Freedom has a name Camp Lejeune celebrates Law Day 1991

"It is only fitting that the American people should remember with pride and vigilantly guard the great heritage of liberty, justice and equality under the law ...," President Dwight D. Eisenhower said upon the formation of Law Day by presidential proclamation in 1958.

Marking the 200th anniversary of the signing of the Bill of Rights, the theme for Law Day 1991 is "Freedom Has A Name, The Bill of Rights".

Originated in 1957 by Charles S. Rhyne, a Washington, D.C. lawyer, who was president of the American Bar Association at the time, Law Day is observed each year aboard Camp Lejeune to call attention to the principle and the practice of American law and justice.

1stLt. David A. Stolz of the Consolidated Legal Assistance Office says service members and their dependents can gain from Law Day, a heightened awareness of this year's theme "Freedom Has A Name, The Bill of Rights."

BGen. Michael P. Downs, Commanding General, Marine Corps Base, signed a proclamation Monday to begin the observance of Law Day 1991.

A booth will be set up at the exchange from April 29 to May 9, Monday through Friday, from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. to give legal advice concerning various aspects of the law.

During the week, a program designed by University of Nebraska college professor Alan Frank will be held for fifth grade students to inform them of the Bill of Rights.

"What the program is designed to do is get the children aware of the Bill of Rights and make them start thinking about things," Stolz said. "We try to reach a wide populace here at Camp Lejeune, so we've also targeted the high school seniors."

Preventive Law Classes will be held for Camp Lejeune High School seniors that cover leases, contracts, auto purchases, loans and criminal law.

Program boosts careers

Just about everyone is looking for the chance to advance his or her career — the hard part is finding an opportunity.

In most businesses, if you work hard and prove your worth to others, you might get noticed and get the opportunity to move up. The Marine Corps, on the other hand, has set up specific programs for outstanding individuals to increase their chances for advancement.

Cpls. Kevin Hummons and Gerald Thomas, both from Marine Corps Base, didn't let their hard work go to waste. They took the initiative and applied for commissioning programs here. Now, instead of waiting for promotion to Sergeant, they're creating their opportunity to become Marine Corps officers.

It was a lifelong dream of 26-year-old Hummons to be a Marine. Since he can remember, he wanted to wear the distinctive Dress Blues.

"I remember seeing a Marine Corps commercial on television when I was in grade school," Hummons said. "The Marines were wearing their red shorts and gold USMC T-shirts while running PT," Hummons continued. "They were running through the circuit training course, getting muddy, yelling and screaming with motivation ... I wanted to do that."

After graduating from high school, Hummons immediately enlisted. He was assigned to the Legal field and is now the Assistant Legal Administration Chief at Base

Legal. He got a taste for his MOS during his senior year when he worked in the tax department of a major oil company's legal research section.

Hummons, a native of Houston, Texas, started his Marine Corps career ready to excel, meeting every challenge with the desire to succeed. He graduated second in his Legal School class and third in NCO School.

"I started noticing the authority and responsibility officers had and that

motivated me to want a commission."

Last year, Hummons' fourth year of enlistment, he began looking into Broadened Opportunity for Officer Selection and Training, the BOOST program, and started putting together a package for consideration.

"The paperwork was so detailed and it involved a lot of legwork, but I think it has to be that way so the people who don't

Working to keep Lejeune clean

Camp Lejeune, on many occasions, has been referred to as a beautiful and well kept base.

However, keeping it that isn't easy. It seems that at dusk on Friday the base is invaded by thousands of phantoms.

They usually leave right before day break on Monday. Sometimes, a couple hundred stay around till the following Friday to get a head start on the weekend.

These phantom beings will now be referred to appropriately as "Litter Critters".

They do such a good job at leaving litter all over base it takes all week to clean up.

The base has custodians who help keep the base looking clean and neat but, they seem to be outnumbered. More litter critters seem to be invading Camp Lejeune as the weather gets warmer.

This is why the base needs extra help picking up behind the litter critters.

The helpers will be fittingly named "Junk Janitors" because they go out picking up junk left behind by the litter critters.

Monday through Friday Courthouse Bay sends a group of six students out to pick up trash.

The junk janitors set out on their quest of keeping the bay clean. In sets of twos, they start at Sneads Ferry gate, Onslow Beach, and the flashing light at the intersection of Sneads Ferry and Marines Road, picking up the mess the litter critters left on the side of the roads leading to Courthouse Bay.

It takes the janitors on the average three hours a day, five days a week. Multiply these numbers by four weeks and they add up to 360 man hours a month used to pick up trash in the Courthouse Bay area alone. What about the rest of the base?

Other groups of junk janitors are out, Monday through Friday, trying to keep their areas litter free in French Creek and on main side.

Brig personnel escort junk janitors around seven days a week to ensure Camp Lejeune always looks presentable but not long after they finish, litter critters come out and make their rounds.

Many hours are being used to fight the critters. This is not a war that cannot be won. People who want to help keep Camp Lejeune looking clean should join forces with the junk janitors to banish the litter critters from base.

Littering aboard Camp Lejeune is prohibited and if caught, a person could have their driving privileges aboard base suspended for six months.

Litter is litter no matter what's tossed on the side of the road. Something as small as a cigarette butt or as large as a bag of trash can cause a six month suspension.

Litter critters are really lazy people in disguise. Their littering shows that they don't care about anyone but themselves. They also are the same people who would have a stroke if you threw something on the floor in their house or paper in their yard.

The time and money spent picking up after litter critters could have been used on something useful like base beautification projects.

Oh, for those who believe that if they didn't litter it would put someone out of a job, try again. Junk janitors and base custodians will probably have enough to do without having to pick up behind litter critters.

Chalk up one win for the junk janitors.

FSSG continues work in Saudi Arabia Marines return to Camp Lejeune in phases

"This week saw the 2nd FSSG flow its first group of Marines and sailors back to Camp Lejeune. Two hundred thirty doctors and corpsmen from medical facilities all over the United States departed Jubail airport on the 19th of April. By the first of May, over 600 more members of our command will be either home or on their way home. Again, the names of these men and women will be released as soon as they are put on the official manifest. It is my intent to continue to flow people back to Camp Lejeune in phases — each phase to coincide with the completion of a set of tasks that we are required to perform in support of the redeployment of II MEF. I can tell you that we are literally working 24 hours a day, 7 days a week to get the jobs we have to do, accomplished. All of us want to be home with you as soon as possible and the hard work will be worth it when we have the chance to see you again. It still

appears that our final phase will be comprised of about 1,800 Marines and sailors and that the latest target date looks like the mid-June time frame. We would like to be home before that time but, unfortunately, it may look like a pretty solid date.

The weather is still pretty cool — around 85 degrees — so the working conditions are not too bad. We are trying to get as much work done as possible before the hot weather begins. We still have MCSDD-28 in Kuwait but are expecting their release from that mission in a week. They are doing a superb job and their workload is extremely high.

As you see more and more reunions take place, please don't get discouraged. Our time is definitely going to come. And when it does, it will be just that much sweeter. You remain in our hearts and prayers every day. God bless you. BGen. Krulak."

Clear your mind; think safety

"Accidents usually don't just happen. There's usually a series of things that lead up to one," said Helen F. Ramsey, safety manager, base safety.

Every year, many lives are lost and people injured in on-the-job accidents. Most are attributed to state of mind. Being able to spot attitudes like apathy, carelessness, complacency, ignorance, defiance, emotions, negligence and tiredness is what can help to reduce the number.

Apathy, or a lack of interest, comes from people who show a "who cares," attitude toward safety. These people are at a greater risk of injuring themselves on the job.

Being careless could cause accidents that could injure others too.

Complacency causes people to think "well I've done it this way last time and didn't get injured so why

change now," knowing that what they are doing is wrong. This type of thinking causes many accidents.

Just like ignorance is no excuse for not knowing the law, it's no excuse for safety either. Not knowing and not taking the time to find out could make someone an accident waiting to happen.

Know the rules, and work by them. Defying safety rules is just asking for an accident to happen.

Excessive anger or happiness can injure. Controlling emotions at work is important.

Failing to keep a work area tidy and tools in good condition is also hazardous. Neglected work areas and tools could be the beginning of an accident.

Getting the proper amount of rest is important for safety. Tired workers react slower than well-rested ones.

When you get down to the basics, accidents can be prevented. Doing a job safely saves personal misery, money, and time.

Individual responsibility is the key to safety. The sooner that's accepted the safer people will be. Other people can prevent accidents.

Volunteers working together to save birds

SAUDI ARABIA — It has been approximately two months since Saddam Hussein decided to turn his wrath away from humans and spend it on wild life in the Persian. Since his unexcusable act of violence Jan. 25 when he spilled 300 million barrels of oil into the Gulf, untold numbers of birds, turtles and other sea-living creatures have died.

However, some good has come from his destructive attitude. The world's largest oil spill has awakened an otherwise sleepy nation into action by creating the first ever, Saudi Arabian Wildlife Rescue Center in the town of Jubail, according to Peter Symens, an ornithologist and biologist working with the program.

Innovative in its own rights, the wildlife rescue center has also been a haven for volunteers. And as usual, when the call for volunteers went out, several Marines and sailors responded. The Marines, the majority of which are reservists from 3rd Bn., 24th Marines, headquartered in St. Louis, Mo., have spent the past four weeks caring for a variety of birds affected by the toxins caused from the spill.

According to Maj. David E. Glass, the senior Marine volunteer, "between eight and 12 Marines come here every day and work about nine hours each day in cleaning and feeding the birds. We are a unit awaiting redeployment to the U.S. and all our gear has been cleaned and packed and there isn't a lot to do, so when we heard about the rescue center it was an opportunity to help the people of this area in another way."

The effort is in fact a multi-national one, for the Marines and sailors replaced British soldiers who had earlier volunteered. Scottish, Dutch and Belgian military members, American expatriates and their spouses and workers from ARAMCO have all volunteered to help lessen the destruction.

According to Yousef Al-Wetaid, the Field Research Director for the Saudi National Committee for Wildlife Preservation and Development, when the center began no one in the start-up process really knew how to deal with the problem. "But, through trial and error and a lot of help

from people such as the Marines and sailors, we've been able to do very well."

Approximately 1,000 birds have been saved from death so far; and 480 are in different stages of recovery while another 105 are ready to be released to their natural habitat.

The process of getting the creatures back to their usual living area, the seam, is really not as complicated as one might think, but it is rather delicate.

"It takes us about 45 minutes to get each bird ready for cleaning," explained Cpl. Matthew F. Komlski, who incidentally was meritoriously promoted to his present rank in the field by BGen. Charles C. Krulak, commanding general, 2nd FSSG.

He went on to explain that, "when the birds are first brought in, we feed them and try to get their strength up, because otherwise, they usually don't make it through the cleaning process. Once their strength is up we give a betablock which helps to sedate them while we clean their beaks.

"We then cut the puffed ends of the Q-tips off and take the center portion and tape it between their beaks to prevent them from pecking at us while we clean them. It also helps protect their mouths. Eye drops are placed in their eyes to protect their sight during the washing process," the political science major at Virginia Highland College in Havingdon, concluded.

The next step in the process takes two people, one to help keep the bird calm while the other washes each feather individually with dish washing liquid and warm water. Once that is over the birds are placed in small tubs of water to get them used to the water again. After they've satisfactorily adapted they're put in the swimming pool of the former bachelor recreation center. There, they're watched like small children; if they don't float or dry quickly, they're rewashed because that means all the oils have not been washed out of their feathers. And, the process begins again until the volunteer crew is satisfied that the birds are ready to be released.

Several variety of sea creatures have been collected by the center so far, including a 40-year-old sea turtle that unfortunately did not live. However, day in and day out, these unlikely bird-men and -women show up to

care for the Great Crested Grebes, Black Necked Grebes, Great Cormorants, Socotra Cormorants, Slender Billed Gulls, Herring Gulls, Curlews, Pintails, Grey Herons, Mallard Ducks, Red Shanks and Green turtles. Of particular concern to volunteers is the Socotra Cormorants, because 60 percent of that species live in the Gulf region.

Birds and turtles have been the only species rescued so far, but according to Al-Wetaid the center will probably take care of seacows, dolphins and other sea mammals. With that in mind, a new facility will be strictly for the rescuing of marine wildlife.

Cmdr. Richard Ilka, the 3/24 battalion surgeon, has also spent many days at the center. He says he became involved when he found out the green turtles were an endangered species and requested volunteers from the battalion's commanding officer LtCol. Guilliams, who responded enthusiastically.

"The significance of our Navy/Marine team being here is that we're reservists rescuing victims of the war; for these creatures really are victims of Saddam Hussein. We've learned the importance of biological toxins on wildlife and humans; in the long term it will help us to prepare for the future. The fact that the Marine Corps is involved in such a positive thing speaks highly of Marines," he said.

The team of military and civilian volunteers have been able to garner a 70 percent success rate with the cormorant species. The Grebes, which are total water birds, have a 10 percent survival rate,

"because they have to be out of the natural environment for so long before they are totally cleaned," explain Symens.

One Marine reservist who is sick at the sight of the oil slicked birds but at the same time thrilled to have the experience, is wildlife biology major at South W. Missouri State University; LCpl. Tom McMurry is a motor transport Marine MOS attached to Headquarters and Service Company, 3/24. "This is just the best practical experience I could have ever asked for. Being here makes me, really all of us, realize what devastation something like this cause with very little effort; we're just glad we are able to help," he said.

In addition to their deeds at the rescue center, the Marines and sailors have spent time on three tiny islands, Jan Kurayn and Kavar, with 120 other civilian volunteers cleaning up from the oil slick and debris which were preventing the Green Turtles from nesting. The British Royal Air Force provided the helicopter which ferried the volunteers to the islands last month and according to Symens, the multi-national effort has helped to increase the breeding success rate of the turtles on those islands.

The hope of the staff of volunteers is that someone else will take their place when they have to move on.

"The people of Saudi Arabia and really the entire Gulf Region which this oil spill will eventually affect, appreciate the efforts of these Marines and sailors in coming to help us," emphasized Al-Wetaid.

MECEP offers advancement for qualified persons

Today's education is a stepladder leading to success; the more knowledge you acquire, the higher you can climb.

One downfall of higher learning is the cost. It's expensive to stay in school, and a lot of young people today are forced out into the harsh reality of the nine-to-five world, away from the dreams a better education can provide.

For those men and women who enlist in the Marine Corps, wanting new challenges, programs are available to advance their careers. All of the programs require applicants to be in outstanding physical condition and have no legal convictions.

Marine corporals and above, who have completed at least two years of college, may be eligible for the Marine Corps Enlisted Commissioning Education Program (MECEP). This program was designed to provide the Marine Corps with regular officers from the enlisted ranks. Applicants must have a combined Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) score of 1000, with a minimum verbal score of 400.

If accepted, the Marine will receive active duty pay while attending school and will attend Officer Candidate School (OCS) during the first summer in college. After OCS, the Marine will return to complete his/her degree and then will be commissioned a 2ndLt. in the Marine Corps.

Many Marines are not fortunate enough to attend college before they enlist. That's one reason Broadened Opportunity for Officer Selection and Training (BOOST) was created.

The BOOST program is a demanding 12-month academic improvement program, providing remedial high school and college prep level instruction. Individuals with an electrical composite score of 110 on the Armed Forces Classification Test or a minimum combined score of 800 on their SAT qualify for this program.

The program was established for individuals from backgrounds or circumstances which caused educational deprivation. After the applicant is accepted and finishes the yearlong course, he/she will then compete for the MECEP program.

The Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps Scholarship Program (NROTC) also offers scholarships to active duty Marines with a combined SAT score of 1000, and who are no older than 25 on June 30 of the year they are eligible for commission.

Upon acceptance, the individual must apply to and attend one of 64 schools on the NROTC list. The scholarship pays for tuition, books, instructional fees, uniforms, and provides a subsistence allowance of \$100 a month.

These are a few of the programs offered to Marines. By finding out about them through their career planners, Marines can make these programs work to their advantage.

really want to do it are weeded out," Hummons said.

Hummons didn't let the difficulties of applying for the program discourage him. He was supported by his wife Cynthia and Marines in his office to accomplish his goal.

He was accepted into the program in March and will attend a 12 month school to prepare him for college. Then he will compete with other Marines for the MECEP, Marine Corps Enlisted Commissioning Education Program. Hummons knows he has a tough road ahead of him but he's confident he will do well.

"As long as you have people in your corner supporting you, you can accomplish any goal," Hummons said.

Thomas shares the characteristics that drove Hummons to succeed. He was accepted into the MECEP program in March.

Thomas is a 24-year-old native of Augusta, Georgia. He started college after high school and majored in accounting. When his finances ran low he looked for help through the Marine Corps.

"I talked to my recruiter and since I had two years of college completed, he suggested enlisting and applying for MECEP," Thomas said.

A Data Base Clerk at the Base Communication Center, Thomas joined the Marine Corps and started working toward his goal: to complete college and become an officer.

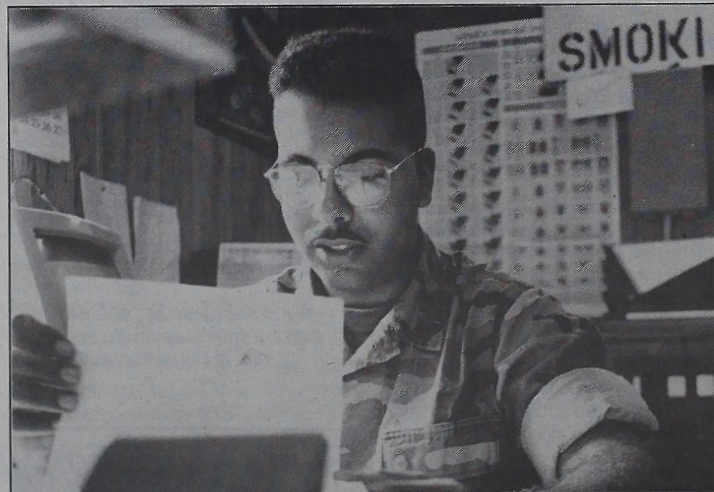
Since one of the requirements for acceptance into the program is achieving the rank of Corporal, Thomas was deter-



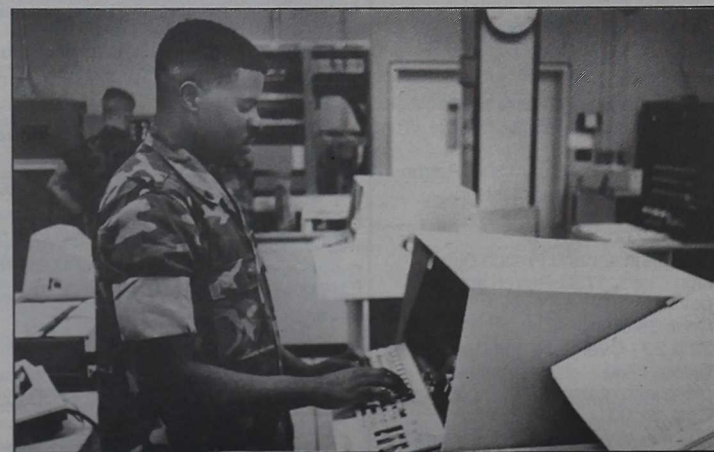

mined to get a speedy promotion, meritoriously.

"It started in boot camp, striving for honor man, anything to help me excel," Thomas said.

Thomas brought the same motivation to his first duty station where he had to work out of his MOS in the Radio Operations field, on Crypto equipment.

His ability to adapt to the new atmosphere got him noticed and he was made a section head. He continued to work hard and he got a chance to move up.

Thomas went before a Marine Quarter Board and came in second, which made him eligible for a Meritorious Corporal Board. His promotion was within reach.

"I didn't place first but at the Regimental level, I impressed the Sergeant Major so much, I got a meritorious promotion," Thomas said.

In June of 1990, Thomas started the painstaking work of submitting a promotion package. He knew MECEP was a very competitive program, but took into account some advice his dad gave him.

"My dad told me, you can beat 90 percent of the people by doing what's right, you can beat another 40 percent by getting up a little earlier, staying a little later and working a little harder," Thomas said. "Having that burning desire to achieve your goal beats that last 10 percent — I have that burning desire."

Thomas has a long road ahead of him. He has to complete college and attend OCS before getting a commission, but he won't do it alone.

"The support of my wife Renee and my desire to be a good provider for my three children will keep me going," Thomas said.

These are just two Marines accepted for commissioning programs. There are many more Marines who have what it takes. They just need to apply to the program that is best for them.

Stone Bay receives facelift

Seabee reservists rebuild old buildings

Since their inception in 1941, the Seabees have built everything from roads and bridges to fortresses and airfields.

Now they are at Stone Bay rifle range, stripping down 13 buildings to the frame and totally refurbishing them.

The buildings are used by the Special Operations Training Group for several purposes such as warehouses, classrooms, offices and special operations training.

The Seabees are putting on new roofs, installing new windows and doors, rewiring the electrical system, and building new walls. Basically, they are doing whatever is required to restore these very old rock buildings.

In fact, virtually every trade and profession is represented in the ranks of the Seabees. Engineers, electricians, masons, surveyors. You name it. They've got it.

"These people are a representation of America's skilled worker," said Builder Chief (BUC) Hans U. Ruediger of the 7th Reserve Naval Construction Regiment in Davisville, RI, "... the electrician that fixes your house and the plumber that fixes your kitchen faucet."

CE3 Darryl A. Rivers rewires the lighting throughout the buildings.

The Seabees working on this project are reserves who are on their two-week annual training duty. Reserve detachments from the New York and Rhode Island areas are rotating every two weeks to complete the project.

"They are doing a fantastic job," said MSgt. Don Little, Chief range coordinator at Stone Bay, "It is clear that these people are professionals at what they do."

"We maintain a close relationship with the Marine Corps," Ruediger said, "We provide the Corps with work in our field of expertise — construction. The Corps, in turn, provides us with training in their fields of expertise — marksmanship, land nav, etc."

This is important since the Seabees were founded

to perform construction jobs in dangerous environments. The training the Corps provides helps them to protect themselves and what they built.

One reserve and four active duty Construction Battalions went to Saudi Arabia, in support of Operation Desert Storm, where they built airfields, roads, and field hospital units. There are a total of 18 reserve Construction battalions and seven active duty battalions.

The Stone Bay project began in mid-February and completion is set for mid-May.

"This has been a great experience for us," Ruediger said, "and after having witnessed the emotional outpouring as the troops came home, it feels super to have been here in a support role at this point in time."

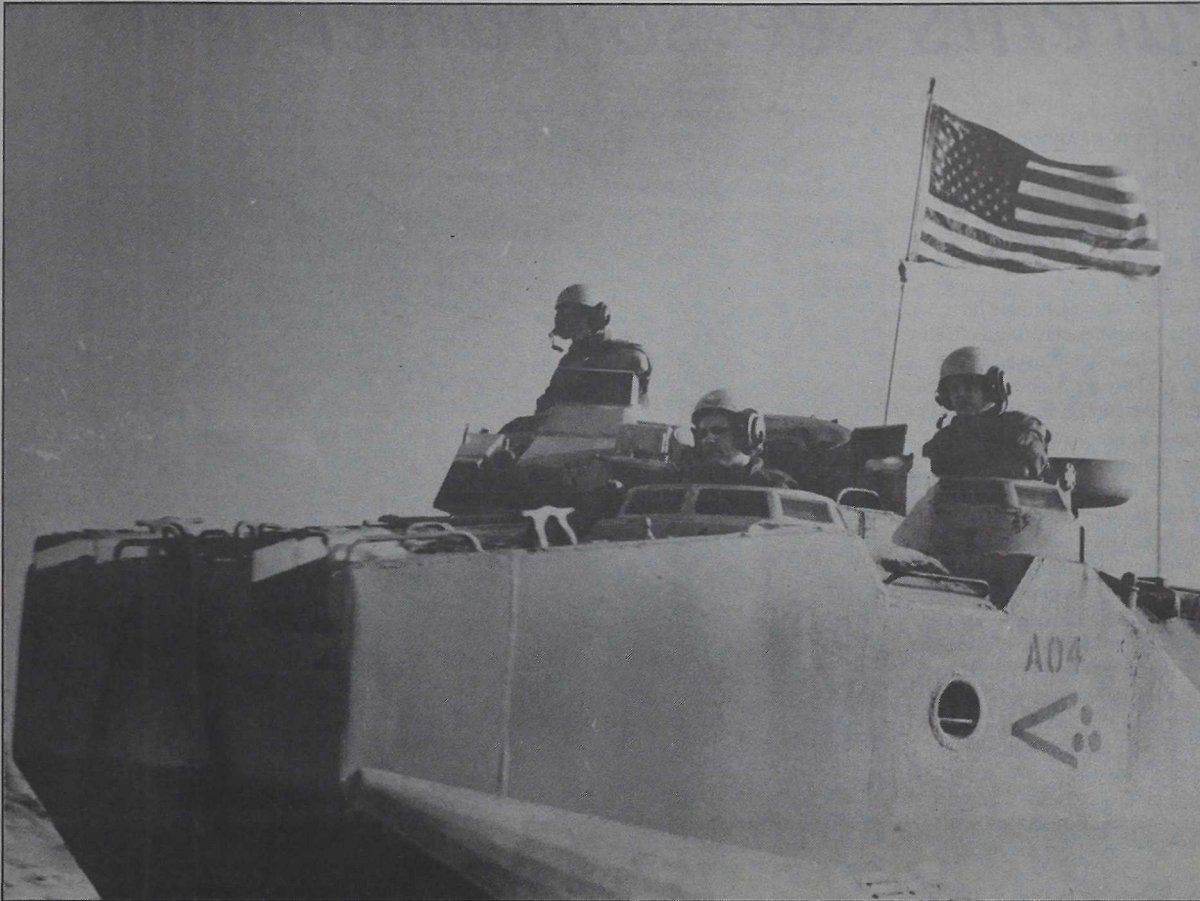
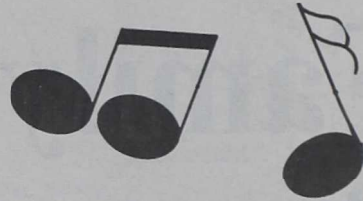

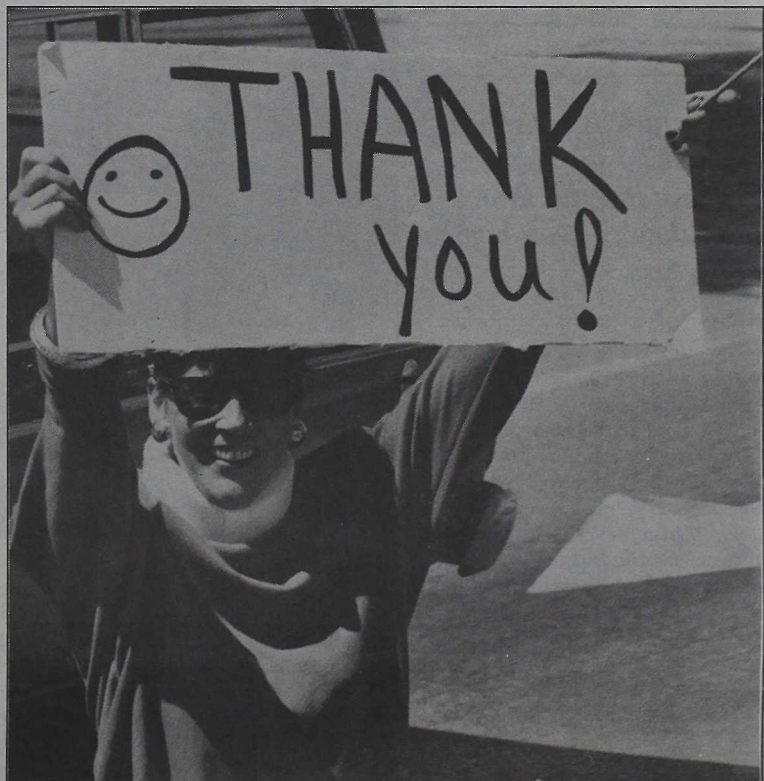

Family Ties

Parents see son after two years

Marian and Tom Scott McVea are very proud of their son, LCpl. John McVea. He just returned from eight months in Saudi Arabia with H&S Co., 3/2.

McVea did not expect to see his parents at Camp Lejeune, because their home in Zachary, La. is over 1,000 miles away. They are a close family and value the simple things in life, so they made the trip.

"These are the things that we'll pass on down the line," said Marian McVea. Passing things down the line is what has made them a close family.

The McVeas have four generations of stories, beginning with great-great grandfather T. Scott McVea. Part of the tale was related by John McVea's father, the fourth T. Scott McVea. "For about two years he was a prisoner of war in New York, where he was captured during the Civil War. While he was there, he was given a Bible. Inside the cover it says, 'Presented to T. Scott while a prisoner in Elmira, N.Y. by Maggie McAlons, January, 1865.' We have the Bible now."

"When he was set free from being a prisoner, he came back here to Louisiana," McVea said. "He walked the whole way. Then he settled in the Plains area, not far from here."

His return is a little extra special for them, because it's the first time they've seen him in two years.

The Plains is a section of Zachary that is outside the city limits.

The next generation of McVeas, headed by T. Scott Jr., started McVea's Dairy. "The whole area is filled with Mills, McKuens and McVeas, and that's how things have been for years and years," Marian McVea said. "There used to be nothing but dairies in the Plains and the big ones have crowded out the smaller ones; but it's still the kind of place where you can leave your house unlocked all the time."

T. Scott Jr. had four sons. Three of them graduated from LSU and followed their father's footsteps into the dairy business.

"I took it over from my daddy (the third T. Scott McVea), and we ran it till about ten years ago," T. Scott IV said. Though it's no longer an active dairy farm, the 640 acres are still being used. "Now we rent out the land for fish and

game."

The end of the dairy business, brought an end to 80 years of a family tradition, but not the end of family history. In fact, since the farm has been used as a sportsman's area, it's produced its own history.

LCpl. McVea's father tells the story of his son's first deer, "When each of my kids was 13 or 14 years old, I'd give them a shotgun for Christmas. Then when they're ready to go hunting, I'd give them just one buck shot and I'd tell them, 'If you can't get the deer with one

shot, then you can't get it at all.' Well, I sent John out with his gun and one shell. In a little while, we heard a shot, but he didn't come back for a long time. After about two hours, he finally came in with an eight point buck and his shotgun busted in two. He'd shot the deer, but he wanted to make sure he was dead, so he hit the buck in the side of the head with the gun. He's still got the gun, and we tell him that maybe he can fix it up someday when he has a son."

The best story for the McVeas, right

now, is that their son, John, is back safe and sound from Operation Desert Storm. His return is a little extra special for them, because it's the first time they've seen him in two years.

"Every time we thought he'd be able to come home, something else always came up. Okinawa, or Norway or something," said Marian McVea. "This time, though, he'll be home for three weeks, and his sister's graduation."

As generations continue, LCpl. McVea, the fifth generation from the first T. Scott McVea, will have tales for his children, as well.

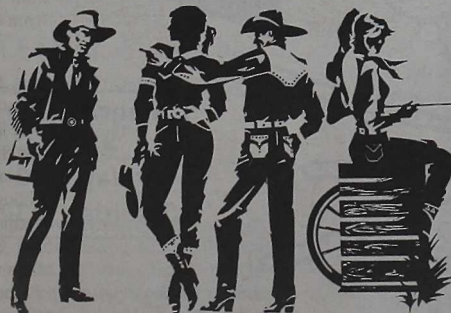

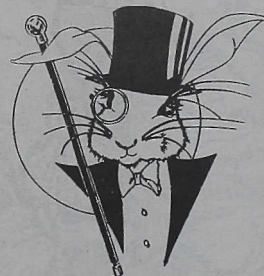

FMSS: Navy's finest serving the proud

Teaching techniques at the Field Medical Service School, MCB, have always stressed the importance of serving with Marines and working as a team. Throughout the school's history little has been altered. Camp Lejeune's FMSS was initially activated April 8, 1943 as Field Medical Service School, School Battalion, Camp Lejeune. In April 1944, FMSS was reassigned to the Medical Battalion and was officially deactivated after World War II. The command

was reactivated by order of the Commandant of the Marine Corps on Oct. 1, 1950 as FMSS, Marine Barracks.

Today, the school is regarded highly, as it was in the 1940s, for the caliber of corpsmen it sends out to serve with Marines.

FMSS's mission is to train Navy Medical Department personnel in preparation for their initial assignment to ground, aviation and combat service support units of the Fleet Marine Force.

Although the largest numbers of personnel trained are hospital corpsmen, the school also trains Dental Technicians and

Medical Department Officers.

All classes are designed to introduce the students to the organizational and operational aspects of the Fleet Marine Force. This enables the students to survive in a combat environment while providing emergency medical care and preventive medicine services.

Today, Navy Capt. A.E. Mataldi, commanding officer of the FMSS, says the most important aspect of the school, "is we prepare the hospital corpsmen and dental technicians to serve with the Marine Corps.

"We truly believe our corpsmen and dental technicians are the finest in the medical department," he said. "That's why we say 'training the Navy's finest.'"

The corpsmen and technicians are considered to be general practitioners, "... they do a little of everything, working side-by-side with medical department officers," Mataldi said.

Mataldi attributes his belief to the instructors. He said many of the students who come to the school don't want to be here. Usually it's because they don't have a "focus" on their life.

"We get the majority of our students directly from Hospital Corps School ... and up to this point they have not gone to any permanent Navy duty stations," he explained. "So they don't know what they want to do. They don't know whether or not they

want to go on ship, to a hospital, or to Fleet Marine Force.

"But once when they get here, they see 'Emergency Medical Care — Field Medicine, as medicine they would experience,'" he said. "Medical lifesaving treatment they would provide in a combat environment. It's very exciting, challenging and demanding for the individual. They get all caught up in wanting to be the very best. On graduation day they are the proudest bunch of young men and women because they realize how important it is to be skilled in emergency medical treatment."

Many of the graduates will continue their education in emergency medical care by attending additional courses at their permanent duty stations, according to Mataldi.

Even though the corpsmen become more skilled at providing emergency medical care, first and foremost at FMSS is the skill to give immediate care to battle wounds.

"Here the students are focused on providing total battlefield care," Mataldi said. "Including disease and injury prevention.

"Many people requiring treatment or evacuation sustain non-battlefield injuries," he explained.

Therefore "healthful living" is stressed to the students. Healthful living meaning taking care of personal hygiene, taking of their feet, and caring for the environment (i.e. waste disposal.)

An ounce of prevention....

FMSS students learn the importance of preventive medicine

Preventive medicine lectures are not always looked upon with great enthusiasm. Most people even forget to practice preventive medicine until an epidemic breaks out. However, at the Field Medical Service School, MCB, it is one of the most important aspects of their training.

Since Preventive Medicine covers a wide range of subjects, from personal hygiene to disease-carrying insects, the hospital corpsmen and dental technicians at FMSS receive 3 hours of instruction on the topic. Additionally, they learn how to relay the information to Marines.

"Our approach to preventive medicine is to teach the hospital corpsmen and dental technicians to educate the Marines about preventive medicine," said Chief Petty Officer C.R. Hayden, senior preventive medicine technician, FMSS. "We focus it toward the Marines for self-use." Since humans are social animals, diseases can spread rapidly and in a combat environment even more quickly, according to Hayden who likened the spread of disease to an ant hill.

"In the military it's almost like an ant hill. Instead

of having one type of ant you have all of them because they're here from every part of this country and others," he explained. "So everyone is exposed to different things in their life which may affect some and not others."

A good example which is used as an opening statement in the Water Purification class is "... everybody has to have some things to survive. Without food, humans can survive seven to 10 days, but without water the survival rate is three days. Americans tend to take clean water for granted but it can't be taken for granted in other countries," Hayden said. "A waterborne disease can effect an entire company or battalion. It's real difficult to fight a war if you don't know whether to shoot or squat."

The students receive classes on various countries and the diseases that are indigenous to the countries. They can then make recommendations to the commanding officers as to what precautions the Marines should take, according to Hayden.

"If a CO loses 25 percent of his battalion because of a waterborne disease over a four day period, he's not going to be a happy camper," he said. "So that's why preventive medicine is so important and that's what we teach the students."

However, water purification is just one of the six classes taught under preventive medicine. Others are heat and cold injuries, preventive foot injuries and care, vector control, communicable diseases prevention and field sanitation.

"We teach the students how to recognize a disease, what causes the disease, the symptoms, what the treatment is and how to prevent the disease from spreading to others," he said.

The Marine Corps is famous for its saying "A chain is only as strong as its weakest link." Preventive Medicine works the same way and that's what is stressed to the students, he explained.

So one way of keeping the "chain" strong is

preventive medicine.

"An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," he said.

Students visit D.C.

Lejeune students seek closer view of government

In this age of technology, it is not unusual for educators to use computers, video recorders and laser discs to enhance their curriculum. However, Jane Tinnen, a government and economics teacher at Lejeune High School, chooses to use the old-fashioned field trip to stimulate her students.

Tinnen and four students travelled to Washington, D.C. recently to participate in the week-long Close-up Washington Program. The Close-up Foundation was established in 1970 as a civic learning adventure for high school students. It has become a hands-on way of learning about the American government, its political system and the responsibilities of citizenship.

"When I first came to Lejeune, they were not participating in the program," Tinnen said. "I had been very active in Close-up at my previous school and I had the opportunity to see firsthand how the experience benefited the students."

After settling into the job, Tinnen approached the administration with the idea. She now attends every year, with selected students.

Although the foundation is a nonprofit organization the trip is costly.

"It costs about \$800 per student," Tinnen said. "I try to help offset that by asking for contributions from local organizations like the Camp Lejeune Officer's Wives Club, the Lejeune High Parents Club and the Student Government

Association."

Tinnen said it is often the cost that inhibits the students from approaching their parents. But, because she is aware it can be an obstacle, she begins talking about Close-up in the fall. This allows students time to approach their parents or to earn the money.

This year's group consisted of three seniors and one junior. Other than grade level, the participants must be in at least the tenth grade, the program has no specific requirements.

During their week-long stay in Washington, D.C., the students attended seminars, heard lectures, and went sightseeing.

"If you're a people kind of person, you would have a great time," said Jennifer Wilkerson, a junior at Lejeune High.

"You certainly don't learn as much in the workshops if you don't speak out," Tinnen said.

Although Congress was not in session, the students did get an opportunity to visit with their local government officials. They spoke with Congressman Martin Lancaster and visited Senator Jesse Helm's office.

One of the workshops each student remembered as frustrating, was creating a law.

"Now I have a respect for what the congressmen and senators do," said T.J. Matthews. "I respect them, but I still don't agree with all of it."

"I got a real view of D.C.," said Kevin Monroe. "I have never been there before and I can't understand how anyone cannot be impressed."

"I lived there," said Wilkerson. "And you just don't respect it when you live there."

Each session of Close-up is limited to several states. However, the session the Lejeune High School students attended was more culturally enhancing this year, according to Tinnen. It contained participants from the Indian reservations in Arizona, Oklahoma and South Dakota.

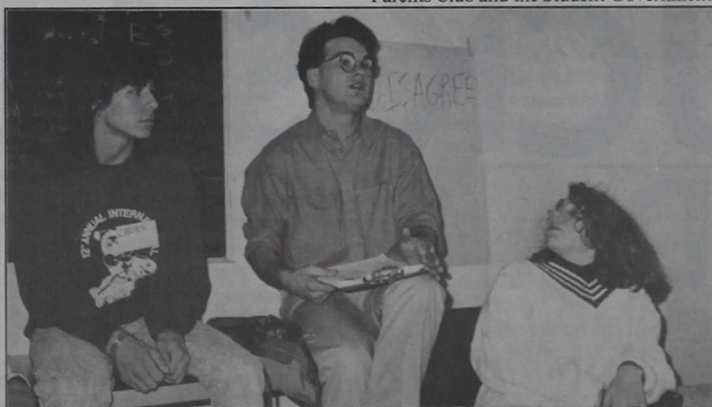
"I have traveled all of my life," said Charles "Bud" Gallagher. "I think what I learned most was to appreciate my life. There were kids there that had never left their state. Plus the Indian kids told us they weren't allowed to speak out, its disrespectful. They were proud [of their heritage], but so passive."

"I just wish more students could attend," Tinnen said. "It's a wonderful experience both educationally and culturally."

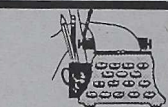

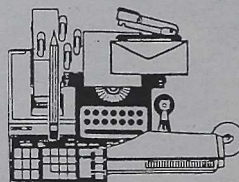

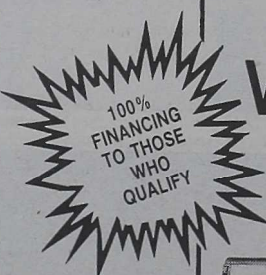

Naval Hospital New handling procedures for outpatient records

A new procedure will be implemented regarding the custody of dependent and retiree outpatient medical records. Effective today, patients will no longer be required to pick up their records from the records office prior to reporting to a clinic for walk-in visit.

Patients are to report directly to the clinic in which they wish to be seen. For example, a dependent or retiree wishes to be seen in the Acute Care clinic for check-in. Clinic staff will request the medical record from the outpatient records personnel. If you are scheduled to be seen immediately at another hospital clinic, clinic staff will transfer your record to the appropriate clinic.

This change does not affect procedures currently used for scheduled appointments. Medical records for scheduled appointments are requested prior to the appointment by clinic staff. If you are scheduled to be seen in more than one clinic, clinic staff will transfer your record.

These steps to minimize the handling of records by patients are taken to protect the interest of the patient and of the government, as they are long-term records for use in your present and future medical care. Per the Secretary of the Navy and BUMED, the practice of patients maintaining custody of their own health care treatment records is absolutely prohibited.

The Navy/Marine corps Relief Society also assisted families during Operation Desert Shield/Storm when they encountered pay problems.

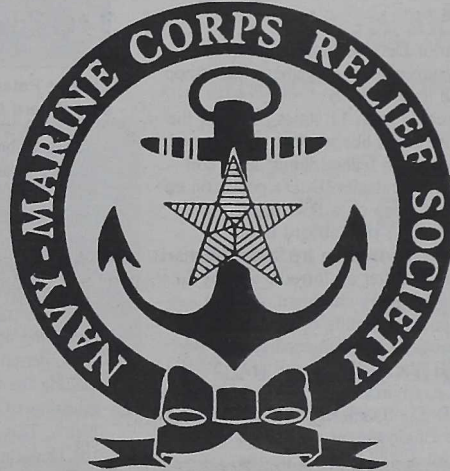
The Navy Relief Society came to Camp Lejeune in the summer of 1943. The name was officially changed to Navy Marine Corps Society in January.

Student named finalist in writing contest

Seventh grader chosen from 8,000 entrants

Brewster Middle School seventh grader, Kevin Rogers, was recently named finalist in the RespecTeen letter-writing contest that generated 8,000 responses from students nationwide.

Camp Lejeune 13-year-old wrote to Congressman Martin Lancaster concerning the growing problem of Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) in the country. That topic was one of the top ten concerns students voted in letters to their congressmen as part of the third annual RespecTeen "Speak For Yourself" contest.

Choosing to write on the topic of AIDS was spurred by increased awareness of the disease and the Ryan White story, Rogers said. The peer pressure and ridicule White suffered during his illness was something Rogers said he could relate to because of the age similarities.

Watching the stories about people like Ryan White on television and it concerned me," Rogers said. "I wanted to know more about the disease and what I could do if I got it or if someone I know got it."

Rogers added that he feels the AIDS

issue is the most urgent on today's health agenda. If it is not dealt with and research for a cure is not pursued, the disease will get out of control, he said.

While Onslow County has reported only 36 cases of the disease, Health Department officials said reported cases of women contracting the disease has increased substantially. Zanessa Bell, health educator with the department, said increased crack sales, the sharing of narcotic needles and multiple sex partners has also contributed to rising local statistics.

Rogers urged Lancaster to push for further federal funding to help in developing a cure for the disease he said has been largely ignored by the general public. AIDS is a problem for everyone, he said.

"Too many months the AIDS epidemic went largely ignored by the general public," Rogers wrote. "Let us not close our eyes to this issue any longer."

School systems around the country have added AIDS to the health education curriculum in the hopes of dispelling myths that students hear. At Brewster, AIDS education starts in the sixth grade. Dewanda Starling, Health Education teacher, said

students have a lot of questions, but they are comfortable with the topic.

"The disease is widespread enough now that the students aren't so scared to mention anymore," Starling said. "And they know now it's okay to be around people with AIDS."

Other educational measures Rogers feels are helpful include parents talking about the disease with their children and students encouraging students to educate themselves.

"I try to urge my friends to take AIDS seriously," Rogers said. "It's not a joke."

Although Rogers has not received a response back from Lancaster, he feels

his letter will make a difference. If nothing else, he said it will show the Congressman that students are concerned about AIDS and people with AIDS.

"Speak For Yourself" is an element of the larger "RespecTeen: Helping Parents and Teens Respect Each Other and Themselves" program. The national program is aimed at helping teens and parents recognize and meet the challenges of adolescence.

Rogers was one of 435 finalists chosen from each congressional district. One student from each state was then selected from the finalists to attend the national youth forum in Washington, D.C. this week.

The Department of Defense held a three day Red-Cockaded Woodpecker Management Workshop at the officers club here recently.

More than 50 people from 11 states attended the workshop to discuss issues like ways to manage red-cockaded woodpeckers on federal lands, legal considerations, long term strategies, DoD's policy on endangered species and to go on a field trip to red-cockaded woodpecker sites aboard base.

A welcoming speech was given by BGen. Michael P. Downs, CG, MCB. After an introduction by Lt. Col. Douglas Ripley, USAF, chairman, defense natural resources council wildlife committee, a speech on DoD's policy on endangered species was given by Thomas E. Baca, deputy assistant, secretary of defense, environment. Baca spoke about accomplishments DoD officials hope to fulfill in the future for Defense Environment conditions.

"The date is April 3, 1993, I pick up the Washington Post and I read the following headline, 'The Department of Defense is recognized as the

standard for environmental stewardship through its leadership and commitment to compliance and protection of the environment.' Below this headline I read, 'The public widely recognizes DoD as the world leader in environmental stewardship in the 21st century.'

"Our military installations are recognized by the public as trustworthy and cooperative neighbors providing decisive accountable solutions to environmental and public health concerns. DoD is leading the nation in generating and implementing solutions to one of our nation's most demanding problems. This is the vision that we have adopted for the Department of Defense," Baca said.

The second day started with a recap of what happened the day before, speeches and then a field trip

to red-cockaded woodpecker sites.

The trip showed workshop attendees the condition of Camp Lejeune's woodpecker colonies and how they are managed.

The endangered species act requires military departments to protect listed endangered species to carry out a conservation program to preserve endangered species on its installations.

Because of that the first stop on the trip was the G-6 range where a brief on expansion of training areas in regards to the red-cockaded woodpecker was given.

On the final day of the workshop, attendees split into three groups to discuss and make recommendations on red-cockaded woodpecker management.

Have you ever thought what it would be like to grow your own vegetable garden, helping to save money and having the freshest possible vegetables?

The Garden Plot Program, organized five years

ago, has 78 plots open to all active duty and retired military personnel and their dependents. The site is off Stone Street across from the Base Riding Stables.

"Every one of the garden plots has always been filled during those years," said Virginia L. Rochelle of the Base Riding Stables.

The first year the stables took over the registering maintenance of the plots because the whole area filled with trash and rubble from former patrons.

"I think there were about 45 dump trucks that hauled out all the garbage," Rochelle said. "We had to have a working party come over to help us."

There is a usage fee of \$10 to help cover the expense to maintain the area.

"The clean-up for the plots that has to be done each year has caused us to have to charge a small amount," Rochelle said.

The plots are disced every spring to prepare them for the patron's use. From there, maintenance is the responsibility of the patron.

In the winter there are specified plots to be used for winter gardening that do not interfere with the annual maintenance requirements of Base Maintenance.

The plots can be used for one year. After November patrons must remove any fencing they may have added during the growing season. Plots are assigned to plot holders and new patrons in February.

Now is the time to turn over a new leaf and start gardening. The benefits that you can reap are measurable.

SSgt. R.W. Eberhardt, H&S Co., SOI, MCB, was convicted at a special court-martial of one specification of wrongful use of cocaine, in violation of Article 112a, UCMJ. He was sentenced to 30 days confinement, \$667 forfeiture, and reduction to lance corporal.

A PRECIOUS COMMODITY

Someone once wrote this rhyme. "Make new friends, and keep the old. One is silver, the other gold." It expresses very well one of our most basic needs, and the value we place on friendship. Sometimes our friendships may be very casual, at other times they may be very deep, but all friendships are crucial and precious. In fact we may even say that a friend and friendship is something we cannot live without.

This insight has been brought home very clearly during and following the conflict in Southwest Asia. During any separation, friends play an even more important role in our lives. As apart of the Reunion workshops facilitated by the Family Service Center, over and over again when asked who they turned to first for support when their spouses, or parents, or children, or significant person left, the answer was given: "FRIENDS". To be sure, other answers were given for that question as well—family, God, self—but the overwhelming response were friends.

Isn't it interesting that we value friends and friendships so highly. We choose to share with them some of the most stressful times in our lives, some of our deepest feelings and emotions, some of our most intimate secrets, and some of our most ecstatic joys. Isn't it interesting because that which we cherish and look to for security, support and safety, is also that which takes one of the biggest risks.

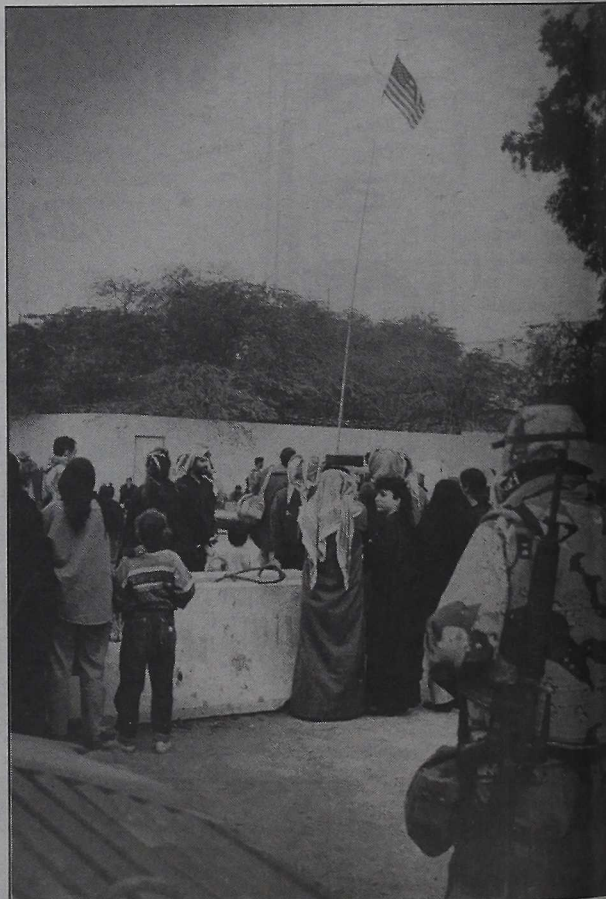
Friends and friendship means taking a risk. It means that we are opening ourselves up for possible hardship. What if a friend is not chosen wisely? Those most intimate secrets could become public knowledge. The apparent support that was there during the good times—that vital support—seems to evaporate when everything is falling apart.

While it is a risk to reach out to be a friend or to look for a friend, it is also rewarding.

In fact it has often been said that the bigger the risk, the greater the reward. Properly chosen friends will keep those secrets that just have to be shared with someone. A good friend will be there to give support even though it appears that everyone has deserted you and the world is falling apart. It is a true friend that can be compassionate listener, and when necessary, bring a sense of reality to fantasy.

But such friends don't just happen, they have to be chosen wisely. A friend should be someone we respect and trust, someone who may have a lot of the same interests we do, someone who has a good reputation, someone who is truthful and honest. For couples, there are usually "hers", "his", and "our" friends. It is generally a wise idea that your spouse be comfortable with your friends, and that there be an understanding between the two of you as to what can and cannot be shared with friends. After all, our first confidence and our first responsibility is to our spouse and not to our friend.

Especially now, with the troops returning from Southwest Asia, the role of friendship needs to be looked at. The testing of stress and turmoil and hardship have made the bonds of friendship strong. There will always be a special kinship between those who have lived through similar experiences. For those who are married, what will the role of friends be now, now that you are reunited? Friends and friendships will most likely have to be redefined, but certainly not forgotten, and always cherished. Now may be an excellent time to find some way to show your appreciation to your friends. What about sending a card, making a phone call, going over for a visit, or possibly even giving a small gift? All are ways of saying "thanks"! Thanks for being a friend!

Lejeune hosts All-Marine trial camps

Marines pit skills against best of best

Marine athletes from near and far are coming to Camp Lejeune. They come to compete in contests that demand strength, speed and agility. They come to pit their skills against the best of the best.

They have already earned the title of All-Marine. Now they aim for a new, special designation—All-Marine.

For the next few months, several All-Marine trial camps will be held here and the level of competition is expected to be high. The finest Marine athletes the Corps has to offer will try to become number one.

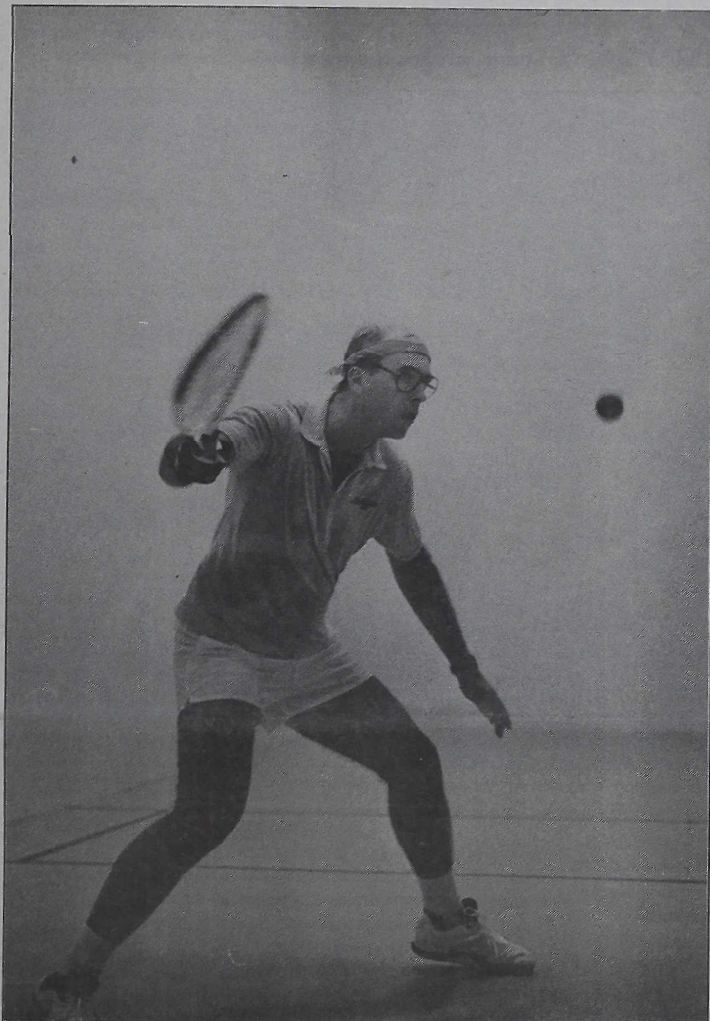
Larry Coffman, Assistant Athletic Director for Special Services, is coordinating much of the activity connected with these events, such as the recently concluded All-Marine Bowling Tournament.

"We're hosting bowling, racquetball, basketball and tennis here," he said. "What happened is that if the Armed Forces Championships is being held on the East Coast, then the All-Marine has to move to the East Coast, to simplify everything.

"We're hosting the racquetball tournament May 5-10," Coffman said. "The men's softball is scheduled to begin July 2 and the tennis trials for the first week in September."

Coffman said because of the Gulf War and financial belt-tightening, changes had to be made in the athletic schedules to maintain a high level of competition.

"In the past," he said, "we'd do the ceremonial program, then the All-Camp,

if there was more than one league. Then, we had FMFLant and after that, the East Coast, where everyone east of the Mississippi could send a team. Then

you have the All-Marine trials, which is what we're hosting, and then the Armed Forces.

"This is what usually goes on," he

said, "but because of Desert Storm, the All-Camps have pretty much all been eliminated because we haven't had two leagues in a lot of our sports, and the FMFLant and East Coast regionals have been suspended or canceled."

Coffman said not having the usual manpower has hurt the contests to some degree, but the competition is still up to Marine Corps standards.

"Anytime you can't play a better caliber of competition it's going to have an effect," he said. "In bowling, the team was completely submitted and approved by resumes, and you had to have a 202 average or higher to be considered for the All-Marine Bowling Team. In racquetball, they took the people with the most experience in competition.

"In team sports, we go with our trial camps," he added. "For our softball camp we're expecting about 50 to 60 players, from which they'll pick out the best 15 players."

All Marines are welcome to come and take part in the trial camps, provided they have some experience and can get the TAD time to participate. Interested athletes must fill out an athletic summary, available at the Athletic Office, in Bldg. 6.

"They have to have experience," he said, "There has to be some kind of proof they're that caliber of player. The problem is that we're not getting applications submitted to make selections.

"In All-Marine bowling, we only had three women submit applications," he added, "and there were only two women in All-Camp racquetball. As far as we know, only one man has submitted a resume for volleyball, and we have good athletes that could easily qualify.

"Usually, Camp Lejeune has the most athletes make these teams, because we're so big," he said, "but we want to stress that we want people who are qualified to come out and apply. Lejeune has some really great athletes."

Lejeune Spiker invited to All-Marine trials

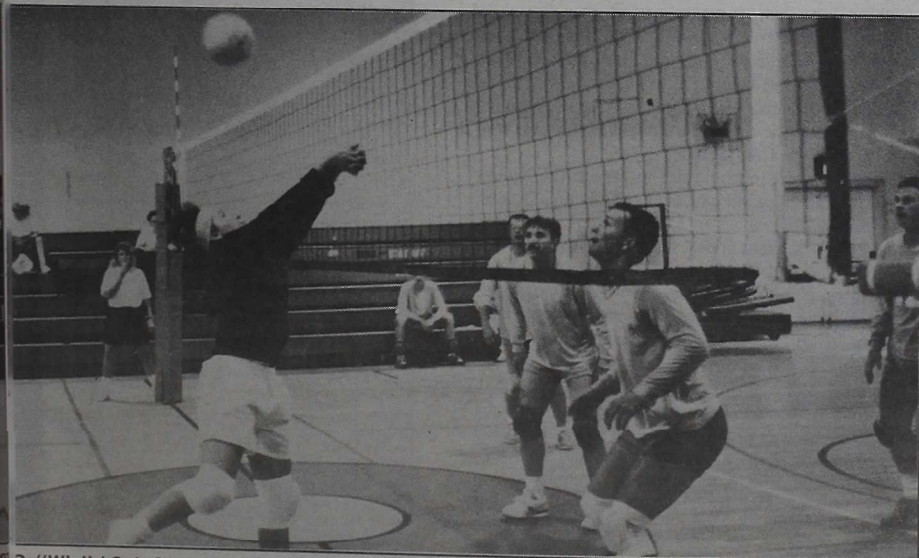

Lejeune boxers set for national competition

Dynamic Duo determined to dominate.

These alliterated sentences are merely symbols of what can be expected of Cpl. Douglas Liggion and LCpl. Narcisco Aleman of the All-Marine Boxing Team here. These fighters will not only twist

the opposition's tongue but rotate an entire head with painful blows.

The two fighters have recently completed a tournament that has allowed them the opportunity to compete in the National tournament next month in Iowa.

Liggion, at 6-feet-2-inches and 195 pounds, fights in the heavyweight class. He competed in four matches to get to the Nationals.

"I always seem to have stiff competition," Liggion says. "In these matches, I

sometimes didn't fight to the best of my ability and that made them harder."

Hard would be the way to describe the way Liggion got into boxing. He got his start competing in 'smokers', or matches in which anyone with arms and a will to fight may enter a ring and get beat up.

"When I was in school, I played football and ran track," Liggion says. "While stationed at Cherry Point, I fought in 11 smokers and won all but three over a period of a year and a half."

Liggion was successful in making the All-Marine team and has been training here nine months.

The other half of the nationals duo Aleman who, at 5-feet-10-inches and 110 pounds, fights in the light welterweight class.

Aleman competed in five matches to get to the nationals. He says the upcoming competition is a big step for the fighter. "If we win the nationals, then we get to compete against fighters from different countries on the international level," Aleman said. "All our fights are like stepping stones to a higher level of competition."

Like Liggion, Aleman also got his start in boxing by fighting in smokers. "I've always been known as a brawler," Aleman said. "So, I figured that I could handle the punches."

Aleman was a mortorman at Camp Pendleton. He was by the All-Marine team while fighting in an Amateur Boxing Federation tournament. He was recruited to Camp Lejeune where he has been on the team for more than a year and a half.

Both fighters aspire to be Olympic contenders and maybe to go on to the professional level. They agree they are in the best position to get to that level.

"We see some of our best competition and take our worst beatings here in the gym," Liggion said.

Aleman added, "Here we know each other's strengths and weaknesses. So, when we get out and compete it's a lot less difficult."

Dynamic duo still determined to dominate?

"We're in it to win it," says Liggion.

many people are there, they'll probably keep about 10 or 12 for the team after they make the cuts."

The selected squad will participate in the Armed Forces Championship, May 12-17, at Peterson Air Force Base in Colorado. Players who distinguish themselves there will be eligible for competition in the United States Volleyball Association Nationals, held May 23-31, in Kansas City, Mo.

Lanning said that her invitation to the All-Marine camp came as a result of her submission of an athletic summary, a sort of sports resume, which asked for documented proof of any sports-related activity.

"I sent all my newspaper articles from when I first started playing, on up, so my package ended up being about that thick," she said, holding a near-inch of space between her thumb and index finger.

"They told me that it was the best pack they saw," she said.

Lanning started out riding horses as a youngster in Mt. Vernon, Ohio, but said she switched to volleyball because she was attracted to the intense pace of the game.

"It's pretty fast moving sometimes," she said. "I like the action."

She played her new-found sport all through middle school and high school, but was never chosen for district or state squads. She said the opportunity to be observed didn't really exist.

"We had a really good team at my high school," she stated, "but no one from my team got picked. We lived in a very small town, so we didn't get a lot of attention. We got passed over."

Like so many others, Lanning joined the Marines straight out of high school, and her reasons why would make a recruiter drool.

"I wanted to be different," she explained. "I didn't want to go to college; I wanted to travel, and everyone said that the Marines were hard. I don't like

doing the same thing that everyone else is doing."

Upon completing basic training, Lanning was trained as a motor transport driver, but when she reported to HqSpt. Bn., she was placed in the S-4 shop. It was discovered that she had good typing skills.

She continues to pursue her love of volleyball, playing in Camp Lejeune's intramural leagues, where she gets plenty of action.

"I love to play the back row because I get to dive for the ball, which is a lot of fun," she said.

The idea of throwing oneself through the air to keep a ball from hitting the same hardwood floor they would bounce off of might give one pause, but not Lanning.

She said the psychological effect of a good "dig" is well worth the effort.

"It's a rush when I sacrifice my body to get the ball back up," she said. "It makes me feel good, especially when we (FSSG 'W') play against the men's teams in the league, because we give up a little when it comes to jumping and spiking.

"They hit the ball really hard," she added, "and if I can get under one that they thought was a sure winner, it gives the team a high."

Lanning says she would like to play at the highest level of competition she can, even the Olympic Games, if possible.

"That's a dream of mine," she said. "I would love to be able to do that. If I do well and concentrate, I can do it, and submitting my package was a good start."

Lanning gives a great deal of credit for her package to LCpl. Sergio Reyes, All-Marine and Armed Forces boxing champion.

"He helped me put my package together," she said. "He told me to include every sport, from the time I started to play, not just volleyball. He sat me down and went through all my articles with me; a great help."

When her enlistment is completed, Lanning wants to go to college and study psychology or photography, but says her choice depends upon a good volleyball program.

"I really want to keep playing," she said, "no matter what. It might take some sacrifice, but I'll do it."
