National Hispanic Heritage Week

Celebrating a part of America's excellence

The Marine Corps has people within its ranks from all over the country as well as the world. These people come from a wide range of backgrounds and heritages. One of the largest ethnic groups in the Marine Corps, and the Armed Forces, is the Hispanic group.

THE WEEK OF Sept. 9-16 will be recognized as "National Hispanic Heritage Week", and the theme for this year is "Hispanics — A Part of America's Excellence." Indeed, Americans of Hispanic descent have made innumerable contributions to America's culture including art and science.

In eight years the United States will celebrate the 500th anniversary of Christopher Columbus' 1492 landing, and the beginning of Spanish influence in North and South America.

Hispanic culture has influenced the United States for several centuries. Some of the lands now part of the United States used to belong to Spain and Mexico. A large chunk of land in the American southwest was once owned by Mexico. This land includes California, Arizona, New Mexico, Texas, and Nevada. Florida, Puerto Rico and Guam all used to be part of Spain. In all these places, Spanish culture was introduced.

HUNDREDS OF PLACES in the Southwest have Spanish names, including Los Angeles and San Diego. The American cowboy inherited his trade, horse, outfit, language and methods from early Spaniards.

With the large number of Puerto Ricans and Cubans, another Spanish-speaking people who ar-

rived in this country since World War II, are now the third largest ethnic group in the United States.

Hispanics have given much to America and one segment has given service to this country the military. Many have given their lives in service of this country.

SIX HISPANIC MARINES were awarded the medal of Honor posthumously in Korea and World War II. Lance Corporal A. DeLaGarza Jr., and Jose F. Jimenez were killed in Vietnam. First Lieutenant Baldomero L. Garcia and Private First Class Fernando L. Garcia were killed in Korea, and Private First Class Harold Gonsalves was awarded his Medal of Honor for service in World War II.

It's time to buckle down on buckling up

This common occurrence is the number one child killer. Nothing is more likely to kill your baby.

EVERY YEAR THOUSANDS of children die in auto accidents and tens of thousands are injured. An unrestrained child in an auto crash is helpless.

Staff Pediatrician at the Naval Hospital, Commander Suzanne Stelmach, related an incident involving a young auto passenger. "A two-week-old girl was in a car wreck and she broke both of her thigh bones. She wasn't in a car seat," said Cmdr. Stelmach. "Can you imagine a two week old girl in traction?" Compared to adults, children have softer bones, weaker neck muscles and more fragile bodies. In a sudden stop or swerve, an unrestrained child will be thrown with great force.

The commander explained a child traveling unrestrained in a vehicle is a simple case of neglect on the parent's part. In North Carolina, all children under four years old are required to be secured in a proper child restraint while traveling in a car. Aboard Camp Lejeune, the law is the same for all children under two years old.

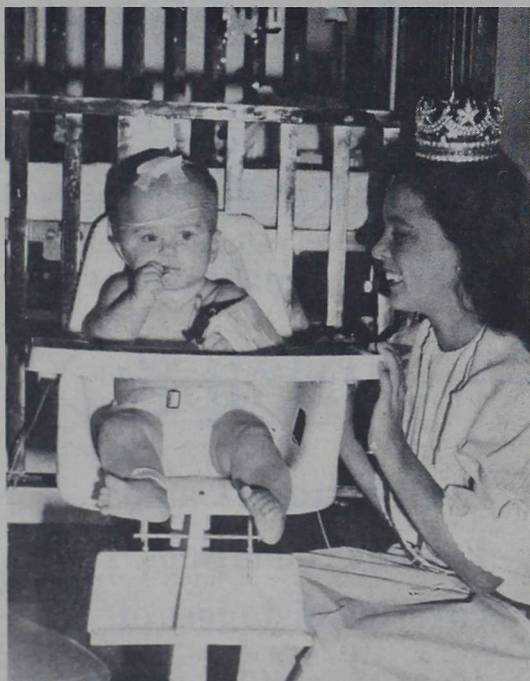
"WE ADVISE PARENTS during prenatal classes to purchase child restraints for their newborns. We also ask the parents if they have one when they leave the hospital with their child for the first time," said the commander. "It's the most important thing a parent can do."

With the availability of child restraint devices at Camp Lejeune, every parent has the opportunity to secure their young one. The Marine Corps Exchange has child restraints which sell for \$16 to \$65. The family services center also offers them to

parents for a no-charge period of 30 days if the parent ample time to purchase one.

Gunnery Sergeant Albert Russell, Family Services Center, said, "All of our child restraints are 'top-of-the-line' and meet Federal Safety Standards. We presently have 20 available, but ordering more." The gunny said parents interested should drop by Family Services Center, 451-1362.

CHILDREN ARE EASILY protected from sickness and disease by vaccinations and other medicines. But, the number one child killer is not disease. The most common cause of death for children is not disease. The most important thing you can do for your children could be to buckle-up your children could be to make sure you insure their futures. Cmdr. Stelmach said, "Many parents still don't buckle-up their children because they think they can handle it. When they take their child home in a hospital, they think twice."

Selective dumping

More than 1,800 tons of cardboard are collected annually at Camp Lejeune. Forty green dumpsters and eight compactors located throughout the base have been set up to help people put cardboard to a good and profitable use.

However, a problem has arisen aboard base concerning cardboard trash deposits. Some people, according to Fred Cone, assistant base maintenance officer, are using dumpsters marked "For Cardboard Use Only" to deposit other forms of trash such as foodstuffs and discarded items.

The cardboard is hauled and sold by a private, nonprofit rehabilitative facility in town. That facility provides vocational evaluation and work-adjustment training along with job opportunities for handicapped adults in Onslow County. When other forms of trash are found in the cache, this facility must pay to have that trash removed, and according to Cone, that can be costly.

News about rabies

Rapid awareness helps take bite out of rabies

you think you've heard everything you care about rabies. How much do you really

THE FACT that the medical community still views the disease to be 100 percent fatal no phases you, then you might be pleasantly surprised that the rabies treatment no longer uses the old 21-syringe salute. Instead, the treatment requires only five shots which are administered in the victim's arm instead of being injected into the stomach wall as practiced in the past. Because of the alarmingly high fatality rate, it is important to understand what rabies is and how it is transmitted. According to Dr. John I. Freeman, North Carolina's Public Health Veterinarian, rabies is a progressive viral disease that is transmitted between animals and man. The disease attacks brain cells, the end result being death."

Dr. Freeman, a veterinarian with the Federal State Veterinarian's Office, said that rabies localizes in the brain. He also said that the central nervous system is eventually affected.

THE TELL TALE signs of rabies include, circling, an inability to maintain posture and other behavioral changes for a given animal. Also, affected animals often suffer from inflammation of the throat, which will cause them to drool. They will become skinny and emaciated because they can not consume food or they could cause them to become either more

vicious or reserved than usual.

To give an example of behavior changes, Dr. Freeman described a fox wandering up to a person in the middle of the day. "First off, foxes are typically shy, timid animals and not likely to befriend man. Secondly, foxes are nocturnal creatures and not likely to be seen wandering around in daylight."

Man is most likely to be exposed to rabies by a domesticated animal, according to the two vets. In fact, according to Capt. MacIntire, "The last two years have produced an increase in the incidents of rabies in cats. This is the first time cats have outnumbered dogs in the area of rabies." Capt. MacIntire attributes the increase to the expansion of the "kitty" population. Livestock have also produced instances of rabies lately.

CONTRARY TO COMMON belief, Capt. MacIntire explained that the incidents of rabies in rodents such as rats, rabbits and squirrels is not as high as people would believe. Capt. MacIntire relayed only one instance of rabies in a rat. "In fact, when people are bitten by a rodent we don't usually push for the treatment because it is so unusual in rodents besides bats, or foxes, raccoons and skunks. A person who gets bitten by a squirrel for instance, doesn't have too much to worry about. Although infection can also be dangerous.

"Animal bites get infected easily because there is a lot of bacteria in the mouths of animals. Bacteria thrives in areas that lack oxygen. Animal bites often result in a puncture wound which is highly susceptible to infection.

According to Dr. Freeman, "It is safe to assume that anything with feathers, scales or a fin would not likely be involved in the transmission rabies."

BECAUSE OF THE increase of rabies in cats, North Carolina has revised its laws so that cats 16-weeks-old have to be immunized by a vaccine which is good for one year. After a year, both dogs and cats receive a vaccine good for three years. Capt. MacIntire warned that some state laws vary, so a pet owner should see if their animals' shots are acceptable upon relocation. Immunizing pets reduces exposure to humans of rabies, but according to Dr. Freeman, it is not possible to introduce an immunization into the wildlife community.

If a person is bitten by an animal, the first step is to try to recover the animal for investigation. If the animal is found and has its shots, the animal is quarantined at its home for 10 days to see if it shows any symptoms. If the animal is a stray or its shots are not up to date, the animal is quarantined at an animal hospital. In both cases, the animal should be examined by a vet before and after the quarantine period.

To avoid exposure to rabies, stay away from dead animals and avoid contact with stray animals as well as wild animals, no matter how tame they seem to be.

BOTH DOCTORS STRESSED, however, that every responsible pet owner should keep their animal's shots up to date. No bite should be ignored because, "It will be alright, it's only a scratch." Scratches can get infected as easily as a puncture.

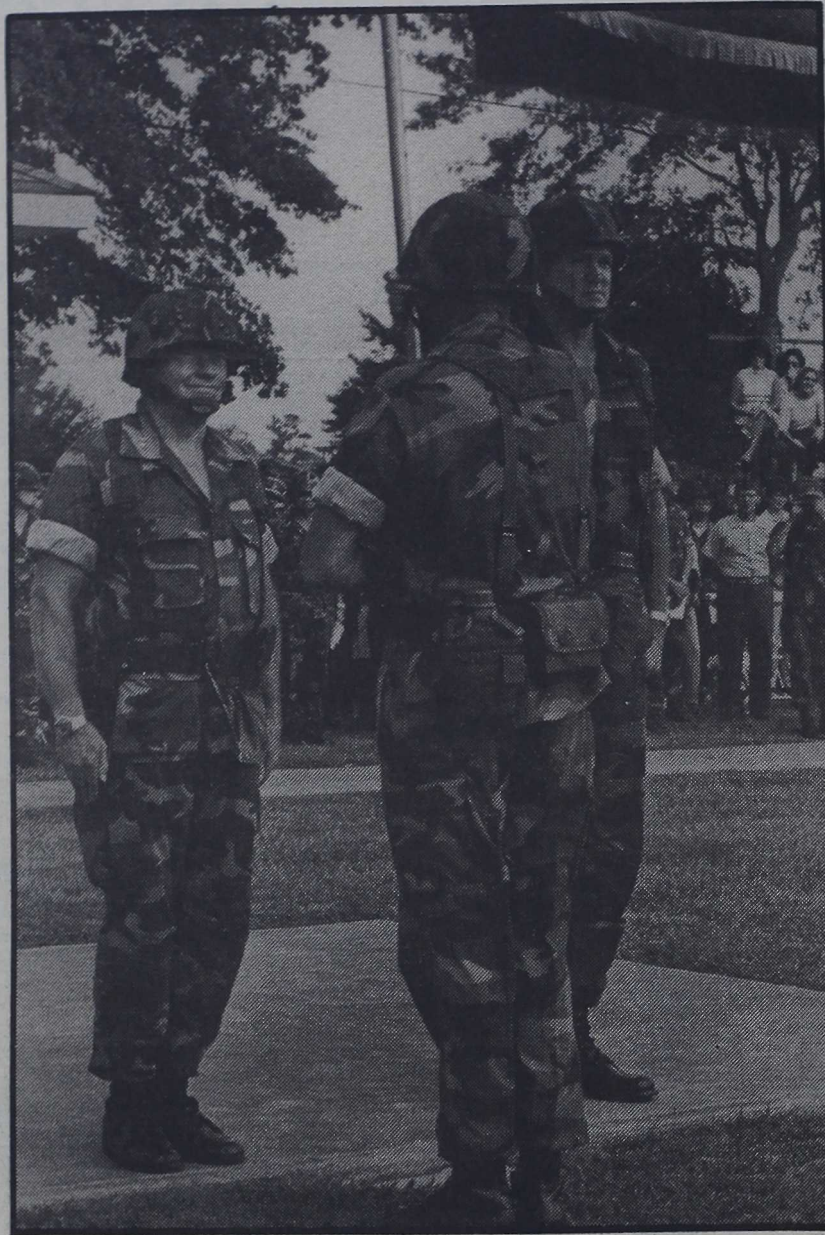

'I thank God I'm a Marine'

Commandant praises
today's Marines during
change of command/
retirement ceremony

Command of the Fleet Marine Force, Atlantic/II Marine Amphibious Force and the 2d Marine Division changed Aug. 29, during ceremony at W.P.T. Hill Field.

DURING THE CEREMONY, Lieutenant General Alfred M. Gray Jr., was promoted to his present rank and relinquished command of the 2d Marine Division to Major General Dennis J. Murphy. Following that, Lieutenant General John H. Miller relinquished command of FMFlant/II Marine Amphibious Force to LtGen. Gray. LtGen. Miller was then promoted to Major General P. X. Kelley, commandant of the 1st Marine Corps, who also presented LtGen. Miller the Distinguished Service Medal.

All of the generals praised the Marine Corps and FMFlant as they spoke.

"To the Marines and Sailors of the Corps, you've done it all and you've done it well," said LtGen. Gray. "You're a credit to your country and a credit to everything that makes our nation great. Always do what must be done. Take care of yourselves, take care of each other and God bless you."

MORE THAN 4,000 Marines and Sailors, as well as 2,000 dignitaries and spectators were present at the ceremony. The combined 2d Marine Division and 2d Marine Aircraft Wing Band performed during the ceremony and a large vehicle, artillery and helicopter display stood behind the formation of Marines.

General Kelley wished both MGen. Murphy and LtGen. Gray luck in their new assignments.

"To the magnificent Marines and Sailors of the Fleet Marine Force, Atlantic," he said. "As I look at you there and see you, I see the mass battle colors of our Corps, I thank God that I'm a Marine, thank God that I'm one of the four million Americans in the history of the republic, who have been honored enough to wear the eagle, globe and anchor. You represent all that is good in our Corps — I salute you."

HE ALSO GAVE a special salute to LtGen. Miller who ended an active duty career of more than 38 years.

"To my good friend LtGen. John Miller, commandant said, "you epitomize what the Marine Corps is sought after by all, that is the respect and total leader."

As the formation of Marines marched past the reviewing stand, LtGen. Miller served as the reviewing officer, and Generals Kelley, Gray and Murphy stood behind him.

THE CEREMONY CHANGED the leadership of the Marine Corps' major operational command on the East Coast and retired a Marine who faithfully served the Marine Corps during two wars.

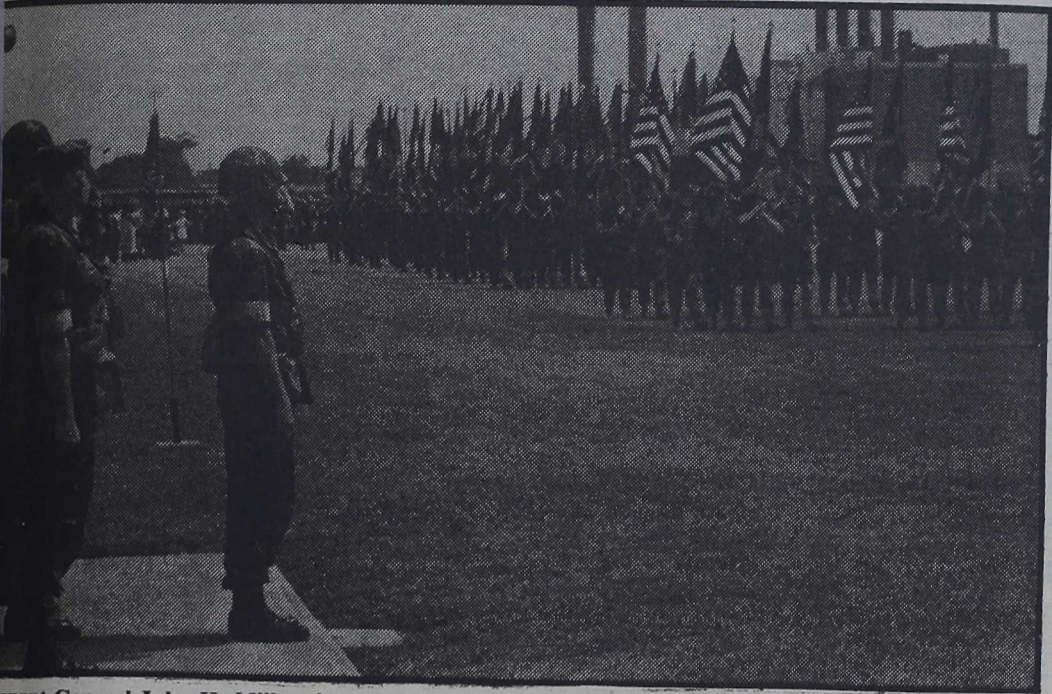

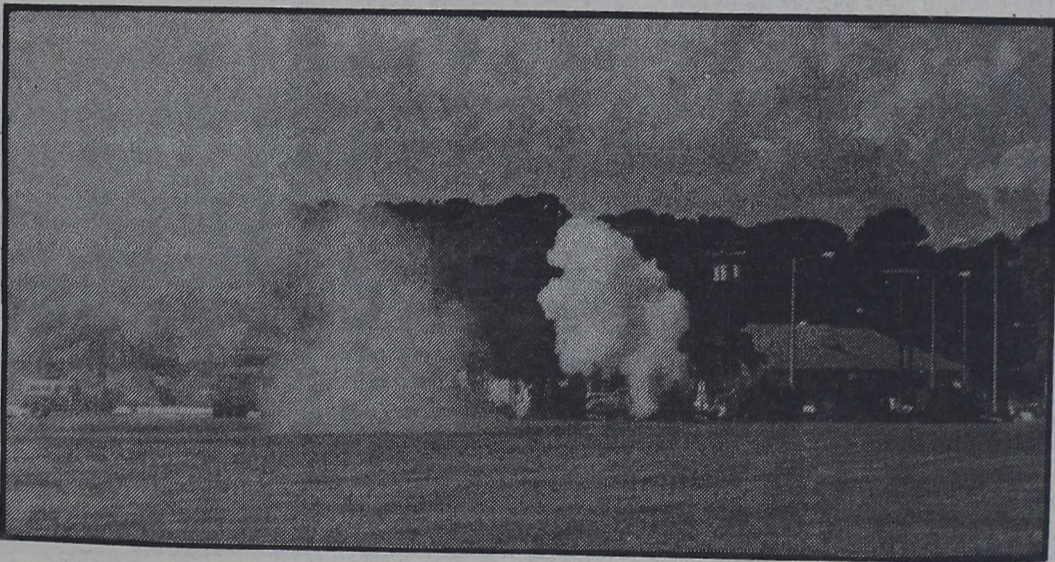

Behind the scenes

Hard work pays off in successful ceremony

Last week it was hard to overlook the 4,000 Marines and Sailors who formed the combined change of command/retirement parade, displaying the pride, work and dedication of Marines throughout the Fleet Marine Force, Atlantic.

BY THE TIME the troops form for a parade, the hours of labor near their fruitful end. The focal point of a parade is normally a change of command or retiring officer. But despite their numbers, the Marines who form the parade are generally "overlooked."

Those Marines and Sailors were drawn from the 2d Marine Division; 2d Force Service Support Group; 2d Marine Aircraft Wing; 6th Marine Amphibious Brigade; 4th Marine Amphibious Brigade and Headquarters and Service Battalion, Fleet Marine Force, Atlantic.

Foul and fair-weather parade rehearsals preceded the fielding of the massive formation on parade day. The assistant chiefs of staff for operations and training for the 2dMarDiv. coordinated all of the activities.

MOVING VEHICLES, HELICOPTERS and artillery pieces to the parade grounds was a huge task. Hundreds of Marines were required to shuttle 184 pieces of equipment to W.P.T. Hill Field two days before the parade. Ambulances, TOW Jeeps, Cobra helicopters, tanks, M-198 howitzers, tractor trailers and a myriad of other pieces of equipment were displayed on the field.

To move all of those vehicles and equipment pieces, Marines from the 2d Combat Engineer Battalion, 2d Maintenance Battalion, 2d Landing Support Battalion, 2d Tank Battalion, 2d Assault Amphibian Battalion, 2d Medical Battalion, 8th Motor Transport Battalion, 8th Engineer Support Battalion, 10th Marine Regiment, Marine helicopter squadrons, Marine Light Helicopter Squadron 167, Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron 365 and Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron 464, as well as Marines from Headquarters and Service Battalion, 2d FSSG all lent a hand.

There were seven American flags and 87 organizational colors bore by more than 90 color guards. The flags painted the field with bright reds, whites, blues and golds. As they passed in review, the multicolored battle streamers, representing all of the service awards each unit has earned, further brightened an already colorful day.

AS WITH ANY long, hot parade, there were Marines who succumbed to the burning sun. To

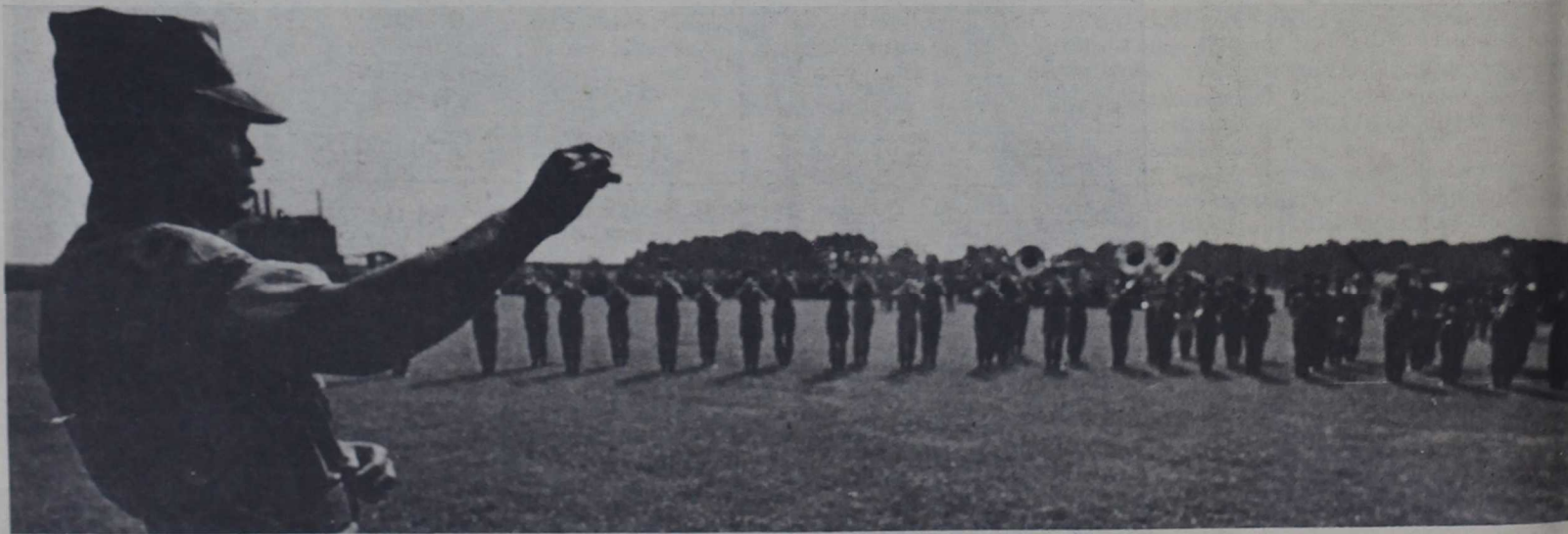

long before the ceremonies began. The band fulfilled a three-fold mission during parades by entertaining, setting cadence and providing ceremonial music.

22d MAU

22d MAU relieves 24th

USS INCHON (Delayed)—Since embarking at Morehead City, N.C., July 26, the 22d Marine Amphibious Unit spent two weeks adjusting to board living. Rigorous occupational and physical training were included in their daily agenda crossing the Atlantic.

As part of the 2d Fleet, the 22d MAU arrived at Naval Air Station Rota, Spain, Aug. 6 for relaxation and as relief for the 24th Marine Amphibious Unit.

"At Rota the 22d and 24th MAUs had a formal turnover," said First Lieutenant Tin Lewis, 22d MAU adjutant and unit information officer. "We conducted meetings with our counterparts of the 24th MAU to discuss things that are of interest to us and the details of the 24th MAU deployment."

HELICOPTERS FROM BOTH task forces reported the operation with cross-deck flights designed to speed the transfer of Marines, Sailors and their equipment from one vessel to another. "These are ammunition, equipment and certain contingency packages that will not leave the Mediterranean. These things are transferred over to the incoming MAU," 1stLt. Lewis said.

The turnover took approximately two days when the complete 24th MAU became part of the 2d Fleet and remained at Rota a few more days for a washdown. "All the ship's equipment must be washed and inspected before returning to the United States," the lieutenant said.

Meanwhile, the 22d MAU, now formally part of the 6th Fleet, steamed to Malaga, Spain for a few days of liberty. They are scheduled to proceed to their normal deployment conducting training exercises with our allies and remain ready to fulfill all requirements in the Mediterranean.

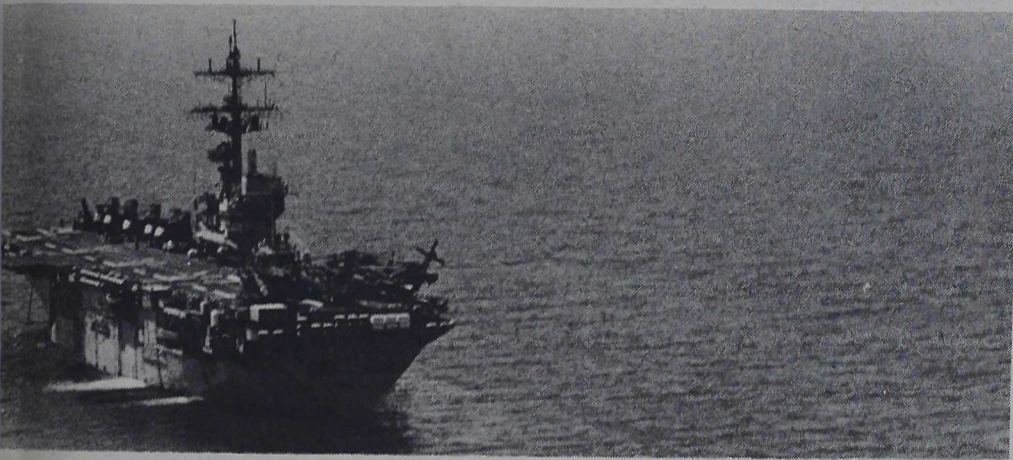

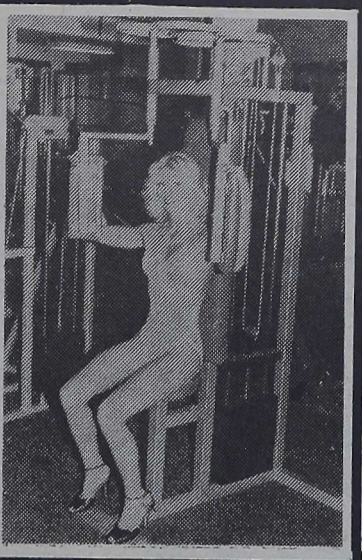

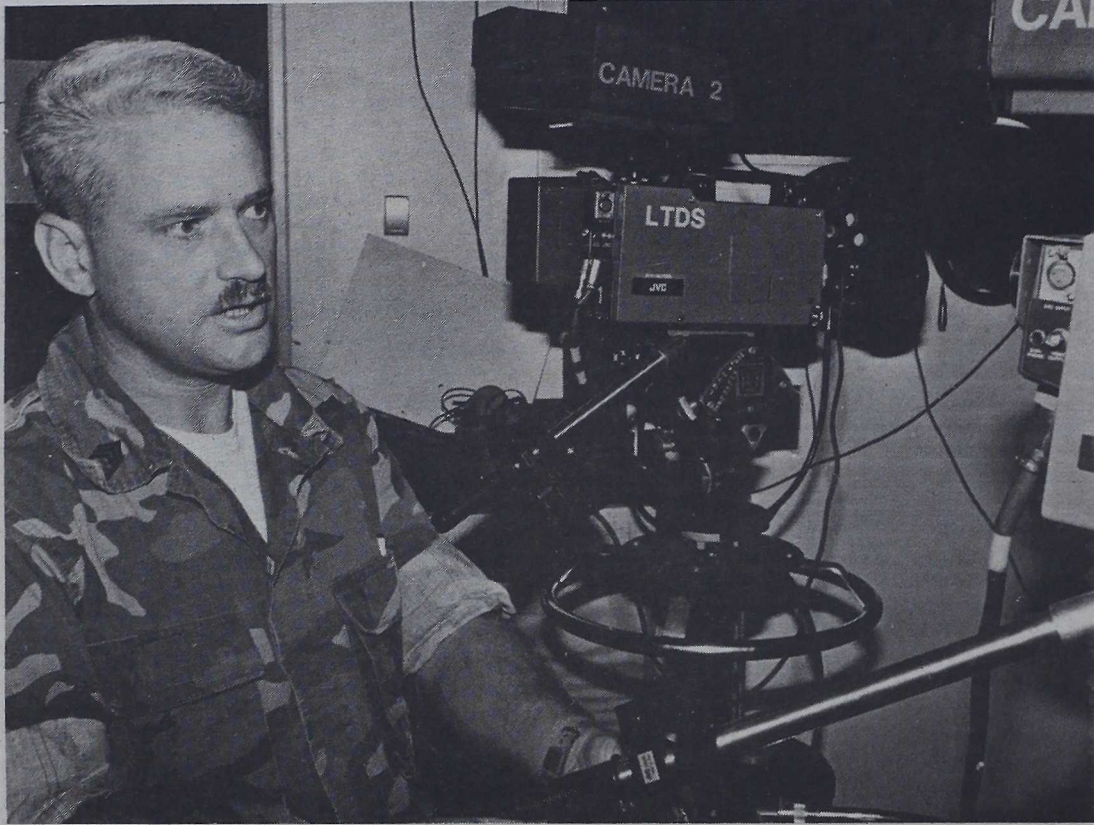

Ready, aim, shoot? His aim is steady with bow, arrow and camera

The snow is too deep and the hunter's feet wet and cold. The moment he's ready to turn back and give up, he spots a silhouetted figure against winter hillside. Shivering, the hunter pulls his bow string taut, sights, releases. A cedar shaft pierces the forest silence.

NOT FROM A movie script or a passage from Zane Grey novel, this is actually an account of Master Sergeant Joe Gallo deer hunt.

Vietnam is where "Top" Gallo began his service in the Marines, as a grunt. After a three-year tour there, he worked in public relations in Buffalo, N.Y. "Independent duty was a whole new world," said the top, "I didn't know that anything, besides the grunts, existed in the Marines."

These days, MSgt. Gallo is the Instructional Television chief for Camp Lejeune. *Camp Lejeune This Week*, which appears on the base cable system, is a product of his crews' work. Top's jobs include directing the studio crews and motion picture camera work.

BUT WHAT DOES this have to do with hunting and the great outdoors? The top is an avid lover of the outdoors and the preservation of wildlife, not to mention his pursuit of motion pictures. And not surprisingly, he has applied Marine ingenuity to meld his pastimes and job.

The blue-eyed Marine is presently producing two video tapes which are targeted to inform the Camp Lejeune populace, and possibly others, about two animals that are having a tough time surviving in our developing world.

The first deals with Loggerhead Sea Turtles, which make their nests on areas of Onslow Bay

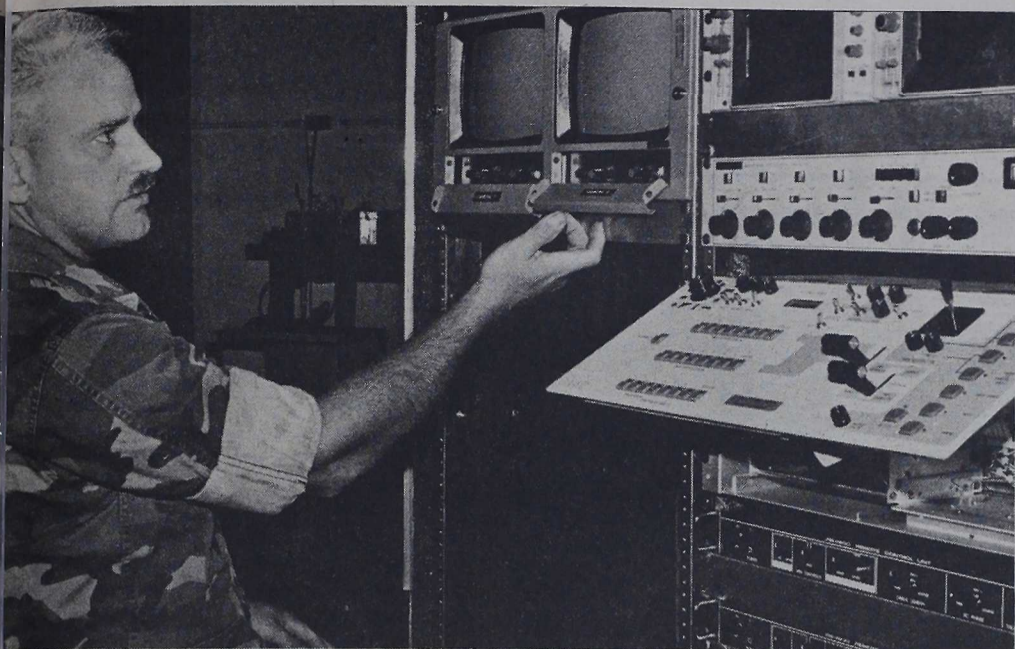

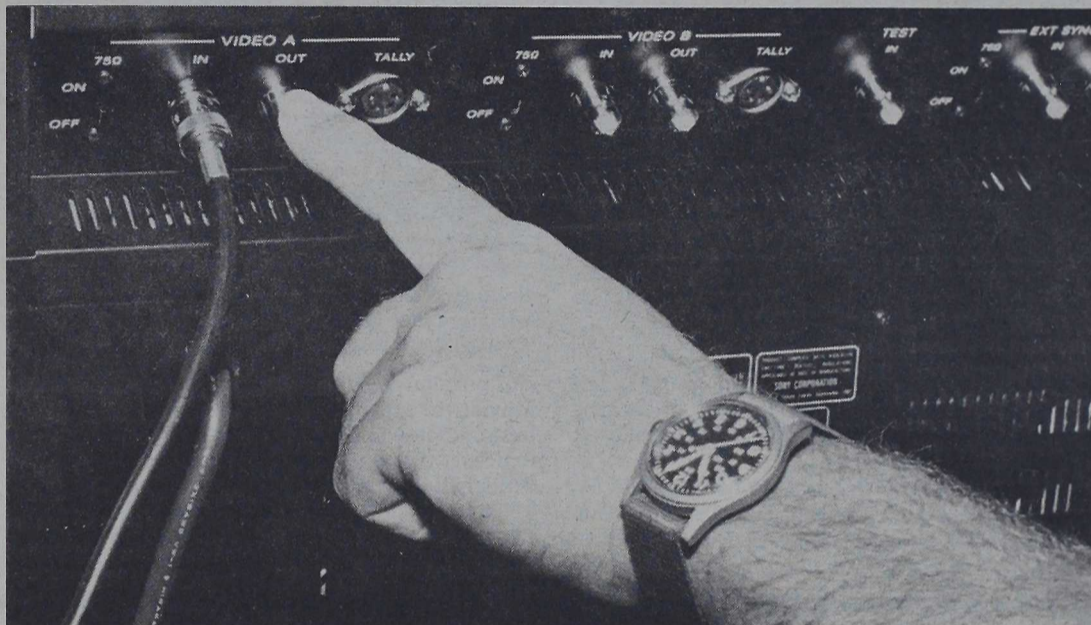

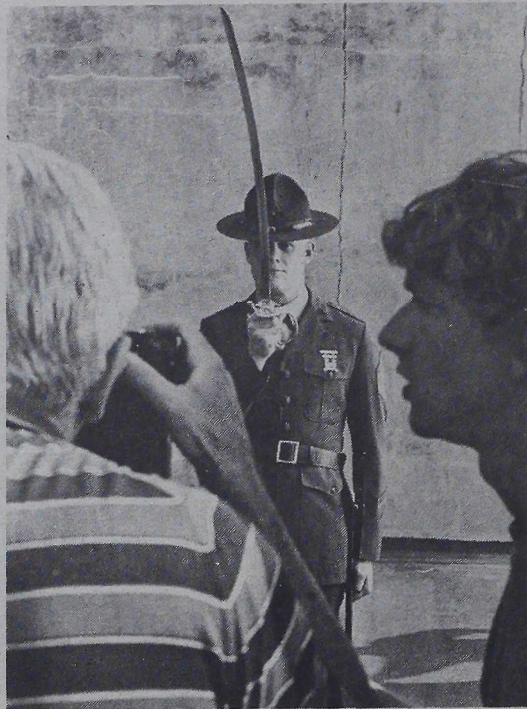
Camp Lejeune Marines pose for recruiting posters

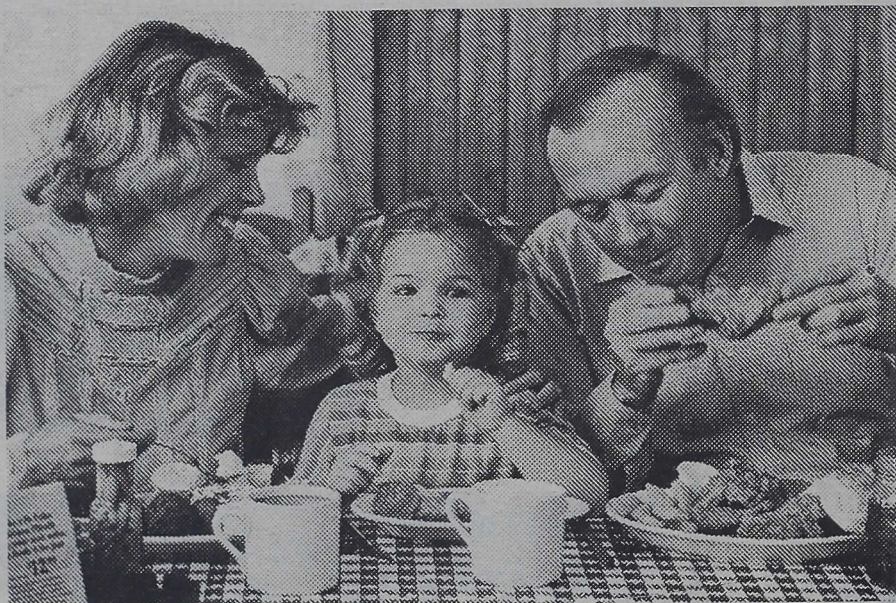

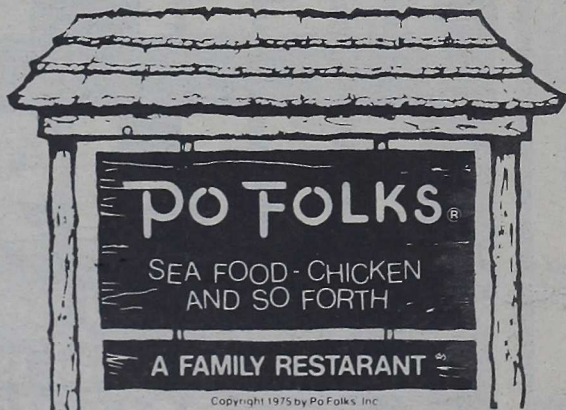

Most vacationers have already had their usual two weeks of fun in for the year. Except for the hunters, the start of school and all weather has brought a halt to vacation plans. But, don't put tent and sleeping bag into storage

GRANDFATHER MOUNTAIN, Linville, N.C., is one of North Carolina's most spectacular scenic spots. The panoramic view stretches across hundreds of miles of Ridge Mountain ridge-tops, and passes four states. The

5,964-foot mountain is the highest in the Blue Ridge range. It was first called "The Great Evergreen Grandfather" by pioneers, who noted that nature had carved the north slope into the likeness of an old man looking skyward.

Grandfather's Mountain is open daily, April 1 to Nov. 15 and winter weekends and holidays if weather permits.

From 1 a.m. to dusk, tourists can stroll from the Visitors Center to Linville Peak by way of the Mile High Swinging Bridge, a 218-foot suspension foot bridge.

WHILE LINVILLE PEAK offers a thrilling view, it is also one of the

launch sites for hang gliding flights. From May to October, four times daily, the Mountain's expert hang gliding team soars.

Grandfather's Mountain has five environmental habitats where visitors can see and photograph animals in their natural surroundings.

Mildred the Bear and Cub Habitats, are a traditional family favorite for photos.

THE OPEN AIR Eagle Habitat contains bald and golden eagles which are wounded and cannot fly. They were brought to the mountain as part of an Audubon propagation program.

Powerful mountain lions can be

seen in the Cougar Habitat. The fifth habitat of white tailed deer is the most graceful and pastoral.

More than 25 miles of expertly-maintained hiking trails, offer a challenge to the novice and expert alike.

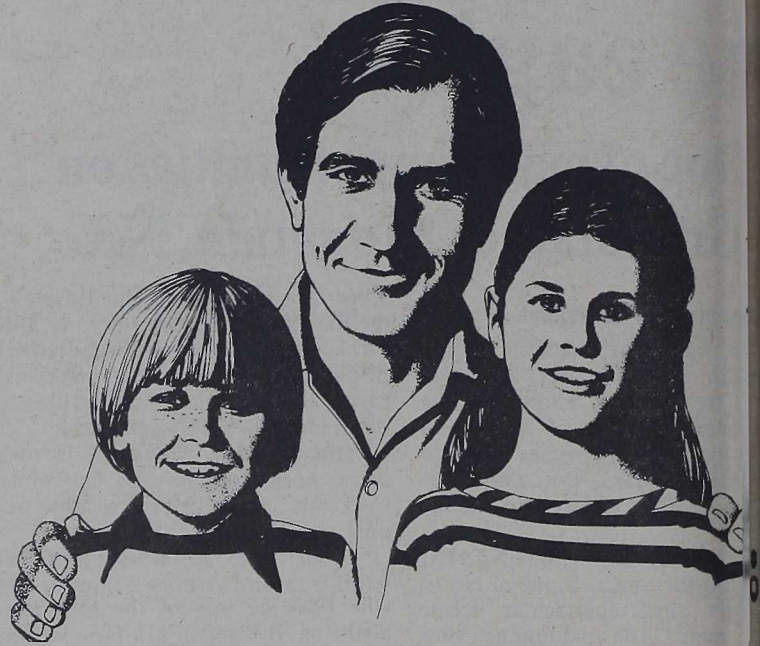

Call it a communication gap, gender gap, or any one of a number of neat sounding names — when it strikes, it can be fatal to family relationships, friendships and lifetime objectives.

IN FAMILIES IT often winds up being categorized as a power struggle, with all the emphasis placed on a win or lose situation. More often, both lose.

Creative conflict resolution, which is another name for mediation, is based primarily on assumptions of equality, fairness and personal responsibility. Resolving family conflicts while maintaining and preserving the dignity of all family members is the ultimate goal.

Many families in Onslow County have found the supportive service and guidance of a professional mediator beneficial in remedying minor delinquencies and disputes when their inability to communicate has reached the point of crisis.

JAMES C. BROWN, director/coordinator of Onslow County Youth Services, said, "Mediation is one of the most effective ways in which conflicting individuals can resolve their own crisis.

"Through active participation and the assistance of a trained mediator, conflicting parties arrive at their own solution," he said. "The mediator's position of neutrality allows him to guide the parties through the conciliatory and resolution processes needed to resolve their crisis."

Onslow's mediation program provides an informal forum to receive juvenile referrals from the court, police, schools and other youth-serving agencies. Walk-ins and parental referrals are also accepted.

FAMILY PARTICIPATION IS encouraged in efforts to find a consensual and practical resolution to their

problems. Perhaps more important, the program encourages children to learn to relate more positively to adults.

The mediation program is part of the American Arbitration Association's "Arbitration As An Alternative to the Court's" program, also known as 4-A, which was started in Philadelphia in 1968 by the Ford Foundation. The 4-A program was begun as a result of a petition in 1968 by the Ford Foundation to the American Arbitration Association to take the skills that have been valuable in the resolution of conflict in other areas — labor, management, insurance, construction, etc. — and transfer them over to the community aspect of our existence.

The funding for Onslow County's program comes directly from a grant by the North Carolina Department of Crime Control and Public Safety. Mediation is used both in conjunction with crisis counseling and separate means to settle non-criminal disputes economically. There are 17 trained volunteers who act as mediators under the guidance of a counselor-patrol officer. The volunteers were trained by the American Arbitration Association.

RESULTS OF FOLLOW-UP studies of Onslow's mediation program have been very positive. Most reported positive results from the program and felt that mediation had solved their problems. A large percentage of adults and youth felt that communication had improved since the mediation between parent and child. The program has proven valuable for opening avenues of communication in the home and improving their ability to resolve future conflicts among themselves.

Hitchhiking

Thumbs down on thumbs out

After several attempts the weary hitchhiker finally flags down a ride. Suddenly, he tosses his bag behind the car and climbs in.

SEVERAL HOURS LATER, he is in a daze and remembers being brutally assaulted and robbed. If he is the less fortunate, he may find himself in an obituary column.

Local police officers and state troopers credit hitchhiking as a contributing factor in the occurrence of several run accidents, assaults and robberies.

Sometimes it's the hitchhiker who is robbed or the driver who is forced to drive to a remote destination where the hitchhiker is left for dead and his car is towed.

ANY OF THESE victims are serious, far from home, and unaccustomed to dealing with those who prey upon the unsuspecting or

at the beginning of the year, there have been no traffic accidents or substantiated robberies/assaults related to hitchhiking aboard the base. Staff Sergeant Eddie McGruff of the Base Provost Marshal's Prevention/Physical Security

unit does not mean, however, that hitchhiking on base. Base Order 100 clearly prohibits hitchhiking and violators are subject to disciplinary action by their commanding officers.

WHAT MANY MARINES and Sailors don't realize is that hitchhiking, whether in uniform or in civilian attire, is punishable under Article 92

of the Uniform Code of Military Justice," SSgt. Burch stressed.

According to the base order, hitchhiking is defined as the attempt to obtain transportation, except with licensed vehicles for hire, through gestures, begging or invitation.

"The best advice I can give people is don't hitchhike on base. It has become an increasing problem and violators will start receiving a minor offense report when they are apprehended," the staff sergeant explained.

"THERE ARE ALTERNATE methods of travel available if you don't have a car. There are bus stops and Marines and Sailors may call the Base Taxi, at no cost, for rides on base. (The Base Taxi may be reached at 451-1639).

"If there is an emergency situation, a phone call should be made to the desk sergeant or an MP vehicle should be flagged down. Just don't hitchhike," he added.

In Jacksonville, a conscientious public strives to prevent tragedies. Car pool information is available to anyone calling 455-7353.

THE BUS STATION has buses scheduled to and from the base which run all day and all night. The bus fare is less than \$2.

If there is no alternative to walking or hitchhiking, officers advise that you not turn your back on traffic and keep well away from the highway.

Avoid walking late at night, or walking alone anytime. Be alert to the hazards of hitchhiking and seek other alternatives as though your life depended upon it — it does.

finished the 16.8 mile course in under 40 minutes, and within an hour, everyone had crossed the finish line. Geiger, after catching his breath following the race, attributed his success to a few things. "After the first circle I kept a good pace," he said. "We had a few sacrificial riders — those who went out fast and couldn't keep that pace up and tired

themselves. My friends and I tried to stay behind them. We did our share of sitting in, to have other people break the wind."

Geiger has been riding competitively for quite a while. He and a group of other cyclists race around the area and up at Cherry Point, N.C. "Every Saturday at 9 a.m. at Verona Loop," Geiger said, "we have bicycle sprints."

His only criticism of the course in which he rode a 21-1/2 pound bicycle was that the finish line was too narrow. "We were finishing about the same time some little kids were finishing," Geiger said. "And that path was simply too narrow. It was a little dangerous."

Geiger said he might also be forming a cyclist club later on this fall.

Tarheel multi-faceted autumn hunting season commences

That time of year all hunters are itching for is finally arriving. The first portion of the 1984-85 hunting season kicked-off Sept. 1 with the opening of dove season.

FIRST REPORTS FROM the field have indicated that hunters are having better luck hunting inland.

Bow hunters get the first chance at the local deer herd, when the season opens Sept. 10. Remember, bows must have a minimum pull of 45 pounds; and non-poisonous, nonbarbed, nonexplosive arrows with minimum broadhead width of seven-eighth of an inch, except blunt type arrows for small game, can be used.

It's still illegal to hunt with a crossbow.

MUZZLE LOADERS ARE next in line for deer. Their season opens Oct. 8 until Oct. 13. Local black powder shooters recommend nothing smaller than .45 caliber should be used.

THE MAIN PORTION of the season opens Oct. 15. The regular deer season opens, along with bear, raccoon, opossum, squirrel, grouse and wild boar. November 17, the rabbit, quail and pheasant seasons kick-off.

According to the North Carolina Inland Fishing, Hunting and Trapping Regulations Digest, the special either-sex deer season begins at Camp Lejeune Oct. 15-Jan 1.

NEW HUNTERS SHOULD know the definition of antlered deer. These are deer where visible antlers are defined as a bony structure that protrudes through the skin. Knobs or buttons covered by skin or velvet are not considered as visible antlers.

Always remember, safety comes first when in the field.

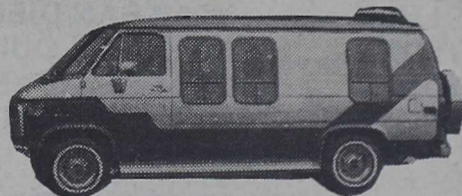

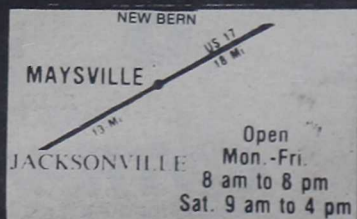

Former Marine gridiron stars excel in professional ranks

The Marine Corps has had some glorious gridiron history, including successful football teams such as the All-Marine football team stationed at Quantico, Va. This team played many of the nation's best collegiate squads from the early 1920s until 1972 when the team was disbanded.

ADDITIONALLY, HUNDREDS OF Marines turned to the professional ranks either after completing a tour with the Marine Corps, or during a war such as World War II or the Korean Conflict.

Joe Arenas who played for the San Francisco 49'ers from 1951-1957, was ranked seventh in the National Football league in kickoff returns. He returned 139 kickoffs, averaging 27.3 yards per return. His longest return was 96 yards.

Cliff Battles who played for the Boston Redskins in the 1930s, rushed for 3,542 yards in six seasons and gained 215 yards on the ground in one game against the New York Giants in 1937. He served with the Marines during World War II.

CLOYCE E. BOX played for the Detroit Lions in the early 1950s. Once in 1950, he gained 302 yards when the Lions played against the Baltimore Colts. Box served as a Marine at Camp Pendleton in 1945 and again in 1951.

Bob E. Dee, served as a Marine at Quantico in 1955 and 1956 and distinguished himself in the professional ranks when he played 112 consecutive regular-season games as a Boston Patriot from 1960 to 1967. His number, 89, was retired by the Patriots.

Another Detroit Lion, Jim Martin served as a Marine during World War II. His professional football career lasted 14 years and included 126 games as a Lion from 1951-1961. Additionally, he played for the Cleveland Browns in 1950, the Baltimore Colts in 1963 and the Washington Redskins in 1964.

ANOTHER WORLD WAR II Marine veteran, Ernie Nevers scored 40 points against the Chicago Bears in 1929. At that time, Nevers played for the Chicago Cards.

Leo "The Lion" Nomellini, a tackle, who once played for the Cherry Point team in 1944, made the Pro Bowl 10 times during his 14-year career with the San Francisco 49'ers from 1950-1963. He played 174 consecutive regular-season games. Altogether, he played in 206 professional gridiron contests.

Ernie Stautner who played for the Pittsburgh Steelers from 1950-1963 made the Pro Bowl nine times. He served as a Marine during World War II.

THREE MARINES HAVE been inducted into the Helms Pro Hall of Fame: Cliff Battles, Ernie Nevers, and Elroy Hirsch who played for three different Marine teams during World War II.

Three former Marines played in Super Bowl contests. Gary Larsen, once stationed at Marine Corps Air Station, El Toro, Calif., played in three Super Bowls with the Minnesota Vikings in 1970, 1974 and 1975. Howard Kindig, stationed at El Toro in 1961, played for the Miami Dolphins' 17-0-0 team of 1972. Mike Montler, a Marine in

1962-1963 at Marine Corps Recruit Depot San Diego, played for the Denver Broncos in 1967.

Former Marines have led the National Football League in several categories. Arenas led in kickoff returns in 1953, with 16. He averaged 34.4 yards per return.

AL CARMICHAEL, A Marine stationed at Marine Corps Air Station, El Toro, Calif., led in kickoff returns in 1955. He averaged 29.9 yards per return and returned the ball 14 times. Once he returned for 106 yards.

World War II Marine, Don Doll of the Los Angeles Rams led in kickoff returns in 1949. He returned with an average of 25.5 yards per return.

The year before, Joe Scott of the New York Giants captured the kickoff title when he returned 20 balls, averaging 28.5 yards per return. His effort was 99 yards. Scott served at MCAS El Toro in 1945. Cliff Battles of the Boston Redskins led in rushing twice — in 1932 with 576 yards and in 1938 with 874 yards.

The Marine Corps had a couple of top receivers. Elroy Hirsch of the Los Angeles Rams captured the 1951 receivers title with 66 receptions for 1,000 yards and 17 touchdowns. He also led the league in scoring with 102 points. Hirsch was stationed at Camp Lejeune in 1944.

ED BROWN OF the Chicago Bears led the league in passing in 1956 when he completed 96 of 168 passes for 1,667 yards and 11 touchdowns. Brown served as a Marine at Camp Pendleton in 1953. Another QB, Korean War veteran LeBaron of the Washington Redskins led in passing in 1958 when he successfully threw 109 passes for 1,365 yards and 11 touchdowns. The following year, World War II veteran Charley Johnson of the New York Giants led the league in passing when he completed 113 of 194 throws for 1,365 yards.

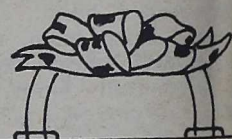

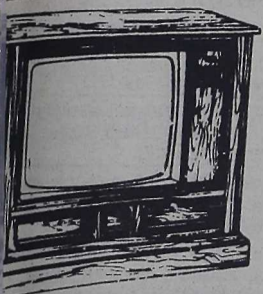

Courts-Martial

GYSGT. RICHARD R. MURRAY, 6th Marines, 2dMarDiv., was convicted by a general court-martial of 13 specifications of unlawfully selling C-rations to Okinawan and Korean nationals, 12 specifications of larceny of C-rations, nine specifications each of making a false signature on and uttering a forged check and unlawfully opening mail matter, eight specifications each of larceny of U.S. currency and U.S. treasury checks, four specifications of assault and battery, three specifications of conspiracy, two specifications each of making false signatures on and uttering forged savings withdrawal forms, one specification each of unlawful disposal of C-rations, larceny of a credit union check and a savings passbook,

possession with the intent to distribute and distribution of marijuana. He was sentenced to confinement for 14 years, forfeiture of all pay, reduction to E1 and a Dishonorable Discharge. Also, an additional fine of \$2,000, if not paid, confinement will extend three more years.

LCPL. JEFFERY B. LOUGHMAN, 2dCEBn., 2dMarDiv., was convicted by a general court-martial of two specifications each of UA, possession of drug paraphernalia, possession and use of marijuana, one specification each of resisting apprehension, wreckless driving, assault and use of cocaine. He was sentenced to confinement for 30 months, forfeiture of all pay and allowances, reduction to E1 and a Bad Conduct Discharge.

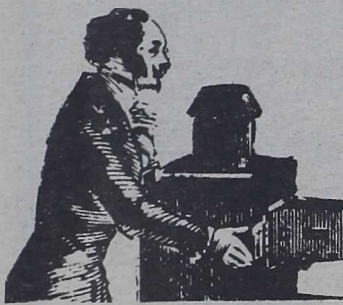
PFC ANDY FALCEY, 2dReconBn., 2dMarDiv., was convicted by a special court-martial of UA. He was sentenced to confine-

ment for two months, forfeiture of \$794, reduction to E1 and a Bad Conduct Discharge.
