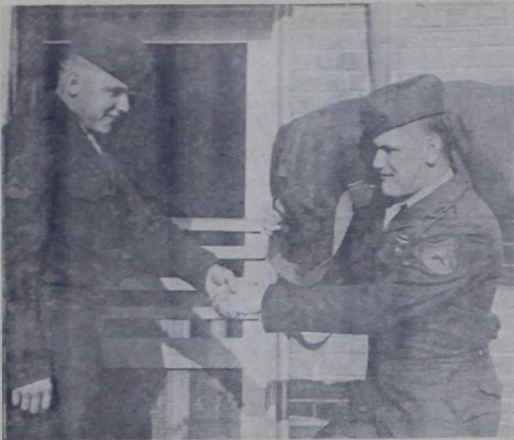

Midnight Oil Pays Off For Local Marine

Four years of hard work and thousands of gallons of "midnight oil" paid off for Capt. Richard W. Wray III of the 2d Marine Division Legal Section October 20 when he received notification that he had been admitted to the Maryland Bar Association.

The Captain earned his law degree through the University of Maryland by going to night school while he was serving as Assistant Officer-in-Charge at the Naval Training Center at Bainbridge. He enrolled at the University in September 1957 and accumulated a total of 87 semester hours of credit in the school of law.

Association Offers Aid To 5th Div's Kids

Children of Marines who were disabled while serving with the 5th Marine Division during World War II may be eligible for educational assistance under a recently announced 5th Marine Division Association Scholarship Program.

The program applies to children of former 5th Division Marines who have been classified as 85 per cent disabled by the Veterans Administration. No grant will be made to applicants eligible for aid under the Federal Government's Educational Program for War Orphans.

Scholarship grants are limited to \$300 a year for a maximum of three years. They are made to assist in defraying expenses for higher education when adequate funds are not available from other sources. They may be used to augment other funds and scholarships.

Applicants must have a high school education or its equivalent and be enrolled in, or eligible for entry into, an accredited educational institution.

Foreign Medical Officers Here For Two-Day Visit

Foreign medical officers representing 14 American Allies studying in the U. S. under President Kennedy's "People-to-People Program" recently completed a two-day visit as part of a tour sponsored by the Bureau of Medicine at Washington, D. C. Capt. George Donabedian, USN (MC), Staff Medical Officer to the Commandant, leads the group composed of 19 doctors from the Naval Medical School at Bethesda, Md. The group is divided into two main fields, Preventative Medicine and Naval Medical Management.

While at Camp Lejeune, the doctors visited Company "B" of the 2d Medical Battalion which was undergoing training in the field under simulated battle conditions.

The Medical Battalion, commanded by Cmdr. R. W. Jones, demonstrated the various echelons of medical aid which might be used in the treatment and evacuation of casualties.

A Marine fire team began the demonstration with an assault on a fortified position. During the assault, several of the men were "wounded." Some were designated as minor injuries while others were of a nature requiring surgery. Those with minor wounds were treated by other members of the fire team and sent to the aid station. This is "buddy aid" which is practiced throughout the Marine Corps.

Casualties of a more serious nature were cared for by the company corpsman.

Once at the aid station, the wound was treated by a doctor. If it was decided that the man required major surgery, he was taken to a clearance station where a field hospital with operating tents had been set up. Persons requiring special doctors or treatment are evacuated either to a hospital ship or to one of the Navy's special surgical team sites.

Countries represented in the group were: Belgium, Columbia, Germany, Italy, Japan, Turkey, Argentina, Korea, Mexico, Pakistan, Peru, Philippines, Portugal, and Indonesia.

Navy Photo Contest Lists Cash Prizes

Saturday night a dance and social was held for the scouts at the Marston Pavilion.

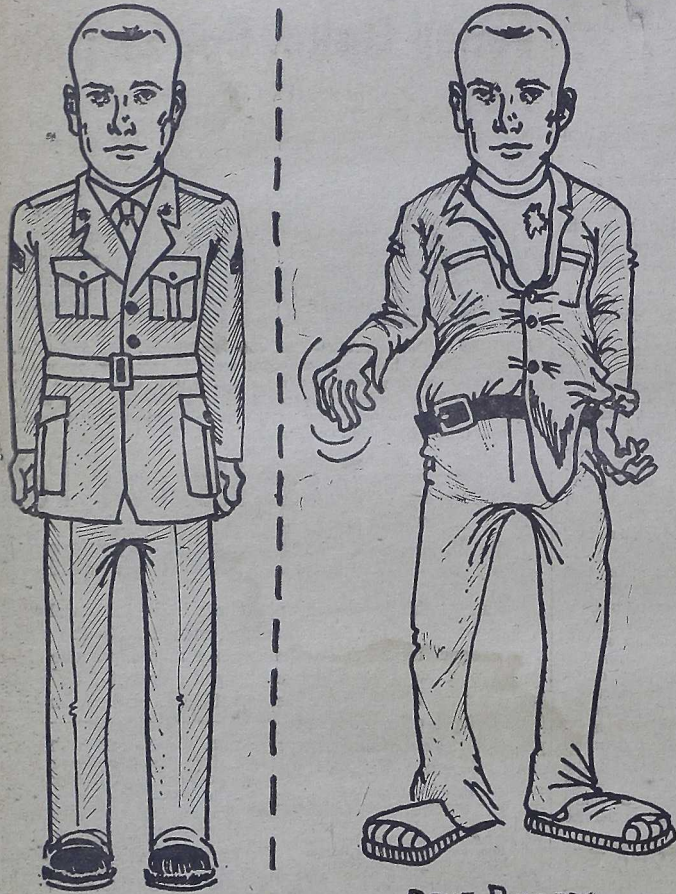
Unattended Children

All persons found not complying with this Regulation will be issued a Traffic Citation and in the case of dependents or civilians will be instructed to appear before the Federal Commissioner.

A Sharp Marine Should Be As Sharp In Civvies

It seems a little ridiculous for a Marine to look sharp in uniform and then look like a bum in civilian clothes. It might be that long association with the Corps (anywhere from three months up) has caused some Marines to lose touch with civilian clothing styles.

If this is the case, the GLOBE will endeavor to bring you up to date.

Civilian clothes are different from uniforms in more ways than one. Civilians wear ties. These come in different colors and designs and are worn with shirts, jackets and suits.

Trousers also come in a variety of colors and cuts. Unfortunately,

some are extreme, such as jeans and others of the same variety. Since jeans are not acceptable attire, word about the wearing of trousers, both washable and dry-cleanable. Trousers, civilian issue, should be neatly pressed and clean at all times. This increases the life of the garment and assures the wearer that an MP won't cut short his liberty.

Shoes, civilian issue, also come in a number of styles. Some, such as suede, require no polishing, but most others do. Uniform shoes usually clash with civilian clothing as do issue socks draped unartistically around the ankles.

Shirts, civilian issue, seem to give the most trouble. Since Base regulations require that shirts be tucked in, and give no recognition to certain extreme types which come to a point somewhat below the belt, a word of advice would be in order here.

The majority of these shirts come with buttons. These should be placed through the openings on the opposite side of the shirt and left in that position. These civilian shirts can also be laundered, ironed and dry-cleaned. In fact, this is recommended by manufacturers and MP's.

Extremes in headgear are to be avoided. Most hats are acceptable but scarves, headbands and other unusual types are not. Wearing proper head gear prevents the headache caused by trying to explain to the company commander why the MP picked up your liberty card.

Regulations on wearing civilian clothing are not open to interpretation. They state simply that civilian clothing may be worn but that it must be neat, clean and in good taste. Jeans, highwater trousers, extremes in color and cut, are not acceptable.

Since too many Marines are wearing civilian clothing improperly, the Military Police have been instructed to pick up offenders. This applies on the Base as well as on liberty.

Chaplain's Corner

Aggressors Sharpen Division Unit

Whenever a Marine unit plays war games, it needs opposition. During most training exercises, the "aggressors" are just a platoon or company of everyday Leathernecks who sit on the other side of the MLR and fire blanks. But Force Troops has a unit of specialists who

play the enemy role during war games.

The 2d Marine Aggressor Company is a 15-man unit which realizes that the better they do their job, the more training the Marines will get out of it.

Where the ordinary infantry Marine could pose only a mild threat to the security and mission of a field exercise, this unit puts the training Marine and his organization to extreme tests. The aggressors use tear gas and other harrassing measures, and they use their simulators and mock equipment to make the opposition think they are a much larger force.

They'll jam your radio nets, play "Tokyo Rase" tape recordings to you and use all

other known methods to break down the morale of the opposition. They'll set up a public address system and tell you about how much greener the grass is on their side of the fence.

While you're hurling epithets at the rain, the cold, and the "C" rations, they'll promise you a warm bed with clean sheets, hot chow, and dry clothes if you'll only give up your "senseless struggle" and lay down your arms.

They'll crank up those simulators to make it sound like artillery rounds are coming right down on top of you. Just as your pulse jumps a silky voice will be back in its begging, promising, persuading, and sometimes threatening channels.

To add insult to injury, some salty corporal will pin on captain's bars, and wearing aggressor uniform walk right into your CP, and steal you blind as far as your plans and security are concerned. Then you wonder why the aggressors knew exactly where your unit was going to be at exactly what time and exactly how strong.

Why? Because some private on security watch wouldn't challenge a captain. But from this a lesson is learned. These lessons are the end result of 2d Aggressor Company's continuous efforts to offer better opposition for the training Marine.

The Force Troops aggressors, only two men stronger than a Marine rifle squad, sometimes pick up men from ABC School at Camp Geiger or from the unit they are working against, but they are always a small group with a big job.

The hardy 2d Marine Aggressor Company is under the leadership of 1st Lt. George Gibbs, a Long Island, N. Y., native who's stress on physical conditioning and classes of all sorts has rounded his outfit into a strong, combat-ready group of men. The rigorous training in the company parallels that of the infantry units, except that the aggressors cover a wider range of subjects and tactics.

The company would have

to rate among the most-schooled units in the Marine Corps. They certainly have one of the most versatile or-

ganizations to be found anywhere.

All of the aggressors have been through ABC School,

about half have been trained at the Escape and Survival School at Pickle Meadow, Calif., and all of these Marines are high school graduates, although some of them have earned their diplomas since joining the aggressors.

Everyone in the company is taking MCI courses, but for all of this formal training, the aggressors find that their own teammates are some of their best sources of training.

For example, Pfc Gerald Jewers, listed on the company roster as a sound bank operator, is also a school-trained scuba-diver. He has held class for the rest of the company on this subject.

One fact that bears out their versatility is that they are self-supporting.

The company has its own supply section with GySgt. Cleveland L. Jackson and SSgt. Telton B. Brazell; motor transport with LCpl. William A. Ferrell and LCpl. Johnny C. Hedges; communi-

'Hercules' Furnishes A New Muscle For Fleet Marine Force Combat Units

The Marine rifleman has ridden into combat in a variety of vehicles—ranging from whaleboats to helicopters and from four-footed mules to mechanical mules. In future battles he may ride in the Lockheed GV-1 "Hercules"—a four-motored turbo-prop transport destined to replace the older and slower R4Q "Q-Bird."

Three of the new Hercules belonging to the 839th Air Division, based at Sewart Air Force Base, Smyrna, Tenn., arrived at the New River Air Facility where members of the 1st Battalion, 6th Marines, checked them out for air movement training for three days.

The three planes—known in the Air Force as the C-130—were flown here under the command of Maj. James Watkins, USAF. They remained at the Air Facility for three days, ferrying troops and equipment of the battalion on familiarization hops.

The mighty Hercules is

generally regarded as the world's largest and fastest assault transport aircraft. It was designed especially to get in and out of small, unimproved fields with its load of combat troops and gear.

It can lift a prodigious 25,000 pounds of men and/or supplies to an altitude of 21,000 feet and cruise there at a speed of 310 knots. Hercules could carry a 105mm howitzer, a two-and-a-half-ton truck and 20 combat-laden infantrymen from coast to coast in a matter of hours and still have ample fuel reserves in its cavernous tanks.

During their three-day familiarization with the big plane, troops of the battalion loaded and off-loaded Ontos, Jeeps, trailers and 106mm rifle-bearing mechanical mules.

Following loading exercises, the troops were flown in the huge aircraft on short introductory hops.

Among Marines queried for their reactions to the big

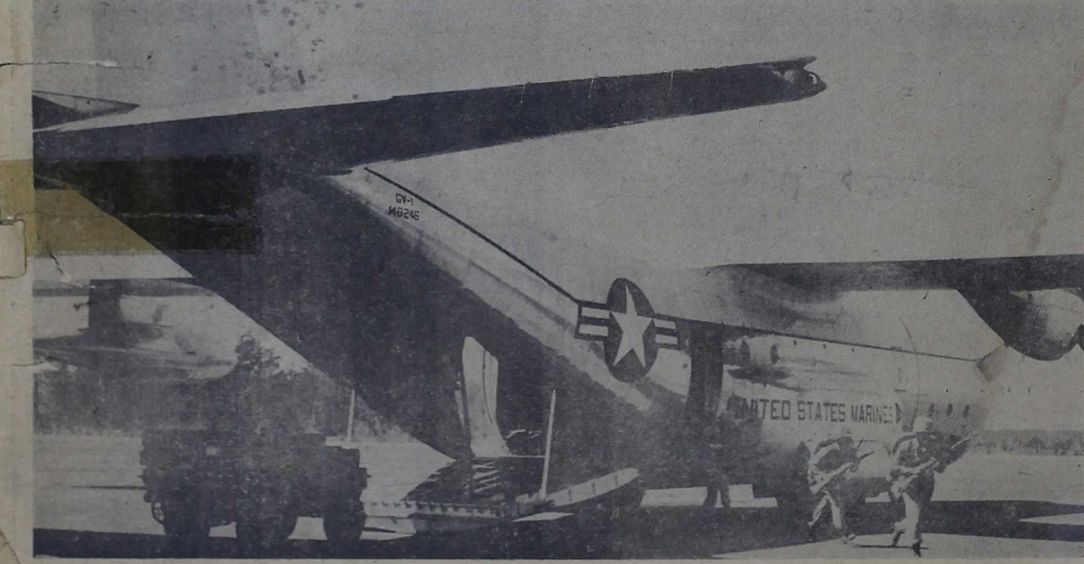
plan was Pfc Kenneth M. Donald, a mechanical mul operator from Headquarters and Service Company. M. Donald noted the fact that the axle-width of the mule is just barely wide enough to fit the twin tracks that extend down from the hydraulic ramp. He guessed that "if combat there might be a few bumps coming down in a hurry, but it's all in the game."

The mighty muscles of the Hercules have already successfully met a series of tests conducted on a Corps-wide basis. These tests included a number of trials run-offs by the 2d Marine Division, and the 2d Marine Aircraft Wing based at Cherry Point.

Among the capabilities of the Hercules are lifts involving two nine-ton Ontos, or a variety of vehicles and troops equalling 25,000 pounds.

As many as 92 fully combat-equipped Marines have been swallowed up by the big Hercules.

Flyers Aid Hondurans

Fifty-one Marines returned to their home squadron, HMR-264, MAG-26, at the Marine Corps Air Facility, New River, last Friday after spending 16 days in British Honduras aiding the strife torn victims of Hurricane Hattie, which devastated their country on Oct. 30, leaving a rising toll of nearly 500 dead in her wake.

The Marines, including 18 officers and 33 enlisted men, had embarked aboard the USS Antietam at Pensacola on Nov. 1, and after arriving in the vicinity of Belize, British Honduras, on Nov. 3 had operated off the aircraft carrier with eight HUS-1 helicopters for three days. On Monday, Nov. 6, the entire detachment of Marines with six helicopters moved ashore to the Stanlee Airport just 10 miles inland from the capital, Belize, and continued their task of carrying food, medical supplies and other aid to the inland areas of the British colony.

In all, the Marine helicopters carried nearly 200,000 pounds of cargo which included medical supplies and food badly needed in the

wake of the storm. They flew about 110 flights totaling nearly 250 hours of flying time.

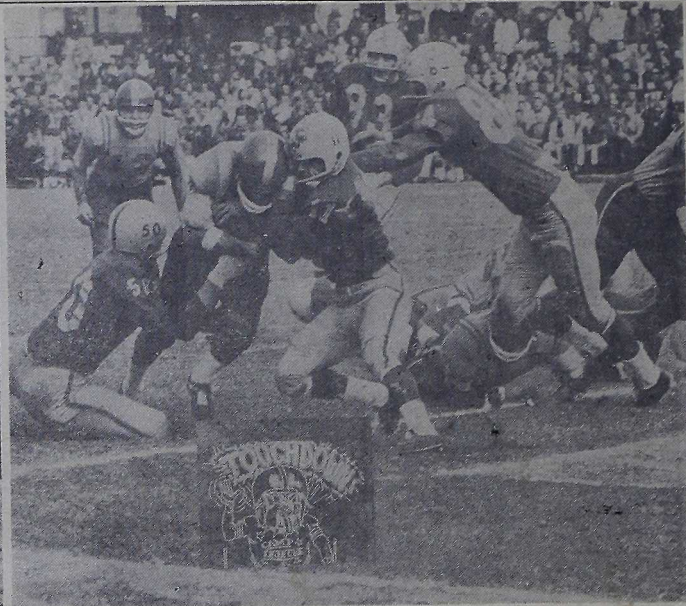

MCI Records Need Proper Identification

What's in a name? Everything—if that name is on file with 120,000 other names in the Marine Corps Institute. The Institute currently maintains approximately 120,000 students' records. Half of these are the records of active students; half are the records of those students who have completed their courses, or those who have been disenrolled for other reasons.

With this large roster, it is mandatory that students follow a few simple rules to facilitate proper processing of their courses. When he receives his course materials, he should examine the mailing label on the outside envelope. The student record maintained at MCI contains exactly the same information which appears on this mailing label.

If the label is incorrect, the Institute should be notified immediately, so that an accurate student record may be prepared. Otherwise, MCI may be unable to locate the appropriate student record at the time lesson grades are to be recorded.

If the student changes his address, the Institute should be notified immediately. Prompt notification of changes in rank is not essential.

Also, the officer who administers the student's final examination may help to insure the preparation of a correct completion certificate by checking carefully the student identifying information on the face of the certification sheet.

All changes to this information should be marked on the face of the certification sheet before it is returned to MCI with the examination materials.

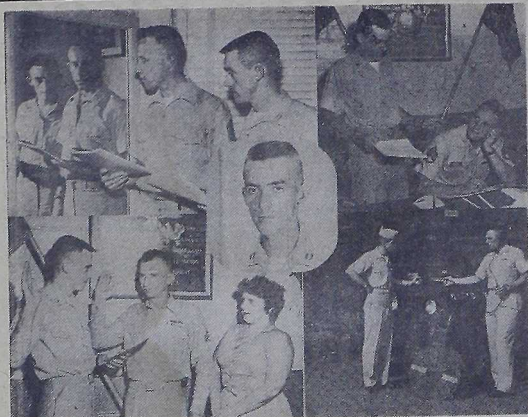

sequently was not included in the program submitted to Headquarters Marine Corps. This was the status of the program when Captain Pridgeon reported as Base Dental Officer and one of the many phases of preventive dentistry to which he turned his immediate attention.

In September, 1960, Pridgeon took up the fight and placed the fluoridation project back in circulation.

Thirteen months and several letters later, his goal was achieved and the project for fluoridation of water for the first area of Camp Lejeune—Hadnot Point—was approved for financing from local funds.

The Hadnot Point well supplies water for Hadnot Point, Hospital Point, Midway Park, Paradise Point and Berkeley Manor. Doctor Pridgeon hopes to extend the project to other wells serving Tarawa Terrace and the outlying camps of the Base at an early date.

At present, the fluoride content of the water from the Hadnot Point well is 0.05 parts per million. The chemical feed system to be added will bring the optimum level to

0.8ppm, which is considered adequate for this area based on average temperature.

Fluoridation is described as a major step toward the prevention of dental decay by the American Dental Association. Carefully controlled studies have revealed that by bringing and maintaining the fluoride content of the water supply to the optimum level of one part of the element fluorine to a million parts of water as much as 60 per cent reduction in the incidence of dental cavities has resulted.

Children who drink fluoride-bearing water from birth receive the greatest beneficial effects. It is most effective when fluoridated water is included in the diet during the formative stages of the enamel of the teeth. Fluoride fortifies and makes the enamel more resistant to the decay process. Older individuals who start drinking the treated water will also receive protection against dental decay. The protection continues throughout life and when the water system is treated, the continuous-residence population all eventually receive full benefits from the fluoridation.

Historic Army Fighting Unit Honors 5th And 6th Marines

The U. S. Army's 2d Infantry Division, one of America's most historic fighting units, held a "family" reunion recently and reaffirmed a 43-year-old comradeship with two of its former members, the 5th and 6th Marines, by making them honorary members of the Indian Head Division. This battle-strengthened camaraderie

dates back to 1918, when the 2d Infantry Division, American Expeditionary Force, commanded by Army Maj. Gen. Omar Bundy, made history during the bitter fighting at Chateau-Thierry, Belleau Wood, Soissons, and St. Mihiel.

The 2d Division, A.E.F., was considered the equal of any division of any army in Europe and was so honored by often being selected to lead the attack. It was made up of the Third Brigade, composed of the 9th and 23d Infantry, and the Fourth Marine Brigade, composed of the 5th and 6th Marine Regiments and the 6th Machine Gun Battalion.

It was in October, 1918, following the battle of Mont Blanc, that the new Division commander, Marine Maj. Gen. John A. Lejeune, later the 13th Commandant of the Marine Corps, wrote to the officers and men of the 2d Division:

"To be able to say when this war is finished, 'I belonged to the 2d Division, A.E.F.; I fought with it at the battle of Blanc Mont Ridge,' will be the highest honor that can come to any man."

The latest fraternal meeting between the 2d Infantry Division and the Marines occurred Oct. 28, when the commanding officer and sergeant major of the 6th Marine Regiment, Col. James M. Platt and Sgt. Maj. E. B. Pullen Jr., attended ceremonies at Ft. Benning, Ga., commemorating the 44th Anniversary of the 2d Division's founding in Bourmont, France, Oct. 26, 1917.

The invitation to attend the Organization Day festivities of the Indian Head Division was extended by Maj. Gen. Charles H. Chase, USA, 2d Division commander, and a personal friend of Maj. Gen. James P. Berkeley, then Commanding General, 2d Marine Division, and now Commander, Marine Corps

Base, Camp Lejeune.

The 5th Marines were also invited but had to take a "raincheck" due to training commitments. In a sense, Colonel Platt also represented the 5th Regiment at the occasion, since he commanded the 1st Battalion, 5th Marines, in Korea.

Both Colonel Platt and the sergeant major were eloquent in praising their hosts.

"There were 7,000 troops in formation plus vehicles and supporting arms," Colonel Platt reported. "Yes, and the local newspaper estimated there were 5,000 spectators," added the sergeant major.

Also present was Lt. Gen. T. J. H. Trappnell, Commanding General, Third U. S. Army, of which General Chase's Indian Head Division is a member.

"When we went out to 'Troop the Line' with the two generals in one Jeep and the colonel and myself in the other, I couldn't keep thinking, 'Oh boy, this is probably the first time in history a Marine sergeant major has inspected an Army Division,'" the sergeant major said.

"We were introduced as distinguished visitors after the review," said Sergeant Pullen, "and then General Chase presented us with a very impressive proclamation making us 'honorary members of the United States Army 2d Infantry Division.'"

Colonel Platt observed that when their Army hosts closed the morning's proceedings, they really did it with a bang.

"After a few closing words by the announcer, they fired an Honest John rocket from the parade ground, and it was impressive to say the least," Colonel Platt remarked.

Upon his return to Camp Lejeune Colonel Platt presented the proclamation to General Berkeley.

A framed reproduction will be hung in the corridor of the 6th Marine Headquarters, opposite copies of the French Citations issued to the regiment in WW I.

Another copy of the proclamation has been sent to the commanding officer of the 5th Marines.

Colonel Platt is named after Captain Jonas H. Platt (deceased), his uncle, who served as an aide to General Lejeune. Captain Platt was awarded the Navy Cross and Distinguished Service Cross for his heroism at Belleau Wood, when he served with the 5th Marines as part of the 2d Infantry Division.

From December, 1952, to April, 1953, Colonel Platt commanded the 1st Battalion, 5th Marines, in Korea. Brig. Gen. Lewis W. Walt, now Assistant Division Commander of the 2d Marine Division, commanded the 5th Marine Regiment at that time.
