plenty of time for questions and answers in a relaxed, friendly environment.

At a pre-deployment refresher brief June 2, Renee Valdov, a SMP coordinator, covered such topics as protec-tion of personal belongings and the importance of financial preparation prior to deploy-ment. One of the attendees, Lance Cpl. Colin Simonelli of

Saint Johnsville, N.Y., who is gearing up for his second deployment to Iraq said, "It's stressful taking care of financial matters while you're over there. If you haven't taken care of everything prior to your department.

If you haven't taken care of everything prior to your departure, the first mail you'll receive will be bills, not the letters from your family."

After deployments, the SMP supports the troops by offering extra care for the singles. The program coordinates the rack packs that are provided by the USO. "Singles' needs differ from married Marines and sailors, in that they have no one to look out for their best interest. When the commands involve the SMP, we do all that we can to ensure that the singles are given a special taste of gles are given a special taste of home when they return," said Valdov.





hie Neff was not directly implicated in any goings, his employer was fined for recording discrepancies.

ader Virginia law, a dealer license is not

required to buy cars for resale.

Peggy Bailey, office manager at the Virginia Motor Vehicle Dealer Board, said the Carland case was an unusually brazen instance of predatory practices against military service members.

"The evidence that was brought forward clearly demonstrated that these people were defrauded," said Bailey. "This was a real eye-opener for this agency. I really felt sorry for the victims who had the unfortunate circumstances to do business with [Neff]."

Lance Cpl. Jonathan Spurrier, a Quantico Marine and one of several service members not included in the original complaint, fell for one of Neff's common deceptions in November 2003. After replying to a business card posted in his barracks, he accepted a free ride to Carland's remote location where he was told to buy a car or find his own way home.

Additionally, Spurier ended up paying more than the same to the contract of the co

Additionally, Spurrier ended up paying more than \$13,000 for a 1998 Volkswagen Passat, which he estimated had a blue book value of about \$6,000. Later, Spurrier was able to refinance the 13 percent annual percentage rate offered by Carland at 5.1 percent with Navy



### Veterans Affairs offers program for Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder

DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS

Post-Traumatic Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder is an ailment resulting from exposure to an extreme stress involving direct or indirect threat of death, serious injury or a physical threat. The trauma may be experienced alone, as in rape or assault, or in the company of others, as in military combat.

bat.

The events that can cause PTSD are called "stressors." They include natural disasters (floods, earthquakes), accidents (car accidents, airplane crashes, large fires) or deliberate man-made disasters (bombing, torture, death camps).

camps).

Symptoms include recurrent thoughts of a traumatic event, reduced involvement in event, reduced involvement in work or outside interests, hyper alertness, anxiety and irritability. The disorder apparently is more severe and longer lasting when the stress is of human design.

More than 185,000 veterans were listed by the Department of Veterans Affairs in 2003 as having PTSD as a service-connected disability.

### **VETERAN CENTERS**

VA readjustment counsel-ing is provided through 206 community-based Veteran ing is provided through 206 community-based Veteran Centers in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands and Guam. Veteran Centers are located outside of medical facilities, often in shopping malls and other community settings.

The Veteran Center mission features a mix of direct counseling and help accessing other programs, such as psychological counseling for vetchological counseling for vet-erans exposed to war trauma or who were sexually assault-ed during military service, family counseling, community outreach and education, and extensive social services and referral activities to help vet-erans improve their social and economic prospects after the military. military.

Veteran Centers are staffed

Veteran Centers are staffed by interdisciplinary teams that include psychologists, nurses and social workers. Veteran Center teams reflect ethnic and gender diversity and include many veterans, most having served in a combat the-ater of operations. Eligibility for Veteran

Center services includes all Vietnam theater veterans, other Vietnam era veterans who accessed Veteran Center care prior to January 1, 2004, and any other veteran who served in any war, armed conflict or peace keeping mission. Eligibility for sexual trauma counseling at Veteran Centers is open to any veteran regardless of period of service.

In 2003, Veteran Centers saw approximately 130,000 veterans and provided over 990,000 visits to veterans and family members. For many veterans who would not otherwise receive VA assistance, the Veteran Centers make more than 100,000 referrals a year to VA medical facilities and another 120,000 referrals annually to VA regional offices for disability compensation, pensions or other benefits. For the third consecutive year, 99 percent of veterans using Veteran Centers reported being satisfied with services received.

### VA MEDICAL PROGRAMS CENTER

VA MEDICAL CENTER PROGRAMS

VA operates an internationally recognized network of more than 140 specialized programs for the treatment of PTSD through its medical centers and clinics. One notable program consists of PTSD clinical teams that provide outpatient treatment, working closely with other VA treatment programs, including Veteran Centers and the community. In 2003, more than 77,800 veterans were treated for PTSD by VA specialists.

In addition to 97 PTSD clinical teams, VA operates five specialized inpatient units around the country, plus three brief-treatment units, 14 residential rehabilitation programs and seven PTSD day hospitals. There also are five outpatient Women's Stress Disorder and Treatment Teams, A special focus in the program has included underserved and minority populations, such as African Americans, Hispanics and Native Americans, A specialized PTSD inpatient treatment Hispanics and Native Americans, A specialized PTSD inpatient treatment unit serves women veterans at the Palo Alto, Calif., VA Medical Center's Menlo Park Division

Medical Center's Menio Park Division.

The Veterans Millennium Health Care and Benefits Act (Public Law 106-117) re-established the Under Secretary of Health's Special

Committee on PTSD. The committee will assess VA's capacity to diagnose and treat PTSD and provide guidance on VA's education, research and benefits activities with regard to PTSD.

### NATIONAL PTSD CENTER

VA established the National Center for Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder in 1989, with a Stress Disorder in 1989, with a mandate to promote research into the causes and diagnosis of the disorder, to train health care and related personnel in diagnosis and treatment and to serve as an information resource for professionals across the United States and, eventually, around the world. The center consists of seven divisions with distinct, but complementary responsibilicomplementary responsibili-ties: behavioral science, women's health sciences, clinical neurosciences, education, evaluation, pacific islands ethno-cultural and executive

evaluation, pacific Islands ethno-cultural and executive and resource center divisions. The center is committed to approaching PTSD through a focus on research, education and consultation. These three threads weave the Center's work together in a way that brings science into practice and ensures that clinical concerns guide scientific priorities. The National Center has come to be viewed as a world leader in PTSD research. Current research at the center includes large-scale clinical trials, as well as studies on the epidemiology, diagnosis, psychobiology and treatment of PTSD.

Among its many educational programs, the center provides regular satellite broadcasts and publishes two newsletters, which highlight the latest developments in research and clinical practices for PTSD. The National Center also offers a monthly, 5-day clinical training program free of charge to VA staff, and maintains a nationally recognized Web site with information about trauma and PTSD. The Web site includes documents such as the Iraq War Clinician Guide to help clinicians diagnose and treat War Clinician Guide to help clinicians diagnose and treat veterans returning from Operation Iraqi Freedom, and a bibliographic database of more than 21,000 articles. The National Center also provides consultation to clinicians, scientists and policy makers concerning treatment, research and education regarding PTSD. research and regarding PTSD.

### **DOD** provides funera honors for veterans

Press Release

The Department of Defense provides military funeral honors at the burials of veterans. When requested, funeral honors can be given at any cemetery – private or government-operated. Most funeral directors make those arrangements with DoD on behalf of family members.

While military funeral honors are a long-standing tradition, it wasn't until 1999 that the rights of veterans and the responsibilities of the federal government were written into law. That law, which took effect Jan. 1, 2000, was the National Defense Act of 2000 (Public Law 106-65).

Under the new law, at a family's request, every eligible veteran will receive military funeral honors, to include the presence of a military funeral honors detail, which will oversee folding and presenting the U.S. flag and playing "Taps," either by a high-quality

recording or by a bugler. The law defin military funeral honors detail as consist of two or more uniformed military personial and the second of two or more uniformed military personial and the second of two or more uniformed military service.

Funeral home directors must request itary funeral honors from DoD, whe burial is in a national cemetery or anocemetery. The Department of Veter Affairs staff at national cemeteries help, when necessary, to facilitate a request DoD for funeral honors at VA natic cemeteries.








### Medal of Honor winner Stockdale endured captivity in Vietnam

**ONCE A MARINE**

Retired Vice Adm. James B. Stockdale, a Medal of Honor winner, naval aviator and academician, who endured seven and a half years of captivity during the Vietnam War, died at 81 in his Coronado home.

He had received two Distinguished Flying Crosses, two Purple Hearts and four Silver Stars among his 26 combat decorations. And he was the only three-star admiral to wear both aviator wings and the Medal of Honor, which was presented by President Ford in 1976.

"Our Navy is saddened by the loss of Vice Adm. Stockdale, a giant among heroes and a patriarch of ethical leadership," said Adm. Vern Clark, chief of naval operations. "Adm. Stockdale challenged the human limits of moral courage, physical endurance and intellectual bravery, emerging victorious as a legendary beacon for all to follow."

Stockdale, who retired from the Navy after 37 years in 1979, made a brief sojourn into politics in 1992 by agreeing to be the running mate for independent presidential candidate H. Ross Perot, a longtime friend. He initially was a substitute, standing in while Perot studied other possible candidates, but ended up taking part in a vice-presidential debate. Perot and Stockdale won 19 percent of the popular vote, the San Diego Union-Tribune reported.

He played football as a back on the 1942 Monmouth College freshman football team.

And he was a football guard at NABTC Pensacola in 1949. He played in the following games: 12-6 Troy St., 12-6 Navy JV, 0-49 Memphis St., 34-0 Corpus Christi NAS, 0-14 Southeastern La., 13-0 Memphis NATTC, 12-28 Southwestern La., 27-0 Erskine, 55-6 Jacksonville NAS. The team, with Stockdale, posted a 6-3 record and won the Naval Air Training Command Athletic Conference title.

Hilton" that he would rather die than capitulate, Stockdale became a symbol and leader of the U.S. resistance against North Vietnamese attempts to use prisoners for propaganda, said

Stockdale, the highest-ranking naval officer captured during the war, was forced to wear heavy, viselike leg irons for two years. He was tortured and spent four years in solitary con-

To avoid being used in a propaganda film, Stockdale smashed his face with a mahogany stool. After the death of Ho Chi Minh, he broke a pane of glass in an interrogation room and slashed his wrists until he passed out. Stockdale's captors responded by easing off him and the other POWs.

"He was a man of inestimable courage and leadership," said Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., a fellow war prisoner in Vietnam. McCain, a Navy aviator who was shot down and imprisoned in 1967, described Stockdale as an "inspirational leader" who counseled younger prisoners on how to endure the brutality without breaking.

During his captivity, his wife, Sybil, lobbied tenaciously for humane treatment for her husband and other prisoners. She would later receive the Navy's Distinguished Public Service Award.

The Stockdales went on to collaborate on a The Stockdales went on to Condabrate on book, In Love and War: The Story of a Family's Ordeal and Sacrifice During the Vietnam War, which was published in 1984. A second edition was issued in 1990, the Union-Tribune said.

Stockdale served as president of the Naval War College from 1977-79. As a civilian, he served a year as president of The Citadel in South Carolina, then became a distinguished

South Carolina, then became a distinguished research fellow at the Hoover Institute of War, Revolution and Peace.

Stockdale was born Dec.23, 1923, in Abingdon, Ill. As a youth, he participated in drama productions staged by his mother.

Services were scheduled last Saturday aboard the aircraft carrier Ronald Reagan in San Diego and on July 23 at the Naval Academy in Annapolis, Md. Burial will be at the academy, his family said.

### Youth Baseball

PITTSBURGH (AP) — A youth baseball coach paid one of his players to hurt an 8-year-old mentally disabled teammate so the boy wouldn't be able to play in a game, state police will bridge.

Mark R. Downs Jr., 27, of Dunbar, offered one of his players \$25 to hit the boy in the head with a baseball, police said. Witnesses told police Downs didn't want the boy to play in the T-ball game because of his disability.

The solicited player hit the boy in the head and in the groin with a baseball just before a game, and the disabled boy didn't play, police said.

Downs, who is a coach with the R.W. Clark Youth Baseball League, had an unpublished telephone number and could not immediately be reached for comment Friday. It was unclear

whether he had an attorney.

The assault happened June 27 at the R.W. Clark baseball field in North Union Township, Fayette County, about 40 miles southeast of Pittsburgh.

The 8-year-old's mother asked the state police to investigate her son's injuries because she suspected Downs wanted to keep the boy off the field, despite a league rule that required each player to participate in three innings a game,

player to participate in three innings a game, said state police Trooper Thomas B. Broadwater.

"The coach was very competitive. He wanted to win," Broadwater said.

Downs was arrested and arraigned Friday on charges of criminal solicitation to commit aggravated assault corruption of minors criminal solicitation.

charges of criminal solicitation to commit aggravated assault, corruption of minors, crimi-nal conspiracy to commit simple assault and recklessly endangering another person. He was released from jail on an unsecured bond. Eric Forsythe, the president of the R.W. Clark Youth Baseball League, said league organizers investigated accusations against Downs before the T-ball season ended earlier this month, but could not prove that he did any-thing wrong. thing wrong.

If Downs is convicted of any crime, he won't allowed to be a coach next year, Forsythe



The MCCS-S.C. office at the Marine Corps Air Station Beaufort supplies several types of outdoor activity equipment at little or no cost.


"We didn't pay for anything because MCAS Beaufort's MCCS office let us have the kayaks, paddles and the life vests for the day," said Daniels.

"Last year we went kayaking, but at the end, we realized that we needed some type of transportation to get back to our vehicles. Today, we didn't have any major






Family members and Marines from the depot's Communication and Information Systems Div make their way to shore after nearly two hours of kayaking around Hunting Island July 8.

Grave's re-aggravated knee sidelined him for another eight months. Then, from Jan. 18, 2003 to June 2003, he was deployed to Iraq in support of Operation Enduring Freedom, which later became Operation Iraqi Freedom. During the three years that elapsed between the time of his first knee injury and the end of his tour in support of OIF, Graves was unable to maintain a serious physical training regimen.

Yet, while most others would surrender to age and injury, Graves stands defiantly against the eroding force of time, either unwilling or unable to gracefully bid farewell to the sport he fell in love with 12 years ago.

Ellis Graves, who was selected three times to play for the U.S. Eastern National Rugby team, attempts a comeback at the age of 40 afte suffering two serious knee injuries in his sport. Yet, Davis admitted that Graves has a lot of work to do to get back to top form.

"He's 40," said Davis, "and getting back to that level of play is a lot harder than it was at 30."

In his glory days, Graves was a prototypical running back with a combination of speed power and shiftiness, said Davis.

"He could make people look silly," said Davis. "He put a lot of work and energy into his fitness and his ability to play the game."

Graves, who is 5-feet, 9-inchest all, weighed more than 215 pounds before his injury. He said





"Our first year, we really had to scramble to put things together," said Bock, now the league president. "We played at the North Carolina State field in Raleigh, which was fine, but it wasn't conducive for what we wanted to do. Getting Wilson involved was crucial. The city always has supported baseball, and it had a team — the Tobacconists—in the original Coastal Plain League, a Class D minor league that began just before World War II.

Plus, with Fleming Stadium, the team would have the type of facility Bock was looking for in this new venture, a former minor league park with plenty of potential.

"It's a great baseball community," he said. "It's kind of an all-American type city. Having that stadium and the love of the game, I thought it would be a great cornerstone for our league."

Everything has worked perfectly, and the Tobs still thrive.

"It's a lot like minor league baseball was 20 years ago," said Tobs general manager Mike Edwards. "It's still very much grass roots, it's very laid back. It's a lot of fun for the players, the fans and the communities that are involved."

The small town of Edenton, N.C., took its involvement to another level, using donations to purchase the team from the league in 2000. The Steamers made their debut in the second season of the CPL as a league-owned team, and when Bock started looking for someone to take over, the citizens of Edenton were scared the new owner might take away the

team.

The town raised about 75 percent of the sales price of

\$125,000 and borrowed the rest, becoming the only franchise in the league owned by a community. The loan was paid back earlier this year.

In Asheboro, N.C., a group of four brothers operates the Copperheads, with Ronnie, Doug, Steve and Mike Pugh deciding to buy the team before last season when the previous owner wanted to move it. move it.

move it.

Ronnie's son, Aaron, had played for the Copperheads before graduating from college, so they put him in charge along with co-GM William Davis. A lot of their work comes from coordinating the use of McCrary Park — the local American Legion team, as well as the high school, plays there — and making sure the locals come out.

"With this being a tight community, we've gained so

much support since the owner-ship change," Aaron Pugh said. "The hometown feel is really important to the CPL, and that's what we've tried to

and that's what we've tried to do here."

That was apparent during the Copperheads' game against Martinsville earlier this month. The game was stopped for about 30 minutes because of an approaching storm, but few people left. Instead, they stood around near the concession stand or stayed in the bleachers, catching up with neighbors and enjoying the music that blared over the PA system.

Some of the travel was eliminated through an unbalanced division schedule, but every team plays each other at least once during the season.

"We think the purpose for the kids to be here is to improve their skill level and showcase their talents," Bock said. "We present everything to them in a minor league atmosphere. We feel like that's important."

None of the players seem to mind.

"We get up every day and

### Dangerous work tests Marines resolve

An average day for the landing support specialists of Beach and Terminal Operations Company, 2d Transportation Service Battalion, 2d Force Service Support Group, consists of placing themselves directly under a 75,000 pound flying monster, while the wind blows in their faces at similar speeds of a hurricane.

The Marines know the cer-The Marines know the certain danger of a hovering CH-53 Sea Stallion, as they connect a load of supplies and sometimes vehicles before the helicopter flies away only to return in five minutes.

According to Cpl. Jerry E. Weeks, a landing support specialist and helicopter support team leader, helicopter support teams put themselves in harms way everyday, even while training in preparation for combat.

while training in preparation for combat.

"A CH-53 generates over 200,000 volts of static electricity created by the rotation of the blades," said Weeks, a San Luis, Calif., native. "This current runs right into the hooks that we attach the load onto."

"In order for the electricity to keep from electrocuting team members, it must be grounded through a ground wire attached to the hook before anyone can hook on the

before anyone can hook on the load," said Lance Cpl. Thomas L. Wilson Jr., a Waldorf, Md., native and landing support specialist with the company.

Another danger that looms above the landing support Marines' heads is the helicopter itself.

"At anytime the helicopter is seven to 14 feet above our head." according to Lance Cpl. John B. Blount, a landing support specialist and St. Mary's, Ga., native. "We have to worry about the helicopter falling on top of us while we are hooking up the equipare hooking up the equip-ment."

Despite the difficulties and

possible dangers, the landing support specialists of BTO company have no problem finding pleasure in their work.

The adrenaline rush sparked by the danger of the mission is what draws a lot of

Marines to the job, according to Blount.

The Marines piloting the helicopters above them respect and trust the expertise of the landing support specialists.

"They are outstanding and always provide awesome sup-port," said Capt. Steven J. Payne, a CH-53 pilot with Marine Helicopter Training

### Lejeune emergency services train for spill response

About a dozen personnel from Camp Lejeune's Fire Department and Environmental Compliance Branch, along with Coast Guardsmen from the U.S. Coast Guard's Marine Safety Office in Wilmington, took part in a Facility Response. Team training at

Wilmington, took part in a Facility Response Team training at Gottschalk Marina, July 11 - 15.

This training took place in an effort to improve fast-action response capabilities in emergency contamination situations, according to Dave Balog, an environmental protection specialist with the Environmental Compliance Branch, Environmental — Management Division, Installations and Environment Department, Marine Corps Base.

Corps Base.

The five days of training consisted of one day of classroom lessons and four days of practical applica-

tion, or "hands on" work.

The classroom portion included instruction and lectures on the specifics of navigation, boom deployment, ship coordination and

response techniques and strategy, according to Balog.

The other four days were spent responding to simulated scenarios involving the contamination of dif-ferent aquatic environments includ-ing river hanks, onen water and espe-

cially sensitive areas.

This hands on portion of the training, which pertains only to inland waterways and harbors, consists of a number of ships working together to accomplish a series of tasks. The first step is to identify and mark the contamination plume denlow with buovs. step is to identify and mark the con-tamination plume deploy with buoys. Once the area to be treated has been determined, two ships deploy an 800 ft. boom, which is the apparatus that surrounds and contains the pollu-tants, each towing an end of the

### **Environmental Conservation Branch** promotes natural dune building

The Camp Lejeune Environmental Conservation Branch coordinated a dune building day July 9, in an effort to preserve and maintain Onslow Beach and its wildlife, while protecting the coast from hurricanes and tropical storms.

More than 30 volunteers gathered at Riseley Pier to help plant sea oats in an effort to create future sand dunes.

"Our work here has two
main purposes," said Marty
Korenek, a wildlife bioloeist with the Camp Lejeune Branch, "The first is to main tain the beach so Marines and sailors can continue to

and sailors can continue to use it for training purposes, and the other is to preserve the wildlife inhabiting the beach's environment."

There were 10,000 sea oats planted. This grass was chosen because it is a native dune plant and is the signature plant found along the entire North Carolina coastal dune system, according to Korenek.

In order to plant so many saplings, the volunteers used a special technique to plant the oats and began the transformation from sand to dune.

All the volunteers lined

off into five hoses and came from a large tank being hauled by a tractor. As the holes were made in the sand, people would drop a plant while another placed a soda cap full of fertilizer in.

"Our goal is to establish a stable line of vegetation, which will recover as much of the sand blowing up and down the beach as possible," said Korenek.

There are three main factors involved in forming a natural dune properly, natural dune properly, according to Korenek. The first is a supply of dry sand to blow freely up

and down the area. An onshore wind to transport the sand is also a needed factor. Finally, a barrier to slow down and allow the sand to drop to form the dune – in this case, the barrier is the individual sea oat.

"This project is one of the biggest we do all year," said Korenek. "We put a lot of effort in organizing this project and being able to get everyone together, but it was worth it because preserving the future of Onslow Beach is in the best interest of

### Downtown region brings history to life

New Bern, N.C., has a way of making history fun. Pieces of the town's nearly 300-year existence flourish in its downtown area through many different avenues of

It is easily recognizable that the city takes pride in its downtown. Local businesses still thrive in the two-story shops. The beautifully landscaped streets encourage visitors to explore, while the old alleyways turned peaceful sitting parks allow resting time to sip on a soft drink from the Pepsi-Cola birthplace soda shop and dive into sweet, creamy fudge from Bear City Fudge Company made right in New Bern.

While strolling through the quaint downtown district on any given summer day, it wouldn't be unusual to meet several visitors from various parts of the United States. In fact, on a narrated trolley ride through the beautiful historical downtown residential area last Thursday, the 18 passengers hailed from six states.

When you walk into Mitchell Hardware located in the heart of downtown New Bern, it reminds you of places grandpa and grandmatold stories about. The wooden floor squeaks, items line the shelves from floor to ceiling and nails are still measured out by the pound into brown paper bags. There's something about the place that makes you smile as you search the shelves from gabout the place that makes you smile as you search the shelves lined with everything from plumbing supplies and Sevin Dust to handmade pottery and cast iron cookware.

"Hardware stores were known for having a little bit of everything," said Smith. Visitors from the older generation hold back tears as they are taken back in time to yesteryear, and wide-eyed children are amazed by this unique store they've only seen in movies.

Smith encourages visitors to fully absorb the old-time hardware store experience. "I want them to touch everything unlike the world that is covered in plastic," Smith added.

A whole day could effortuesize be spent experiencing life in the late 1700's at Tryon Palace; however, balancing the day at the magnificent palace with the revitalized downtown district will not only show visitors New Bern's beginning but its progression to present time. By exploring Tryon Palace and the rich downtown region surrounding it, you experience every point in the town's history from statehood, through the Civil War, past the yellow fever epidemic, continuing all the way to modern art and eateries.

Tryon Palace was named best historic site for the Research Triangle, Raleigh and east coast area by Metro Magazine in its sixth annual MetroBravo Awards. Once you enter through the palace gates, you enter into the 18th century with tour guides and servants dressed the part. The two-story Georgian palace completed in 1770 was the most talked-about public building in the American Colonies. Royal Gov. William Tryon and his wife were the first to call the palace home, and they still roam the palace in the form of first-person characters that interact with the guests oblivious to the fact that it's the 21st century.

The palace burned to the ground in 1798, but 150 years later the palace was reconstructed and furnished using the original architect's drawings. Outside of the captivating palace walls are 14 beautifully landscaped gardens along with stables, a blacksmith shop and kitchen office. Visitors experience the lives of servants with authentic demostrations from the cooks, weaver, spinner and blacksmith. The palace provides much more than history facts; it provides a hands-on fun.

"Frankly, I think we are very much like Charleston before it got so huge. You just have to come and allow some time to stay here to really tour and get the full experience of what we offer," said Nancy Hawley, communications and marketing manager for Tryon Palace."

In addition to the palace and its grounds, the nearly 84,000 yearly visitors get to tour three additional historical houses surrounding the palace, including on

### Reservist call for adjustment in child support while deploye

ffer serving on active duty for 24 years as a chaplain, I thought I dealt with every problem in the book. Well, after receiving the following letter from a deployed father, I realize that there are problems surfacing today that were either non-existent, or much smaller in scope in the past: "Five years after leaving active duty, I was recalled as a reservist and am now having a hard time while deployed getting my child support payments reduced that are based upon what I was earning as a civilian. Frustrated by the lack of support I am experiencing in resolving this matter, I feel betrayed by the military and our courts."

If the military hopes to continue to recruit men and women into the reserves, it will need to address and solve this problem involving the timely adjustment of child support payments, particularly now that large numbers of reservists have been recalled to active duty to serve for have been recalled to active duty to serve for

extended periods of time.

According to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Administration for Children and Families, "Being called to active duty can mean a reduction of total monthly

income. Those reservists who are currently paying child support payments based on higher monthly income, may find that child support arrears will begin to accumulate when monthly child support payments are not met ... Reservists experiencing a reduction in monthly income may wish to contact their child support office to request a review and modification of their child support orders."

wish to contact their child support office to request a review and modification of their child support orders."

Unfortunately, accomplishing this task is not always easy. In an article entitled, "Divorce and Child Support are Eviscerating Military Recruitment," David Usher reports how less than 5 percent of activated reservists are able to obtain the support modifications suggested by the Administration for Children and Families. He cites the example of Gordon Dollar, a reservist for sixteen years, whose military record was tainted when 60 percent of his military pay was incorrectly garnished by the Arizona Child Support Department. According to Usher, after appealing the injustice to the Arizona Attorney General's Office, Dollar was informed that "it would take a year at the earliest to adjust support if they agreed it would be adjusted."

What happens in the course of a year, when a recalled reservist's pay is insufficient to cover the child support payment that was based upon much higher civilian salary? Most people, unfamiliar with the child support system, would think that a reservist could straighten the matter out once he returns from active duty. Unfortunately, this is not the case.

In an article entitled "Laws Must Protect the

### Workshops dig deeper into deployment issues

In January, Marine Corps
Family Team Building was asked to begin a new program for Marine spouses to dig deeper into topics touched on during pre-deployment briefings, when the commands, Key Volunteers and Family Readiness Officers realized spouses still had unanswered questions. Just like the Marine Corps, when MCFTB is asked to meet a need, they pull together all their resources and get the job done. They developed "Beyond the Brief"

"Beyond the Brief" workshops provide participants the opportunity to gain deeper insight to those issues that most concern families before, during and after a deployment," said Catherine Bruggeman, deployment support specialist with MCFTB.

The pre-deployment brief has worked well to "brief" spouses on a large amount of information within a short timeframe, but MCFTB is not able to individualize information for the handful that desires more depth. ### Sea Turtles make annual visit to Onslow Beach

Summer is upon us at last; the weather i balmy, children are out of school and nvariably, our thoughts begin to turn oward sand and sun, salt and sea, acationers from all over the country warm the coast and battle for the perfect atch of sand to spread out their beach owel. This is why many local Marine amilies know what a rare and precious pot Onslow beach is. Its strand is wide and clean, quiet and undeveloped and seerved for use only by military families and employees of Camp Lejeune. Free rom masses of tourists, it is the perfect reaction spot for those who have access to the stranger of the server of the s

But many visitors to Onslow Beach are unaware that they share this spot with mother summer guest. Each year, from ate May until August, giant female sea urtles emerge quietly from the waves late at night and make their slow way up the beach to lay their eggs before returning to the ocean. This remarkable event occurs all along the North Carolina coast, but turtles that nest on Camp Lejeune are affordathe are conventing to did their pasts in season. des that nest on Camp Lejeune are afford-ed the rare opportunity to dig their nests in an area that is unspoiled by overdevelop-ment and habitat destruction, thus bolster-ing the chances for survival of their young. There are several species of sea turtles, but the opportunity of the control of the control of their young.

There are several species of sea turdes, but the ones most commonly found on Onslow Beach are called loggerheads. These giant beauties can grow to well over four feet long and can weigh nearly 440 pounds. A healthy adult can live to be sixty years old. They swim tens of thousands of miles in their lifetime, crossing entire oceans. Amazingly though, female loggerheads often return to the exact same beach where they were born to lay their own nests. Because they do not reach

sexual maturity until they are between 20 and 30 years old, this means that these world travelers have pretty amazing memories. The sea turtles' ability to find the beach of their birth is something of a mystery to scientists, as are many of the details of their life cycles. In truth, frighteningly little is known about sea turtles, which is why preserving them from extinction is such an enormous challenge for conservationists.

All species of sea turtles are considered to be threatened or endangered worldwide. For thousands of years humans have exploited them for their meat, eggs and beautiful shells. In the more recent past, their populations have been ravaged by continual development on their native beaches, beach lighting, long line fishing and native and non-native predators. In addition, the often are hit by boats and caught in fishing nets. In many cases their populations have been brought to the very brink of extinction and have only narrowly escaped it. As human demands on the environment increase, the fate of sea turtles becomes less certain.

That fate is not yet sealed though. Thanks to increased interest and awareness over the past few decades, great efforts have been made by individuals and nations to help preserve sea turtles. The

The Endangered Species Act in the United States protects sea turtles and their eggs from poaching and requires fishermen to use turtle excluder devices in their nets. Many international treaties have effectively protected some populations of sea turtles. In addition, multitudes of scientific and to the protection of the protec turties. In admini, multimotes of scientists, volunteers and conservationists throughout the world have dedicated themselves to protecting their native sea turtle populations. They patrol the beach for predators and poachers, relocate nests that are in unsafe areas, rescue and rehabilitate wounded sea turtles and much

Here in North Carolina, an amazing group or passionate turtle entitusiasis con-tribute their time and energy to the N.C. Sea Turtle Volunteer Program, in associa-tion with the North Carolina Wildlife tion with the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission. These dedicated volunteers work together to ensure the safety of the turtles and their nests and respond to reports of stranded and injured turtles all along North Carolina's coast. There are also two sea turtle rehabilitation facilities in the state — the Network for Endangered Sea Turtles Rehabilitation Facility on Roanoke Island and the Karen Beasley Sea Turtle Rescue and Rehabilitation Center, just down the road on Topsail Island. The Karen Beasley Center is open to the pub-

lic from 2 - 4 p.m. Monday through Tuesday and Thursday through Saturday, and anyone interested can stop by to catch a glimpse of the extraordinary

catch a glimpse of the extraordinary patients that the center treats.

The Environmental Conservation Branch aboard Camp Lejeune is responsible for ensuring the safety of turtles and their nests on Onslow Beach. They receive the same level of excellent protection here that volunteers provide with throughout the state. Every day during nesting and hatching season, staff from the Threatened and Endangered Species section patrol the beach at dawn in search of turtle activity. They locate and cover nests with cages to protect them from predators, beachgoers and Marine training activities. They also coordinate with

other members of the N.C. Sea Turtle Volunteer Program to report stranded and injured turtles and ensure that they are transported safely to a rehabilitation cen-

ter.

Other policies that assist in protecting the turtles on Onslow Beach include the use of red light covers over all beach cottage lights. Bright light can often confuse and disorient sea turtles, but they are unaware of the red lights. Also, the south end of Onslow Beach contains some of the most fragile and delicate sea turtle nesting habitat, which is partly the reason it is closed to vehicle traffic during the nesting season.

North Carolinians are doing their part in the struggle to save this remarkable species from extinction, but it is an uphill battle. Sea turtles are not yet protected in many parts of the world, and poaching of eggs and killing of turtles in fishing nets goes unhindered in many nations where such laws do exist. Crowded and overdeveloped beaches contribute to their decline even on our own shores.

There is hope for sea turtles, but only if humans are willing to fight for their preservation by caring for their precious habitats, both on the beaches and in the oceans.

Matching a tiny sea turtle emerge from the sand and struggle towards the waves to begin its new life is an extraordinary sight, and everyone has a part in ensuring that future generations of beachgoers will be able to witness it too.


There is no specific period during the deploy-


