Marines eye replacement for Humvee

MARINE CORPS BASE QUAN-ICO, Va. — The Marine Corps is earching for a larger, more capable ombat transport to replace the

combat transport to replace the Humvee.

The Fires and Maneuver Integration Division of Marine Corps Combat Development Command is outlining the requirements for its future vehicle, dubbed the Combat Tactical Vehicle, with the goal of fielding the first CTVs in 2011.

Kevin M. McConnell, deputy director of the Fires and Maneuver Integration Division, said the Humvee — while a battle-proven tactical vehicle — is beginning to show its limitations in Iraq and Afghanistan.

"The Humvee A2 is a great vehicle, [but] it has outlived its usefulness, said McConnell. "We have added very capable armor to the Humvees in Iraq But for every pound of armor you add, that's a pound less capable the vehicle is. We have done a lot of modifications to the vehicle, and it's at the end of its capabilities. There is just no more you can do for that vehicle." .

McConnell said among the improvements is the requirement that the CTV accommodates up to six Marines with their existence loads and three days of food, water and ammunition.

The current Humvee, including up-armored versions, normally seats four Marines or less.

"As we go into the future, we know
we have to plan for a couple of
things," said McConnell. "We have to
plan for increased mobility of the
ground combat element, and we need
to plan for (heavier) payloads. The
first configuration we want to build is
a people mover, not a fighting vehicle.
It will take six guys with three days of
supplies and be able to perform like a
BMW on the Autobahn."

McConnell said the requirements
for the CTV, including its ability to
transport six combat-ready Marines,
supports Operational Maneuver From
the Sea and Distributed Operations, as
well as the Marine Corps' capstone
concept, Seabasing.

"The Expeditionary Fighting
Vehicle, the EFV, holds 17 people, a
reinforced rifle squad," said
McConnell. "Three CTVs would hold
a reinforced rifle squad, Is supports
our Distributed Operations concept. It
allows that type of unit to be tactically
employed. We figured out a way to
divide a reinforced squad into packages. Why didn't we make it a 17 person vehicle?

One, it would be a big vehicle.
Two, if you take out that vehicle, you
take out 17 people. You split them up
into more vehicles and you increase
the survivability of the team itself."

The CTV combines a laundry list of requirements, drawn in large part from the Marine Corps Center for Lessons Learned and the Marine Corps Warfighting Laboratory, and responds to the needs of the modern warfighter.

responds to the needs of the modern warfighter.

"There is nothing better than a war to validate ideas," said McConnell.
"All of the requirements that we have built into this are traceable back to something that somebody, from lance corporal to colonel, who has been to Iraq or Afghanistan or both, has told me or one of the guys in the division."

McConnell said the Marine Corps is working with the Army, Navy, Air Force and U.S. Special Operations Command to identify joint requirements that could help turn the CTV into a joint endeavor.

"The requirements for (the Army's concept) vehicle line up pretty closely with CTV," said McConnell. "In the end, we and the Army are working very hard to make this a joint program. There are a lot of efficiencies in doing this with one vehicle, both in production and in lifecycle management."

According to McConnell, the Marine Corps has an inventory of about 20,000 Humvees, while the Army has more than 120,000.

By December, McConnell said his team hopes to have a solid draft of an

Decisions made today will give edge to tomorrow's force

WASHINGTON-

WASHINGTON—Decisions being made today about how troops are recruited, equipped, trained and stationed will have farreaching implications during future operations, said the Marine Corps commandant.

The future battlefield is likely to be much like today's—uncertain, chaotic and full of fog—so it's critical that the military continue to recruit and retain smart men and women and train them to operate in such an environment, Gen. Michael Hagee told reporters at the National Press Club.

Tomorrow's military members, like today's, will need to be able to think quickly on their feet, often

making decisions with less information than they'd like, he said. And that applies regardless of the type of operation they're conduct-ing, from high-end combat operations to humanitarian-and disaster-relief opera-tions.

and disaster-relief operations.

If history is any guide,
the military will again be
called to fight a future conflict, Hagee said. And just as
certain, the military will be
called to respond to humanitarian crises, including
tsunamis, hurricanes and
earthquakes like those witnessed around the world
during the past 10 months
alone, he said.

Decisions in shaping the
force for the future will be
guided by findings of the
upcoming Quadrennial
Defense Review, which will

look 10, 15 and more years into the future, Hagee said.

Predicting the future is no easy task, he acknowledged.

"We're doing everything we can to get it right or not get it wrong as we design the force of the future," he said.

That means recruiting the best troops possible, continuing to provide them the equipment they need, and replacing it as needed when it's seen heavy use, such as in Iraq, "so it's ready to go for the next contingency," he said.

It also means positioning troops where they can oper-ate most effectively and giv-ing them the capabilities to deploy quickly to hot spots when they're needed, Hagee

At the same time, it requires giving troops the

education and training they need to perform on a battle-field that requires quick thinking and good decision making, he said.

Hagee cited the success of this formula during the battle of Fallujah, Iraq, where, he said, Marines "absolutely crushed the insurgency" last year.

"There's still a great deal to do," he said of operations in Iraq. "It's still very hard, and it is still quite dangerous over there."

Improvised explosive devices continue to be the biggest challenges troops in Iraq face, he said. But with many of these weapons becoming increasingly complex,

22nd MEU begins deployment

Nearly half hail as vets of Iraq, Afghanistan

Approximately 2,200 Marines and sailors of the 22nd Marine Expeditionary Unit (Special Operations Capable) left the Camp Lejeume area last weekend on a scheduled six-month

weekend on a scheduled six-month deployment.

While their exact deployment location is unknown at this time, the MEU embarked aboard the amphibious ships USS Nassau, Austin and Carter Hall, and headed for the Central Command area of responsibility, where it will serve as the landing force for Expeditionary Strike Group 8. In addition to the three amphibious ships, ESG-8 includes two Navy destroyers, a cruiser and an attack submarine.

Nearly half of the MEU's members have seen combat in either Iraq or Afghanistan. The MEU recently completed six months of intense pre-deployment training aimed at enabling the unit to tackle a variety of missions ranging from humanitarian assistance to combat.

The 22nd MEU(SOC) is commanded by Col. K.F. McKenzie Jr., and comprised of Battalion Landing Team 1st Bn, 2nd Marines, Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron 261 (Reinforced), and MEU Service Support Group 22.





Another area of concern is the wear and the place of the place of



Brown said the preparation enabled them to be mentally and physically ready for the stress of the job.

"We conduct the casevac mission [Ithroughout] the Al Anbar province," said Brown. "The corpsmen are able to use all of their medical skills when they fly to a point of injury. There, they may be the first to see the patients, and they are prepared for that trauma."

the point of injury, the Navy/Marine Corps team is evident as the Marine pilots fly the aircraft, and the crew chiefs guard the corpsmen behind .50 cal

the corpsmen behind .50 cal machine guns.

"I have complete confidence in my air crew," said Petty Officer 3rd Class Jeremy Jones, a corpsman with II MEF casevac and Katy, Texas, native. "I know I'll be protected, and the Marines aren't afraid to help us. We always have someone behind a gun. But, our goal is to save lives, and we are both in it together."

Lieutenant Col. Robert M. Brassaw, the commanding officer of HMM-161, said the Navy/Marine team works great, and as the Marines have learned to help the corpsmen during dire circumstances, the corpsmen have learned to assist the crew chiefs helping to get the aircraft in the air.

"We are all Greyhawks," said Brassaw, a Cape Corral, Fla., native. "The corpsmen have been completely incorporated into everything the squadron does. They aren't a separate unit, they are all Greyhawks."

The casevac job may be very demanding, but the Greyhawks, both Marines and corpsmen, stress how they love their job and know they are making a differ-

ence saving people's lives.

"I had an Iraqi call me an angel from the sky," said Congdon.
"You can see they are truly grateful in a lot of our patients' faces. By providing in-flight medical care, I know we are the difference in the chain of medical care."

Marines who fly with the II MEF casevac team said they know they are the difference in saving the lives of both U.S. service members and Iraqis.

"We did a casevac for an

infant girl," said Lance Cpl. Adam Timar, a crew chief with HMM-161 and Tetonia, Idaho, native. "Her body was stiffening, and we all feared she was going to

die.

"We got her to the hospital and were able to save her life. I expected to see soldiers and Marines, but to see an infant child makes you know we are here for everyone, and we are truly con-ducting both a wartime and humanitarian mission."

RCT-2 Awards Section ensures troops receive "their just rewards"

CAMP RIPPER, Iraq — Marines and sailors often find themselves in dangerous situations where they respond selflessly and heroically.

When the ordeal is over, they have another story to tell and are happy to have lived through it. The last though to their mind is that they may be rewarded for doing what comes naturally to them.

That is when their leadership recommends an award and it comes into the horde of Carl Board N. There are a reported.

That is when their leadership recommends an award and it comes into the hands of Cpl. Paul N. Ibarra, a young Marine from Brooklyn-Mill Basin, N.Y. His sole purpose during their deployment is to make sure these Marines receive "their just rewards."

"I have to do the best job I can to make sure everything is correct on the awards write-ups," the 20-year-old administrative clerk said, "Because if anything is done wrong, the whole process has to be done over from the start."

The process starts when the service member's command submits them for an award for their actions. The submission is then sent to Ibarra and Capt. Darrel L. Choat, the awards officer, before it goes to an awards board where it's approved, disapproved, upgraded or downgraded. It is then sent back to the unit or to the next review board until it is at the approval authority for that particular medal award. After final approval is met, the medal award can be presented.

"Ibarra receives all the awards and does the initial checking before passing them on to me," said Choat, 40-year-old Albion, Neb., native, "Everything must be done to perfection, so there is no delay in getting these guys their proper award."

Since February, Ibarra has seen approximately 700 individual awards, including combat action ribbons, purple hearts, Navy achievement and commendation medals, bronze stars and silver stars.

Sometimes he gets more than 30 awards submitted within a matter of hours. However, for Ibarra, one particular medal sticks out above them all.

"In April, a young Marine with 3rd Battalion, 2nd Marine Regiment, defeated three oncoming SVBIEDs, while he was injured, that were going to attack his base," Ibarra, remembered. "He was submitted for a Navy Cross, and that will be well earned if he gets it."

Ibarra and Choat estimate the entire awards process to be approximately three to four months long, but they are working new methods to cut the process down to about a month.

Although Ibarra's focus of effort is awards he is also

Although Ibarra's focus of effort is awards, he is also responsible for passing information from Red Cross messages, emergency leave requests and personnel casualty reports.

"Someone has to stay near the computer for these issues 24-hours-a-day," Ibarra stated. "If there is any delay, it could seriously affect mission accomplishment and troop morale. So we follow through on each of them until we reach the end."

Ibarra and Choat hope to process all the awards they can and make sure everyone is properly updated. They know this is the best they can do for those who earned their awards while defending their nation from an insurgent threat and helping Iraq establish itself as a peaceful state.

"From reading all these awards, it shows me this generation is just as heroic as those of the past," commented. "Parents, grandparents and other family members will be forever proud of them for being not only great Marines, but great Americans."



Dole Plantation continues to whip up pineapple themed delg 1

WAHIAWA, Hawaii — For many years, the Dole Plantation of Hawaii has been selling fruit, whether it is from a fruit stand or large plantation.

In the case of the Dole Plantation, that's how it had its early beginning — operating as a fruit stand beginning in the early 1950s. As its popularity grew, so too did the size of its facility.

In 1989, after extensive remodeling, the Dole Plantation was opened to the public as Hawaii's "Pineapple

Today, Dole sells more than 3,500 fresh, Hawaiian-grown pineapples at stores or from its plantation.

Along with the growth of the facility came a gift shop, which offers hundreds of pineapple-related and Dole brand items, including the world famous Dole Whip, a chilled non-dairy treat that commands lines of people at Disneyland.

"We are constantly having some kind of construction going on around the plantation," said Marvin Kaolani, Dole Plantation tour guide.

"New things are always being added to make the plantation a better experience for all visitors."

Kaolani said the plantation gets more than one million visitors each year, each coming to see Dole's pineapples and its attractions.



Originally a fruit stand in the early 1950s, Dole Plantation has come a long way. In 1989, after extensive renovations, it opened to the public as Hawaii's "Pineapple Experience" and holds the record as the world's largest maze in the 2001 Guinness Book of World Records. Dole Plantation is visited by one million tourists every year and sells more than 3,500 pineapples every week.

"We get visitors from all over the world," said 26-year-old Kaolani. "We get mainly tourists here. Without them, we would definitely go out of business."

One of the attractions and activities that Dole's visitors includes are the Pineapple Express, a two-mile, 20-minute fully narrated train tour of the plantation grounds. The tour prothe plantation grounds. The tour pro-

vides tourists with a chance to learn about the history behind Hawaii's pineapple and agriculture business. While on the train, visitors are told the story of James Dole, founder of Dole Fruits, and witness the beautiful vista of Oahu's North Shore.

For those who enjoy tours, Dole offers another — the Plantation Garden Tour. This self-guided tour

gives visitors an up-close view of some of the crops grown on the North Shore of Oahu. Aside from the flora, visitors receive an education on plantation villages that housed contract workers who came from all over the world to work in Hawaii's plantation fields. plantation fields.

Of all of its many activities, perhaps the most famous is the Dole

AL ASAD, Iraq — Two hours into a deep sleep, he awoke to the sound of bullets flying and alarms screaming as heavily armed al-Qaeda terrorists attacked the U.S. Consulate Jeddah, Saudi Arabia.

He immediately assumed his duties as acting detachment commander of the Marine Security Guard and was directly responsible for saving the lives of consulate employees and maintaining security of the consulate.

The flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses. Every year in the United States, more than 200,000 people are hospitalized from flu complications, and approximately 36,000 people die from flu. Symptoms of flu include, fever (usually high) headache, extreme tiredness.

Symptoms of flu include, fever (usually high) headache, extreme tiredness, dry cough and sore throat.

The flu virus spreads in respiratory droplets caused by coughing and sneezing. They usually spread from person to person, through touching something with flu viruses on it and then touching the mouth or nose. Most healthy adults may be able to infect others as soon as day one, before symptoms develop and up to five days after becoming sick. That means that a person can pass on the flu to someone else before they know they are even sick, as well as while they are sick. There are two types of vaccines to help protect against the flu.

The first is the "flu shot" - an inactivated vaccine (containing killed

tivated vaccine (containing killed viruses) that is given with a needle. The flu shot is approved for use in peo-

ple older than six months, including healthy people and people with chronic medical conditions.

The second type is the nasal-spray flu vaccine – Flu Mist is approved for use in healthy people five years to 49 years of age and who are not pregnant. People who are at high risk of having serious flu complications, and those who live or take care of those who are at high-risk need to get vaccinated.




During the week-long training, the service members of Company A had the opportunity to become familiar with the bridging equipment and methods used by the ROK Army.

The mood inside the chopper was tense. The crew yelled for a corpsman to hop on the helicopter before it took off for

for a corpsman to hop on the helicopter before it took off for Camp Al Qaim to deliver the Marine to a medical facility.

Unfortunately, the mission wasn't as simple as flying a Marine to a hospital. The Huey flies without rear doors, creating an intense wind. Normally, that wouldn't matter, but the severity of the Marine's wound required extra precaution.

"He was bleeding really bad, so we were trying to protect him from the wind," explained Reale, To help minimize the wind, the pilots flew at low speeds, while the corpsman debated whether a smoother ride or a quicker arrival was more important to the Marine's survival. In the end, the corpsman decided time was more important.

"When I saw the back of his head, I agreed," said Reale.
"The doctors were very appreciative because of how quick we got to him."

Now, the Marine is back in the United States, still recovering, but doing fine, Recording to his peers.

"That's all that matters," said Pinto. "He's alive."

CAMP FALLUJAH, Iraq—While deployed to Iraq, many Marines of 2nd Battalion, 2nd Marine Regiment, will unfortunately miss important family events which happen only once a year or, perhaps, once in a lifetime. But one Marine, Lance Cpl. Matthew J. Hutchison, ā combat cameraman with the battalion, was fortunate enough to see one of the most important events in his life, his first child being born via video transmitted across the World Wide Web. He received some help from the hospital and fellow deployed Marines, allowing him to see the birth shortly after the actual event. "The hardest part of being sent to Iraq was that I would miss the birth of my son," said the 25-year-old Akron, Ohio, native. "But knowing that the hospital and Marines from Regimental Combat Team-8 were going out of their way to help me see the birth was a great feeling."

While Hutchison was on leave a few months ago, he and his wife Sarah, 23, took a tour of the Akron City Hospital. While they were there, they asked if there was a way to view the birth of his son via a web broadcast.

They were directed to kimberly Holm, a member of the corporate communications section

Kimberty Holm, a member of the corporate communications section of Summa Health Systems, who set up a meeting to discuss the request and determine what they would be able to do. This would be the first time this hospital would do anything like this and the coeff was excited to do what! the staff was excited to do what they could.

Holm contacted other hospitals

that had fulfilled similar requests for deployed service members. The whole process took approxi-mately six weeks to complete and included 11 individuals from the corporate communications, public

metuded 11 individuals from the corporate communications, public relations, audio-visual support, legal and nursing departments.
"When the idea first came up that the hospital was going to help us make it like Matthew was there. I was excited," Sarah said. "This way, he could see an hour of video online and much quicker than if we did it ourselves. I felt like someone was looking out and helping us."

After the hospital's capabilities were assessed and the group discussed the options available, Holm decided to allow the families to utilize some of the hospital's digital video equipment. They

lies to utilize some of the hospital's digital video equipment. They were allowed to take footage of Sarah and their newborn son, Benjamin, after he was born. The family also brought their own equipment as a backup.

The hospital then set up a secure Web site for Hutchison to access the video footage from a computer in Iraq. Staff Sgt. Christopher Rogers, Regimental Combat Team-8's data chief, exchanged emails with the hospital computer technicians so they could test the site.



MWCS-28 becomes expeditionary in Iraq

AL ASAD, Iraq

Twenty-one leathernecks from Marine Wing Communications Squadron 28 practiced establishing a communications link in a forward operating base at Al Asad, Iraq.

The training prepares the Marines in the event they are called upon to establish phone and Internet service in an area where communications are sketchy or nonexistent.

As Marines and other forces continue to hunt down insurgents in the Al Anbar province, the ability to bring communication assets to the battlefield, regardless of location, is valuable to accomplishing the mission and bringing Marines home alive.

"The bottom line is ensuring the safety of our own," said Master Sgt. Anthony W. Erwin, staff noncommissioned officer-in-charge of the troposphere radio scanner team that sets up and operates the necessary equipment.

The training evolution marks the fourth time the team practiced the operation in the sands of Iraq.

Second Lt. Katheryn M. Buehler, officer-in-charge of the tam, said her Marines were training to set up communications for a forward area refueling point, a mission they may very well encounter while supporting the 2nd Marine Aircraft Wing (Fwd).

"If they set up an expeditionary airfield, we would provide the communication services," she said

The early morning process began with designated Marines ensuring the safety of a particular area



and creating a perimeter inside which a makeshift communications facility can be raised.

Then, all the necessary equipment is put into place. Large tents and different communications-specific vehicles are set up in a matter of minutes. Two large disks, each a part of the TRC-170 communications system, are raised and then staked into the ground like camping tents.

"If we don't do that, the wind will knock them down," said Cpl. Travis W. Snider, a multichannel radio operator from Franklin, Tenn.

Snider and the Marines he works with set up the TRC-170 to create a signal that allows users 100 miles away access to Internet and phone services. Other Marines, like Lance Cpl. Derek J. Tryon, a single-channel radio operator, set up a signal that allows only

phone services.

"That's what we strive for, and we're pretty suc-

"That's what we strive for, and we're pretty successful," said Erwin. "For the number of rehearsals we've done so far, that's outstanding."

Erwin and his Marines will continue practicing, making their operation quicker and more efficient until they receive word that it's time to do it for real.

"We rehearse this all the

"We rehearse this all the time in case they ever have to send us out," he said. "We never know when we'll get the call."



Coca, a Simi Valley, Calif., native, said Youngblood has adapted well since returning from MSG duty and getting back to working on Prowlers, and has brought with him experience junior Marines look up to, and strive to emulate.

"You know you can trust him with your life," said Coca.
"This experience, earning the Bronze Star with combat valor, makes you have more respect for him, and respect for the job he does."

enlisted quarters, along with everything Youngblood and the other Marines had in Saudi Arabia, save the clothes on their back and their determination to defend the consulate.

"When the attack started, everything was chaos and confusion," said Youngblood. "Soon, it was controlled confusion, but we executed everything by the book. It was a text book operation.

We only had one goal in mind, to accomplish our mission and protect the U.S. Consulate. They tried to comprise U.S. security and couldn't because of us."

Youngblood said he credits the Marines he served with for the accomplishment of their mission. He said everyone played their part perfectly.

According to Youngblood's

Bronze Star citation, he exhibited courageous leadership and unparalleled presence of mind orchestrating the internal security of the consulate while under terrorist attack. He directed with his M-9 pistol and dispatched the terrorist threat, driving the terrorists away.

Youngblood said for the rest of his life, he will never forget what happened.

"We were all asleep when the attack started," said Youngblood. "I had crashed in my bed, and was still wearing my (camouflage utility uniform). Then, for the next three and half days we were awake. The experience is something that is always on my mind. I owe my life to the other Marines. My condolences go out to the people who were killed and their families."

Hagee said, they're no longer improvised at all. "Some are very sophisticated," he said.

No one technology or solution is likely to counter the IED threat, Hagee said, noting that weapons like these will probably remain the insurgents' weapons of choice. "No one out there is willing to take us on one on one or even squad to squad," he said. "If they do, they know they will lose."

That military superiority will remain critical to the military of tomorrow as its members face new threats and missions, Hagee said.



World League coach uses lessons from the Marine Corps to build winners

Berlin Thunder head coach Rick Lantz knows the game of football. He has made a career out of coaching winners and develop-ing talent at the highest levels, and has won a world champi-

onship.
In World Bowl XIII, June 13,
2005, Lantz's second World Bowl 2005, Lantz's second World Bowl appearance in two seasons with the Thunder, his team faced an almost unthinkable challenge. The Thunder's starting running back, starting fullback and starting tight end were all placed on injuried reserve.

The loss in the World Bowl brought Lantz's second season as head coach of the Thunder to an end. His first season with the team ended with a victory in World Bowl XII.

Bowl XII.

For Lantz's players, there would be little time to dwell on the loss June 13 since NFL training camps were scheduled to begin in a matter of weeks. Many players in the NFL's World League, more appropriately labeled NFL Europe these days, are allocated by NFL

teams. These players are sent to the World League in the spring to work with esteemed coaches like Lantz and increase their chances of making it in the NFL.

Many current and former starters in the NFL spent early parts of their careers playing in Europe, Past World League players include quarterbacks Jake Delhomme, Kurt Warmer and Brad Johnson, wide receivers Dante Hall and Marcus Robinson, defensive tackle Keith Traylor, and kickers David Akers and Adam Vinatieri. Adam Vinatieri.

sive career at the collegiate and professional level. He credits his success as a coach at the highest levels of the game to the lessons he learned in the U.S. Marine Corps.

For Lantz, the decision to join the Marine Corps was steeped in a childhood as the son and nephew of dedicated World War II Marines. Lantz's father served in the 3rd Marine Air Wing and his Uncle was in the Joint Assault Signal Company. The decision was formed early and implemented in his senior year of high school, and a week after graduating from high school in June 1956 Lantz was off for basic training at Marine Corps Recruit Depot Parris Island.

Looking back half a century later, Lantz recognizes how lessons he learned, sometimes the hard way, during his training, formed the foundation for his success as a coach.

"The gragatest teachers I've week."

formed the foundation for his success as a coach.

"The greatest teachers I've met were Staff Sgts. Frank G King and Donald Drake, my drill instructors," Lantz said. "I've even used some of the same terminology and philosophies throughout the years. Discipline is a state of order resulting from training."

Lantz vividly recalls the close attention to detail, such as always leading with the left foot and proper rifle handling, and applies it as

a coach on the football field. As he a coach on the football field. As he began his coaching career he would focus in on one player, the "player in the barrel," and concentrate on his every move. By concentrating on the fundamental techniques of his players, Lantz was able to help those players eliminate mistakes and improve their play. He would catch the little errors in practice that could spark game-altering mistakes in games, and correct them before game time. game time

"There were no 'my bads' in the Marine Corps," Lantz said referring to the modern cliché. After joining the Platoon Leader Program, Lantz attended Central Connecticut College where he played linebacker and where he played linebacker and earned a degree, and spent two summers at Quantico. At age 26, and recently married, Lantz began and recently married, Lantz began to pursue a career in coaching. He started his coaching career in the high school ranks in 1963 before joining the coaching staffs at Boston University (twice), Bridgton Academy (head coach), University of Rhode Island, and the State University of New York at Buffalo

Then, in 1970, Lantz began a Seven-season term as defensive coordinator at the Naval Academy. It was during this time that he met Bob DeStafney, a line-backer at Navy from 1974-77. backer at Navy from 1974-77. Col. DeStafney, with 2nd Transportation Support Battalion, 2nd MLG, returned from Iraq last month where he served in Combat Logistics Regiment-25. Lantz was the guest of honor at the 230th anniversary birthday ball for both units, held in Wilmington, N.C.

units, held in Wilmington, N.C. Nov. 1.

"I remember him very clearly as an in charge defensive coordinator who was close to his defensive assistants and to his players," DeStafney said. "He was very approachable, which players loved, but not so close that he wouldn't throw your tail off the practice field if you weren't playing to expectations. Having said that, I gotta admit that he was also very patient with young players."

very patient with young players."
Although the Thunder lost the most recent World Bowl, Lantz most recent World Bowl, Lantz still sports a ring commemorating the Thunder's championship during his first season with the team. His players are often young, accustomed to big man on campus status, and surrounded by the temptations of European cities, but they buy into Lantz's system and it pays off on the field.

"I don't have to deal with T.O.," Lantz said.

Lantz has coached many NFL

Lantz has coached many NFL stars though, including lineback-ers James Farrior and Jamie Sharper, both of whom he devel-

Choir leaving Navy in 1977, Lantz landed at the University of Miami where he was defensive coordinator until 1980, and then spent two years as linebackers coach for the NFL's New England Patriots, followed by two seasons as defensive coordinator at Georgia Tech.

Although Lantz left the Marine Corps largely to find greater stability in civilian life, he would discover that the life of a football coach involves more moves than he initially anticipated. From 1984 to 1986, Lantz was defensive line coach at Notre Dame and he spent five seasons as defensive coordinator at the University of Louisville before moving on to Virginia.

Virginia.

Now "retired," Lantz spends the spring in Europe coaching the Thunder and the rest of the year

oped as linebacker coach at the University of Virginia. To be sure, Lantz's players in Europe are probably more inclined to buy into this philosophy because they are aware of his resume and know that his word carries weight with many of the coaches and general managers with NFL teams.

Upon leaving Navy in 1977, Lantz landed at the University of Miami where he was defensive in the U.S. eastern seaboard. He watches the NFL with great interest, seeing players he's coached performing on the sport's highest stage. He pulls for players like Rohan Davey, a "big time arm and great leadership skills" who was cut by the New England Patriots in training camp. Lantz feels confident Davey will eventually make

cut by the New England Patriots in training camp. Lantz feels confident Davey will eventually make it in the NFL.

Yet, he also knows not every player will.

"Football is terminal, seldom fatal. At some point, it's time to go on with the rest of life. I had two careers, one in the Corps and one in coaching," Lantz said.

He makes it a point to guide players toward making smart decisions, including encouraging those who he thinks would make good coaches themselves.

After all, it was the teachers he

After all, it was the teachers he had in the Marine Corps that helped steer him in the direction

he ultimately chose in life.
"I learned things in the Marine
Corps I still use," Lantz said. "I'm
appreciating it more."

'm guessing that there are a lot of individuals reading this who don't have high blood pressure. I hope that's the case. Your main goal should be to keep it that way. The best way to lose weight is to never gain it. Keep your weight in check, stay active and eat a plethora of potassium from fruit, vegetables and low fat dairy. The US Marine Corps heights for weights standards are a good guide to follow for individuals who do not have increased muscle mass.

Byner, now the Washington Redskins runing backs coach, gained 1,002 yards for the Cleveland Browns in 1985, while backfield mate Kevin Mack gained 1,104. They were a 1-2 punch that wore down defenses and moved the chains for a team that won its division.

"We were interchangeable," Byner reflects. We enjoyed blocking for each other. Kevin was the fullback, but we switched it up. And we challenged each other."

Led by the Denver Broncos' Mike Anderson-Tatum Bell tandem, such two-headed backfield monsters are back in vogue, USA Today reports.

Both Anderson, a Marine vet, and Bell are on pace to top 1,000 yards, giving Denver (6-2) the only NFL combo with two runners topping 550 yards. Their shared effectiveness was tey in a recent Sunday win against Philadelphia, when the thick, 230-pound Anderson loosened up the Eagles with his power rushing and the shifty Bell finished them off with two fourth-quarter touchdowns, mcluding a 67-yard snapshot of his quick-trike capability.

Anderson, who served in Somalia and played football for Camp Pendleton, Mt. San

Jacinto Junior College and Utah, also has caught nine passes for 126 yards. He was the NFL's Offensive Rookie of the Year in 2000.

Broncos receiver Ashley Lelie, son of a Marine vet, has caught 22 passes for 339 yards and a touchdown this season, and rushed twice for 56 yards.

Denver was not scheduled this past weekend, but will play at Oakland this Sunday.

It's a new offensive philosophy for Broncos' coach Mike Shanahan, whose offense has rushed for more yards (23,849) than any NFL team since he took over in 1995. Texas did its part, sending a strong message by dominating offensively and defensively in a 62-0 victory at Baylor. Led by Vince Young and receiver-turned-starting tailback Ramonce Taylor, the No. 2 Longhorns (9-0, 6-0 Big 12) scored touchdowns on eight straight possessions Saturday.

A few hours later, Miami pulled off a stunning 27-7 upset at Virginia Tech, which until then had become a fashionable pick to eventually overtake Texas in the BCS standings for the likely championship matchup against top-ranked USC.

The Longhorns know they're not there yet.

"We do have a big target on

not there yet.

"We do have a big target on our chest right now, everybody's trying to knock us off and USC off, and that's fair," Texas coach Mack Brown said. "When you

Mack Brown said. "When you get to this position, you have to play like you expected to be at this position, and want to stay."

Texas, which has won 16 straight games, has regular-season games remaining against Kansas and Texas A&M.

Assuming the Longhorns don't lose both of those, they only have to win one to clinch the Big 12 South, but both to remain in the national title chase, they then play in the Big 12 championship game, likely against No. 22 Colorado (7-2, 5-1).

Like Texas in the South,

Like Texas in the South, Colorado has to win just one of its next two games (at Iowa State Saturday or vs. Nebraska) for a

Buffaloes, who have won the North title three of the past four years, beat Missouri 41-12 on Saturday.

Saturday.
"No one comes to Colorado just to be competitive in the Big 12. We're always preparing to win championships," Buffs quarterback Joel Klatt said. "I think next week you'll see a team even more jacked up to play, because that's why we are here."

Colorado and Texas weren't the only lopsided Big 12 winners this weekend.

Kansas, the next Texas opponent, ended a 36-game losing streak against Nebraska with a 40-15 victory that was the league's closest game Saturday. No. 13 Texas Tech won 56-17 over Texas A&M, and Jowa State beat Kansas State 45-17, while Oklahoma and Oklahoma State had the weekend off.

Texas is the only Big 12 team still in the national title chase, and along with USC and Alabama the only undefeated teams remaining in NCAA Division I-A. Miami (7-1) leaped over Alabama to take the No. 3 spot in the new AP poll Sunday.

After needing a big comeback last week to beat Oklahoma

After needing a big comeback last week to beat Oklahoma State, overcoming a 28-9 deficit to win 47-28 and then falling from first to second in the BCS

from first to second in the BCS standings, the Longhorns had an easy time with Baylor.

With Heisman Trophy contender Young accounting for 351 total yards in just more than three quarters against the Bears, and Taylor running for 102 yards and three touchdowns to go along with a 42-yard TD catch in his first start at tailback, the Longhorns followed a 606-yard performance against Oklahoma State with 645 yards.

Alabama moves into third in BCS standing

NEW YORK (AP) — Alabama moved into third plaslightly ahead of Miami, in the Bowl Championship Serstandings Monday, putting the unbeaten Crimson Tide in potion to play for a national title if Southern California or Testumbles down the stretch.

The first-place Trojans and Longhorns remain locked into 1 top two spots and on course to play for the BCS title in the Re Bowl Jan. 4.

USC, with a BCS average of .9802, lengthened its lead Texas (.9765) from last week. For the first time in the BCI eight-year history, the same teams have held the top two spots the first four standings. USC has been in first for three weeks a Texas one.

And they're both way ahead of Alabama this week. The T has a BCS average of .8814, leaving it barely ahead of Mia

The Hurricanes' 27-7 victory over previously unbea Virginia Tech made it possible for both them and the Tide

Virginia Tech made it possible for both them and the Tide move up two spots.

Penn State is fifth, followed by Virginia Tech, LSU, O. State, Georgia and Oregon.

Notre Dame (6-2) moved up three spots to 11th, meaning Fighting Irish are now in place to become BCS eligible by wning their final three games. Notre Dame needs at least nine rular-season wins and a final BCS ranking in the top 12 to be gible for selection by one of college football's four big-do bowl games.

Alabama is facing a difficult stretch run with LSU coming Tuscaloosa Saturday and the Iron Bowl at Aubum Nov. 19. If Tide survives, it would play in the Southeastern Conference t game, likely against Georgia or Florida.

But even winning out against that tough schedule makes

But even winning out against that tough schedule makes Tide a long shot to catch USC or Texas if those two remain un feated. Alabama could become the second straight unbea SEC champion to be left out of the BCS title game in favor the Pac-10 and Big 12 champions. Last year, Auburn had a pfect regular season, but ended up in the Sugar-Bowl as USC: Oklahoma played in the Orange Bowl for the national title.

USC and Texas are currently Nos. 1 and 2, respectively, in AP, coaches' and Harris polls. The Harris and coaches' poll e count for one-third of a BCS average. A compilation of six coputer rankings make up the other third. The Trojans Longhorns have a huge lead in the polls and the computers.

Alabama is third in the coaches' poll and fourth in the Ha and AP polls. Miami is third in the Harris and media polls fourth in the coaches' voting.



2nd Radio takes a plunge

Marines with Company B, 2nd Radio Battalion, in combination with 2nd Air Delivery Platoon, took part in their first jump after more than a year at Drop Zone Condor Nov. 1.

Approximately 30 Marines visited DZ Condor, but only about half had the opportunity to step off the back of a CH-53D helicopter on a day when the wind was varying and the sun hid behind a dense sheet of clouds.

Sergeant Brandon A. Andrews, paraloft chief, Company B, 2nd Radio Battalion, explained how drills keep the Marine Corps' jumpers proficient.

"All jump qualified Marines

should get at least one jump a quarter," he said.

Although this was their first jump as a battalion since March 2004, the Marines have opportunities and are encoufraged to jump with other units. "However, with many aircraft deployed, jumping is few and far between these days."

The day started at 8 a.m. with the jumpmasters keen to give pre-jump briefs, which included the weather conditions, drop zone boundaries and obstacles, command signals and gear/equipment requirements.

Prior to the CH-53 landing, Marines checked each other's gear and planned out the groups, or sticks, that each jumper would be in. The

helicopter only took up to four jumpers at a time to make rounds move more quickly.

Each Marine did two jumps at an altitude of 1,500 feet. The DZ was somewhat small - 600 feet by 600 feet - and the jumpers had to be aware of the tree line that surrounded the zone and the slight wind coming in from the north.

Before anyone took the plunge, several bright yellow streamers were dropped from the helicopter in effort to mark the point at which Marines would step oft.

Once the wind was judged and the jump spot found, sticks began to

Chesty isn't physically with us anymore, but three units within the II Marine Expeditionary Force were recognized Nov. 2 for keeping his memory and mission accomplishment alive.

The Lieutenant General Chesty Puller Award for Sustained Superior Leadership and Performance originated approximately one year ago to commend a small-, mediumand large-size unit on superior leadership. The Puller award changes hands bi-annually to units within the II Marine Expeditionary Force.

II MEF Commanding General Lt. Gen. James F.

Amos explained the award is a leadership award and not a safety award; it encompasses a multitude of factors, such as deployment readiness, mission accomplishment, re-enlistment rates and training statistics. It follows that a unit that has outstanding leadership is going to nding leadership is going to a leader in all areas, to lude safety and force include safety and force preservation.

when I sat down on the board to select a winner, there were a lot of units within (II MEF) who were in the ball field," said Amos, "but no one crossed over the home plate like (2nd Marine Division) had."

The small category winner of the award was Company D, 2nd Tank Battalion, 2nd Marine Division. Because Company D is currently in Iraq, the award was presented by Amos via video teleconference. Delta was singled out of the crowd for having every Marine enrolled in Professional Military Education, complete a physi-Professional Military Education, complete a physical fitness test and medical and

dental preparedness.

"You brought everyone with you to the fight," said Amos. "I need every Marine and sailor in the fight. Not just some, but all," said Amos, noting that administrative details can sometimes story Marines

The medium category Chesty Puller award was given to 2nd Tank Battalion as a whole. From the support of operational deployments, like aggressive and innovative predeployment training, and continued general support of the force, the battalion distinguished themselves in the eyes of its command. During the period when almost half of the battalion deployed at various times, the battalion maintained its preeminent position as an operational innovator and continued front runner in force protection with no Class A or Class B mishaps.

"[This battalion] has a wealth of knowledge due to the personnel we have and the experience and knowledge of our Marines." Funkhouser said. "We employ the SAT process to effectively transfer that information and experience to the new Marines."

The MEUs response to Hurricane Katrina proved not only good for the residents of the Gulf Coast, but also provided the command element, BLT, and MEU Service Support Group a real—world operational environment prior to beginning work-up training.

"Katrina was an opportunity for the new Marines to get their feet wet conducting real-world operations in a less stressful environment than combat," Allen said. "Most of them had never been on a ship or ridden in an Amphibious Assault Vehicle, two things they are guaranteed to do in the MEU."

"The CPX was extremely helpful because the wide variety of missions that come through the COC all require specific processing," Jaroslawski said.

"You can study the process on your own, but until you can sit down and actually work through a mission, you

don't get the whole experience of all that's involved in command and control."

As the 24th MEU approaches 'chop week,' a time when it will take com-mand of its BLT, aviation combat and combat logistics elements, some of the Marines said their training this year is

combat logistics elements, some of the Marines said their training this year is more thorough and intense compared to their last deployment.

"So far we've done a lot more training focusing on learning extra gear and new equipment," said Sgt. Dominique E. Polk, radio supervisor and native of New Orleans. "From conditioning hikes to crew served weapons classes, I have the feeling we will be better prepared for wherever we go."

Focusing on a broad range of military training in addition to job specific training, the recent training is helping to create more well-rounded Marines.

"We are not only training more often, but in many different areas," said Master Sgt. Harry Garcia, assistant operations chief and native of New York. "Regardless of their occupational specialty, these Marines are becoming increasingly proficient in infantry weapons, tactics and procedures in addition to day to day job."

As the Marines and commands of the 24th MEU advance in their pre-deployment training, they continue to build off the strong foundation and experience gained from the combat and real-world operations of previous deployments.

Gail Whipple and her husband were driving to Camp Lejeune for a Christmas party in 1977 when they saw an injured German Shepherd laying on the side of the road near the intersection of N.C. 24 and Western Boulevard.

"Not one car stopped," Whipple said. "But we did."

The Whipples rushed the dog to a veterinarian on base, but it was too late. The dog had gone into shock and they had to euthanize him.

For Whipple, a lifelong animal lover, it was the last straw. Tired of seeing stray and neglected animals, she started the Carolina Animal Protection Society.

The society's mission is to

The society's mission is to relieve the pain and suffering of animals. It operates solely on

donations.

C.A.P.S. fights for spay and neuter programs, has rescued cats from Topsail Beach after hurricanes, raised money to buy

bulletproof vests for the dogs in area K-9 units and bought cool mats and "doggie Gatorade" for dogs deployed to the Middle

East.

The society was responsible for closing down the original Onslow County animal shelter in 1981, which Whipple called "disgraceful."

But the society also takes in animals that have nowhere else to go and works to find them homes.

C.A.P.S. is a shelter-less humane society, so the animals live in foster homes until they find a permanent home.

About 55 cats and 40 dogs need homes now.

40 dogs now.

One dog looking for a home is Missy, a 5-year-old beagle-hound mix. Whipple calls Missy "my little dream boat."

"She is the sweet-out, happiest girl,

est, happiest girl, despite her situation," Whipple said.

Missy was found in the Jacksonville Country Club area, "trying to get every cat to live in a tree."

She is as soft as a rabbit, intelligent and well-behaved, according to Whipple. She will recognize people she has not seen for years and is very friendly.

seen for years and is very friendly.

Missy was adopted before but returned after two years because she would snatch food out of a toddler's hand. Whipple recommends Missy not live in a home with cats or toddlers.

"She wants to be the queen bee," Whipple said, but gets along well with older children and adults.

Many cats also

Many cats also need homes.

Debbie Chmiel, cat coordinator and treasurer for C.A.P.S., is fostering 24 cats now, in addition to her own five cats and two dogs. Other cats live in other homes, waiting for a family.

"There are so many unwanted animals out there, and it just breaks my heart to see all these guys out there that nobody wants, that nobody cares about," Chmiel said.

Foster owners are responsible for shelter, food and day-to-day care of the animal or animals, but CAPS pays for all medical care.



Array of scholarships available for military spouses

Marines and sailors often hear out the financial aid opportunities ailable if they choose to attend llege, and high school students we a wealth of information about solarships at their fingertips. A handful of the nearly 200

named scholarships are designated for military family members, but most are open to any full-time stu-dent who can show evidence of need and maintain a 2.0 grade point aver-age.

Nearly all of the scholarships can be used for military dependents, according to Teachey.

"We feel very strongly that we want to support our military friends and neighbors. They are an important part of our community," she said.

said.

The community college also offers a text book loan program for students who cannot afford the often astronomical costs of books.

To be considered for any scholarship at Coastal, students must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid, commonly known as the FAFSA. The form allows students to apply for federal and state financial aid programs.

"We do everything we can to provide some assistance to students who need it," Teachey said. "We are looking to fill in the gaps" left by

federal or state aid.

Students seeking a four-year degree can pursue an education at the University of North Carolina Wilmington. Besides the array of programs offered at the main campus, UNCW offers a handful of programs in Jacksonville at Coastal Carolina Community College.

Currently, UNCW in Jacksonville offers a bachelor of arts in elementary education, bachelor of science in nursing, master of arts in liberal studies, master of education in elementary education and teacher licensure for elementary education.

"It is the same quality of education you'd get at the main campus," with university professors and adjunct faculty teaching the courses, but tuition rates are much lower, said Beth Barton, director of the UNCW extension program.

Students must have at least 30 semester hours of college-level coursework before they can enter the program, but the UNCW extension program has no application dead-

lines and no enrollment cap.

Military dependents are eligible for in-state tuition rates, even if they have only lived in the state for a day, Barton said.

Financial aid and scholarships are also available.

share my response with you, in the that there are many other military course in husband, like most husbands and

s: ir husband, like most husbands and s, wants to be able to support his family it relying on outside help. Accepting from your folks in the form of a gift or

a loan may make your husband feel dependent on them. For him, it's a matter of pride. Itook your problem to the Navy and Marine Corps Relief Society, which specializes in helping military families like yours with financial problems. I asked them to work up a realistic, very conservative, monthly budget based on next year's projected base pay for E-3s. Unfortunately, it did not look very encouraging. These are the amounts that were calculated based on a family of three with two cars: Income: Base Pay: \$1,596; Base Allowance for Housing: \$1,156; BAS: \$267; Tax and other deductions: \$250 = \$2,769.

Expenses: Rent for a two-bedroom apartment: \$1,000; Utilities [gas, electric, water, cable, trash]: \$150; Clothes: \$75; Car [gas and maintenance]: \$200; Food: \$400; Haircuts: \$300; Diapers: \$40; Fast food and drinks: \$75; Dry cleaning and laundry: \$15; furniture payments: \$30; Telephones: \$100; Gifts, DVDs, videos and toys: \$35; Credit card interest: \$25; = \$2,720. Balance: \$49.

With a monthly balance of only \$49, I can see how you and your husband may be living from payday to payday without any room for emergencies or investments for the future like retirement or your child's education. It is because of cases like yours that I questioned the Government Accountability Office's report that criticized military personnel who complain about their income. It seems to me the people at the GAO who signed off on the report are not trying to support a family of three on the pay of an E-3.

With regards to your husband getting upset that you shopped at the base Exchange, I went

online and looked up an item — a digital camcorder — that I was thinking of buying. I
found it available on a few different Web sites
for \$285.90 — \$265.95 + \$19.95 shipping and
handling. When I went to the base Exchange,
the price for the same camcorder was \$319.99.
When I asked the salesperson if the Exchange
would mutch the price I could get online, she
said the Exchange would only match a competitor's price in a local newspaper or advertisement. Consequently, I have decided to
order it online and save \$34.09.

Unfortunately, base Exchanges today are more
of a convenience than a savings for many military
families. Even the gas prices on base when I went
to visit the Exchange were higher — \$2.85 —
than some of the gas stations off base — \$2.77.
