# Protecting military against 'rip offs'

Marines take care of their own. What does that really mean? How do we take care of our own?

Sometimes, a Marine doesn't even realize how much most of the time it's done in subtle ways. Often than not, taking care of our own means hot chow to Marines in the field, or a helping hand from the Red Cross and Navy Relief when in trouble at home.

Once in a while though, that care can hit like a ton of bricks; like when an establishment frequented by Marines is placed OFF LIMITS. It's like this that makes a lot of younger Marines wonder if the Corps really cares, or if it's going to establish a rigid moral standard for

Most people see the Armed Forces Disciplinary Control Board as a band of crusaders trying to put all the 'fun' places off limits so the Marines can't go there anymore," Lt. Martin H. Eaves, recorder for the AFDCB. "If they knew why many of the places we put off limits get that way, they'd understand

the "fun" places, the lieutenant referred to the area of "movie mate" and adult book stores in the Jacksonville area, which currently make up the places which are taboo for Marines and any other servicepersons assigned at Camp Lejeune/New River or MCAS Cherry Point.

"I have a crew of investigators, including myself, that is responsible to go and check out each complaint we receive," the lieutenant said. "If the people who think we're crusaders could see these places we investigate, they'd think twice about going there to begin with. Most of the time, by the time we get them into the off limits status, they're so filthy and flagrant in their abuses, they're one step ahead of the law."

A place doesn't have to be "sleazy" to be investigated and put on the off limits list. The business can be just as legitimate as the next. But, if they make a practice of ripping off military personnel at Camp Lejeune or the other bases in this area, they can be brought before the AFDCB.

"We investigate any place where a Marine receives services and gets ripped off. If we get a complaint, it doesn't matter if it's a 'sleazy' joint or a legitimate place. The bottom line is if they make a practice of hurting our people, we'll get our ducks in line and get them placed off

limits," he said.

Emphasis with the AFDCB is placed on the complaint link in the chain. In order for the lieutenant and his investigators to act, they have to have a bona fide complaint. By that, the complaint can't just be someone who got themselves into a situation he or she doesn't like and is trying to grind axes.

"We don't want to hear sour grapes," Eaves said. "We can help if it's a legitimate complaint. If enough Marines come to me and tell me that they think they're being ripped off by a certain place, I'll see a pattern. If I see a pattern, I can and will act."

Investigation is the first step in the chain. Once a Marine makes a complaint about a place, say for instance a car repair place he feels has overcharged him an exorbitant sum for repairs or storage on top of the original estimate, the AFDCB will initiate its own investigation. If the investigation proves the complaint valid, the AFDCB can start the proceedings to place that establishment off limits.

Secondly, the board will decide if the complaint warrants additional action. If so, the board will draft a letter of warning, which tells the establishment owners what the AFDCB feels is wrong and gives them a chance to take corrective action.

"I personally deliver the letter to the place we're checking out," Eaves said. "Depending on how I and the letter are received will determine the next step."

## Display Determination '88 stretches across Med

Three in the morning is when the human body is typically at its lowest. It was at that moment that Marines of Fox Company, 2nd Battalion, 4th Marines assaulted Orange Forces guarding a coastal surveillance radar site. The site sat on a rocky, barren and wind-swept ridge line 541 feet above the main landing beach. Seizing it was the first step in this year's major, two-part Display Determination '88 NATO exercise.

The exercise took place during September and October over vast stretches of the Mediterranean as it began on

the southern tip of Sardinia southwest of the Italian mainland and concluded 21 days later in Turkey. Participating allied forces came from the United States, Italy, Turkey and Portugal.

Fox's night attack was followed by a surface and air pre-dawn assault by the remainder of the 24th Marine Expeditionary Unit (Special Operations Capable) commanded by Col. R. R. Matthews. For the next two days U.S. Marine infantry, armored vehicles and anti-armor weapons made their way up narrow valleys against Orange Force tanks and armored person-

If the owner is very antagonistic, I'll let him know that he has the right to confront a meeting of the board with any information he has to rebut the findings. Since I've been here, none have faced the board."

If the establishment is receptive to the board's findings and does make a concerted effort to correct what was found wrong, that's probably as far as the board's action will go, according to Eaves.

On the other hand, if the owner doesn't make an effort to change his or her practices, or if it receives another complaint about that particular establishment, the board will continue to investigate and will meet again to discuss possible additional action.

"We issue a second letter to the owner (hand-delivered like the first), which tells them that their practices will again be

brought up at the next board meeting," the lieutenant said. "Again, they're given the right to appear with any and all information they have to rebut the board's findings. If they don't show up, the board will still vote on whether to add that establishment to the off limits list."

At that point, the board generally has enough information and has had enough complaints to take action and recommend that the commanding general put the place off limits. The establishments the board considers and adds to the list must be really flagrant in their abuses of Marines, according to Eaves.

Once the final action has been taken, and the place has been marked as off limits, a third and final letter is sent to the owner (informing him or her of the board's action), and notice is placed in the base newspaper.

As a general rule, once the final step is taken, the establishment changes its name. But, that's no excuse

for the Marines and Sailors in this area to think okay to go there again.

"Off limits means just that. If someone is assigned to Camp Lejeune, New River or Cherry Point is caught there, they're in violation of a general order and will be dealt with accordingly," Eaves added. "That's why each establishment that's put on the list is placed there according to its exact location."

One point the lieutenant stressed is that the AFDCB is not out to take away fun from young Marines. The places that get put on the list are really outrageous about their practices.

"Personally, I don't care where a Marine goes to do business, unless that place endangers the Marine's health, welfare, moral discipline," Eaves concluded.

# Memorial scheduled, investigation continues

A memorial service will be held for Lance Cpl. Jason J. Rother tomorrow at 2 p.m. in the Protestant Chapel here.

Lance Cpl. Rother, who was assigned to Kilo Co., 3/2, disappeared during a Combined Arms Exercise at Twentynine Palms, Ca., Aug. 30. His remains were found Dec. 4 during a grid search conducted by the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department.

The Sunday search by volunteers covered the area one mile south of old Highway 66 and 13 miles west of the town of Amboy. The rifle, equipment and identification card discovered had been issued to Rother.

After a thorough review of the investigation on the circumstances surrounding the disappearance of Rother the Commandant of the Marine Corps has returned the investigation and directed further inquiry.

Because of the narrow purpose of the initial investigation, which was to determine the status of Lance Cpl. Rother pur-

suant to the Marine Corps Casualty Procedures Manual, and the additional information developed since its submission, the Commandant decided that a more detailed investigation was necessary. He directed the Commanding General of Fleet Marine Force, Atlantic, to appoint an officer to conduct the investigation, using the initial investigation as a starting point and incorporating facts gathered by the Naval Investigative Service during its inquiry, and such other information as the investigating officer might develop.

Additionally, the Commandant noted that three Marines: Rother's squad leader, his platoon sergeant and the officer responsible for placing Rother and the other road guides on the night of Aug. 30, had all had been referred to special courts-martial. The Commandant noted as well that Rother's platoon leader and company commander had been relieved of their commands and reprimanded as a result of the incident.

The squad leader, Sgt. Thomas B. Turnell, is awaiting trial on charges of dereliction of duty and unauthorized

absence. Sgt. Christopher P. Clyde, Rother's platoon sergeant, has also been charged with dereliction of duty. 1st Lt. Allen V. Lawson has been charged with dereliction of duty and willful disobedience of an order for not posting the road guides in pairs as he had been told

to do. The three special courts-martial are expected to be held in the near future at Camp Lejeune, the home-base of the unit to which Rother was assigned.

The new investigation is expected to take about one month to complete.

## Work continues on proposed land expansion

Work continues in two main areas of the proposed land expansion of Camp Lejeune. The areas are the Draft Environmental Impact Statement and the Land Survey.

The Draft Environmental Impact Statement is being prepared to address questions and concerns of private individuals and public agencies and will consider all alternative courses of action.

The Land Survey is being conducted to establish the exact boundary line of each land owner's property. Once the property owners' boundary lines are established, Marine Corps officials will discuss boundaries with each property owner and then establish the proposed land expansion boundary lines. In most areas, the proposed land expansion boundary lines will be 200 to 300 yards from the highway. The exact location will have to be negotiated between the Marine Corps and the land owners, which is the purpose of the land survey.

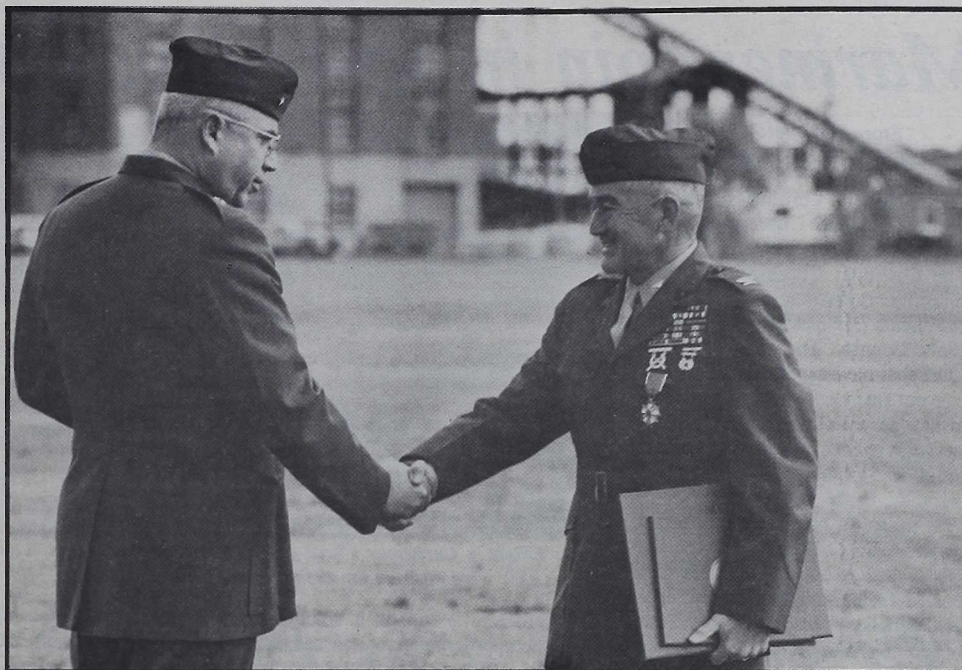

### Marine killed in accident

Pfc. Christopher J. Bellecci, 22, of Vallejo, Calif., was killed Nov. 19 when an amphibious assault vehicle backed over him in the dark at MCAGCC, Twentynine Palms, Calif. A helicopter was immediately dispatched to fly Bellecci to the Combat Center's hospital where he was pronounced dead.

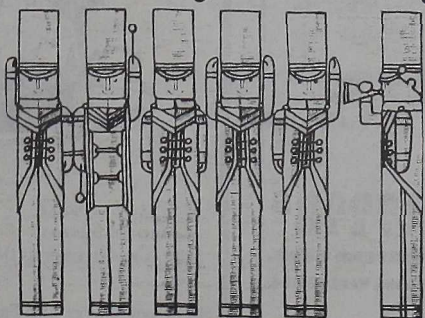
## Christmas concert scheduled for Sunday

# Marines join in spreading Christmas Cheer

Ho-Ho-Ho!!! It's Christmas time again, and the Christmas Cheer program is spreading cheer to needy people.

The Christmas Cheer program is a non-profit organization that stems from the Human Services Department of Onslow County. The program helps families that have experienced a trauma or are not financially able to provide a Christmas for their loved ones. Christmas Cheer helps provide toys, food and special items of need to families that are unable to purchase them.

The program has been around in Jacksonville about 18 years. It originally started with a group of ministers who discussed their Christmas benevolence after this holiday season and found out they had helped the same families more than once. That led to another discussion of finding a community system that would help prevent the same families from coming there too many times and enable the ministers to help many different families, according to Hargett.

"The Christmas Cheer program is a facsimile of the ministers' Christmas Benevolence program. Families can come into the Christmas Cheer office and fill out an application, specifying their needs for the holiday," said Glenn Hargett, program chairman.

The program is run on a volunteer basis. It accepts donations of new and old toys, money and non-perishable foods as well as clothes. The clothes are given to the Salvation Army or other similar organizations.

The intent of the program is not to duplicate already existing organizations but to help the community at a difficult time and assist in human needs. The program works with other organizations such as: Red Cross, Social Services and Family Services here. Family Services accepts the applications of Marines and Marine family members who cannot get

to the Christmas Cheer office.

"Anyone who is in need has to come into any one of the offices, Family Service or Christmas Cheer and fill out the application. We handle it from there," Hargett explained.

The applicants are interviewed by trained volunteers who assist the applicants in filling out the applications and determine what the applicants' special needs are. There are no rigid guidelines pertaining to income to determine whether or not Christmas Cheer will help the families. The applications are put into four categories from the most needy

to the least needy.

At the base level, some of the donations are given to the Adopt-a-Program, which is coordinated by Maj. Grant C. Beck, Marine Corps sergeant major.

The program is a volunteer effort for the units of Camp Lejeune. Each unit receives a number of applications for the Christmas Cheer office. The office distributes them to the commanding officers of the units. They distribute the applications to the units and companies.

The battalion or the company family it is assigned and puts together a Christmas package consisting of different elements. The first is the most comfortable items, the second is the best for a Christmas dinner and the third is two or three toys for the child if the family has children.

"How the Marines get the packages is up to them as long as it is legal. Some have held raffles, or taken a collection," Beck said.

"Last year we helped 82 families. The units got a lot of gratification helping the families," he added.

## Marines demonstrate grenade launcher to Argentinians

**PUERTO BELGRANO, Argentina—**With a demonstration of the MK-19 grenade machine gun, the Marines of UNITAS XXIX played the role of diplomats here recently as part of the first U.S. forces to visit the country in three years.

Although a blue-water exercise was part of the original schedule between the U.S. and Argentina Navy, the Marine exercise was set up later.

"While we were at sea, three Argentinian officers came aboard the *USS Sumter*, including a Marine officer," said 1st Lt. Samuel Lima, language officer. "They were given a tour of the ship and were shown some displays of U.S. Marine weapons. The Argentinian Marine showed interest in the MK-19, and after entering port, made a request to his commanding officer for us to give a demonstration of the machine gun. Our commanding officer obliged and a shoot was set up."

The area where the exercise was conducted is called the "Batterias," because it has seven naval coastal batteries that were used in the early 1900s as protection to the port and surrounding bay," continued Lima. "They have constructed a number of bases at the site of the batteries. One is an AAV base, where the MK-19 was fired, one is a logistical site, one has been preserved in its original condition as a tourist attraction and use of the MK-19 gunner," Lima said. "The base commander, and numerous officers and enlisted men were present for the demonstration."

"We set the gun up in what is called a combat placement," said Pfc. David G. Dekker, MK-19 gunner. "You get the gun down, get it set up and get ready to go. The MK-19 is the fastest machine gun to set up."

As the MK-19 crew members were getting the gun up and sighting in on the objective, they noticed that their target might not be quite so easy to hit.

"The target they had set up for us was a barrel at about 700-800 meters away," said Lance Cpl. Larry D. Plott, MK-19

gunner. "We were also told to try and keep our rounds from going over the berm and out of sight. Because it was a pinpoint target and we were limited in our range, we basically fired short and then, adjusting the gun, walked the rounds up to the target," he said.

"Argentina, like many South American countries, has livestock grazing on their firing ranges and care must be taken when the ranges are in use," said Lance Cpl. Patrick E. Moreno, MK-19 gunner. "The Argentinians were getting a kick out of seeing the rounds go downrange, because they're not used to seeing that."

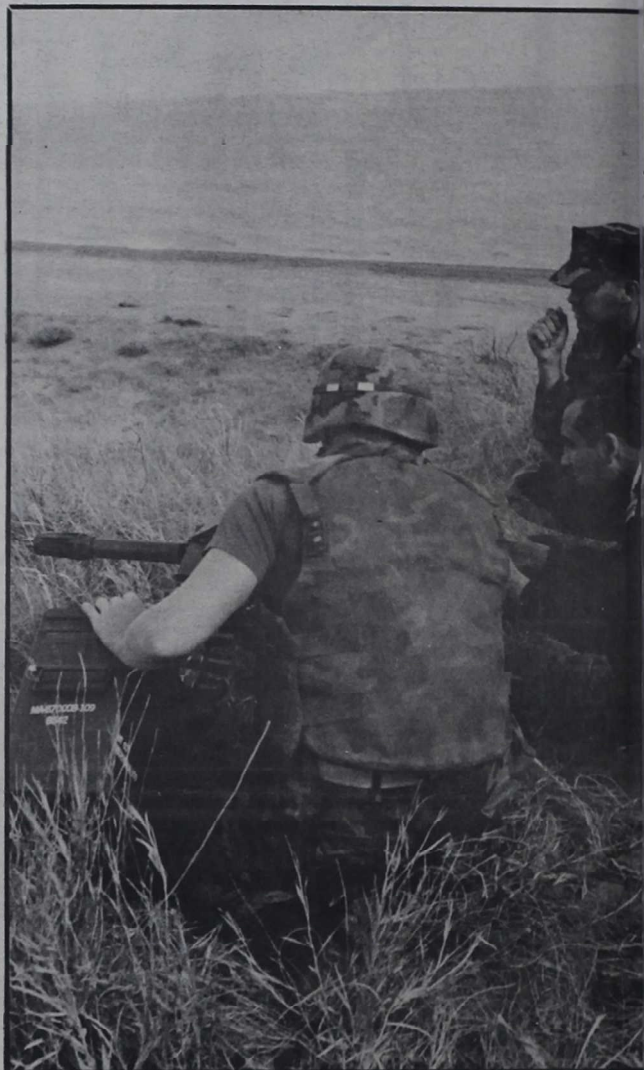
"They asked a lot of questions about the uses and firepower of the MK-19. Joking around, they asked if one of our Marines, who's pretty big, could shoot from the hip Rambo style. They also asked about the capabilities of our tracks, like how far they usually go before disembarking troops," Moreno said.

After the U.S. Marines demonstrated the range and power of the MK-19, the Argentinian officers were given a chance to fire.

"We showed them the basic sights, adjusted the range and from their suggestions, made the minor direction adjustments," said Plott. "The base commander fired five- to six-round bursts and seemed to really like it."

"We were using High Explosive, Dual Purpose rounds for this shooting," he explained. "The HEDP rounds have more anti-personnel capabilities and this was the first time on the cruise that we used them. They also make more impressive shoots," he added.

The U.S. Marines of the MK-19 crew seemed to impress their Argentinian

## Marines run 350-mile long strait aboard ship

**OF MAGELLAN** — In the 15th century, it took the Portuguese explorer Ferdinand Magellan more than a year to travel through this waterway between the Pacific and Atlantic Oceans. Located at the southern tip of South America and surrounded by snow-capped mountains, the passage is notorious for its treacherous currents, blinding snow and fog and tidal ranges

of 20-knot winds and freezing rain. Nothing stopped them from achieving their goal, however.

As the *Sumter* grew closer to the waters of the Atlantic, signaling the end of the passage, the group of Marine runners assembled on the flight deck to symbolize their team effort.

Marines of UNITAS XXIX participated in what is believed to be the first continuous run of the long strait while aboard the USS *Sumter*, LST-1181.

"I think the run was good," added the recon Marine. "We did something that hadn't been done before, and it was a motivation lift for a lot of people. The strait has the most beautiful scenery I've seen in South America so far."

Some of the conditions the Marines had to contend with during the run were

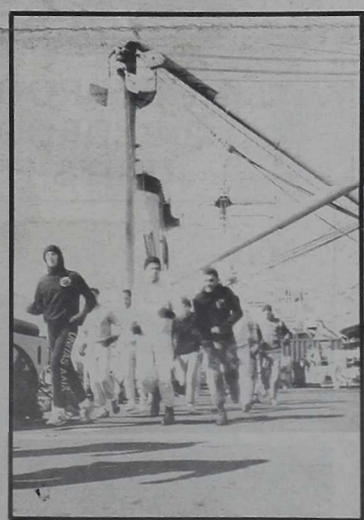
20-knot winds and freezing rain. Nothing stopped them from achieving their goal, however.

off the Chilean city of Punta Arenas, where the rest of the UNITAS Marines went ashore for scheduled activities with the Chilean Marine Corps. On the *Sumter*, however, there was always a leatherneck pounding sneakers on the flight deck.

# Battalions compete in machine gun shoot

The sound rata-rat-tat-tat is usually associated with a drummer beating his instrument. But in this case it's the sound of the .50-caliber and M60 machine guns firing in the Force Awards Competition for Military Proficiency in Gunnery.

Eight battalions from 2nd FSSG, Headquarters and Service, 2nd Maintenance, 8th Motor Transport, 8th Engineer Support, 2nd Landing Support, 2nd Medical, 2nd Supply, and 8th Communication battalions, participated in the

Force Awards competition at G-7 range, Camp Lejeune. The competition is a contest of battalion vs battalion in a machine gun shoot off.

"The competition has a twofold purpose. The first is to make Marines more proficient in crew-serve weapons. The second is to make Marines more proficient in overall competition inside the group," said Gunnery Sgt. Daniel E. Burke, non-commissioned officer-in-charge of Marksmanship Training Unit, 2nd FSSG.

There are four phases of the competition: one is an inspection of personnel and equipment; second is a written examina-

tion to see how well the Marines know the equipment; third is assembly and disassembly of the weapons; and fourth is the zeroing, qualification firing, firing at predetermined targets and firing off a traversing and elevation mechanism, which is how the machine gun moves from one target to another.

There are seven Marines per machine gun squad. The squads consist of one squad leader, two gunners, two A-gunners and two ammunition bearers.

"Each battalion has two squads, and there is one squad in the .50 cal., and one in the M60 competitions," said Burke. The squads are graded by evaluators.

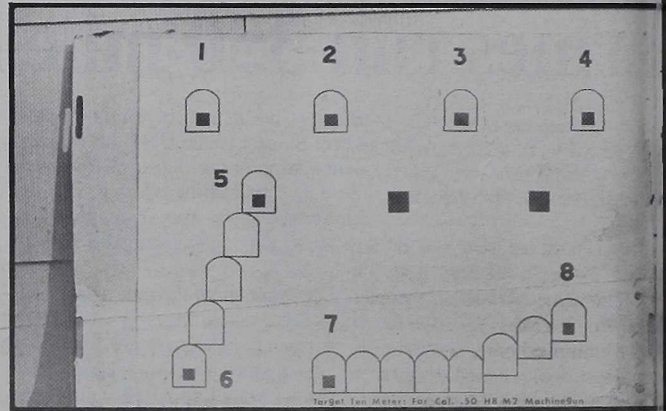
The Evaluators fill out reports on their personal views on how the machine gun squads are at the machine guns.

After the evaluations are completed the reports go to the Marksmanship Training Unit and the unit chief first-, second- and third-place b

"The competition is good training a good system because every Marine should have the opportunity to break down a machine gun. It's the Marines for combat readiness," said Sgt. Wallington Sim Jr., 2nd Support Bn., 2nd FSSG.

# MEU's Atlantic journey allows for 'prep' time

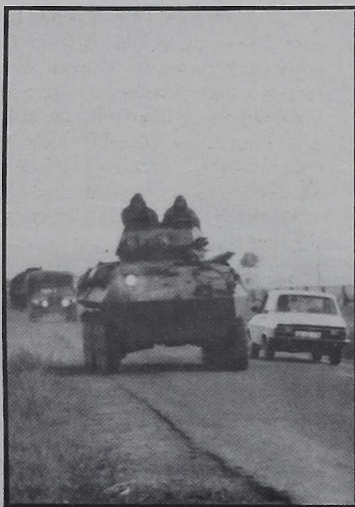
h Marine Expeditionary Unit (Special Operations Capable) aboard the USS Guam—The final rope, securing the five amphibious ships to the pier in the pierhead City, was released and the commencement "Underway" meant good-bye to family and friends for about 1,800 Marines attached to the 24th Marine Expeditionary Unit Special Operations Capable.

From the time of their departure on the early August afternoon, the 24th MEU (SOC) Marines, currently on a month-long deployment in the Mediterranean, have been busy honing their combat skills at sea, on land and in preparation for exercises with the forces.

The MEU (SOC), consisting of the Command Element, Battalion Landing Team 2/4, Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron 261 and MEU Service Support Group 24, continued preparation for the Mediterranean deployment during the 11 days taken to cross the Atlantic Ocean. "It has been a learning process from start for our air/ground team," ex-

plained 1st Lt. R.W. Smith, HMM-261 adjutant and Cobra pilot. "It gave the air crew a better understanding of what our infantry and service support Marines are trying to accomplish in their missions. A lot of new ideas were brought up by all three communities (air, ground and logistics) during the TransAtlantic operations that added to the further success of our MEU (SOC) mission.

"We had to take into account the different obstacles encountered on each ship, everything from steel riggings to the confined space available on which a Marine could successfully fast rope—anything that affected the pilots getting the rope to the correct spot and the infantry Marine getting to the deck," Smith continued. "Timing and planning were critical to the overall success of each

practice mission. It was a teamwork effort."

Upon arrival in the Mediterranean, the ships docked at Naval Base Rota, Spain, for turnover with the outgoing MEU and two weeks of additional training prior to taking on the first exercise.

"We took advantage of the airfield at the Rota, Spain Naval Base and the terrain of Spain in preparation for our upcoming events in the Med," Smith said. "The terrain, which includes mountains 40 miles to the east of Rota, gave us an ideal opportunity to fly in an environment we can expect to encounter throughout the Mediterranean. It gave the air crew a fantastic opportunity to fly over terrain unlike that encountered at Marine Corps Air Station New River,

which is more or less flat."

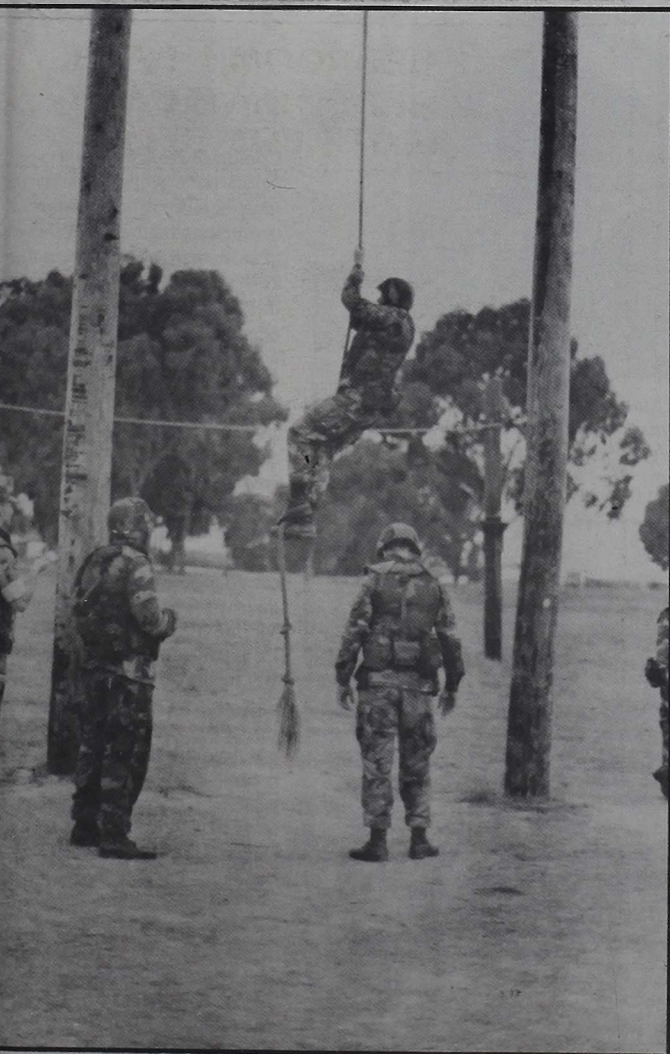
The Command Element also had an opportunity to ensure its Marines were prepared physically while visiting Rota by conducting a Combat Physical Readiness Test. Wearing a helmet, flak jacket and web gear, the Command Element Marines climbed a 20-foot high rope, performed step ups on logs 18 inches off the ground, fireman carried fellow Marines 25 yards, ran a fire and maneuver course and marched five miles (2½ each way) from the ship to the test site, and back, with full packs and weapons.

Leaving Rota behind, the 24th MEU (SOC) Marines had a brief rest in the Spanish tourist resort of Palma, located east of Spain, before heading for Italy and an exercise with the Italian military.

"We took advantage of the terrain offered in Italy to fine tune our skills in a tactical environment," explained 1st Lt. Andrew Solgere, BLT 2/4 adjutant. "We were able to practice mountain combat training, night operations, vehicle tactics and live fire training from small arms weapons to artillery."

The other 24th MEU (SOC) units were also busy sharpening their force-in-readiness skills during the exercise. HMM-261 carried out both day and night ship-to-shore flight operations, MSSG-24 provided medical and supply support and the Command Element, also in the field, tested its ability to set up, tear down and relocate its command post in a minimum amount of time.

With the Italy exercise behind, 24th MEU (SOC) Marines were ready to meet the major challenge of Display Determination 88, which is a two-part NATO exercise conducted in Italy and Turkey.

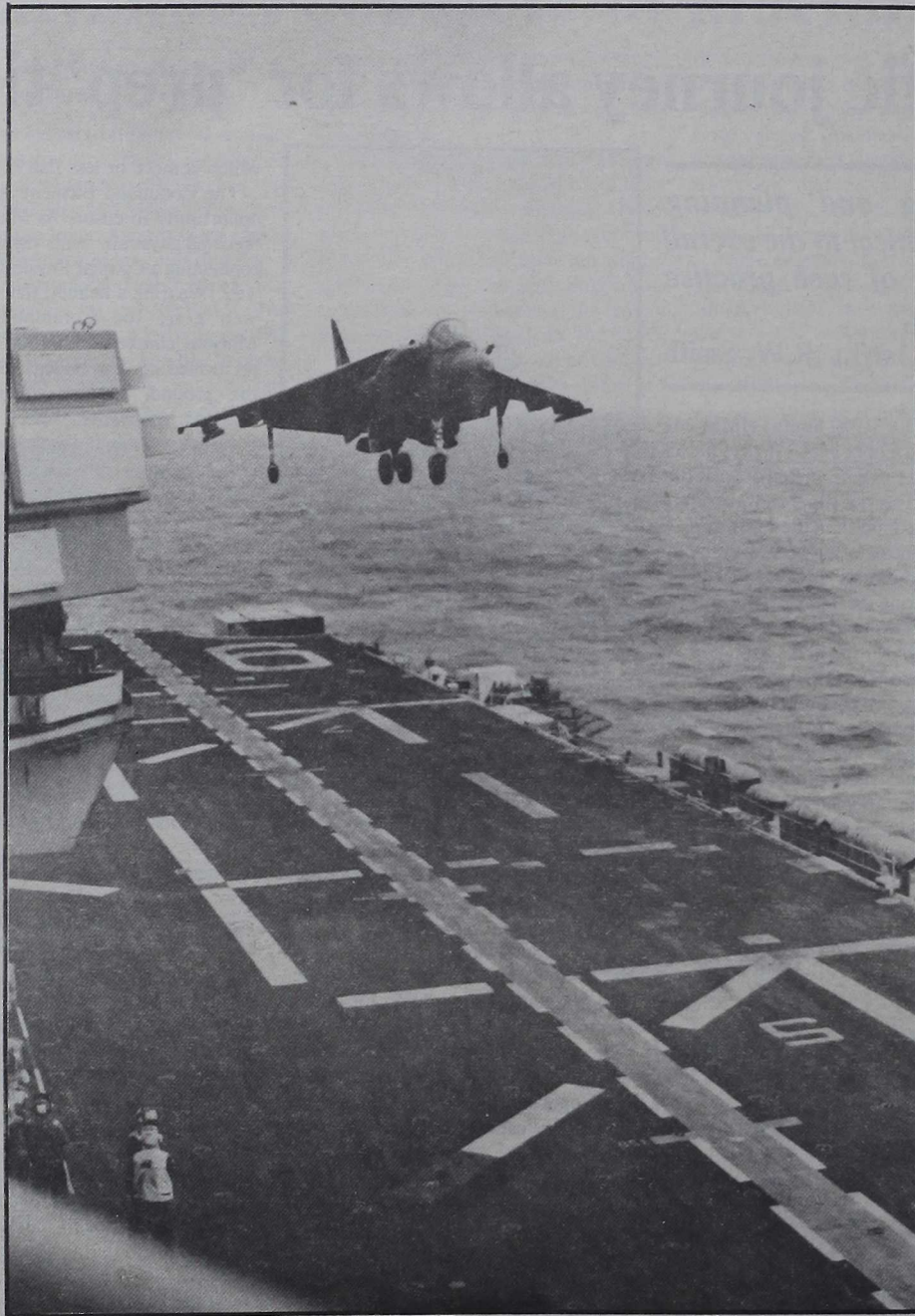

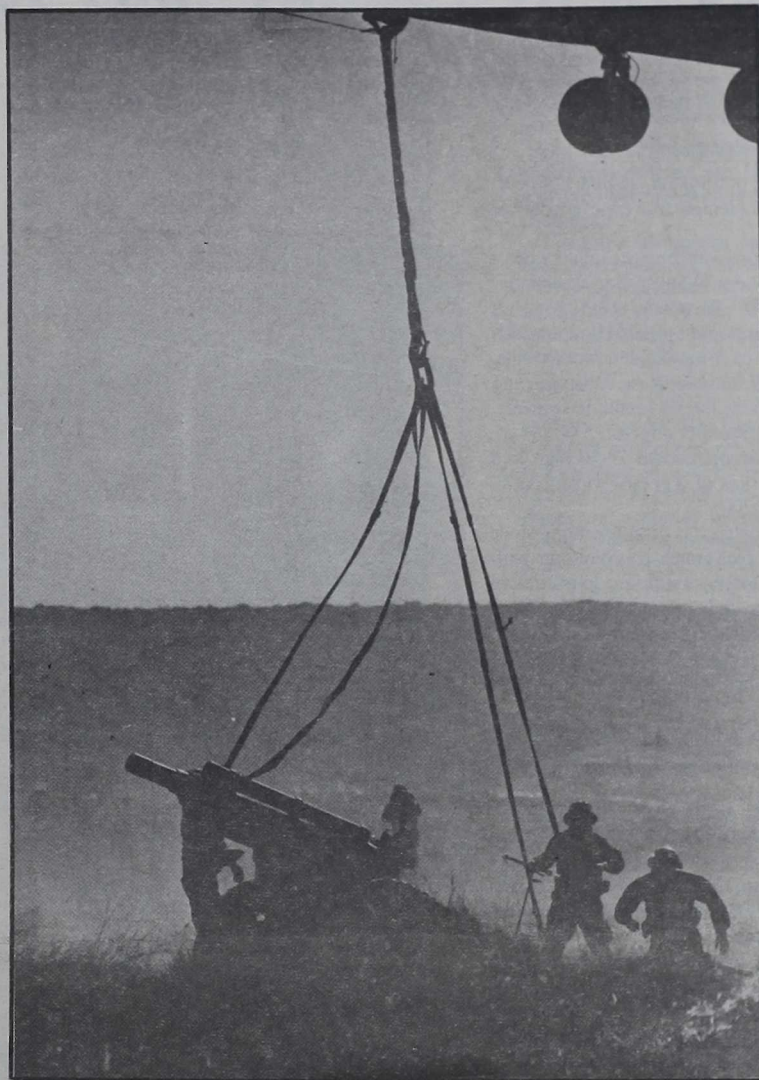

# 3/12 Marines spend holiday fixing old house

To the Marine way of thinking, 96 hours of liberty means time off and a temporary reprieve from the military regimen.

Yet one unit took time out from its holiday liberty routine to help others Thanksgiving weekend.

Hotel Battery, 3rd Battalion, 12th Marines volunteered to fix up and spiff up an old house, which has fallen to disrepair over the years in Jacksonville.

The old house is sanctuary for battered women and their children in Onslow and surrounding counties, according to Connie Shotate, director.

"The shelter can accommodate 24 women and children who are victims of domestic violence and sexual assault" she said.

The Jacksonville shelter has been operating since February 1985 and does much coordination with Family Services on base. Last year an administrative building was added to the shelter.

"The Marines volunteered to fix our leaky roof, window screens and locks, and to paint, caulk and do general maintenance in both the building and yard," Shotate said.

The civic project began last summer following a conversation between the battalion's chaplain and commanding officer.

"The CO of 3rd Bn., 10th Marines, Lt. Col. E.M. Campbell, gave us his full support and encouragement to pursue this project," said Navy Lt. Larry Ruddell, 3/10 chaplain. "We do a lot of civic action projects while deployed, and we thought it was time to get involved at home."

Ruddell talked to different agencies in the area and determined the battered women's home had the most immediate needs. "That was in June. In October we contacted them again and agreed on one day in November to come out and fix the house up," Ruddell said.

That day just happened to fall on the Thanksgiving weekend, according to Ruddell. "We really didn't plan it that way. It's been an alternative to do something nice for others, instead of just thinking about ourselves this holiday season."

Before the repair crew of 45 artillerymen descended on this old house, Ruddell had to provide a list of building materials, tools and estimated cost to the

shelter. He had no background in this and sent word to Hotel Battery for someone with this background.

Ruddell found Lance Cpl. Jesus Galicia.

Ruddell took Galicia to the shelter to calculate cost

estimate for the job.

"From that day on, Galicia became the advisor," Ruddell said.

"We take our orders from him out here," Sgt. Mark Kellison, platoon sergeant.

Ruddell attributes this leadership to the leadership team at Hotel 3/12. "They had a guy who could get the job done and take the ball and run with it."

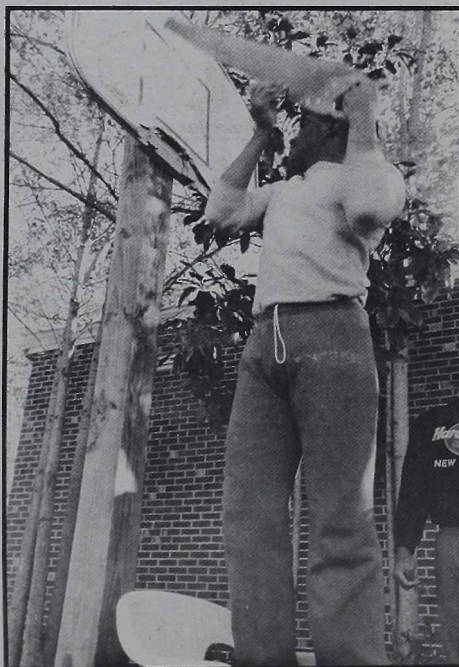
The battery drew volunteers with a wide range of construction experience, including roofers, carpenters, according to Galicia, who has experience with hardware and general contracting.

The experience also added up to some of the best workers. Cpl. Vernon Schlichting, filling in as a carpenter, cut board to close off an entrance. "I enjoy carpentry work. I use my furniture and do projects around home," said.

Most of the Marines found the work a challenge to maintaining howitzers.

"Since we don't have the chance to make us feel good to help other people," Prince, said from his roof top perch. He has 10 years experience in roofing and landscaping.

The house repair work the battery put in a half day couldn't have been accomplished without the experience, teamwork and enthusiasm of everyone involved, according to Galicia. "The cooperation has been great. I just want to thank these guys for their help in doing this."

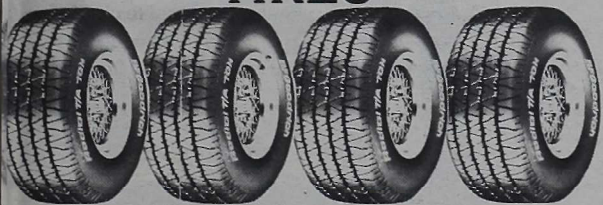
The hobby shops on base are also providing their services and use of their equipment.

"The auto shop is adding a new twist to this year's Appreciation Day. They are going to give free automotive inspections," Jerry Asbury, Special Services recreation director, said.

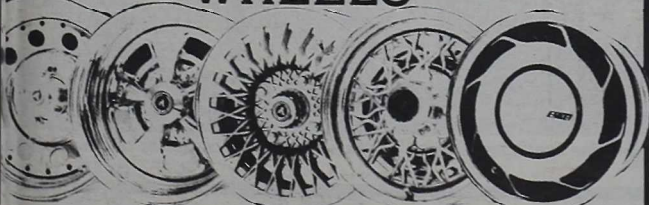

# Base's new obstacle course bigger than P

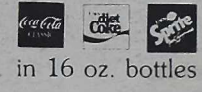

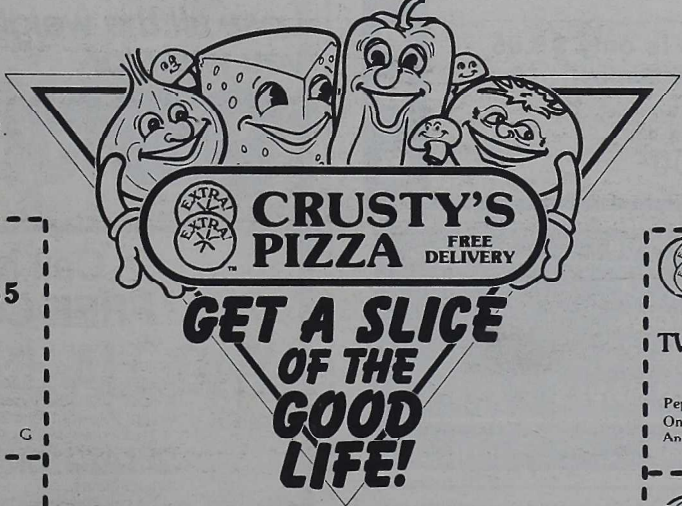

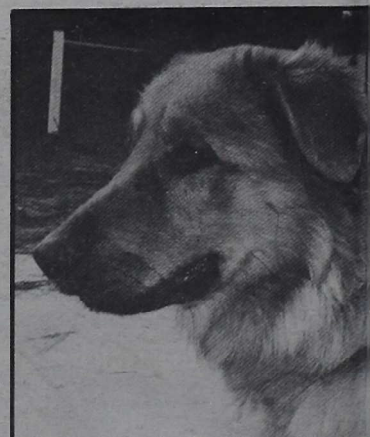

Teddy Randolph, a Camp Lejeune Marine, won a bronze medal after winning two fights by 4-1, 3-2 decisions.

Although Randolph only came with the bronze at CISM, he is aided by his coach and teammates very well for the All-Marine team in the future.

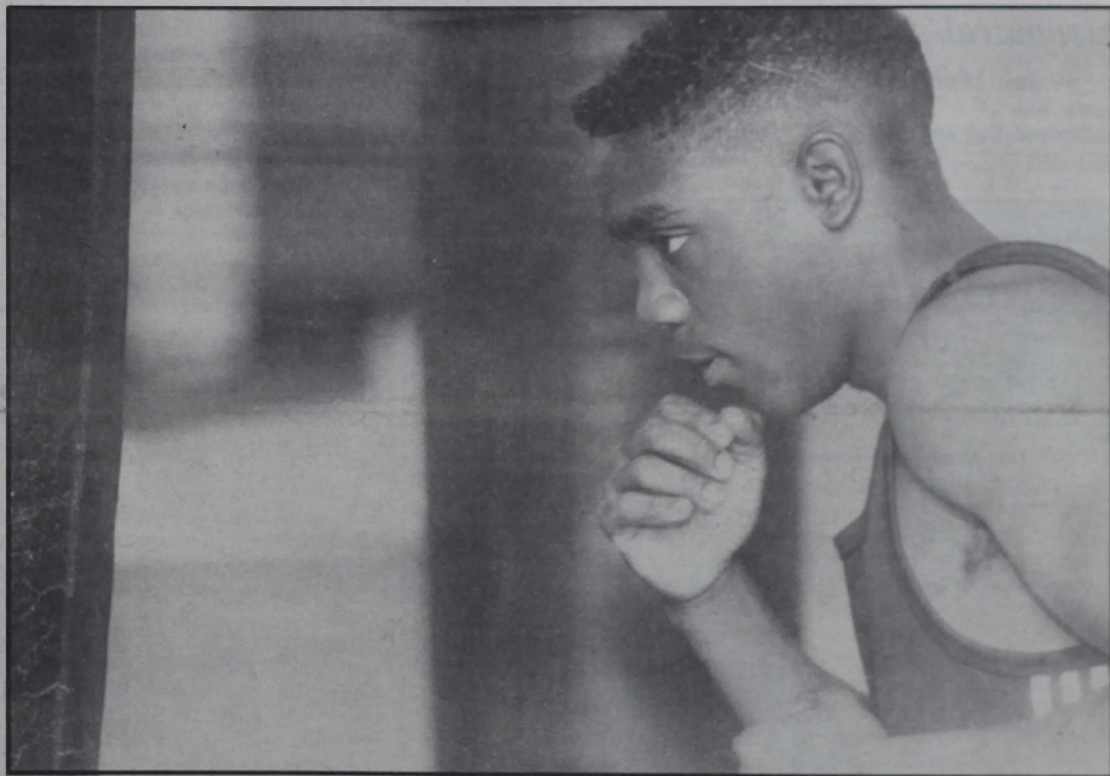
As a pretty sharp boxer and will likely end up as one of the bright stars on the team in the near future," said Maurice Knight, assistant coach.

"The people in Egypt were very hot and the water and food left a lot to be desired," Randolph said. We had a physician with us, and she put me on an I.V. with glucose and a lot of sugar to give me some energy to fight my bout."

One of the facts that Randolph got out of the experience was that he also had the toughest fight of his career on his hand.

"It was my toughest fight for a few years. I wasn't use to foreign fighters' style of boxing. They hold their hands way out in front of them, and it was very confusing to me."



Boxer Lance Cpl. Teddy Randolph boxes a punching bag the old fashioned way—bare fisted.

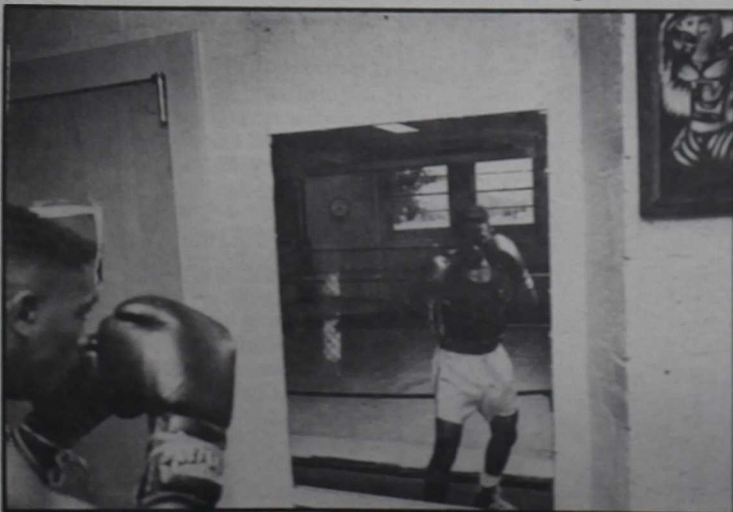
Randolph said.

"I was supposed to fight an Egyptian in the semifinals and had prepared myself to fight the Egyptian, but when I got to the ring that morn-

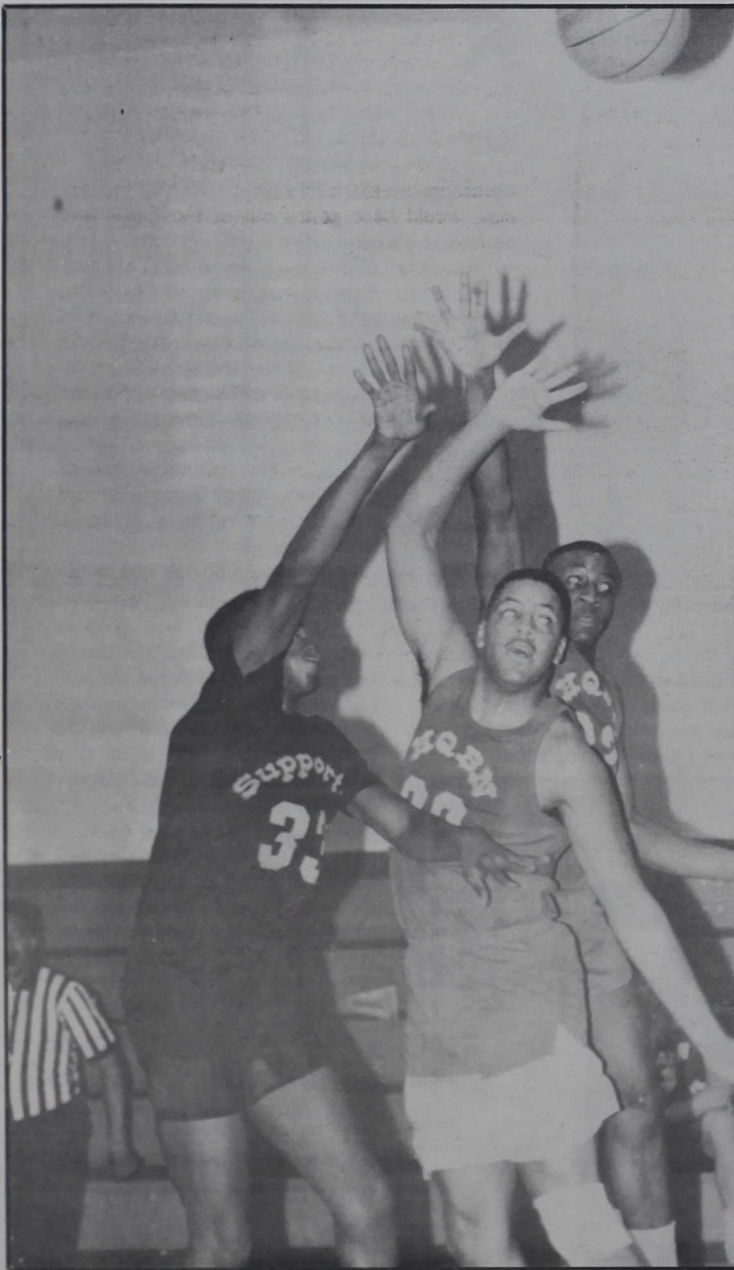

career, and has started reaping benefits for the players he chooses for his teams. Since he began coaching the All-Camp team, Shai has compiled an impressive 11-1 record, and has helped a number of his players who were getting out of the Corps get full scholarships to college.

"Up to now, I've sent more than 20 former players to colleges to play football," Shai admitted. "Primarily, I get them into Huron University in South Dakota, but I've also sent one to Arizona State, two to West Virginia and one to Georgia."

In addition to the Marine Corps players, Shai has gotten Huron University Coach Cary Radisewitz to look at and take on a couple of local high school players for his team, the "Tribe."

"Most of our players go to Huron because we have a good program worked out up there," Shai said. "It all started when Huron recruited some former Marine Corps basketball players and *Sports Illustrated* did an article about them. The football coach figured if they could recruit good basketball players from the Corps, they'd probably be able to do just as well with the football players."

Huron, according to Shai, is a small college in the North American Intercollegiate Athletic Conference which, over the past couple of years since starting their recruiting program here, has come around as quite a football power.

As far as recruiting players, this year should be a

good year for Huron coaches as Shai said no less than 10 of his players from the Corps and a couple of local high school players will be looked at by Radisewitz when he comes here Saturday.

Coach Radisewitz will be coming to Camp Lejeune to watch the All-Camp team play against Cherry Point in the season's only 11-man football game. His trip is more a formality than anything else.

"Cary will be here to get a first hand look at the players I feel he'll be interested in," Shai said. "He's going to get together with the team tonight and show some films about the college and their football program."

So, why is the trip here just a formality?

"Because I have every confidence that the players coach Shai calls me about will be good players and will want to play at Huron," Radisewitz said in a telephone interview. "He hasn't let us down yet. Nearly everyone he's sent to us is still playing for us. The only ones who have left the college have done so because of family problems."

There's a reason this program has been so successful for Huron and Shai.

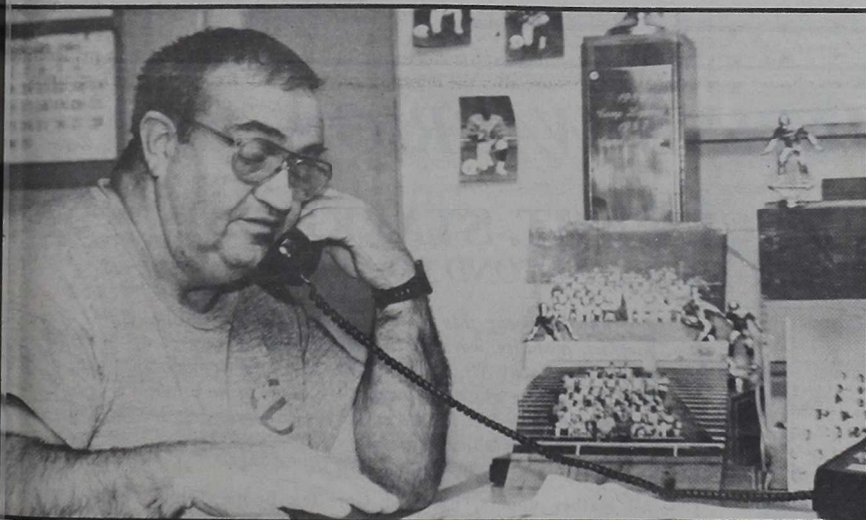
"The guys who are playing in the Corps are older and more mature than your average player in college," Shai said. "Because of the Corps, they're more disciplined and ready to play when they get there; not like the kid who's fresh out of High School who has to 'Red Shirt' (not play so he can maintain eligibility) for a year before he's ready to play."

So far, the program started by Huron has become a great opportunity for the players who, for the most part, would have gotten out of the Corps with nothing else to do.

"These guys are getting a college education virtually free. Most of them, though, are staying in the Marine Corps Reserve while they go to school," Shai said. "At the same time, the school reaps the benefits by getting players like Roman Holiday who, in his first game at Huron, ran for 198 yards and scored four touchdowns. It's sort of like one hand washing the other."

For now, coach Radisewitz plans to continue the program and give as many Camp Lejeune football players as possible, the opportunity to go on to college.

As for coach Shai, if his Jeckle and Hyde tactics keep his teams on the winning track and his players going on to play in college, that's what he plans on continuing to do.
