Local crime under fire

Major Charles G. Cooper has declared a "war on crime" in the Camp Lejeune-Onslow County Marine Corps Base commanding general's program to reduce on and off base crime among the Military-Civilian Community here Thursday morning.

Cooper's plan calls for a three-pronged attack which affects Marines. His down to Marines taking care of one pointed out MajGen. area crime figures released by the state Attorney General's office indicate a definite "... time and MajGen. Cooper. The war on crime is come to the aid of the individual Marine who is victim to lawbreaking, while weeding the Corps "... criminals masquerading as those service people breaking the law. In concert with criminal activity, officials mean a more combat-ready military

The three-pronged emphasis includes increased cooperative law enforcement closely coordinated with civilian police agencies; creating activities alternative to trouble-causing in changing adverse environments where likely to occur.

as a week's meeting with civic leaders, and news conference Monday morning, Cooper called on the local community -- civilian -- to work together in combatting the problem.

The second phase of the program involves the effort between the base provost marshal's office and the Naval Investigative Service detachment and other authorities. Information and evidence

exchanges are already taking place, helping prepare cases for prosecution by both civilian and military courts.

At present also, two military policemen have been assigned to accompany the Jacksonville police in high crime areas. By employing one civilian and one MP for foot patrols, the capability of the city police to provide service to all areas of Jacksonville is greatly increased.

"Increased surveillance will be used as an active measure to decrease on base legal infractions. Preventive measures will include escorting back to their units those Marines who might be easy prey for criminals. Tours of the base brig for problem-prone Marines will also be used.

Taking an economic bite out of business where crimes often occur, while protecting Marines' best interests, is the job of the Armed Forces Disciplinary Control Board. The board studies evidence regarding businesses to determine if the business actually threatens Marines' well-being. If necessary, the board can recommend an establishment be placed off-limits to all military personnel. The actual off-limits order would be signed by MajGen. Cooper.

The second aspect of the program will involve expansion and creation of wholesome recreational activities at which service people here can spend their time.

Changing environments where crimes breeds is the third part of the campaign. In order to reduce potential for crime where it most likely will occur, studies are underway to determine the best means of transportation available to Marines traveling to and from base.

The wide ranging campaign reflects MajGen. Cooper's fifth principle of his *Band of Brothers* tenets: "It is essential that issues and problems which tend to lessen a unit's effectiveness be addressed and resolved."

That is what the general says the war is all about. The Marines, not used to losing, expect to win this "war on crime."

Band Of Brothers

It was the third time during the Korean War that the First Marine Division had been entirely surrounded by Chinese Communist forces. A Marine lieutenant, 23-years-old, led a platoon of troops toward the Fifth Marines' area of responsibility where they would serve as replacements. To make it to the regimental CP, the Marines had to engage in three firefights.

When they arrived, the regimental commander greeted the reinforcements welcoming them to the "family of the Fifth Marines." The colonel stressed the importance of the Marines taking care of one another, as if they were actually related.

Days later, the young lieutenant was to learn first hand how strong those "family ties" were. After having his backbone shattered during intense combat, the lieutenant's platoon carried him to safety. Three Marines died in the effort to save their leader.

Hospitalized for many months after the incident, the young lieutenant had a lot of time to think about the Marine Corps family. What he thought, he wrote. He refused to accept the diagnosis of doctors who said he would never walk again. After a seemingly endless stay he left the hospital to rejoin his "family." Today he commands Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune. He is Maj Gen. Charles G. Cooper and these are his "Band of Brothers Principles."

-All Marines are entitled to dignity and respect as individuals, but must abide by common standards established by proper authority.

-A Marine should never lie, cheat, or steal from a fellow Marine or fail to come to his aid in time of need.

-All Marines should contribute 100% of their abilities to the unit's mission. Any less effort, by an individual passes the buck to someone else.

-A unit, regardless of size, is a disciplined family structure, with similar relationships based on mutual respect among members.

-It is essential that issues and problems which tend to lessen a unit's effectiveness be addressed and resolved.

-A blending of separate cultures, varying educational levels, and different social backgrounds is possible in an unselfish atmosphere of common goals, aspirations, and mutual understanding.

-Being the best requires common effort, hard work, and teamwork. Nothing worthwhile comes easily.


-Every Marine deserves job satisfaction, equal consideration and recognition of his accomplishments.

-Knowing your fellow Marines well enables you to learn to look at things "through his eyes," as well as your own.

-Issues detracting from the efficiency and sense of well being of an individual should be surfaced and weighed against the impact on the unit as a whole.

-It must be recognized that a brotherhood concept depends on all members "belonging" --- being fully accepted by others within.

Sun rays may cook your goose

Fun in the sun is fine, but the Food and Drug Administration reminds sun-worshippers that ultra-violet radiation can cause skin cancer.

Unfortunately, many people don't realize the serious health threat skin cancer has become. It's the most common form of cancer. According to FDA, there are 300,000 cases a year, and more than 6500 deaths. Investigators suspect that there has been a 100 percent increase in skin cancer over the past 25 years. Fortunately, just about every death from skin cancer is avoidable. Because you can see it, skin cancer can almost always be detected and treated at an early stage.

Any skin change should be called to your doctor's attention. Skin cancers can be treated successfully in several ways. They can be removed surgically, eliminated by heat or freezing, or treated by x-ray. Active chemicals also may be applied directly to the tumor as ointments or solutions.

The after-affects of too much sun can also include eye injury, sunburn, skin eruptions, and premature aging of the skin. And, in rare instances, sunstroke can cause death.

How can you protect yourself? Simple. Just remember that 60 percent of the sun's ultraviolet rays hit the earth between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. So, reduce your exposure to damaging radiation by not sunbathing during these hours.

If you want to bathe in the sun anyhow, use a sun-block. These lotions come in different strengths, from 15 (the most protection) to 2 (the least protection). Check the labels of these products to identify the degree of protection you need.

So before spending time in the sun, take a look at some important information from the FDA booklet, *Sunbathing and Skin Cancer*. It tells what you can do to avoid harmful sunbathing and what warning conditions of skin cancer may look like. Open Line Lockout policy defined

OPEN LINE:

On Sunday, July 19, at 8 p.m., my daughter inadvertently locked us out of our house in Tarawa Terrace I. I used a neighbor's phone and called Emergency Maintenance. The individual who answered the phone told me that he couldn't come to my quarters and let me in because the employee who had the master key wasn't on duty that night. He asked if we could wait until morning to get inside. When I turned down that suggestion, he told me to break a window in the quarters to get inside. Now, I'm not stupid. I know that destruction of government property is punishable under both the UCMJ and federal law. I also know that the maximum punishment under federal law is 1 year imprisonment and/or a fine of up to \$1,000. I can't afford to pay for a new window let alone a fine. My question is this: Are Emergency Maintenance personnel advised to advocate destruction of government property or did I happen to get locked out of the house on a night when the employees was watching a good show on TV, reading a good book, etc?

Concerned reader responds

More on bicycle safety

OPEN LINE:

Recently The Globe carried an article warning bicycle riders to be on the defense at all times. I could not agree more, however, I think it is just as important to warn auto and truck drivers that bike riders enjoy the same rights and privileges on the road.

I think a warning to bike riders is appropriate, however, the motor vehicle drivers must also be warned of their responsibilities in approaching and passing bike riders. I propose the following hints for motor vehicle drivers:

-When you see a person on a bike, check your rear view mirror to see if traffic behind you will allow you to pass the rider safely.

-Within 150 to 200 feet of the bike rider, give your horn a couple of short "toots" to let the person know you are overtaking him and intend to pass.

-When you do pass the bike rider, make sure you give him enough room. The bike rider may be over

ed to each Family Housing occupant) No after-hours service is provided for occupants of family housing when keys have been lost or misplaced. The Family Housing Office recommends that you contact a private locksmith whenever this occurs.

The order further states that damage through forcible entry will be repaired at occupants' expense. The night supervisor will advise you to break a window in the house to gain access. Although this has been done in the past, we do not advocate breaking windows because of the safety aspects involved.

The purpose of the after-hours maintenance crew is to provide emergency maintenance to the entire Camp Lejeune complex. On a typical night, the four employees normally on duty receive thirty-five emergency calls dealing with problems such as power failures, water breaks, steam leaks, heating calls and a long list of other emergency calls. There is little time for loafing or performing routine work that is not considered emergency. The night supervisor is constantly faced with decisions regarding the urgency of a problem. He must determine if the problem requires emergency attention and decide if it warrants recalling maintenance on overtime to correct the problem.

We feel that the emergency maintenance crew provide excellent service to the habitants of Camp Lejeune. However, as stated earlier, suggestions to improve the service we provide are welcome.

to the right, but if he accidentally leaves his vehicle, loses control of his bike and falls, he may injure his head or neck.

-Government trucks, pick-up trucks and similar large vehicles may have obstacles from the side, such as side rear view mirrors, door handles, loose cargo, etc., which can easily hit the arm or shoulder of a bike rider and send him flying with serious injury, or worse.

-Although bike riders are encouraged to ride defensively, not all riders know this and necessarily choose to do so.

-Failure to properly yield to or pass a cyclist could result in the motor vehicle operator being cited for failure to operate his vehicle in a safe manner. Worse yet, the driver of a motor vehicle is responsible for the serious injury or death of a cyclist.

-Remember, bicycle riders have rights on the roads, too!

2nd MAU awarded unit commendation

1,700 Marines of the 32nd Marines Amphibious Unit, who participated in the Indian Ocean deployment last fall, entitled to wear the Meritorious Unit Commendation.

Adolph G. Schwenk, commanding officer of the 6th Marine Force Atlantic, presented the unit commendation, which covers the period June 17 to Aug. 19, at a ceremony at Camp Geiger, Wednesday. Marines and sailors assigned to 2nd Bn., 6th MM-264, Headquarters, 32nd MAU, and Service Support Group formed the 32nd MAU. The MAU was commanded by Col. R. T. Roche. The MAU was the first Marine combat unit

dispatched directly from the continental United States to the contingency task force in the Indian Ocean.

While afloat there and in the Mediterranean Sea, the MAU made the first amphibious landing in Tunis and called at ports in Egypt and Israel.

"Exceptionally noteworthy was the performance, in view of the first-time nature of amphibious planning and operations in two countries, the uncertainty of port facilities in remote areas, the limited lead time for planning, and the intense operational tempo experienced throughout."

Marines who served with the 32nd MAU during this period should contact their battalion administrative sections to confirm eligibility.


Jerome Freedman offered some suggestions for newspaper boys, church organizations, Boy Scouts and others to make extra money.

Changes of command

Weapons upkeep

Since all Marines are "basic riflemen," the care and upkeep of rifles and other weapons must be of utmost importance to them.

The Commandant of the Marine Corps, Gen. Robert H. Barrow, has noticed a trend in unsatisfactory care of weapons, including rifle team equipment, and recently addressed the problem in White Letter 8-81.

"This situation is deplorable and is particularly difficult to understand since team shooters are ostensibly the epitome of marksmen, sensitive to the proper use and care of their weapons," said Gen. Barrow.

"The apathy which permits not only the unsatisfactory care of rifle team equipment, but also individual weapons must be corrected," he added.

"I expect an immediate, Corps-wide concentrated leadership and training effort to eliminate this problem," said Gen. Barrow.

"Further, once corrected, I expect everyone to exert a continuing effort to ensure that there are no similar lapses in Marine-like behavior in the future," he concluded.

Operational security

Operational Security is command responsibility to prevent an enemy or potential enemy from obtaining information to accurately predict friendly actions.

But, according to Gen. Robert H. Barrow's July 31, White Letter, operational security is not only a command responsibility, it is also the concern of every Marine and dependent.

"The judicious and limited release of information with regard to drills, exercises, alerts and deployments cannot be overemphasized," stated Gen. Barrow. "I urge each of you to ensure that OPSEC (operational security) is an integral part of every operation and exercise, and that secrecy and security are achieved at all times."

Essay contest

Active duty patients

Active duty individuals who report to the NRMC for admission must report in the appropriate uniform of the day or they will not be admitted. Navy and Marine Corps men should have in their possession underclothing, toilet articles and shower shoes. Service women should bring underclothing, toilet articles, pajama and robe (optional), slippers and shower shoes.

When active duty personnel are admitted on an emergency basis, the command will ensure that all the above items are delivered to the patients within 24 hours of admission.

Incentive awards

Marines and civilians alike are eligible to receive up to \$5,000 by making money-saving suggestions to the Marine Corps Incentive Awards Program.

Suggestions... "should contribute to the efficiency, economy, or other improvement of operations or programs of the department or government." Im-

provements through inventions and scientific achievements also qualify.

All Marine Corps personnel are encouraged to submit suggestions that can result in substantial government savings. The amount of money awarded, ranging from \$25 to \$5,000, varies with the savings generated by the suggestion, invention or scientific achievement.

For suggestions resulting in savings of less than \$250, suggesters are awarded certificates or recognition in writing.

Each command has an awards program representative to assist those with suggestions. Suggestions must be submitted in writing on NAVSO Form 5305/4 to the local command administrator of the program.

Degree completion

Staff NCOs who wish to complete their college education through full-time study can apply for the Fiscal Year 1982 SNCO Degree Completion Program.

Disciplines for the FY82 program include Criminal Justice, Computer Science, Financial Management, Education/Psychology and Safety.

Applications must be submitted to the Commandant of the Marine Corps (Code TRE-40), and arrive no later than April 15, 1982.

The selection board is scheduled to convene in Washington during May 1982.

Savings Bonds

The Secretary of the Navy has announced a recent increase in the interest rate on U. S. Savings Bonds.

According to a July 1 notice, the interest rate on Series EE Savings Bonds, purchased on or after July 1, 1981, was increased to 9 percent compounded semi-annually, when the bonds are held to maturity. The terms to maturity have been shortened from 9 to 8 years.

The yield on other outstanding Savings Bonds and Savings Notes has also been increased by one-half percent. For further information contact your Bond officers or a savings institution.





Amtracs to host Family Day

Assault Amphibian Bn. will celebrate its Annual Family Day Saturday, 9 a.m. to dusk, at the Boat Basin on Hwy. 172. Everyone is invited to the day's events which include riding in amtracs and observing amtrac operations.

Initially, the amtrac has evolved from a variety of names to what it

is now. The LVT is said to have been developed in the cypress swamps of the means of getting mail service through the swamps. The story goes that in World War II, the Marine Corps was looking for a replacement for the tanks they used for amphibious landings. They sent a representative to the LVT.

Through his patriotism, the inventor agreed to sell and the Marine representative paid \$1 for the rights to manufacture the tracked vehicles. It is also claimed that the Marine Corps could not reimburse the officer for that dollar and he still claims to own the rights to all LVTs.

Used as a troop carrier in amphibious operations, the LVT can travel up to 8 miles per hour in the water and can travel 1 1/2 to 2 miles from shore.

It can withstand 12 feet of pounding surf.

"It is easy to drive the amtrac in the water," said LCpl. Damon James, PT-7 crew chief. "The water comes up 5 to 6 feet on the side of the vehicle and looks like a big turtle. It amazes me that 26 tons of vehicle can stay afloat, the vehicle is practically water tight. If any water should get in, a hydraulic bilge pump can pump 110 gallons of water per minute and a electric pump can remove 100 gallons per minute."

Through the surf and back on land, the LVT can go almost anywhere. It can negotiate a hill with a 60-degree incline, span an 8-foot ditch or cross a 12-foot wide stream.

"It can go 30-40 miles per hour with four

and two reverse speeds."

James has found the LVT to be a sturdy vehicle, which is not hard to maintain if we stay on top of the maintenance," he explained. "We have to pay special attention to the 100-pound engine, we have to check them carefully before each operation. It's hard, heavy work, these are big vehicles and everything on them is heavy."

Before each operation, systems such as suspension, communication

and machine gun in the armament station and the jet propulsion

system for water driving must be in good order.

Since the LVT can do many things, the mission could vary. "We can support the artillery by carrying their ammunition," said LCpl. James. "Or, we can carry food for troops, since the LVT can carry 10,000 pounds of cargo. If we are operating alone, we can carry everything we need inside the amtrac. We don't need a tent, we have our own 'traveling motel' when we go to the field."

Usually the LVT crew will support the infantry because the tractor can also hold 25 combat-equipped Marines.

LCpl. James says he enjoys his job and considers it a challenge. "Working as an LVT crew chief is interesting," he said. "It's something not a lot of people have done."

But a lot of people will get a first-hand look at LCpl. James' and other's jobs this Saturday, plus free refreshments.

Gunner wears insignia with pride

They are called, but few have ever been chosen. A bursting bomb, worn on the uniform's left collar is a mark of distinction. But somehow these people are confused with the masses.

It is the often misunderstood role of a Marine gunner."

"I never get upset when a young trooper asks me about the insignia," says C.W.O.-4 Roger Larvie, assigned to the Rifle Range Detachment. "How can you get upset with a question asked in earnest?"

Today, W.O. Larvie is the only actual Marine gunner aboard Camp Lejeune and one of 16, Corps-

wide, on active duty, according to Headquarters Marine Corps.

Having served with gunners prior to his selection, may be a reason he holds a hardened view of their traits and carries a unique pride.

"Being a gunner is special, but unexplainable. It's just something I feel inside," stated the seasoned Leatherneck.

Although the warrant officer rank was initiated into the Corps more than 65 years ago, the National Defense Act of 1916 authorized only 20 Marines for selection as Marine gunners. This marked the beginning of a great tradition for a select group of Marines.

Twenty years later the title gunner was abolished and the grade designations became warrant officer 1, 2, 3 and 4.

During the 50s, the title was reestablished—but only for three years. It was also during that time that chief warrant officer 2, 3 and 4 grades were established.

Again, in 1964, the title gunner emerged for a few years and W.O. Larvie was one of the first selected.

"Only warrant officers who had been serving in certain military occupational specialties (infantry, tanks, artillery, amtracs and operational communications) at the time of their initial selection were eligible for selection as a gunner," explained the 30-year veteran.

"I thought all warrant officers were gunners," said PFC Mark Calix, recently qualifying at the Rifle Range. "But since I've been here and had the privilege to meet Gunner Larvie, I know there's a difference."

The obvious difference is their bursting bomb.

The intangible difference is their unique pride.

Another difference is their title: Gunner, United States Marine Corps.



Surf detachment sun-bathed duty serious, but fun

Perched atop a wooden throne, he is surrounded by bronze bodies in the summer sun. Looking at sand stretching miles to the left and right, he patiently watches over his domain.

He is not a king; he is one of 26 Onslow Beach lifeguards.

The lifeguards, half of the 52-man Beach Detachment, are tasked with providing safe and enjoyable recreation for military men and women, their families and guests. They spend long hours on the beach, yet constantly remain on the alert.

Three lifeguards usually work each of the three swimming and sunbathing areas at Onslow Beach. They encourage swimmers to remain within the boundaries of the beach and keep them informed of swimming conditions through the use of flags.

Three flags are used: green, water's safe; yellow, caution; and red, off-limits.

On crowded weekends, beach-goers sometimes number 2,000.

"Sometimes a lifeguard will look up and see nothing but people," aid Lt. Guy Larimer, the detachment's officer-in-charge. "Although we're not lifeguards, (children under 12 are required to be accompanied by a responsible adult) we do pay particular attention to the kids," he added.

Swimmers, surfers and sunbathers can help the detachment by observing the rules both in the water and out.

From mid-March through late October, lifeguards are assigned to the detachment. Each Marine is trained in cardio pulmonary resuscitation and the Red Cross certified in first aid. Lifesaving or water safety instruction is also required.


The other half of the detachment is continually responsible for the maintenance of camping sites, cabanas, pavilions and beaches. Their efforts are often granted, yet a clean, well-kept area makes recreation more enjoyable, according to Lt. Larimer.

Labor Day, Sept. 7, marks the official end of the beach season, staffed on weekends until Sept. 27.

They may not be royalty but the Onslow Beach lifeguards are a kingdom.

Dental Corps: 69 years proud and going strong

Saturday marks the Naval Dental Corps' 69th anniversary. But even before its establishment as a corps, the Navy had dental care.

Dental care was originally accomplished by hospital stewards who had varying degrees of formal training; contracted dentists also provided treatment. A dental service was proposed by the Surgeon General in 1902 but the bill wasn't signed until ten years later. When President Taft finally signed the bill, it authorized the appointment of not more than 30 acting assistant dental surgeons into the Navy's Medical Department.

The Dental Corps finally began in earnest in 1913 when the first Naval dental officer was ordered to sea. During the same year, dental officers were assigned to overseas stations and Marine Corps units. These appointments signaled the beginning of the Navy's dental care for Marines as well as sailors.

Originally, one dental officer was appointed for every 1,000 Marines and sailors. By 1935, legislation increased the dentist to patient ratio to one per 500.

The number of Navy dentists has risen from 35, at the beginning of World War I, to nearly 1,600 today.

There has also been an increase in opportunities for Navy dentists through residency training, post-doctoral fellowships and continuing research and education. Programs are structured to provide Naval dentists with expertise in their particular field.

"The most recent change has been the consolidation of all shore-based activities into Naval Regional Dental Centers," according to Navy Capt. Erwin J. Heinkel, Jr., commanding officer, NRDC Camp Lejeune.

This consolidation has brought dental activities within certain geographical locations under the guidance and direction of one dental officer. There are 23 such commands on three continents.

In their 69 years of formal existence, the Naval Dental Corps has grown in size and technology while providing a vital service by Marines and sailors world-wide.

Number 2 boxer tries harder

Standing 5 feet, 4 inches, and weighing 106 pounds, the small quiet man from Brooklyn, N.Y. doesn't look like a formidable opponent in a fight.

However, Cpl. Inocencio Ventura has a boxing record of 42-8 as a light flyweight. His boxing laurels include honors as a silver medalist in the recent National Sports Festival in Syracuse, N.Y.; a silver medal in international military boxing competition at the recent CISM games; runner-up in Interservice competition for the last two years; and the All-Marine title in 1980 and '81.

"I'm tired of second place though," said the Puerto Rico native. "I seem to have a curse, but this year I'm going to be on top!"

Cpl. Ventura joined the Corps in July 1977 and after recruit training went to Okinawa. "I started going to the gym and working out for something to do," said the 25-year-old boxer.

"I never boxed before I was in Okinawa, I didn't ever think I could be a boxer until I tried it," said Cpl. Ventura.

After boxing in a few smokers Cpl. Ventura decided to get really serious about the sport. "It was time to set a goal...All-Marine," he said. "In April 1979 I started working for that goal."

He attained his first goal in the 1980 All-Marine bouts by defeating LCpl. Alex Monel.

With his first goal secured, Cpl. Ventura wanted the Interservice crown next. But this is a goal yet to be reached.

"I lost a close decision in the Interservice bouts last April," he said. "There is no doubt that the 1982 Interservice crown will be mine."

Despite his loss in the 1981 Interservice bouts Cpl. Ventura was asked to be a member of the team that would participate in the CISM bouts. "It was pretty

exciting, I couldn't believe I was going to fight on an international level," said the boxer. It was a great experience, seeing all the different styles and meeting people from other countries. I was ready but that second place hit me again."

The CISM bout with South Korea's Kyung Cho was close even though Cpl. Ventura was knocked down twice in the first two rounds. He fought viciously in the third, but didn't get the win.


The process is starting over again for Ventura. The All-Marine tryouts are raging hot and furious. "It's like starting from scratch again," said the All-Marine Champion.

But with a little luck and the experience he has gained in the last year, Cpl. Inocencio Ventura has a better than even chance of staying a champion in 1982.


The Marine Corps Marathon is sanctioned by the Track and Field Association-USA, and is certified by the Athletic Congress.



I admit when I run with the ball, I'm not an O.J. Simpson. But he's not as good looking as I am either.






